Summer Food Insecurity Rises with the Heat

There are times during the year when those heading under-resourced households are more uncertain of having enough food or being able to acquire enough food to meet the needs of their household members. For the Georgia neighbors calling on St. Vincent de Paul for food support, summer is one of those times. There are several contributing factors that consistently leave our neighbors lacking sufficient funds to feed their families.

Those with children can no longer rely on summer supplemental aid that ended in Georgia last year. The aid was meant to ensure that children receiving free and reduced-cost meals at school would have resources for food directed to their homes during school breaks.


Everyone can relate to the increase in utility bills associated with the Georgia heat, but we don't always think about the usage increase associated with kids spending more of their time at home versus school. The U.S. Energy Information Administration analysis for summer 2025 projected a 6.2 percent increase for home cooling over last year. For many of our neighbors, even a \$30 monthly increase can result in difficult choices between paying their utility bill and meeting other critical household needs, including food.

We know these are just two factors that are likely to increase food insecurity for children. The USDA reminds us that if children are experiencing food insecurity in a household, the adults are just as likely to be experiencing the same. St. Vincent de Paul answered the calls for food support from neighbors across Georgia.

When the discussion ended, It was obvious that Brian Goldstone was moved. "It was a rich conversation, and I wish we could do it more often, with more leaders. These are the people who are going to influence solutions to housing instability. St. Vincent de Paul gets it, with the work they do every day, and the partnerships they build for outcomes that help neighbors have a decent roof over their heads. I don't think that's too much for anyone to want."

Brian relayed the experiences of homeless neighbors profiled in his book that moved the group. All had jobs that in the past would have assured safe affordable housing and all had faced numerous barriers to accessing services and help. Today they are suffering indignities and loss.

The Atlanta leaders in the room had thoughts and ideas. This was an opportunity to share them without concern for public disclosure. The passion they have for the betterment of people and communities in Atlanta and beyond, is sure to translate into actions that will benefit our neighbors.

SVdP Brought Stable Housing and Business Inspiration

Willow & Lavender brings dignity, healing, and wellness.

A few years ago, Motel to Home neighbor Sonya Warlick wrote the book, *A King's Love for His Daughter*. She knows that without God's love and help from St. Vincent de Paul, she could be living a different story. When she thought about launching a handcrafted skincare brand, so many of her ideas came from a place of recovery and healing. As the founder of Willow & Lavender, she built her brand around softness, strength and legacy. Her target audience would be women navigating through housing insecurity, incarceration, and community re-entry.

She wants to affirm to women that circumstances don't have to dictate their presentation. "When we take care of ourselves, we feel better, we look better and the people we meet think better of us. Despite everything I went through I didn't want to walk around with a bad attitude with my troubles sitting on my shoulders," Sonya shared. "There I was with my two boys, no income, no job, living in a hotel room and certainly had no money for a day at the spa or products for self-care."

Making it through COVID in the real estate business while homeschooling her boys had depleted her savings and maxed out her credit cards. As she searched for new employment while trying to keep her young sons housed and schooled, she and her boys spent six months living in hotel rooms, relying on the public library for safety, cleanliness, and information. It was there she found information on the Gwinnett Library Sponsored Business Plan Competition and decided to see if she could take the skin care products she was developing from items in her kitchen to an enterprise. She won the competition, earning a cash prize, mentoring, and a year-long Chamber membership with office space.

Her constant daily research also brought her to United Way 211 and a referral to Motel to Home. It took a few months to meet the program requirements, but in January she got the news from Motel to Home that she had been accepted.

A strong woman knows she has strength enough for the journey, but a woman of strength knows it is in the journey where she will become strong.

In January 2026, St. Vincent de Paul Georgia will launch its Drive to Bag 10,000 Pounds of Food, inviting supporters and partners to join the fight against food insecurity for neighbors in need.

"This effort goes beyond the surge in food requests we've seen during the summer and year after year," says Adam Seely, Director of Food Initiatives. "Many essential items are not consistently available from our traditional suppliers, and this drive also responds to the many supporters who ask how they can help. We believe this is a great way for friends to make a difference, expand our collective impact, and enjoy the camaraderie of the Atlanta Community Food Bank Hunger Walk."

The drive will run through the first two months of the year and culminate at the 2026 Hunger Walk, where participants who help us reach the 10,000-pound goal will be recognized.

Companies, schools, churches, and community organizations are encouraged to participate. Each participating group will receive collection containers, and SVdP will provide pick-up and distribution of donated items across our 40+ food pantries.

Building a Stronger Future: SVdP Welcomes New Board Leaders

A strong nonprofit board is built on several key pillars, including passionate and engaged members, clear communication and expectations, effective governance and strategic planning, and a commitment to the organization's mission and continuous improvement.

The Power of Partnerships

Fully Furnished Ministries Bless and Furnish SVdP Neighbors

In 2003, a group of volunteers with a simple idea set out to honor God by connecting families who no longer needed furniture with those who did. The furnishings didn't need to be in perfect condition, because they had teams of volunteers to restore it to like-new condition. They had no idea of the needs they would encounter over the next eighteen years. By 2021, the ministry added part-time staff for warehouse and outreach support, and later welcomed its first full-time Executive Director, John Dance. He was surprised, humbled, and honored that St. Vincent de Paul chose them as the 2025 Community Builder of Hope.



Much like St. Vincent de Paul, Fully Furnished Ministries meets families in crisis. Apartment fires, hurricanes, floods, refugee settlements, family transitional housing programs, women fleeing abuse, veterans needing housing, and sometimes a family just needing a new start. Few neighbors they encounter have even the basics, so each year hundreds of families receive essentials like beds, tables, and dishes that help them create healthy, happy homes. Yet what lingers longest are the prayers and personal connections offered with every delivery.

"Fully Furnished Ministries is one of the best tools in our partnership toolbox", shared Vincentian member Krista Toddy. "They are there for our neighbors, when we've run out of resources. I have my own testimonies of how they have been there for neighbors, including grandparents taking in a grandson but unable to buy him a bed to sleep in. When a family we were able to place in stable housing didn't have a kitchen table to eat on, Fully Furnished came to their rescue. They take pride and extreme care with every item they bring through the door. I love the honor they give to God, by blessing the home and the people in it with prayer. We are blessed to have them as a partner."

HEALing Community Health Brings Quality and Compassionate Care to SVdP Neighbors

HEALing Community Health Dr. Verneda Curry (CEO) and Dr. Diana Wilson (Chief Medical Officer) attended the 2025 SVdP Corporate and Community Impact Luncheon in February. Before leaving, they had assured Health Initiatives Director, Dr. Samanta Ricks, that a partnership with St. Vincent de Paul was inevitable, and she had good reasons to think the same.

"Beyond the alignment of our missions is a shared commitment to achieve excellence in patient outcomes," said Dr. Ricks. "Households headed by women make up our largest service demographic across the organization. HEALing's focus on women's health, combined with the pediatric services



they offer, will provide easy access to care for mothers and their children. Every day we see neighbors bypass needed healthcare out of lack of convenience and having to make difficult choices between other critical household needs that exceed their limited financial resources."

In the pilot partnership program, kicking off this fall, the HEALing Community Health mobile unit will be on-site at Chamblee monthly. Doctors will see patients by pre-scheduled appointments. Pharmacy patients and other neighbors will have access to services at the mobile unit and HEALing health centers throughout Metro Atlanta. Beyond the pilot and assessment opportunities, Conferences within their service area will be able to schedule the mobile unit and refer neighbors.

HEALing Community Health, a federally qualified health center serving Metro Atlanta since 2013, bridges healthcare gaps with quality, compassionate care for all. The dedicated medical team works diligently to achieve excellent patient outcomes. The SVdP/HEALing partnership will open doors to better health for our neighbors.

Hope Was Transformed with \$7.5M

5 Years of Service at the Renovated Chamblee Service Center

In August supporters joined St. Vincent de Paul to celebrate the five-year anniversary of the reopening of the Chamblee Service Center. The property purchase and renovation of the facility was made possible by the 2020 Hope Transformed Capital Campaign, making it more responsive to the needs of local neighbors and the support needs of the 3,500+Vincentian members across Georgia.

Campaign Committee Co-Chair Mike Petrik shared his reflections with the sixty reception guests, "We knew we were taking on a tremendous challenge, with the original campaign goal of \$6.5 million. But we had faith in the mission and faith that people and organizations of this community would join us to make life better for our neighbors in need. Despite our long service record in Georgia, many of those we initially called on had little knowledge of the impact of our mission. My fellow Campaign committee members and our leadership did a tremendous job of changing that. The success of the Campaign has opened doors for the support we are seeing today, and the continued support St. Vincent de Paul will need in the future."

A commemorative plaque now hangs in the Center to recognize the success and contributors of St. Vincent de Paul's first capital campaign.

WISH Supports

Motel to Home Families

The members of WISH (Women in Service and Hope) chose to focus their service efforts on Motel to Home (M2H) because so many of the households served by the program, are headed by women. "Many of us are moms, and I know that some of us have first-hand experience raising children as a single parent and others who made it through some difficult times to get to the stability and success we have today," shared a WISH member during their back-to-school bookbag project. "I can remember what it was like, tackling the cost of supplies along with all the other bills, worrying how far I could stretch a dollar. I'm glad I can be a part of taking that worry away for our M2H moms and have a chance to work alongside my WISH sisters."

WISH joined other supporters in making sure that all 120+ children in M2H households had the supplies needed to start the school year. Extra bookbags were provided to the Family Support Center for other neighbors who need assistance with school supplies.

Earlier in the summer, members of WISH were on hand to engage M2H kids while their moms attended a required Saturday financial education session. "Many of our parents don't have extra resources to pay for babysitters, and it can be very difficult for them to give their full attention to the information shared if they're trying to manage their children at the same time. It's a big thing that the women of WISH are willing to take time out of their weekend to support our families," said M2H Program Manager, Heidi Eveleigh.

Love Comes to Our Rome Neighbors

A Vincentian Conference Established in Floyd County

St. Vincent de Paul Georgia's strategic plan emphasizes growing Vincentian membership and Conferences across the state. "The needs of our neighbors combined with providing an avenue for parishioners to serve are at the heart of building SVdP Chapters. The areas of Georgia, with no Vincentian chapters, are served by Chamblee Service Center staff. This can limit the face-to-face interactions that we count on to address the long-term needs of our neighbors beyond the crisis of their first call for aid," shared Lisa Regan, Sr. Director of Programs and Services. "Expanding our service capacity in Floyd County will benefit the neighbors who need us most."

On May 10, 2025, St. Mary's Conference launched to serve all of Floyd County. With Father Porter's leadership and parish support, including a second monthly collection, the new Conference quickly grew to 16 active Vincentians focused on Home Visits. In just a few months, they have already served more than 131 neighbors.

"Going out into the field and meeting people in their homes is unique to being a Vincentian," shared Conference President Patrick Marks.

The home visits are incredibly rewarding and humbling. The families you meet ask for so little, yet you see how great their need is.

Patrick and his wife Karen have an established legacy of support at St. Mary's Catholic School via the Verso L'Alto Endowment Fund. The Latin phrase meaning "to the heights," will enhance student education experience beyond the classroom, funding enrichment speakers, field trips, and other unique learning opportunities. A strong desire to give back combined with his passion for expanding outreach to neighbors in need led Patrick to take on the role as inaugural president of the St. Mary's Conference.

St. Mary's Church, located in Rome, Georgia, has grown from a handful of members to 1,700 families today. From a simple wooden church on East First Street to the present facilities inspired by Gothic forms and monastic simplicity, the school has grown from 51 students in 1945 to 200 today. A legacy of faith and community have passed from generation to generation at St. Mary's - It seems like the perfect parish for St. Vincent de Paul Georgia's newest Conference.

In the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains, Rome is the largest city in Floyd County. Of the approximately 38,000 people who live there, 25% live below the federal poverty line, 17% of households are headed by women, and only 20% are educated beyond high school. The intersection of these demographics are predictors of neighbors who are more likely to experience household challenges during economic downturns and rising costs of basic needs.

We look forward to sharing the impact Vincentian members will have with neighbors in Floyd County.

Program services will support mothers in building sustained family and housing stability, with:

The program honors Saint Louise de Marillac, co-founder of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and patron Saint of social workers, who dedicated her life to serving widows, orphans, and the sick.

Housing Mothers and their Babies

The 2022 Georgia Point in Time (PIT) Report showed a 43% increase in unsheltered individuals since 2019. Nationally, women and their children account for 45% of the homeless population.

Pregnant women and single mothers are especially vulnerable, facing wage and housing disparities, gaps in healthcare, inadequate maternity benefits, and the challenges of parenting alone. Nearly 80% of households served by SVdP in 2024 were headed by women. You can see the stress on their face when they don't know how they will feed their children, keep the lights on, or are facing an eviction and potential homelessness. Mental illness compounds these pressures. About 65% of homeless women experience mental illness, and nearly half live with major depression, which is double the rate of the general population.

In Georgia, 35,000 women cited financial hardship as the primary reason for terminating pregnancies. To respond, SVdP Programs and Services will launch **Marillac Moms**, a pilot program modeled after the highly successful CareSource *Healthy Beginnings at Home* model. The program will provide crisis resources for pregnant women and transitional housing for homeless mothers with children.



Generosity Expands and Upgrades the SVdP Fleet

Every day, St. Vincent de Paul trucks are on the road picking up food donations from retailers, delivering to warehouse storage and Conference pantries. We also get unexpected calls at the closing of exhibits and tradeshows for donations that exhibitors don't want to ship back. Everything we receive directly or indirectly serves to feed, clothe, house and heal our neighbors in need, and we work hard to accommodate every opportunity to support the mission, even when our fleet had major challenges.

"Our fleet was old, with several vehicles needing repairs that forced us to rent trucks," shared Operations Director Darrell Hooker. "As a statewide service agency, the miles add up quickly. Repairs strained our unrestricted and emergency funds, and retailers donating food cannot wait for a truck repair. Every item we receive carries a cost to manage it, and transportation issues created extra expenses and limited our ability to respond to partners ready to give."

In 2025, SVdP created a transportation fund to cover the daily costs of operating and maintaining our vehicles, including refrigerated truck rentals. Donors stepped in with generous support, and the fund remains open for designated gifts to sustain this critical work.

When asked "what do you need most" and "how can we help," the answer was clear: newer, more reliable vehicles. The Holzgrefe Family and NetMOVE responded with vehicle donations that greatly expanded our transportation capacity. Their generosity has made a tremendous impact, and we are deeply grateful.
