

Cutting the cost of home insulation

State Government

From early 2026, the Government is helping slash energy bills by around \$400 a year with discounts on ceiling insulation through the Victorian Energy Upgrades (VEU) program. This will halve ceiling insulation install costs of \$3,000 to \$1,500

Insulation works by acting as a barrier to heat flow, making homes more comfortable year-round, reducing energy consumption, and lowering heating and cooling costs.

Almost 60 percent of homes in Victoria have no ceiling insulation or are under-insulated. 200,000 households with no insulation will be eligible for the first stage of the discount, with those topping-up eligible later.

To date, the VEU program has helped more than 170,000 businesses and 2.4 million households upgrade their appliances and equipment, slashing more than \$440 million dollars off energy bills.

We have a nesting box to attract a pair of Peregrine Falcons

Corellas by the Barwon River

Growing Winchelsea

All eyes are on Winchelsea as we trial innovative ways to manage our Corella problem. Over the past few months you may have noticed some remedial work occurring to the trees by the Barwon River near the bridge, together with understory planting and weed control.

Last Wednesday Barwon Terrace was abuzz with a hive of activity all in the name of placing a nesting box atop a stone pine. It is hoped the nesting box, made by the Winchelsea Men's Shed, will attract a pair of Peregrine Falcons to regularly use the nesting site as they hunt Corellas.

The nesting box is now securely attached to the tree with its own balcony for the falcons to view their beautiful surrounds and even includes some safety mesh to catch any young chicks should they venture too far from their snug nesting box. The base of the box is lined with fine gravel for the Falcon to lay its eggs in, which also helps to keep the eggs warm when the Falcon goes off to hunt.

"It was exciting to see a bird of prey flying along the river and scaring a large flock of Corellas as the tree works were taking place. We are sure that it's a sign of things to come!" said John Tebbutt, President of Growing Winchelsea.

The Trial in flight: long term collaborative corella deterrence strategy is supported by the Victorian Government through the Corella Management Grants Program 2024, as an implementation action of the Victoria Corella Strategy 2022-2032.

Last week Landscape Architect Pete Wilson visited Winchelsea to meet representatives of the Project Steering Group to gain input into the Landscape Concept Plan for CWA Park and the highway avenue, where a mix of trees will eventually replace the existing Elms. Corellas like open space so this plan seeks to increase plantings while maintaining the space as a community park.

Corella management is a complex issue and many management strategies implemented by councils across eastern Australia have had limited effect. The most widely accepted and effective long-term strategy is to discourage the birds from establishing a permanent roost site during the summer months.

Changing the local environment, to reduce open spaces and increase lower level planting of trees and shrubs that provide a visual barrier from danger, makes the birds uncomfortable and unwilling to stay. Encouraging the presence of natural predators such as birds of prey will also create an unsafe area and deter birds from roosting.

Surf Coast Shire is trialling a long-term strategy of habitat reduction, modification and replacement, in line with council's aspirations to protect the urban forest and habitat for the future.

"This project is a collaborative one - working with the local community – Growing Winchelsea, Winchelsea Arboretum Trail, Winchelsea Men's Shed and Winchelsea Land & Director - and the Shire's open space and environment teams to renew, replace and modify the environment at a key roosting site along the Barwon River to deter roosting" continues John.



Nesting Box Installed Aspect Tree Services

Funding of \$45,375 was received with the project due to conclude 30 September 2025, however planting works will continue beyond this date. While the project is intended to benefit the community of Winchelsea, the research outcomes potentially will benefit people throughout Victoria and beyond.

"It is important we trial different approaches to managing corellas. Other towns are looking with interest at how we are tackling this issue. Over the coming months keep your eye out for a family of peregrine falcons who have also moved to our great community." concludes John.

The Fall and Rise of the Eastern Quoll

The history of the Eastern Quolls represents a pretty intense example of the early clash between European agriculture and native Australian wildlife.

Early colonisers made life a lot easier for Quolls, bringing with them chickens, who make good eating, are easy to catch, and hence greatly improve Quolls' quality of life, inducing a baby-boom that to the colonisers represented an unappreciated double-whammy.

Tiger Quolls are, amongst other things, stealthy nocturnal hunters - and pretty good at it. They also bite through chicken wire and tunnel underground with ease, representing a destructive pest for anyone attempting to maintain chickens, demanding expensive control measures.

Coop reinforcement technology was spectacularly ineffective against the Tiger Quolls. Later colonisers turned to tried and true technologies from the mother-country - steel-jawed traps, strychnine poisoning, shooting, bounties, which in conjunction with habitat destruction, new diseases and introduced predators, comprehensively pushed back the Tiger Quoll and contemporary species. Even worse, they introduced the extinction programmes for which Australia is so (in)famous.

One such species, (illustrated here), is the Eastern Quoll, considered functionally extinct from Winchelsea to Colac and beyond. Their vital role in soil ecology and biodiversity has been sorely missed, but luckily, the measures were not quite so effective in Tasmania where Eastern Quoll numbers remain relatively intact, effectively constituting a breeding programme for mainland reintroduction.

In 2002, a number of these tasmanian Eastern Quolls were reintroduced to the Mount Rothwell Biodiversity Centre in Little River. Since then, hundreds of have been bred on the mainland.

Over three trials 2016-2018 in Mulligans Flat, ACT , 60 Eastern Quolls were reintroduced in an attempt to restore the Box Gum woody grasslands. In 2018-2019, 20 Eastern Quolls were reintroduced to Booderee National Park in NSW. A supplementary

feeding programme was established to support them. Last year, 12 Eastern Quolls were released onto Tiverton sheep station in Dundonnell in Victoria. It was a collaborative effort involving the traditional owners, the Eastern Maar people, and conservation group Odonata.

Also last year, the Minister for the Environment coordinated government agencies, conservation organisations and private contributors in creating a high-tech protective environment in Booderee Park to safely reintroduce a further 19 Eastern Quolls to the Eastern seaboard, and more particularly, further formalise Eastern Quoll status and their protection.

While the Eastern Quoll is still classified as "extinct in the wild" on the mainland by some conservation authorities, the efforts of many have made this not completely so - constituting genuine grounds for hope of their return to business as usual.

Quolls are carnivorous marsupials native to Australia and New Guinea. They are primarily nocturnal, and spend most of the day in a den. Of the six species of Quoll, four are found in Australia and two in New Guinea.

Quolls evolved around 15 million years ago. The six species vary in weight and size, from 300g to 7 kg. They have brown or black fur and pink nose. They are largely solitary, but come together for social interactions, such as mating, which occurs during winter. A female gives birth to up to 30 pups, but the number that can be raised to adulthood is limited by the number of teats. They have a life span of 1–5 years.

Quolls eat smaller mammals, small birds, lizards, and insects. All species have drastically declined in numbers since Australasia was colonised by Europeans, with one species, the Eastern Quoll, becoming extinct on the Australian mainland in the 1960s. Major threats to their survival include the toxic cane toad, predators such as feral cats and foxes, urban development, and poison baiting. Conservation efforts include captive breeding programs and reintroductions.



You will be offered suggested How To Vote cards by representatives of the candidates. I note some parties don't show the candidate's party, or if the candidate is an Independent, so I suggest you do your homework.

A brief guide to what the minors stand for -

Legalise Cannabis Party – advocate for the legalisation and regulation of cannabis for personal, medicinal and industrial use.

Animal Justice Party – against any lethal methods for controlling animal populations; ending 'factory farming' and live animal exports; a move to regenerative farming; support clean energy.

Indigenous - Aboriginal Party of Australia – restore the health of rivers; direct political representation; end to Indigenous incarceration except for serious offences and rehabilitation to be prioritised; Indigenous-run schools; no development that harms sacred sites.

Australia's Voice – founded by Senator Fatima Payman after resigning from the ALP over recognition of Palestinian statehood; limit negative gearing and reduce the capital gains tax discount to

fund social housing; a banking code of conduct and establish a public bank.

FUSION | Planet Rescue | Whistleblower Protection | Innovation - Fusion of the former Science, Pirate, Vote Planet and Secular parties —transition to negative carbon emissions; a universal basic income; expand Medicare; abolish stamp duty; reduce migration.

Group G (Socialist Equality Party failed to get registration) – redirect military funding to public hospitals, schools and other social services.

Trumpet of Patriots – Trump-like; cut immigration; withdraw from the Paris climate agreement, the World Health Organisation and the United Nations.

Family First - ban teaching on LGBTQ issues in schools; ban public servants using pronouns in email signatures; wind back antivilification laws; a stronger safety net for the poor; repeal of voluntary assisted dying laws; wind back of abortion access; a pause to "Muslim immigration".

Pauline Hanson's One Nation - reduce Australia's refugee intake; withdraw from the UN Refugee Convention and the Paris climate agreement; redirect & reduce foreign aid, abolish the National Indigenous Australians Agency; suspend GST on building materials; limit abortion access.

Australian Democrats – revived after deregistration in 2016; says it acts without partisan or vested interests.

Victorian Socialists - "radical reorganisation of society" in the areas of wealth inequality, housing and workers' rights.

Sustainable Australia Party - Universal Basic Income - reduce immigration and limit development; abolish negative gearing; universal basic income of \$500 a week.

Gerard Rennick People First / HEART Party - end to all "no jab, no play" policies; remove fluoride from water; raise the tax-free threshold, cut the corporate tax rate; scrap franking credits; make superannuation voluntary; reduce the number of work visas.

Libertarian - lower taxes; repeal section 18C of the Racial Discrimination Act; enshrining free speech in the Constitution. (Leading the party's ticket is Jordan Dittloff, who was jailed for defrauding nearly \$280,000 from clients through his Colac travel agency in 2014-15.)

Citizens Party - creation of a public bank through Australia Post; oppose the AUKUS security pact; ease tensions with China. (have claimed human-driven climate change is alarmist pseudoscience)

Shooters, Fishers and Farmers Party – no restrictions on farmers clearing vegetation on their land; expand the live export trade, recreational fishing and mining; clamp down on foreign investment; prioritise water conservation for agriculture; stronger free speech and privacy protections; review the 1996 National Firearms Agreement.

Group T - more Medicare-funded mental health sessions, a transition to 100 percent renewable energy by 2030 and greater investment in affordable housing.

Anzac Day reflections on sacrifice and service

Anzac Day's Last Post and ode transported Bill Shaw's thoughts far beyond his own decade of service with the Royal Australian Navy Surf Coast Shire

While the Anglesea veteran remembered his own experiences, the many mates made, his reflections turned to those who made ultimate sacrifices in conflicts before and since, and those who were left behind.

"It's very emotional, a time to reflect on Australia as a nation and those people who served and sacrificed," Bill says.

"First World War, Second World War, Vietnam, Borneo and more recent conflicts – it's a time to remember them and especially their families – their loved ones didn't come back."

Bill joined the Royal Australian Navy at 17 in 1972 and served aboard HMAS Anzac, Swan, Brisbane, Hobart, Stalwart, Cerberus, Canberra, Harman and Lonsdale.

Deployments took him around Australia and South-East Asia and profoundly shaped him. "It gave me purpose knowing that working with the navy helped to

protect Australia. It gave me values like loyalty and integrity, you have to have those to be in the forces, and then it just made me really proud to be an Australian," Bill says.

Bill lives in Anglesea and serves on the committee of the Anglesea RSL subbranch. On Anzac Day he attended the town's dawn reflection at the memorial in Cameron Park with wife Jeanette before joining a march from Anglesea Memorial Hall to the cenotaph for a commemorative service, Jeanette proudly wearing the service medals of her father Harold Walker who returned from service in the Second World War.

Bill estimates up to 1000 people might have attended Anglesea RSL Anzac Day ceremonial and social activities during the entire day, but one of his primary aims is boosting year-round membership of the sub-branch, recruiting younger veterans as well as first responders.



"I'm 70 this year, and you've got young people just out of the forces in their late 20s and 30s. We'd like to get these young people in and run their own programs and gradually they will come up through the ranks," he said.

"I'm active in the RSL because I believe it's a good organisation, a non-profit organisation. We just want to help people."

Surf Coast Shire Council supports RSL sub-branch Anzac Day services across the shire.

ANZAC Day Winchelsea

It was great to see such a turnout of our community at the ANZAC Day ceremony at the Winchelsea & District Soldiers' Memorial on Friday Morning. Sharing meaningful events such as this is one of the most important ways we grow our community and keep it strong. Wreaths were made and presented during the ceremony by local and visiting Scouts and Guides, Winchelsea Men's shed, the Captains of Winchelsea Primary School, Hesse Rural Health, Winchelsea CFA, SES, Geelong Military Reenactment Group, Winchelsea and District Historical Society, Winchelsea Lions Club, Winchelsea Football and Netball club, and many others.

I would like to acknowledge and pay respects to all who have served this country in all conflicts at home and abroad, especially those who have paid the ultimate price in the line of service. This includes those who lost their lives during the colonisation of this country. I pay respects to them and their families and descendants who have survived them. The greatest impacts of War are as much on the lives and cultures of the communities back home who have sacrificed their loved ones, as on those who served, died and survived. The cultural impact of that sacrifice can be felt down the generations, as demonstrated by the strong gathering of community young and old, sharing stories about their grandfathers and great grandfathers, remembering those who were lost, and those who came home to tell their stories.

I would like to acknowledge the services of one Winchelsea local who served in the armed forces during the first world War. Allan McKenzie McDonald, whose story was eloquently shared by his granddaughter at Friday's service.



Allan McKenzie McDonald,

DFC (4 July 1888 – 10 June 1953) was a Winchelsea local, who lived on a farm just north of the town. He was the fourth child of Allan McDonald, a farmer, and his wife Elizabeth, née McKenzie (d.1889)

On 17 September 1913 at the McLennan Memorial Presbyterian Church, Birregurra, he married Sarah Mary Farquharson, and had six children. Following his father's death in 1914, Allan succeeded





him as a member of the Winchelsea Shire Council. He remained on the council for almost forty years.

On 6 April 1916 McDonald enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force and joined the 14th Battalion in France in December, he was shot in the left arm on 11 April 1917 at Bullecourt and spent some months in hospital. He served with distinction at Polygon Wood, Belgium, in September, and was promoted sergeant in October. Next month he was transferred from the front because of his injured arm. Returning to Australia, he was discharged from the A.I.F. in October 1918.

McDonald helped form the Winchelsea sub-branch of the Returned Sailors' and Soldiers' Imperial League of Australia and was its president in 1920-21; he also presided over the 14th

Battalion and 4th Brigade associations in 1933-34. He belonged to the Independent Order of Odd Fellows of Victoria and was grand master in 1923. Elected shire president in 1921 and 1927 and the Municipal Association of Victoria, of which he was president (1941-42).

In August 1933, McDonald won the seat of Polwarth for the United Australia Party ,and was popular and widely respected for his strength of character, courage, independence of thought and sense of justice and humour. He was a Proud Scots Presbyterian. He was survived by his wife, four daughters and one of his two sons. He died of cancer on 10 June 1953 in his home at Winchelsea; he was accorded a state funeral and was buried with Masonic rites in the local cemetery.

Our community was built by such people as Alan McKenzie McDonald of Winchelsea.

Lest we forget.

Enrolments now open for Prep 2026

Victorian State Government

Enrolments at local government schools for the 2026 intake of Prep students is open until Friday 25 July - giving families time to plan, visit schools and get the information they need to apply.

Families across the state have guaranteed access to the designated neighbourhood government school for their kids.

Parents and carers will receive offer letters back by Friday 8, August. Applications submitted after Friday 25 July will be considered by schools as they are received.

The Find my School website allows families to find their designated neighbourhood government school and other government schools nearby – giving them clarity on what their government school options are for their children. The website includes school zones for 17 of the new government schools and adjustments to 7 existing school zones.

Schools can be found by typing in a residential address or searching by school name or categories such as primary, secondary, or specialist school.

RACV provides helmet safety advice

RACV is reminding Victorians about the importance of wearing a helmet while using active transport such as bicycles and e-scooters as new data from Victoria Police reveals thousands of riders continue to ignore safety rules, risking severe head injuries.

Victoria Police issued 2,329 fines last year to Victorians for failing to wear a securely fitted and approved bicycle helmet, totalling more than \$528,000. Over the past five years, more than 12,000 Victorians have been fined for not wearing a helmet.

This comes as already two bike riders have lost their lives on Victorian roads since the start of Calendar Year 2025. Over the last five years, an average of four Victorian bike riders have lost their lives riding each year.

According to research cited by Transport Victoria, helmets can reduce the risk of serious head injuries by almost 70 per cent. Despite this, thousands of fines issued each year indicate that some riders are still taking unnecessary risks.

Victorian road laws require all bike and e-scooter riders to wear an approved helmet whenever they ride. RACV also encourages Victorians to ensure their helmet is correctly fitted, as an ill-fitting helmet can reduce its effectiveness in a crash.

In partnership with Bicycle Network, RACV continues to support safer bike riding with the delivery of bicycle Ride2School education program in schools across the southeast in northwest of Melbourne.

injured in low-speed vehicle run-over incidents each year in Victoria. Children under five years of age are at greatest risk due to their unpredictability, inquisitive nature, and they being surprisingly quick and mobile.

"People might be surprised to learn that nearly 3 in 4 driveway run-over deaths in Victoria occurred when the vehicle was travelling in a forward direction," said Kidsafe Victoria CEO Sarah Sexton. "Blind spots exist right around the car."

Kidsafe Victoria released their Low Speed Vehicle Run-Over (LSVRO) Prevention Strategy in December last year to reduce the number of deaths and injuries in driveways and carparks. The strategy was finalised in March and Kidsafe is now working on implementing the action plan.

"Driveways are dangerous places for children – they are designed to allow vehicles access to and from a property and present the same hazards as roads," said Ms Sexton.

"Every incident represents a child whose life was cut short, and a family left forever changed. These aren't just numbers — they're heartbreaking stories with lasting impacts. It will take a united effort to reduce risk, but together we can make our driveways and carparks safer for children."

National Low Speed Vehicle Run-Over Prevention Awareness Day is held annually on 16 April, dedicated to promoting key driveway safety measures.

Kidsafe Victoria is reminding parents of three crucial driveway safety tips:

- Supervise Always supervise children around the driveway. Hold their hand or hold them close to keep them safe.
- Separate Separate play areas from driveways and garages where possible (e.g. fitting high handles to garage doors, installing fences to separate the house and garden from the driveway, and installing self-closing doors and gates).
- See All vehicles have a blind spot in front and behind. Reversing sensors and cameras assist with reducing blind spots, but should never be relied upon - always walk around the vehicle before driving off.






Homeless Veterans – a national disgrace casting a dark shadow over ANZAC Day

Vasey RSL Care

Each ANZAC Day, Australians rise early in the cold dawn, light a candle, and bow their heads in solemn remembrance. We honour courage, mateship, and sacrifice. We say "Lest We Forget."

But too often, we do forget - especially those who came home.

As the CEO of Vasey RSL Care, I see the reality behind the sentiment. Veterans - those same people we applaud on ANZAC Day - are disproportionately homeless, unemployed, and dying by suicide. They are three times more likely to sleep rough than other Australians. That is not just unacceptable. It is a national disgrace.

These aren't nameless faces. They are people who committed their lives to the protection of ours. And yet, as we approach another federal election, veterans are once again forced to fight - not for their country, but for basic support.

At Vasey RSL Care, we built the V Centre Veteran Empowerment Program to change that. We couldn't wait a single day longer and see one more life lost. It is the only service in Australia directly aligned with the Royal Commission's call for veteran-specific housing and integrated support. And yet, despite the clear need, despite the recommendations, we are still footing the bill alone, running it on a shoestring budget.

If this country can't help the people who helped it, what has it come to?

In the lead up to the election, vulnerable Australians are crying out to be heard. But some cries come from the depths of desperation - and our veterans' cries must not go unanswered.

This ANZAC Day, we remember the dead. But let's also protect the living. It's time for our elected leaders to put words into action and fund programs that give our veterans what they truly deserve: dignity, stability, and hope.

Because no one who served Australia should be abandoned.

Surf Coast Shire Draft 2025-26 Budget and Revenue and Rating Plan

Surf Coast Shire

Surf Coast Shire Council will consider releasing its Draft 2025-26 Budget and Draft 2025-29 Revenue and Rating Plan for community feedback at its meeting on 29 April. If the Council releases the documents, they will be available from 9am 30 April via yoursay.surfcoast.vic.gov.au.

Tuesday's meeting begins at 6pm at Council's Torquay office. It is open to the public and will be livestreamed on the Council website.

The draft budget features a forecast result (Unallocated Cash Surplus) of \$2.2m, and record capital works program to deliver new and renewed assets.

The proposed capital works budget of \$64.25m includes multi-year projects worth \$49.14m, such as the Wurdi Baierr Aquatic and Recreation Centre, hockey pitch at Banyul Warri Fields, and Karaaf Diversion project, along with new projects \$15.11m.

Highlights of the new capital allocation:

- major irrigation and drainage upgrade to oval at Spring Creek Recreation Reserve, Torquay (\$2.55m);
- upgrade Gladman Street, Winchelsea to become a sealed road (\$757,064);
- unsealed road renewals on Bambra-Aireys Inlet Road (\$386,000), Eagle Rock Parade Aireys Inlet (\$97,000) and Pettavel Road Freshwater Creek (\$152,000); and
- renewal of Cape Otway Road from Dysons Lane to Parish Lane, near Moriac (\$200,000)

The draft budget details Council's core services, incuding open space, civil and road maintenance (total more than \$14.3m), waste and recycling services (\$13.06m), early years (\$4.53m), and local libraries (\$850,500 contribution to the Geelong Regional Library Corporation).

Funding is proposed for specific initiatives:

- \$160,000 for year two of the 'Branching Out' urban tree planting program;
- \$148,600 for community grants;
- \$87,000 for Christmas decorations and activations; and
- \$64,600 to Life Saving Victoria towards lifeguards on Surf Coast beaches.

The draft budget factors in an average rate rise of 3%, in line with the Victorian Government's cap.

The full Draft Budget and Draft Revenue and Rating Plan can be read now as part of the Council meeting agenda, via surfcoast. vic.gov.au/meetings. It is the final budget under the 2021-2025 Council Plan, and will transition Council into a new four-year plan.



Fire Danger Period ends 1 May 2025

The Fire Danger Period will officially end on Thursday, May 1st, at 0100 hrs. This marks the end of heightened restrictions on burning off and other activities that pose a fire risk.

'Ghost Camping' impacting regional tourism

CRPV

Caravan & Residential Parks Victoria is calling on the Government to urgently expand its free camping policy to include regulated parks to reduce 'ghost camping'.

Unlike unregulated free camps, privately operated caravan parks operate under strict regulation and offer safe, affordable and family-friendly camping experiences with access to clean amenities, emergency infrastructure and onsite staff.

They also play a vital role in regional economies, tourist parks accounting for 50% of overnight stays in regional Victoria, contributing \$2.4 billion in economic value, and supporting 17,000 jobs.

Since 1 December 2024, private tourist parks have been forced by the Government to compete with free, unregulated camp sites, eroding private park occupancy rates, revenue and profitability.

CRPV CEO Scott Parker said, "Providing campers in private caravan (tourist) parks with a voucher worth a similar discount to the government is providing campers in unregulated campgrounds would give more choice, provide support for small businesses and avoid the waste created by a poorly managed free booking system."
