IMPROVING LIVES: 1,000th Well in Sierra Leone



In 2023, the people and government of Sierra Leone celebrated World Hope International's drilling of our 1,000th well in West Africa.

Our deep borehole wells in communities, public health clinics, hospitals and schools don't run dry like shallow hand-dug wells. These borehole wells also solve the water scarcity problem that especially endangers vulnerable children and families in rural communities. Without the safe, clean water our wells can provide, vulnerable children and families in Sierra Leone have fewer opportunities to escape multigenerational cycles of despair. But with one of our wells nearby, they can overcome common, interrelated problems:

- Sickness
- Poverty
- · Education disparity
- Human trafficking

We've seen firsthand how our wells make life better for vulnerable children and their families.

New Drilling Equipment

Also in Sierra Leone in 2023, we began using our newest, fastest and most rugged water drilling rig — a PAT-Drill model 501 and V900 Atlas Copco Compressor mounted on a Mercedes-Benz Zetros 2236 4×4 chassis.

Drilling operators learned how to operate the new equipment at Masanga Hospital, a 120-bed rural hospital that serves 12,000 patients a year.

In a single day, our team completed borehole drilling at the hospital. The process included crushing through 105 feet of solid granite.

Because of our powerful new drilling equipment, we plan in the next five years to install water systems in Sierra Leone that will provide 500,000 more people with clean water.

CERVICAL CANCER SCREENING: SIERRA LEONE WOMEN CAN SURVIVE

In Sierra Leone, health care often is limited. But in 2023, 3,522 more women got screened for cervical cancer. Many women were treated on the spot. And now they can survive.

Cervical cancer is a leader in cancer-related deaths of women in Sierra Leone. The problem is a lack of screening sites. Screening, though, can save lives through early detection.

With little money, many women can't afford to travel for screening. Women in Sierra Leone often learn they have cervical cancer when the disease is in advanced stages. At that point, treatment is difficult, and outcomes are grim.

But it doesn't have to be this way. There is a better way. Our recent work to provide widespread cervical cancer screening already is saving lives. Through clinics and outreach, thousands of women have been screened, diagnosed early and treated. Our proactive approach is saving women's lives.

Mariama's Story

A mother of three, Mariama was diagnosed with early-stage cervical cancer at our screening. Early diagnosis and treatment means Mariama can look forward to a future with her family. Her children, unlike too many others in Sierra Leone, won't lose their mother to cervical cancer.

Screening More Women

We are committed to expanding critical cervical cancer screening in Sierra Leone.

Each screening is a step toward a healthier, more informed community where mothers can continue raising their children.

With ongoing support, we can prevent cervical cancer and successfully treat it across Sierra Leone. We can help women survive.

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION: THEY SEE NEW FUTURES



Our 2023 work in early childhood education continues to show vulnerable children they can have brighter futures. Today, these children imagine better lives for themselves, and they know it's possible.

Without educational resources, young children often miss essential developmental opportunities. But with educational resources from our early childhood education centers, young children can benefit from experienced teachers and vital learning material.

Fatima's Story

Before our new center in the village of Kono opened, children like Fatima had limited access to structured early learning. But today at our center, Fatima and her schoolmates can interact with structured educational activities that are critical for cognitive and social development.

Through interactive lessons and nurturing care, Fatima and her friends can gain necessary skills and confidence that will benefit them throughout their lives.

The education center also continues to strengthen the community's involvement in early childhood education.

Today, parents show more active engagement in their children's learning, and villagers show more support for education overall. Together, their efforts are creating a more educated and empowered generation.

Investing in early childhood education meets the immediate needs of vulnerable children. It also builds a foundation for long-term progress.

With you, we can expand these programs so every child gets an opportunity to start an educational journey with confidence of a better tomorrow.

STOP CHILD SACRIFICE: LITTLE GIRL SURVIVES IN SIERRA LEONE

In 2023, World Hope International introduced a global campaign like none the world had seen: StopChildSacrifice.org.

We knew we needed to create a global movement. (Hardly anyone thinks something as barbaric as ritualistic child sacrifice could still be happening in our world.)

Unfortunately, child sacrifice still happens in Africa because of widely accepted superstitions and good luck spells cast by "native doctors," or witch doctors.

No one knows how many children have been lost to child sacrifice, but we know it happens because some of these children survive. Few feel safe talking about it.

Survivors and their families, however, know they can trust us. They come to us for medical care, pychological support and other needs so they can rebuild their lives.

At Age 8, Marie Survived

In September, we went further than posting facts on a website. We educated the U.S. Congress.

Members of the U.S. House Foreign Affairs subcommittee listened as one of our human trafficking protection managers from Sierra Leone testified about "Marie." At only 8 years old, Marie survived child sacrifice.

Rep. Susan Wild, D-Penn., ranking member of the subcommittee, was surprised child sacrifice occurs. She said the testimony troubled her.

"I don't think that we, as a country, can claim the mantle of being a world leader ... unless we use our resources ... to fight against exploitation of all humans around the world, and especially children," she said.

Ten years after Marie survived, our protection manager testified, Marie continues recovering. World Hope International remains by her side and encourages leaders to protect children like Marie.

SAFE HAVENS: PROVIDING SHELTER TO EARTHQUAKE SURVIVORS

On Feb. 6, 2023, a magnitude 7.8 earthquake and magnitude 7.5 aftershock rattled southern Türkiye. The earthquakes toppled buildings, killing more than 53,000 people in Türkiye and nearly 6,000 in neighboring Syria, and leaving millions more homeless and vulnerable outside in the cold, according to UN data.

We responded by building semipermanent shelters for displaced children and their families.

The Kamara Family

The Kamara family lost their home in the earthquakes.

Initially, they struggled to survive harsh weather and inadequate protection in makeshift tents. But because of our shelter program, the Kamara family now lives protected from weather in one of the semipermanent shelters we built.

Families like the Kamaras gained immediate, significant improvement in their living conditions.

These children and families also gained a sense of stability. Shelter is a vital early step in long-term recovery after natural disasters.

What's more, children and families living in a protective shelter gain back some comfort and renewed hope for better futures.

Part of that comfort is as much peace of mind as it is physical. The Kamara family and others living in shelters we built know they will be prepared. Each unit is designed to withstand natural disasters.

When children and families feel more stable and secure in their environments, they and their communities can feel empowered to rebuild their lives and move forward together.

We remain committed to supporting survivors like the Kamara family. With your support, they can achieve long-term recovery and resilience. Our life-changing interventions, like providing shelters, are critical.

PARTNERS SPOTLIGHT



Celebrate Church has supported the people of Liberia for several years through its partnership with World Hope International, sending volunteer teams and contributing over \$500,000. Of that, more than \$200,000 has been used to upgrade water and electrical systems at ELWA Hospital in Monrovia, which serves 6,000 patients monthly. ELWA Hospital, part of a 181-acre campus, includes housing, an education academy, and a radio station. With over 50 years of service, the hospital is working to develop a first-world facility in a developing country, aiming to improve health care standards for the community it serves. 




