# 'Joyful living' becomes reality Bethesda Cornerstone Village achieves a momentous milestone

On Thursday, September 24, we celebrated the grand opening of our first Bethesda Cornerstone Village, a new Christian residential community in Victoria, Minnesota. Bethesda Cornerstone Village creates the promise of "joyful living" for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities as well as active adults 55 and greater.



"This beautiful housing community celebrates independence and brings people together in a fulfilling, comfortable lifestyle," said Tom Campbell, Bethesda's vice president of real estate. "Both seniors and people with intellectual and developmental disabilities struggle to find high-quality, accessible housing in nice neighborhoods. Bethesda Cornerstone Village-Victoria meets those needs and delivers so much more."

Bethesda Cornerstone Village Victoria consists of a total of 52 homes: 37 apartment homes and 15 villa homes. Up to 20 percent of the residences will serve people with a disability who live independently. The goal of the new development is to offer accessible, high-quality housing while encouraging independent living and connections among residents. It is the latest example of innovation for which Bethesda is becoming nationally known.

Bethesda intends to expand the inclusive living concept by building additional Cornerstone Village locations in clusters around major U.S. cities, including in the Twin Cities. Each will be tailored to the needs and demographics of its community.

The project features state-of-the art smart home technology. All the rooms have universal design concepts, such as low-threshold showers, bathroom grab bars, larger units for wheelchairs and large pocket door handles for those with dexterity issues. In addition, Bethesda installed numerous safety and security measures, including a robust common area camera system, access control and smart unit deadbolts.

Residences are built to accommodate evolving needs as residents age, and offer maximum accessibility with features including walk-in showers, pocket doors and wide doorways to easily accommodate walkers and wheelchairs. The villa homes have attached one- or two-car garages and the apartment home building features an underground parking garage for easy access in any weather.

Leisure activities at Bethesda Cornerstone Village Victoria are made easy with a beautiful community center that features lots of natural light, plenty of space to gather with friends and organized learning sessions like cooking classes, Bible studies, fitness activities, and wellness activities.

### A grand celebration

After years of hard work, we were thrilled to be able to celebrate the grand opening with our staff, members of the community and—of course—the residents of our first Cornerstone Village.

Throughout the course of two events, both of which were livestreamed and attended by hundreds of supporters, we heard from incredible partners like Tom Funk, Mayor of the City

of Victoria; Jonathan Weinhagen, President & CEO of the Minneapolis Regional Chamber of Commerce; and Troy Hudson, Chaplain for the Minnesota Timberwolves.

"Bringing joyful living and independence to people with disabilities is a godsend," said Hudson.

Funk also spoke about his excitement for Cornerstone Village and having it be part of his community.

"This project truly demonstrates inclusiveness," he said, "which makes Cornerstone a perfect fit for the City of Victoria."

"Cornerstone Village is a blessing to me from God," said Hanna, one of Cornerstone's first residents. "My goal is to be more independent and I feel like this is just a really great opportunity for me to do that."

Lauren, Hanna's best friend and roommate, agrees. "My future has more opportunities now that I have this apartment, this place to live, and this community of people around me," she said.

# Enhancing lives one step Behavior Analysis


At Bethesda, our goal is to help people live fulfilling, meaningful lives. But when a person is engaging in problem behaviors or lacking in specific skills, it can have a negative effect not only on their life, but on the lives of those around them.

That's why, as part of our 2030 vision, we're proud to offer behavior supports, a highly customizable and positive approach to promoting behavior change, from reducing problem behaviors to promoting skill-building.

What's more, we're broadening our reach by expanding this offering to include children. Children with autism in particular have shown to benefit greatly from this kind of support, and Bethesda is in a unique position to provide these critical supports—not just today, but throughout a child's life.

#### What is Applied Behavior Analysis?

Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) is a scientific field of study that addresses socially significant behaviors that impact a person's daily life. It aims to understand the meaning or purpose behind those behaviors in order to promote positive behavior change.



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
For adults with developmental disabilities, it's more common that the support will be designed to reduce problem behaviors; with children, supports are more often designed to promote skill-building.

#### What does this look like in practice?

A host home provider in Colorado reached out for help because the person she was supporting, Hollie, was refusing to get out of bed. Through assessments with Hollie and her host home provider, the BCBA determined attention was important to Hollie, and by refusing to get out of bed, Hollie was getting a lot of attention from her host home provider. The host home provider changed her response to Hollie and, instead of giving her extra attention for staying in bed, began lavishing her with praise when she did get up. Soon, Hollie learned staying in bed wasn't producing her desired result, so the behavior faded away.

### **Supporting Bethesda's future**

Behavior supports not only help the people who receive them—it's also an important offering that will ensure a strong future for Bethesda. By expanding to include children in addition to adults, we're able to help more people than ever before, not just today, but throughout their lifetime. And because behavior supports can be provided virtually as well as in person, this is a flexible, accessible option that makes it easy for us to help people live their best lives possible.



# Employment supports: the key to a successful career

Having a job you love can be an important part of living a full, happy life. It fosters independence. It promotes personal growth. And the sense of satisfaction from a job well done is good for the mind, body and spirit.

At Bethesda, we believe everyone deserves the opportunity to find meaningful employment. And we know some people just need a little extra support. That's where we come in.

#### Not just a job—the right job.

At Bethesda, we don't just help people find jobs. We help them find careers. By working one-on-one with the people we support, we aim to not only help them find their dream job, but succeed at it.

The first thing we do is work to understand each person's goals and desires. Do you want to work with kids? We'll help you explore that. Interested in cars? We'll connect you with a local mechanic. Not sure what you want to do? Let's check out different options to help you discover a career that excites you.

And that's just the beginning. Because we also help with interviewing skills. Resume development. Proper work attire. Transportation. Anything a person needs support with—we're there for them.

We also work with each person to determine their unique needs, as well as learning and communication styles. If sensory issues are a problem, we'll know to keep them out noisy work environments. If a person excels at visual learning, we'll provide diagrams they can easily reference to stay on task.

And our support doesn't end once a person lands a job. Our job coaches will be on hand as long as needed to help ensure each person succeeds, whether that means doing the job together or simply being available to answer questions or provide prompts. The ultimate goal is for each person to do their job independently, with less and less support as they gain proficiency in their new role.

Helping people find careers they love is an important part of Bethesda's mission. Not only are we setting people up for long-term success and fulfilment, but we're paving the way for a more inclusive future—a future where people of all abilities are seen as valued members of the workforce and of the community at large.
