"We've been through a lot, me and Wafa," says Faiza. "From home to the surf spot was only a 20-minute walk, but it was kind of like hell for me. You put on your headphones but still you can feel people acting weird around you. When I got harassed, I was like, okay, this is enough."

Putting their surfboards away, instead Faiza and Wafa split the cost of a beat-up old skateboard for a handful of dirhams, and the pair were converted. They discovered that while the skatepark was maledominated, they were far from unwelcome. They found a community that embraced them as equals.

"At the beginning, it was a little intimidating because, of course, there were more boys and it's something new for us," says Wafa. "But we were lucky to meet beautiful, cool people who helped us, and also pushed us to skate more."

Wafa's skating profile rose to the point where in 2021 she made it to the Olympics try outs. Meanwhile, Faiza, who had a graphic design background, was working full time for Morocco's leading surf organisation, Surf Maroc, based in Morocco's surf capital of Taghazout, 30 minutes north of Agadir.

As she surfed more, she came to a realisation. "Every time I surfed, I got out of the water and I'd cry because I didn't have the courage to surf big waves," she says. "I was like, you know what, this thing is supposed to make me happy, not sad – and I had the idea that many girls feel the same. So, this is where it started, the idea to create this brand, get girls together and just be us, motivating each other."

The idea linked up with others already in motion - she had been working on designs, inspired by skate and surf culture, for T-shirts and jewellery. Meanwhile, the pair were offering skate lessons to encourage the growing numbers of local women and girls interested in skate culture, buoyed by the opening of a brandnew, clifftop skate park in Taghazout.

When the pandemic hit, Faiza brought disparate female skaters together on the street as a means of



bonding, sharing tricks and creating a community: "I thought, let's bring our skateboards, put on some music, and have fun. I thought, we have nothing to lose. We do it anyway. So why not together?"

The result of all this has culminated in Wheels n Fins, a side hustle with serious ambitions that blends the pair's two biggest passions – skating and surfing – while also utilising their talents outside of sport: Faiza's artistic flair with Wafa's knack for branding.

As well as offering merchandise – T-shirts, hoodies and jewellery – and regular surf and skate lessons in Taghazout and BBQ evenings, there are now plans for retreats, a vintage clothing shop and more events.

Further into the future, Faiza is thinking bigger still. "My goal is to have my own indoor skate park, where people can hang out, chill, have a drink, and gather together," she says. "I want to be surrounded by surf and skate until I die." wheelsnfins.com

Childhood friends Liam Iacovou and Paris Hadjisoteriou are the team behind the parkour academy that's scaling new heights in Cyprus

hile Cyprus is better known for its sun-kissed beaches and charming waterside tavernas, this year it's attracting adventure-loving tourists for a very different reason. That's in part thanks to Redpoint, the country's first parkour and bouldering academy, founded by locals Liam lacovou and Paris Hadjisoteriou in 2022. "The parkour scene was non-existent before we opened Redpoint," says Liam. "The climbing scene was bigger – though still relatively small." But now both are thriving.

Liam's introduction to parkour was influenced by his childhood friend, Paris. "He started parkour at the



age of 15," says Liam. "As there wasn't a scene back then [no gym to train in or anyone to mentor them], he would watch videos on YouTube and go out in the city to practise. He and his friends were the first people on the island to experiment and fall in love with parkour."

It wasn't long before Liam got into the sport too. The idea of Redpoint, which is in Nicosia (about 50km from Larnaca), was born from their shared passion – filling a gap in the local sports scene. They wanted to create a place where thrill-seekers could train frequently in a safe environment, developing their skills and challenging themselves daily.

Liam's decade as a kitesurfing instructor and coaching at kids' summer camps complemented Paris's experience as head coach at the first parkour academy in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia. "We realised that we should start a venture of our own," says Liam.

Redpoint isn't just a gym. It's become a beacon of innovation and community, where individuals can discover their potential, push their limits, and connect with like-minded adventurers.

Its inception has galvanised parkour and climbing opportunities in Cyprus. To date, the space has over 50 students, of all ages, practising and training Parkour weekly. They make use of 200m² of climbing wall, including a MoonBoard training wall, traverse wall and Beastmakers (wooden climbing equipment).

"We have the first European Standard bouldering wall on the island," says Liam.

Through classes, private sessions and self-training, Redpoint helps people gain strength, learn something new and make friends. "The inspiration for Redpoint is basically European parkour and climbing gyms," continues Liam. "Cyprus is always a little late to the party, and so we want to inspire a movement that

gets people of all ages out of their houses, having fun, and challenging themselves."

"For young people, we want to show them the amazing benefits of doing individual sports, breaking the mould of always wanting to play football, basketball and tennis."

The academy also features a Conditioning Room, equipped with a rowing machine, weights, resistance bands, pinch blocks, parallettes and a boxing bag, so comprehensive training needs are well catered for.


Liam and Paris make vaults, swings, rolls and flips an achievable goal for everyone. "Both climbing and parkour are fantastic; available for complete beginners all the way up to advanced," says Liam, emphasising the inclusivity of their programmes.

Eager to try it? "If you're looking to take a break from the historic sightseeing in Cyprus and need a bit of adrenaline, you know where to find us." Under Liam and Paris's guidance, Redpoint has become a catalyst for community, adventure and personal growth. No peak is too high, no jump too far. redpointcy.com Wizz Air flies to Larnaca

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



Hossam Abdelaziz, my enthusiastic guide and Red Sea Diving Safari's (RSDS) Head of Training and Development. Wetsuit-clad, tank in place, I backwards-roll off the boat, and plop into Shaab Samadai's electric blue, 23°C waters. As I descend, coral comes into view - vast amethyst fans, feathery crimson plumes and spiked candypink reefs where whitetail dascyllus dart, looking like marine mint humbugs. Emerging from a shallow cavern, clouds of orange anthias and sunshine-yellow butterfly fish swarm around towering pinnacles. It feels like I'm swimming through a rainbow. A few metres away, a beady-eyed green turtle glides by. The Red Sea - home to 1,252 fish species - is already living up to its 'Underwater Garden of Eden' nickname.

Back on the surface, a 20-minute speedboat ride across calm waters takes me to dive lodge Marsa



Nakari. One of RSDS's three lodges in idyllic Marsa Alam, it's one of Egypt's very first Eco Dive Centers. The classification, accredited by the Professional Association of Diving Instructors (PADI), recognises dive outfits going the extra mile with environmental protections. While the accolade is new, the sentiment embodies the RSDS ethos. And there was nowhere better than Marsa Alam to kick-start this new. forward-thinking marine conservation initiative even if 73-year-old founder Hossam Helmy had a bit of convincing to do.

"Everyone laughed at me when I said I wanted to bring eco-tourists here." he says as we meet over koshari (a rice, chickpea and lentil dish) at Marsa Nakari's low-key restaurant. In the mid-1980s, after 14 years in the presidential police, Hossam tried scuba diving, fell in love with the Red Sea and spent a year diving. What follows reads like a Hollywood script -Hossam persuaded the Ministry of Defence to let him explore the then-military zone of Marsa Alam, and to map its never-dived reefs. "Marsa Alam was not even a village. There was zero infrastructure, no water supply, and no electricity," he says. "The diving was like nothing I had ever seen. A whirlwind of sharks, turtles, dolphins, healthy hard and soft corals in easily accessible reefs. I knew they were special, and that they must be protected."

Ahead of his time. Hossam recognised that a responsible tourism model would create local employment, underline the reefs' value, and add

weight to the case for preserving them. Since setting up three RSDS camps in 1988, he's resisted the massmarket resort approach seen elsewhere in Egypt, enforcing responsible diving codes, and campaigning for countless protections - including seeing Shaab Samadai designated a National Marine Park.

Today, Marsa Nakari, which has 65 tents and chalet rooms - and guest numbers capped at 110 in line with the house reef's capacity - remains small-scale by Egyptian standards, where 900 rooms can be the norm. Hossam resists governmental pressure to increase room numbers. Aluminium bottles are provided for water refills, and single-use plastic is minimised. Nearby, polytunnels brim with plump aubergines, courgettes and cucumbers at RSDS's 1.5-hectare farm. Launched in 2020, it provides 40% of the lodges' produce needs. It might seem small fry, but the challenges of growing in salty, dusty terrain make it significant. Hydroponics will be implemented soon, and Hossam hopes that eventually, a fivehectare farm will bring full self-sufficiency.

"I'd love to reduce our environmental impact even further, by becoming 100% solar-powered, and improving water provision," he says. Steps are already in place - one of RSDS's properties has a first-in-theregion solar-powered water desalination plant, and a 400kw solar field, which feeds excess energy back to the grid, and Marsa Nakari's own 25kw solar array will be expanded in time.

RSDS's Red Sea Center also offers its divers citizen. science (when the public conduct scientific research) opportunities. The next day, I join three fellow divers in the classroom, and take a PADI Dive Against Debris certification led by Hossam Abdelaziz, offered to guests free of charge. Slides explain how to safely conduct and log a clean-up dive. Knowing what to collect is important, as some litter - tangled through coral, or repurposed by marine life - may cause more damage than good if removed.

We've got a job ahead of us: stormy weather overnight has brought litter into Marsa Nakari's thriving house reef. "Wind brings back all the things thrown into the ocean, reminding us it's our responsibility," says Hossam Abdelaziz, as I put on my wetsuit, a thick glove on one hand, and mesh bag in the other. A few strokes from shore, litter drifts past Gorgonian fans, neon blue giant clams and crocodile fish, and I see a unicornfish mouthing at a disintegrating crisp packet. For close to an hour, I collect, piece after piece. Back on land, the spoils are sobering; we spend 90 minutes separating 30kg - 603 individual bits - of rubbish. Bottles, food wrappers, cigarette ends and more are all logged







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guests," says Hossam Abdelaziz.

Alongside cleaner reefs, the longer-term goal with Dive Against Debris data - collected worldwide - is that over time, it reflects patterns about rubbish type, and where it's coming from. This knowledge can then be used to drive wider change. In 2018, for example, data in the South Pacific helped secure a ban on nonbiodegradable plastic bags on Vanuatu island.

For my final days, I travel to Wadi Sabarah, a coastal lodge 40 minutes north of Marsa Alam, built from repurposed fossilised coral limestone. The property doubles as a base for the Red Sea Turtles Project, which assesses Marsa Alam's green and hawksbill turtle populations.

"From battling red tape to covering vast areas with limited resources, marine research in the Red Sea is one wild ride," says director Ahmed Fouad. Alongside research team surveys using counting, measuring


and photo ID techniques, a core element is educating tourists to take and submit their own photography of turtles they've spotted while diving.

Since launching in 2020, over 8,000 turtle sightings have been submitted, establishing one of the largest databases on Red Sea turtles. "Markings either side of a turtle's head and their carapace, are like a fingerprint, completely unique," says Ahmed. "Everyone uses a camera these days, so why not tap into that?" Once in the database, Al draws a dot-to-dot around darker and lighter colourations to identify similar animals. with the final match selected manually by a researcher. While Ahmed acknowledges the project has "a long way to go", it's a step in the right direction. Add in efforts spearheaded by Hossam Helmy and Hossam Abdelaziz and the outlook for Marsa Alam's marine life feels hopeful. The fact that holidaymakers like me can get immersed in it all - the marvellous megafauna, the many corals - in a way which helps safeguard it feels an absolute privilege.

### The perfect blend

How a new generation of baristas and bakers are shaking things up in Copenhagen by elevating the daily coffee-and-Danish ritual

t's probably no surprise that the people who gave the world *hygge* – that hazy but instantly recognisable concept of candlelit cosiness – are big fans of coffee and pastries. Danes drink 430 cups of coffee a year, on average, although for many it's much more. Factor in a *kaffepause* (coffee break) and *aftenkaffe* (nightcap – yes, coffee right before bed) and it can be four or five cups a day.

Traditionally it was instant or filter coffee and cake, but today they're just as likely to down a specialty brew and a bun by a Michelin-starred pastry chef as bakeries and coffee bars have blossomed across Copenhagen. Big hitters like Alice, Rondo, Bageriet Benji, Andersen & Maillard and Hart Bageri (where actor Lionel Boyce studied before filming his Copenhagen-set episode of The Bear) are just a few internationally recognised names in a new generation of cafes and bakeries giving fresh expression to Danes' centuries-long love affair with coffee and cake.



#### Rise and shine

Sunlight is pouring through Lille bakery's ceilingheight windows, and at least five different languages can be heard in the cinnamon-scented air as customers queue for sourdough loaves, sausage rolls and airy Berliner donuts filled with plum cream.

Housed in the former apprenticeship school of the old shipyard in Refshaleøen, Lille is a 15-minute bus ride from downtown Copenhagen, but as the international crowd proves, people will travel for good bread. While Refshaleøen's past as a shipyard means there's a lingering air of industry, it's home to a growing number of galleries, bars and a world's best restaurant or two.

"I went to look at the space and as soon as we entered I knew," says Sara Macedo, a trained biochemist from Portugal who co-owns the bakery with Australian chef Mia Boland. "It was a true romcom moment. Refshaleøen has changed a lot, but it retains that edge that makes you feel everything is possible."

Much of Refshaleøen's good energy is down to Lille, which opened in 2018. Sara and Mia wanted to create the kind of place they felt Copenhagen was missing: "a space where people felt seen and recognised, just like at a good friend's home," Sara says.

"Building a community has always been very important to us, perhaps because we are not from here, but also so Lille could gain different dimensions and become a hub for people who thought alike, or differently, and together we could create even more projects."

They raised the funds for their oven via Kickstarter. "To our surprise, many local people funded it, so when we opened our doors we had neighbours coming in, showing it to their friends and saying, 'This is my bakery'. That was a wonderful feeling," says Sara. Six years later they have a team of 15 and bake around

100kg of dough a day. Inbetween, they host dinners, breadmaking workshops, mini-festivals and even the occasional dance party.

Their ingredients are "maybe 99.9% Danish organic" and they were the first to use 100% Danish wheat in their bread.

"This can be tricky because you need to have knowledge about wheat and be okay with the fact that it will vary from harvest to harvest," says Sara. "You might have to spend time adapting recipes, but that is also the rewarding part. It's never boring."

They preserve as much as they can during the short seasons and if they can't find a local version of what they need, they change the recipe.

"We have replaced lemons with our own homemade vinegar," she says, "and our cardamom buns are now what we call 'flower buns', as we replaced cardamom with a blend of dried local aromatic plants."

### Oven ready

Lille is among a new wave of world-class bakeries, many founded by burnt-out pastry chefs chasing a more family friendly lifestyle. Bring it on, says Sara.





"Each is different. Every one has a special pastry or bread or technique, and that adds to the richness of the city itself."

Across town another queue is forming outside Juno in Østerbro. They're here for the coveted fastelavnsbolle, a pastry with jam and cream that's only available around the Fastelavn holiday and creates such mass hysteria, it's earned international press coverage. Juno's versions are among the best, but as soon as they're over another must-eat will come along.

While cardamom buns, pain au chocolat, sourdough rolls and rye bread are constants, the rest of the



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menu changes often. "We spend countless hours on development and have several team members dedicated to it daily," says Swedish founder Emil Glaser, a former Noma pastry chef.

"Citrus, nuts and chocolate in the colder months, and fruits as they arrive in the warmer months. Sometimes it is a take on nostalgic pastries, sometimes something that's been developed by the team."

Most ingredients are from Denmark, with some flour from Sweden and other ingredients "where the quality is the highest," says Emil. They'll often work with ancient grains such as einkorn, spelt and kamut too. "We try to constantly improve the quality of raw materials. It has such a direct and honest impact on our work."

### The new New Nordic

This widespread emphasis on providence and seasonality is a legacy of the New Nordic Food Manifesto. Twenty years later, its influence has spread well beyond fine dining to all kinds of hospitality, and its practitioners are often not Nordic at all.

German Patrik Rolf had only visited Copenhagen before deciding to open April coffee roastery and store, drawn by the city's respect for quality food, drink and design. "I can't think of another city, apart from perhaps Kyoto, where quality is such a consistent and widespread part of everyday life," he

says. Opening somewhere unknown to him "wasn't the easy choice. But I was convinced it was the only place in Europe where people would understand what I was trying to do. It seemed to be a city where if you build something good, people would give you a chance."

Patrik previously worked in roasteries in Gothenburg and Berlin, but in Copenhagen he felt people were especially eager to embrace third-wave coffee.

"They consume a lot of coffee without milk. I believe that is why there is such a big interest in higher quality coffee," he says. "People forget that in general the coffee being consumed in Scandinavian countries was mainly dark roasted filter coffee of lower quality. But the guest is more curious today and has a better understanding of coffee's potential."



It's a sentiment shared by Jonas Gehl and Sebastian Quistorff, co-founders of Prolog Coffee, which opened in the Meatpacking District in 2016. What set Prolog apart from day one was what it lacked: pretentiousness. The coffee is of course excellent but that's no longer a selling point, so their focus was on creating a wholly welcoming team and space (complete with Douglas fir accents for cosy sauna vibes), offering coffee education without attitude and making the relationship between barista and customer

"less adversarial," says Jonas. Judgement was out; so if you want oat milk in your coffee, go ahead.

"The only way we were able to succeed was by offering a great hospitality experience," adds Jonas. "To a certain extent we believe that if you choose to work in hospitality you need to have a certain desire to give something good to other people. Coffee becomes that much more valuable and exciting when you share it."

As a B corp, welfare of both people and planet is at the top of their minds. They make constant endeavours to reduce milk waste and reuse packaging, and are focused on supporting their team of around 30. "Is it a fun place to work? Are you challenged? Can you make a living from it?" asks Jonas. "We have such a great team, and we want to be able to give them more opportunities."

All the business owners agree: people come first, which is perhaps the X-factor that makes Denmark's hospitality scene so special. "What I enjoy most is seeing my team share their knowledge and transmit their passion to our guests, in exchange for the biggest smiles when biting into a warm cardamom bun, or a bread roll with a thick layer of butter," says Emil Glaser. "It is a feeling difficult to explain other than sheer happiness."







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he camera focuses on crystal-clear water through a mesh of fishing net. Sweeping up, it shows the seemingly endless denim-blue sea melting into the horizon.

"I made this reel right now. I'm going to send it to my friends," my 23-year-old guide Ana Koka tells me as we lounge luxuriously on fishing-net beds cast above the calm sea in the quiet village of Ksamil. She posts this 20-second moment of serenity and, in just a few seconds, it already has three likes.

I admire the scene before me. Three tree-laden islands that float in the Caribbean-clear sea, white sandy bays and wooden bars that wouldn't look out of place on the beaches of Bali. Add the quiet rush of waves and warmth of the sun on my face, and it's even better in person than the social media fantasy.


I'm not the only person to be lured to this idyllic coastline in the Balkans in search of holiday perfection. TikTokkers and Instagrammers have woken up to this undiscovered section of Southeast Europe – which has beaches as beautiful as those found in the Maldives, minus the 10-hour flight and €600-a-night hotel rooms.

Previous spread Ksamil looks as picture-perfect as the Maldives Above Paradise found at beautiful Ksamil "What we love most about travel is going to places that are not so well travelled yet," says Hannah. "Albania has stunning, unspoiled beaches, crystal-clear waters and a relatively low cost of travel compared to other European beach destinations."

Their Ksamil guide is dreamy, showing off platforms of sprawling day beds with billowing curtains over the water, villa-style hotels and seafood restaurants punctuated by bays of shimmering turquoise water and white pebble-and-grain sand.

The town is a must-see for those planning any kind of Riviera tour – and is the first stop on my three-day long Choose Balkans

Albanian Riviera tour, beginning and ending in Tirana. The village has become the jumping-off point to explore local treasures – including a horizon full of uninhabited islands just waiting to be explored by boat (some are close enough to swim) and the UNESCO World Heritage-listed Byzantine ruins of Butrint National Archaeological Park, just a few kilometres away.

Most visitors, however, will do as the influencers do, and lounge on the fishingnet beds over the water, bronze themselves on the white-sand beaches, or sip a rainbow of cocktails at seafront bars beneath thatched umbrellas and admire the teal



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seascape. After a blissful couple of hours drifting around Ksamil, Ana takes me on to the next Insta-perfect village.

Searching for Lukova on Instagram, I'm met with pictures of paddleboards drifting on a glass-clear sea and influencers posing in the crystalline shallows of Lukova Cave. Despite the name, Lukova Cave is not actually a cave, but a grotto-like bay of white pebble and sand.

Arriving in person, I find a line of beach bars just waiting for me to while away the day on a lounger. I pick the prettiest – called No Name Bar – and enjoy having little to do but sip a cocktail, swim in the calm sea and snap some enviable photos for folks back home.

At Blue Paradise Beach Bar, a tiki-shackstyle watering hole, the concrete expanse of a secluded Cold War bunker has been turned into a spot to dine, recline and slip from the rocks right into the azure water for a well-deserved dip. Only the window once used for artillery fire is visible from the deck of the bar.

White rocks sleek as marble cascade into the water, providing the perfect viewpoint to shoot epic shots of the bay here. I'm a little too nervous of clambering onto the rocks though, so Ana happily takes my phone to oblige. "I grew up in the mountains. My mother called me a wild mountain goat," she laughs.



Inspired by Nick and Hannah, I request Himarë for our next stop – one of their favourite secluded beaches. Their page on Himarë is a love letter to pristine stretches of sand, undisturbed by bars, restaurants and highrise hotels.

This section of the Albanian coast is less developed than Ksamil and nearby Sarandë. From here, hiking routes lead from the town into the mountains, and the famously beautiful Jale Beach is a 10-minute drive away. We find various coves where our footprints will be the only sets in the sand that day. And we don't have to wait around for other tourists to move for that 'secluded paradise' shot.

Further along the coast again, Ana introduces me to the most special destination of the lot. If Himarë is under the radar, Qeparo is completely off the map. Even the most savvy TikTokkers haven't found this coastal treasure yet.


There are plenty of places to stay on neighbouring Borsh Beach, from deluxe small hotels to wooden cabins for families. You can walk barefoot from room to beach lounger in a matter of seconds and wake to the sun sparkling over the ethereally blue Ionian Sea.

I opted to stay in Qeparo at a family-run La Casa di Nonna where breakfast of kulac – fried parcels of dough served with honey and cheese from the local farms nearby – is dished up by host Krisa's grandmother.

In the morning, Ana and Krisa take me to the 700-year-old upper Qeparo village, 10 minutes from the beach. Here cobbled streets and wooden shuttered houses look like they date back to the 14th century. Many of the houses have been abandoned as villagers moved down the hillside towards the beach, no longer seeking sanctuary from pirate attacks. As well as looking like a fairytale village, this is one of the best spots to snap photos of the fabulous sunsets over the rugged Albanian coast.

Finally, we head to the coastal city of Vlorë. Albania's third-largest metropolis, Vlorë hums with life throughout the year and summer sees the biggest crowds flock here to enjoy the plentiful Caribbeanesque beaches.

On TikTok, the beach suburb of Orikum is favoured for those pristine beach shots. There's a Miami vibe along the long stretch of sand lined with towering palm trees.

What the videos don't show is that this is the place for fresh seafood – an abundance of taverna-style restaurants display the glistening catch of the day. A man in traditional Albanian dress invites us into his restaurant and we dine on perfectly charred octopus and fat, juicy shrimps.

The simple meal will never make it to my Instagram grid because a phone can't capture the warmth of Albanian hospitality, accompanied by a complimentary shot of homemade rakiya. Like the influencers before us, Ana and I have spent our days on the Albanian Riviera making reels and snapping photos to show off our best lives to the envy of everyone back home. Yes, the stretch of sand at Orikum looks like the shores of Barbados (having been to both, I can confirm it) and the beaches at Ksamil are named Bora Bora and Tropicana for their resemblance to utopias thousands of kilometres and hundreds of euros away.

But TikTok and Instagram simply don't capture the sweet stickiness of beehive-fresh honey for breakfast, the feel of sunshine on your face with a day of nothing but lounging ahead of you, or the quiet intake of breath as Ana's car rounds a mountain bend, revealing another turquoise-and-teal bay. For that, you have to visit in person.

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## SMALL TALK

We celebrate the distinctive culture of Sofia's kleks – its quirky basement shops that are evolving with the times to stay relevant















he yellow taxi comes to a stop,
hazards flashing, and its driver
jumps out, leaving the door
jutting out over the pavement. In
front of him, the exterior wall of
the building has glassed-in shelves
of chocolate, crisps, soft drinks
and alcohol. You could mistake it for a street-side
exhibition of junk food, were it not for the tiny

exhibition of junk food, were it not for the tiny opening at pavement level. The cab driver drops to a crouch, speaking with someone in the subterranean space, passes over some money and gathers a handful of snacks. Jumping back in his taxi, he roars off.

The people of Sofia stroll past. This is one of the Bulgarian capital's klek shops, and to a long-time local, nothing very remarkable at all. This may soon change, however, as such shops are becoming increasingly rare.

"To understand klek shops, you must understand something about Communism," says Yoan Dimov, Team Leader at The New Sofia Pub Crawl, a themed tour around the special bars of Sofia. "Pre-1989, everything was state-owned, and when we

transitioned to a free market, nobody had any money to establish a business."

'Klek' means 'squat' in Bulgarian, a reference, of course, to the customer having to hunker down to buy from the vendor's basement. "During the period of restitution, people who had previously owned private property were able to take it back, so kleks were an example of people making use of what they now had – bomb shelters, bunkers, basements – rather than renting a retail space."

"Some of these places became mini-markets and started selling anything from sandwiches and snacks to cigarettes and alcohol, cleaning products and laundry detergent. I also recall going to one that sold freshly squeezed juices," says Simona Grinnell, of Fora Travel. Others decided to provide services – cobblers who patched government-issued shoes, for example.

Klek shops grew in the 1990s not only because people needed to think commercially, but also as a means of providing what people required during a time of economic upheaval. The crux came in the winter of 1997, when Bulgaria entered a cycle of hyperinflation, where savings were lost and the national currency was in crisis. As an

example, in March 1996, US\$1 was equal to BGN70; the following February, the exchange rate was US\$1 to BGN2,200.

"Desperate times necessitated the creation of a competitive business culture," says Yoan. "Kleks became a symbol of a practical adaptive, resilient attitude in Sofians and the beginning of capitalism."

Ironically, as capitalism has evolved in the city, the age of the klek has dwindled. Since the early 2000s, when their number peaked, some have been converted, their street-level windows glassed over and the basement shops entered via a door. Others have closed – the word TOTO (Lotto) above boarded pavement-level windows is a telltale sign.

Locals are keen to tell of their dearly departed favourites. "There was a klek shop near my school, which sold sandwiches, soft drinks and hot dogs," remembers Ivelin Kulenski, who works with Yoan. "I'd buy a 'Princess' – an open-faced, toasted


sandwich with yellow cheese [as opposed to the white sirene cheese, which features in Bulgarian cuisine] and meat."

"The saleswoman from the 24-hour klek shop knew everyone in the neighbourhood by their shoes," recalls Daniella Doncheva. "When we went clubbing, we'd buy vodka there, to hide in our bags."

Dido Peshev, an illustrator and screen printer at Bare Hands Society on General Gurko Street, used to take his shoes to a klek cobbler just around the corner from where he now works. When did he last do this? He squints apologetically, surrounded by T-shirts and framed band posters with cool graphics. "Not for some years," he says.

While there are rumours that it was a government crackdown on basement-brewed rakia – the eyewateringly strong fruit liqueur that Bulgarians call their national drink – that has forced klek shops to close, Yoan is more pragmatic.

"The decline simply coincided with the city becoming richer and the emergence of a middle class," he says. "All through the city, you see 24-hour stores selling cigarettes and alcohol, which were once the domain of the klek.

"Today your shoes break, you go to a fast fashion store and buy a new pair. Young people want craft beers, not Soviet-style beer. And, in truth, I think that klek shops are a reminder to many of desperate times that they're happy to leave in the past."

And yet, this is not the end for kleks in Sofia, as Yoan's tour shows. Several of these spaces are now part of the city's nightlife in their own right. On the corner of Stefan Karadzha and Georgi S. Rakovski, a former shop has been repurposed into a Jack Daniel's bar (Thursday to Saturday, from 7pm), where customers squat for a shot to drink on the pavement.

Meanwhile, on Shishman Street, 5L became Sofia's first speakeasy in 2017. Find your way past the secret



'bookcase' door by selecting the right key and you'll find yourself in an unapologetically slick cocktail bar, despite the dense stone walls that give away its former identity as a bunker.

In the centre, we visit Raketa Rakia, a themed restaurant/bar that – as well as serving up the city's most famous spirit – delights in kitsching up the realities of Sofia's past; its decor hung with Soviet household items.

Rakia here hasn't been brewed in a basement, but still boasts an ABV of 40-60%. In the future, sadly, there might not be as many klek shops that bring people to their knees – but it's almost certain that the rakia will.

Take the The New Sofia Pub Crawl, a themed tour around the special bars of Sofia. It is part of the wider 365 Association, which runs the city's main free tour.



## Hidden "Glory" unearthed in the centre of Warsaw

What lies hidden just below our feet in a busy city centre? Read on to learn about the latest archeological finds in Warsaw - and find out how you can help restore its stunning palaces

One of the most famous public spaces in Warsaw is undergoing a dramatic makeover. The sprawling Piłsudski Square will soon welcome back the Saski and Brühl Palaces and three neighbouring townhouses which all fell victim to destruction in World War II. However, before workers can set foot in the area, archeologists have to analyse it, unearthing many surprising finds in the process.

Top specialists have dug their shovels deep into the area where the majestic Brühl Palace once stood. Just after a couple of weeks of working where no one has touched the earth since the war, they discovered an incomplete, life-size sculpture of a woman with "GLORY" written on its pedestal. Incredibly enough, it has a twin sister just 200 meters from the site - in the 300-year-old Saski Garden. Future research will tell if the "Glory" statue found by the archeologists is an original Rococo sculpture or a slightly later copy.

Thousands of artefacts recovered from the site reveal a fascinating story about the city's past.

Ornamental Saxon porcelain, fragments of pipes and oyster shells tell us of the dining habits of the rich in 18th century. An engraved Kiddush cup from the first half of the 20th century reminds us of the melting pot that was pre-war Warsaw, when a third of its population was Jewish. As the Brühl Palace housed the Polish Ministry of



Foreign Affairs, archeologists have also found many artefacts related to office work, such as a glass inkwell or an early radio receiver.

Most importantly, archeological discoveries such as these tell us more about the people who lived here and buildings which once stood here. Since every detail counts in the last stage of rebuilding the destroyed heritage of Warsaw, we are also creating a photo library – or, as we call it: Fototeka – with images of the Saski and Brühl Palaces from around the world. This is where your help is truly needed: we are sure there are key photos still waiting to be discovered in

private collections. If you think you have family photos showing these buildings before 1945, you might have the missing pieces of our historical puzzle!







### Flower power in Paris

"In ev'ry glance you'll find an invitation to romance" - so say the lyrics of the famous ditty *Paris in* the Spring. What it doesn't say is that you'll also find flowers in ev'ry glance this time of year in the French capital. From the magnolias in the gardens around the Eiffel Tower, to wisteria draped across the railings of public parks and the Grand Mosque, it's a pure delight. Rooftop gardens and even laden window boxes provide serendipitous streetcorner joy, while excursions to the magnificent gardens at Versailles, or Giverny, where Monet painted his world famous water lilies, top off an incredible floral escape.



### **Kew and Chelsea bloom** in London

The UK's capital tops the charts for green space in an urban environment worldwide, and its public parks - especially the Royal variety, including Hyde and St James's - are replete with floral displays and colourful borders right now. The jewel in the crown is Kew where greenhouses of all shapes and sizes are stuffed with triffid-like tangles of exotic plant life. Each May, gardens top the city's social calendar as designers

take over Chelsea Royal Hospital for the ultimate botanical show - tickets from the RHS sell out so do book ahead.

### Scents and sensuality in Seville

Being so close to Morocco means Andalusian architecture owes much to its Moorish influences. and that applies to gardens, too. At the Alcázar palace you'll find formal spaces with low intricate hedging and trickling rills, pavilions. Elsewhere, streets have a



scent of orange blossom, while botanical gardens, including the opulent Buhaira, are filled with fragrant shrubs, mediterranean herbs and shady nooks to shelter from the midday sun.

### **Turkish tulips in Istanbul**

You may think tulips come from The Netherlands, but in fact the flower (and its name, derived from the Turkish word for turban) originated in Central Asia. In recent years Istanbul has aimed to reclaim the association from the Dutch by planting up to 30 million bulbs and staging a Tulip Festival every spring. The most brilliant displays are in Sultanahmet Square

and in three beautiful main parks: Ermagin, Yildiz and Gulhane.

### **Exotic beauties in Madeira**

The Portuguese island's sub-tropical microclimate means plants from all over the world can thrive here. During spring you'll find gardens bursting into life with flowering succulents and cacti as well as eye-catching displays of Agapanthus (African Lily) and 'bird of paradise' Strelitzia – the signature flower of the island. Madeira Botanical Garden and Palheiro are the big hitters, although there's plenty of floral life to be found wherever you wander.

### **Cherry blossoms in Copenhagen**

Its most famous gardens - Tivoli - might be more about fun than flora but the Danish capital still comes up trumps for plant lovers. Its botanical gardens cover 10 hectares, packing in greenhouses filled with cacti and palms and magnificent spring displays. Also visit Kongens Have, a former royal garden with Renaissance and Baroque influences, and Bispebjerg Cemetery with its avenues of pink cherry blossoms.

## Your onboard safety

Please show consideration for your fellow passengers and pay attention to the following information. Remember that by purchasing your Wizz Air ticket, you have accepted the Wizz Air General Conditions of Carriage (available in full at wizzair.com)



### Safe handling of hand luggage

Ensure hand luggage remains safely stowed in the locker or under the seat in front of you for takeoff, landing and at any time as instructed by the crew. Passengers seated in the emergency rows and first row must store their cabin bags in the overhead lockers. Take care when opening lockers, as falling items may injure fellow passengers.

In case of evacuation, all baggage must be left on board, and the instructions of the cabin crew must be strictly followed.



### Safety equipment

It is an offence to tamper with or remove safety equipment, including adult and infant life vests, infant safety belts or extension belts. You are not allowed to remove or damage any onboard informative placards.



### Sharp items

To dispose of any sharp items (e.g. hypodermic needles), please contact a cabin crew member. Do not leave your needle or syringe behind.



### **Turbulence management**

Turbulence can occur unexpectedly. Whenever seatbelt signs are switched on, remain seated, keep seatbelts fastened, and stow away large electronic devices.



### Safety of infants on board

Wizz Air has a clear procedure for infant (a child under two) restraint systems. You can only use the single hook infant seatbelt - vests/slings cannot be used with the infant seatbelt. Wizz Air only accepts aft-facing car seats when an extra seat is purchased. However, during take-off and landing, and whenever the seatbelt sign is switched on, infants should sit on an adult's lap with the seatbelt fastened. Life vests for infants are available and are provided whenever flying over water. All lavatories are equipped with a changing table. Do not leave children unattended in the cabin.



### **Lithium batteries**

Portable electronic devices (PED) such as phones, laptops and tablets can contain lithium batteries. When damaged, faulty or overheated, these batteries can catch fire and explode. If you recognise any issues with your device, inform the cabin crew immediately.

Charging electronic devices on board using a portable battery charger is forbidden.



### **Electronic devices**

Some electronic devices can be used during the flight with WLAN/Wi-Fi/Bluetooth turned off.

Larger electronic devices that cannot be held comfortably in one hand, exceed ca. 1kg in weight and do not qualify as handheld devices (e.g. laptops, notebooks etc.) must be stowed in the overhead stowage compartments for takeoff, landing and whenever required by the cabin crew.

If in doubt, please ask your cabin crew.

### Inflight health tips

Read these tips on how to stay fit when travelling.



### Before your air travel

Consult your doctor before travelling if you have any medical concerns. Pregnant women and those with heart or respiratory problems, blood diseases or ear, nose and sinus infections should seek medical advice before flying. Crew members are entitled to call for medical assistance pre-flight if they deem it necessary and are in doubt about your fitness for the flight.



### Medical supplies on board

Keep any medication you may need in your hand luggage and in its original packaging. Inform cabin crew of allergies or illnesses. If you are seriously ill or travelling post-surgery, you will need a medical certificate confirming that you are fit to fly. If you have limited mobility, are hearing- or sight-impaired, pregnant, or unable to understand/react to safety instructions, you will be unable to sit in the emergency exit rows or the front row. If you start to feel unwell during the flight, do not hesitate to talk to the cabin crew.



### Nut alleray

During our WIZZ Café service we offer peanuts and some snacks containing peanuts/nuts traces. If you have any allergies we strongly encourage you to take all necessary medical precautions before flying, and to inform the cabin crew during boarding about your allergy.






- Filming or photographing the cabin crew without their permission
