529 Garage

With the weather looking better and better, it's time to dust off the 'ol bicycle and start getting back into shape ... oh wait! You don't have your bike anymore - someone stole it! Or you "misplaced" it. If this is happening to you, hopefully you read my July 2024 article about the 529 Garage program. If you have not, let me tell you about it.

The bicycle theft protection program, called 529 Garage, continues to gain support in our detachment area. Penticton and area are 3rd highest in theft of bicycles per capita in BC. Registering your bike with 529 Garage is an important step in preventing bike theft. In addition, cyclists need to purchase a good quality lock and use it properly to secure their bikes to a dependable structure. Bike shops can also assist you in getting the right lock for your needs.

This program is also available through Penticton Bylaw Services and Penticton Community Policing Office. Our trained volunteers will also be out behind "the peach" throughout the summer to help promote and register bicycles.

Update From MLA Donegal Wilson

Boundary-Similkameen

After four weeks in Victoria, I am glad to be back home, reconnecting with the communities in the Skaha Matters readership area. Since returning, I've been working with local residents on important issues, including groundwater flood mitigation, the removal of an abandoned boat, and educating myself on the process for upcoming votes related to water and sewer systems. Additionally, I've been learning more about the discussions surrounding the potential establishment of Okanagan Falls as a municipality. These local matters are top of mind, and I remain committed to working alongside residents to ensure their concerns are heard and addressed.

Meanwhile, my time in Victoria has been busy, with the opposition already making significant pro ss in just a few short weeks. One of the most important changes we successfully pushed for was a major revision to the government's "safe supply" drug policy. The new approach now requires witnessed consumption, ensuring these drugs are not diverted to the streets. This is an essential step toward improving public safety and accountability.

We also introduced a **Private Member's Bill to support the biodiesel refinery in Prince George**, a key employer in Northern BC. Thanks to our advocacy, the government has committed to immediate action to protect these jobs - an important win for BC's resource sector.

Another priority has been breaking down trade barriers between provinces. We introduced a **Bill to enable Canada-wide reciprocal free trade**, removing unnecessary restrictions that hinder economic growth. Our country should be working together to support businesses and create jobs, not putting up roadblocks that make it harder for industries to thrive.

We also introduced a motion to apply a carbon tax to U.S. coal passing through BC ports - a policy that would have zero impact on Canadian industry, but could provide leverage to settle the long-standing softwood lumber dispute. Encouragingly, the Premier has taken this idea to Ottawa, and we are optimistic that this could lead to real progress for BC's forestry sector.

As we continue to push for these important changes in Victoria, I'm looking forward to spending time in the riding, meeting with constituents, and working on local issues. I appreciate the conversations I've had so far and encourage residents to reach out if there's anything I can do to help. It's great to be home - see you around the community!

From The Director For RDOS Area "I"

The new garbage, recycling, and yard waste curbside collection contract begins July 1. The new contract is for automated collection and requires RDOS supplied or approved carts only. For an occasional additional bag of garbage, a \$2.50 Tag-a-Bag sticker can be purchased at the RDOS office. Area "I" homes will be receiving a set

Area "I" homes will be receiving a set of RDOS supplied bins for garbage, recycling and yard waste, unless previous arrangements were made

to have existing carts assessed for compatibility with the new automated system, with approved carts receiving an RDOS sticker. The cost per home for purchase of the new automated carts is \$56 per year for the next 5 years. However, Area "I" has used some provincial funding known as Community Gas Tax to purchase the carts, so residents of Area "I" will not pay for the new carts.

Kaleden has been a recognized "FireSmart Community" since 2018, while St. Andrews and Twin Lakes are working towards this recognition. Coordinated by KVFD, the FireSmart committee supports the return of the biweekly unlimited yard waste program to assist all residents in enhancing the fire safety of their homes. As a result, Kaleden and St Andrew's will continue with biweekly unlimited yard waste collection using the carts and brown bags at an extra cost of \$2/home for a total of \$18 for July to December 2025 to be added to the curbside collection user fees. Twin Lakes and White Lake Road will have 2 unlimited collections for July to December 2025, using the cart and brown bags (dates TBA in June), then in 2026, there will be 2 in the spring and 2 in the fall. Anyone who ordered an extra yard waste bin has been asked to contact RDOS at solidwaste@rdos.bc.ca determine your wish to keep the extra bin or to use brown bags for unlimited collection.

Kaleden Irrigation District News

Irrigation Season Starts April 15 ~ And NO watering before April 15, please! Except for new lawns, Stage 1 Conservation Measures are the same as in 2024:

- Irrigation Season runs April 15 October 15. No watering outside of these dates!
- All properties south of Lakehill Road water on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.
- All properties north of Lakehill Road water on Wednesday, Friday and Sunday.
- Sprinkle 6-10 am and from 7-11 pm on assigned watering days.
- Run automatic underground systems from midnight to 7 am on assigned days only.
- Hand watering or drip irrigation systems (with individual drip emitters using no more than 0.5 gal/hr or 2 L/hr), can be done on any day and time.
- No watering on Monday for anyone!

Natural or landscaped areas on agricultural properties must follow the above restrictions. If you have a district irrigation connection and flow restrictor, and have "farm status designation" from BC Assessment Authority, you are exempt from the above restrictions for *watering crops only*.

NOTE - The rules regarding watering new lawns are under review; watch for an update in next month's column, or check the KID website and in the Conservation Measures coming with your Toll Rill

Drought conditions loom and may require moving to Stage 2 or Stage 3 restrictions, depending on severity. Details of these will be included in your Toll Bills, and also will be available on the KID Website.

The Bill Tolls for Thee ~ 2025 taxes and tolls will go up by 4%, and the IHA Levy by \$50. Toll Bills will be mailed out in early May (Tax Bills in August). A survey also will be included in the May mailout, to gauge preferences for options as to loan repayment for construction of the water treatment upgrade mandated by the Province. Please take the time to respond to this survey; your input is important!

AGM A-Coming ~ The date of the 2025 Annual General Meeting has been tentatively set for May 26 at the Kaleden Community Hall (more details next month). Two Trustee positions are vacant this year. One is due to the unfortunate passing of Dave Libby, and Brian Lang has decided to not stand for re-election (thanks for your service, Brian!). If you are interested in running for one of these Trustee positions, Nomination Forms are found in the "How Do I?" section on the KID Website. Completed forms must be received in the KID Office by April 19.

From The Director For RDOS Area "D"

Decision: Okanagan Falls Will Incorporate ~ Nobody can say that Okanagan Falls didn't give this a lot of thought, with previous considerations recorded as far back as 1974! And, on March 22, 2025, in an open, transparent and democratic decision by informed voters, Okanagan Falls residents voted 588 for and 512 opposed on the referendum question to incorporate.

Future leaders of BC's newest municipality should bear in mind the comments noted throughout the process, e.g. be fiscally responsible, ensure growth and development foster sustainability - not just growth and development, and maintain the 'small town feel' of the community.

After 50 years, it's good the decision has been made and time we all move forward - together! Next steps will follow, once additional information is provided by the province. THANK YOU to everyone for participating directly or indirectly in this important milestone for our community.

RDOS 2025 Budget ~ The budget was passed, with the property tax requisition for Area "D" residents increasing by 5.56% over last year. Some Area "D" additions at 3rd reading included: replacement for 1 of the Community Recreation Centre's basketball hoops; and some additional reserve contributions.

Monthly "unlimited yard waste pick-ups" were also added at 3rd reading, at a cost of approximately \$16/house/year. This in addition to 2x each month in February and November. While the earlier planned reduction to 2x in each of spring and fall was a well-intentioned to minimize rate increases, it would negatively impact residents' efforts to FireSmart their properties - many have a large amount of yard waste every month. The monthly frequency that is now planned, is intended to strike a balance between cost cutting and safety. The changes take place in July and carry on for the balance of the year. The frequency of "unlimited yard waste pick-ups" can be reconsidered for the 2026 Budget late this fall.

Infrastructure Upgrades ~ Residents of Okanagan Falls are seeing signs of the "Infrastructure Investment Program" initiated in December 2023. A 2" water pipe has been a constraint on the Okanagan Falls water system as a whole. This was upgraded to 8" in the laneway immediately south of Highway 97 between Cedar and Ash. Other upgrades will occur throughout this year and next. And yes, changes in water pressure from the upgrade triggered the "Boil Water Notice". While Notices are frustrating for some, these system upgrades are essential to maintaining a good water system that provides long term benefits to the entire town.

What Do The Boil Water Notifications Mean ~ These are issued to keep people safe, in accordance with Interior Health Authority requirements. When issued, the advice is to use a safe alternate water source, or boil water - full boil for at least 1 minute - for all drinking, toothbrushing, food preparation/cooking, ice making and infant formula preparation. There are two levels of notification, as follows:

- Boil Water Notice = the advice above applies to all residents, and business operators are required to notify guests. This is the more severe notification and everyone should comply.
- Boil Water Advisory = this advice applies to those residents who are seeking additional protection a less severe notification.

RDOS Water Service Office Relocated ~ Water service operators have relocated to a dedicated office located by the Waste Water



Treatment Plant. They presently service 5 systems in or near Okanagan Falls. RDOS Community Services will continue to use half the building the water services staff moved from; however, the entire building will be available to the New Municipality and may offer a cost effective approach to a Town Hall.

RDOS Strategic Priorities ~ So that RDOS doesn't take on more than it can accomplish, and can get done what it says it's going to do, staff have prepared a list of all the 'strategic priorities'. These include items outside of normal operational tasks, ranging from getting a 'Housing Needs Report' to comply with BC government requirements and identify the type and location of housing needed throughout the Region, to updating the websites, to repositioning or adding a bus stop on a BC Transit bus route, to holding a referendum for converting a sewer or water service from a private operator to RDOS, and more. Supporting the incorporation of Okanagan Falls is on the list, requiring the most staff hours of any item on the strategic priorities list.

There are just over 250 strategic priorities! That's a surprisingly large number, but every item has to be completed for one reason or another. With 9 different electoral areas each needing certain items done for themselves, plus items needed for the Region as a whole, plus items needed to comply with provincial and federal legislation, it adds up fast to 250 priority items. The good news is that each item is budgeted with an estimated number of staff hours and planned for completion in 2025 or 2026. The challenging part of this is that any new priority can only be completed in 2025 or 2026, if other items requiring comparable staff time are removed from the list.

OK Falls Parks & Rec Commission

As we move into spring, you will notice a flurry of activity by RDOS Parks Staff: clean-up of winter debris, checking trees for winter damage; seasonal washroom opening (Easter); annual playground inspection; irrigation testing and start-up; aeration of turf areas and beach rototilling, just to name some of the necessary preparations for the opening of the parks.

Some of the capital park projects you can look forward to this year include: completion of Garnett Family Park upgrades; installation of Water Fountains / Water Bottle filling stations at Kenyon and Christie washrooms; planning for improvements to Lions Park, and planning for the replacement of the Picnic Shelter in Kenyon Park.

The Commission is also working with RDOS Staff in planning a number of Volunteer Projects for this year. The goal is to bring enhancements to the parks that staff cannot provide in their regular duties and to minimize the amount of staff time drawn from their regular duties to oversee the volunteers. Such volunteer projects include providing bike stands for the parks, refurbishing benches in Lions Park, painting picnic tables in Kenyon Park, painting parking dividers in Lions Park, and exploring other volunteer work that provides the enhancements that volunteers can bring to our parks.

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Sewer & Water Utilities Acquisition By RDOS For Heritage Hills, Lakeshore Highlands & Vintage Views Community Vote On April 12, 2025

We would like to remind everyone to please vote on April 12, 2025 between 8am - 8pm at Okanagan Falls Community Centre, 1141 Cedar Street, or at the advance poll on April 2, 2025 between 8am - 8pm at the RDOS Office, 101 Martin Street, Penticton. Mail in voting can be requested by emailing communications@rdos.bc.ca.

This is an exceptionally important vote which will determine whether you receive safe drinking water and whether the sewage treatment system works. The outcome of this vote will substantially impact this community.

Please inform yourself with regard to the engineering studies which the RDOS has had carried out on both the water system and the sewage system. The RDOS studies also determine the overall future costs to bring these utilities into provincial and municipal compliance. You can locate the engineering study by accessing the RDOS website at rdosregionalconnections.ca.

The Heritage Hills/Lakeshore Highlands Community Association (HHLHCA) has been actively involved with the performance and evaluation of the water utility for the past 12 years, and the sewer utility for the past 5 years. They have carried out their own assessment study, resulting in a unanimous vote of members on August 8, 2012 to request the RDOS to assume ownership of the water utility. They have liaised with the RDOS, Interior Health and Ministry of Environment consistently over this period of time. It has become clear from this work that the only viable option available for our community is to have the RDOS assume ownership of both the sewer and water utilities. The current owner has stated at a public meeting and in person to the RDOS, that he has no interest in continuing to operate or own either utility. The Province has indicated that it is not interested in taking over water or sewer systems and the RDOS will not consider or revisit the acquisition of the two utilities for at least 5 years from now if the acquisitions by them are not supported by the community at the Assent Vote on April 12, 2025.

The future of our community is in our hands. Please vote and make an informed decision.

ELECTOR REGISTRATION

There is no need to pre-register to vote as the registration of qualified electors will take place at the time of voting. You will be required to make a declaration that you meet the following requirements:

- 18 years of age or older on assent voting day
- Canadian citizen
- resident of BC for at least 6 months immediately before the day of registration
- resident of OR registered owner of real property in the Vintage Views Wastewater Area for at least 30 days immediately before the day of registration, and
- not disqualified under the Local Government Act or any other enactment from voting in the assent voting and not otherwise disqualified by law.

Resident electors must produce **2 pieces of identification** (at least one with a signature). Picture identification is not necessary. The identification must prove both residency and identity.

Non-resident property electors must produce 2 pieces of identification (at least one with a signature) to prove identity, provide proof that they are entitled to register in relation to the property, and, if there is more than one owner, provide written consent from a majority of the property owners to one owner voting.

 - regular letter mail through Canada Post to residential address; OR
 - regular letter mail through Canada Post to an alternate address provided when requesting the mail ballot package.
- 5. Two pieces of identification that together prove who you are and where you live. Combined BC Driver's License/Services Card is considered one piece of identification.

Mail ballot packages will be sent out commencing on or about February 24, 2025. For the mail ballot to be counted, you are responsible for ensuring that your completed ballot is received at the Regional District Office no later than 4:30 pm on April 11, 2025, or at the Okanagan Falls Community Centre, 1141 Cedar Street, Okanagan Falls, BC between 8:00 am and 8:00 pm on April 12, 2025. Your mail ballot package will contain instructions on how to complete and return your mail ballot.

SYNOPSIS OF PROPOSED BYLAWS

Penticton Outdoors Club Celebrates 50 Years Of Outdoor Adventures

Inspired by the beauty and wilderness of the South Okanagan Valley, in 1975 four kindred spirits founded the Penticton Outdoors Club (POC). The initial four mountaineers, Ann Kiefer, Fred Van Seters, Tom Landecker, and Stu Patterson, shared a common passion for the Okanagan area, creating a community that has grown to 47 active members spanning in age from 30's through 80's, primarily retirees in their 50's and 60's. When asked about the difference in ages, Bev Krieger (former President and a senior hiker extraordinaire) smiled, observing "new members often say they're inspired to keep up with us!", acknowledging the desire to encourage young people to join, noting "inspiring new leaders, and fostering a love for the outdoors are key to continuing our legacy". Hiking remains the main activity for the POC, enjoying 32 group hikes last season from March through October, and an additional 32 pre-hikes performed by trail leaders (17 lead volunteers) and interested parties in advance, ensuring trail safety and assessing the conditions and difficulty of trails. Favorites include Brent Mountain (Apex area), Three Blind Mice (a network of trails between Naramata and Penticton), McIntyre Bluff, Apex Mountain, and numerous others. While day hikes are the norm, there are also multi-day backpacking/camping trips in various provincial parks (Banff, Yoho, Glacier, etc.). Throughout the years, the club has helped maintain popular hiking trails, clearing debris after storms, placing emphasis not only on being fit, keen (some would say hardcore) hikers, but caring for the environment.





The South Okanagan is known for lakes, and with expanding memberships come expanding interests. Kayaking is quickly gaining in popularity, and members enjoy day paddles, topping off the summer last August with a 5-day camping/kayaking outing at Wells Gray Provincial Park.

The longevity of the club may be a result of the philosophy that the club has the potential to be as interesting and exciting as the members wish. Activities are led by volunteer members from the group who select, plan, and lead the adventures - a hike, an occasional bike ride, snowshoeing, backcountry skiing, kayaking or whatever. If there are new members that want to lead, there are mentors to help and encourage them. As the leader, they set the activity, the route, the date, and the pace. The club has embraced the idea that the needs of the members help drive the club activities, exploring and protecting the wilderness in the company of friends made through shared experiences and common goals. Whether there are a handful of people attending or a large group, it means there's been adventure and camaraderie for everyone, where we can all learn, find inspiration, and renew our spirits.

Members come not only from Penticton and the immediate area, but as far away as Osoyoos, Vancouver, Peachland, Keremeos, and even one from the US. Anyone wishing to be part of the next 50 years of adventure can find more information at the POC website at PentictonOutdoorsClub.ca.



Your Gut Health Is Key To Your Overall Health

Research is growing rapidly Gastrointestinal (GI or gut) health and uncovering some insights into how this part of the human body is responsible for so much good health, as well as, so many health problems. What we know definitively is that a healthy gut is a major predictor of wellness and an unhealthy gut a major predictor of disease.

The rich microbiome, mainly in the large intestine, is comprised of many different microbes which are extremely health promoting, when properly balanced. A healthy microbiome contains in the range of 100 trillion microbes, which is at least 10 times more than our own human cells. This is our "top-soil" and it maintains our vitality and health. As every organic farmer knows, the health of the plants and animals depends on the health of the soil. And so, it is with people. We cannot grow healthy cells and tissues without a healthy microbiome. When an abundance of healthgiving microbes lines our gut mucus membranes, as well as all the other protective membranes in our body (such as our respiratory tract), they maintain not only healthy digestion and absorption of vital nutrients, but also a highly functioning immune system, brain, and organ system.

The gut mucus membrane, if stretched out flat, is the size of two tennis courts and acts as a filter between us and the outside world. It is our main area of interaction with our environment and distinguishes that which is friendly to us from that which is harmful. Utilizing a complex system of immune, hormonal, biochemical, and cellular mechanisms, our gut lining protects us from harmful invaders and allows us to be nourished by friendly nutrients. This filter is largely maintained by our microbiome. When the microbiome is out of balance, leaky gut can occur, which is like having holes in the filter. The barrier breaks down and the system of discerning good from bad begins to fail. This leakiness leads to inflammation, which is the root cause of most chronic illnesses (which account for 75% of health-care costs). Estimates are that illness is at least 80% environmentally caused, and at the most, 20% genetically induced.

So, what is causing such havoc in our guts to lead to skyrocketing rates of chronic illness? Chronic diseases include those of the heart and circulation: of the brain such as Alzheimer's disease. Parkinson's, Autism, ADD/ADHD, depression, anxiety; digestive disturbances; metabolic disorders like diabetes, thyroid disorders, and obesity; arthritic and pain conditions; as well as chronic fatigue syndrome and autoimmune conditions. Yes, these are all inflammatory conditions, caused, or at least made worse, by gut issues. The underlying causes seem mainly to be linked to dysbiosis and leaky gut. But what is causing that? The answer lies in the changes we have made over the past few decades in the way we eat, the medicine we take, our lifestyle habits, and the level of toxins we are taking in. These things can all upset our microbiome and lead to leaky gut and immune imbalances.

Stark examples of the changes we have made relatively recently in our society are:

- An increase in prescription antibiotics and pesticide use in farming, which both kill the healthy microbiome.
- An increase in highly processed food intake and a decrease in the consumption of whole foods.
- A decrease in real foods, which is full of health-giving nutrients.

- A decrease in naturally fermented foods, which are rich in healthy bacteria.
- An increase in GMO food which is designed to be sprayed with glyphosate (Roundup), which is a chemical proven to cause leaky gut and destroy the microbiome.
- A change in childbirth and child rearing practices with more C-Sections and less breast feeding. Plus, the decline of real food in children's diets.

In recent years, research on specific whole foods diets, lifestyle measures, and strains of probiotic supplements offer some hope for chronic disease management. Supplementation with certain probiotic strains such as human Lactobacillus and Bifidobacterium strains, Saccharomyces boulardii, Lactobacillus reuteri, and Bacillus coagulans, to mention a few with research to back up their use, show promise for improving intestinal pathologies such as leaky gut, IBS, IBD, colitis, diarrhea, and generalized inflammation. Getting to the cause of ill health is the first step in moving towards wellness, vitality, and becoming the healthiest version of yourself. We should not accept the notion that our bodies are just falling apart. Research and common sense tell us that this is not the normal course of our lives. We can, and should, be vital and healthy for our entire lives. With an understanding of underlying mechanisms that can disrupt optimal health, and by adopting a preventive, wellness approach to daily living, lifelong wellness is very possible. Proven nutritional strategies have been developed to reverse the damage caused by this imbalance and to enhance a healthy, life promoting microbiome. For guidance see a Naturopathic Physician. 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The Dark Ages

380,000 years after the Big Bang, the Universe was a hot soup of subatomic particles. If we had been there, we would have seen the sky filled with a uniform orange glow. That glow is still detectable, but the expansion of the Universe has stretched out the light waves until they are now just a faint background for our radio telescopes, the Cosmic Microwave Background.

A little later, the protons and electrons assembled themselves into atoms. For the next billion years, Hydrogen atoms dominated, and Hydrogen atoms do not emit light, so the Universe went dark. Astronomers call this epoch the Dark Ages. We can investigate what happened in the Dark Ages, but it's difficult work.

While Hydrogen atoms do not emit light, they do betray their presence by generating radio signals. Those signals leave the atoms at a precisely known wavelength, very close to 21 centimetres. Those radio signals from the Dark Ages have been spreading out across the Universe for about 13 billion years. Over that time, two things have happened to them. First, the signals have spread out over a vast volume, and the signals reaching a radio telescope are now very, very weak. Second, the waves have been stretched out by the expansion of the Universe, and are now much longer than 21 centimetres.

To learn about the Dark Ages, we have to face three problems. First, the signals are weak - the faintest signals that radio astronomy has ever tried to capture. Second, the expansion of the Universe has moved those signals to longer wavelengths, where our Milky Way generates signals that can easily drown out the weaker, more distant ones. And third, the signal from the Dark Ages will be in the range of wavelengths which are flooded with the signals that people use to communicate. To listen to the Universe when it was 380,000 years old, we will have to do battle with cell-phone signals, FM radio broadcasts, and communications with aircraft; and the list doesn't end there.

The telescopes needed are very simple, just a wire stretched between two poles, or something like the "rabbit ears" that we once used on our TV sets. Where to put that simple telescope? The further from civilization, the better, to reduce the level of manmade signals.

Astronomers from McGill University, in Montreal, are operating a simple antenna on Marion Island, half way between the southern tip of Africa and the Antarctic (and they are also checking out a site in the Canadian arctic). Indian astronomers have floated an antenna on a remote lake in Tibet. A group of American researchers is working in the West Australian desert. The American group published a result in February 2018, reporting a detected signal far stronger than anticipated. Six years later, the result is still very controversial. Stay tuned.

Are You A Hummingbird Lover? Good News - They Are On The Way!

The Rufous, Calliope and Black-chinned Hummingbirds all come to the South Okanagan to breed and to feast on our spring and summer bounty. It is a long way to come and the trip is perilous

with many challenges along the way. Most of them will be here in May.

These birds are important pollinators, but do you know they are also keen insect eaters? The diet of nestlings is almost entirely made up of small insects that have emerged from aquatic systems. Their favourite food are midges - those little clouds of tiny insects you see above your head on a walk.

Citizen scientists have been hard at work learning about these birds in BC and Alberta, coordinated by Rocky Point Bird Observatory's Hummingbird Project. They have found that some species are in steep decline, most concerningly the Rufous Hummingbird, which is a 'tipping point' species (i.e. has lost two thirds of its population in the last 50 years and is on track to lose another 50% in the next

50 years). They look at how these birds use the environment, and have examined diet and exposure to high levels of agricultural pesticides.

The aim of all this work is conservation, being able to give the public

and land managers solid information with which to make decisions that support these birds and help struggling populations recover.

The Hummingbird Project is launching a new citizen science initiative to look at large-scale hummingbird movements. They want to understand how hummingbird movements relate to air quality across a range of habitats. Specifically, they are looking for volunteers who live outside the urban centres and who feed hummingbirds across the breeding season and would be willing to track nectar consumption twice a week. If you are interested in participating in nectar-use monitoring and finding out if your location might be suitable for inclusion in this study, please let us know at hummingbird@rpbo.org.

We are also rebuilding some of our monitoring capacity in the South Okanagan. There may be availability for a few new team members, e.g. scribes. Please recognize this is a long-term commitment, we monitor every two weeks throughout the season. If you are interested in participating in monitoring, you will also need to be detail oriented, have good eyesight and hearing, and if handling birds, good hand-eye coordination. You also need to be an early riser - we start very early! Please contact us at hummingbird@rpbo.org for further discussion.

Kaleden Museum

Kaleden Packinghouses - Part 2 of 4

This series is on the Kaleden Packinghouses. These articles will present to the reader a vision of what was in the community in years past. Later articles will focus on what has replaced the two packinghouses. Some of you know ... and we will inform the rest. Enjoy!

In Kaleden, Muir Steuart had the advantage of a site, a building and permanent equipment, while the Penticton Co-op had to use makeshift accommodation, working in tents on the Battye property for several years. As a result, Steuart had cornered most of the local tonnage by the 1920s and was the dominant fruit handler until selling out to the Penticton Co-op in 1922. For just one year, the Penticton Co-operative Growers handled the entire local crop. But in 1923, the local growers broke away to form the Kaleden Co-operative Growers, with F.W. King - President, R.D. Mutch -Vice-President, and H.W. Corbitt, Reg Hody and H.H. Whitaker as Directors. F.W. King remained president until 1949, when he became Vice-President. He served in that capacity until he retired in 1961 at the age of 72. The following years saw a succession of building additions and equipment upgrades at the site on the corner of Lakehill Road and Linden Avenue. However, it took the advent of the rail line through Kaleden in 1932 to move the local plant into the twentieth century.

Credible Cremation Services is always here to assist families with questions they may have when dealing with the death of a family member or friend. One of the most common questions is "what is the Canada Pension Plan (CPP) Death Benefit?" The CPP Death Benefit is a one-time, lump-sum payment made to the estate of the deceased contributor.


If there is a Will, the executor named in the Will to administer the estate must apply for the CPP Death Benefit within 60 days of the date of death. If the executor does not wish to apply for the CPP Death Benefit, they need to advise the CPP that the Estate will not be applying. If there is No Will, or if the executor did not apply for the death benefit within 60 days of the date of death, one of the following persons should apply. Payment of the death benefit will be made in the following order of priority, upon application, to: the Administrator appointed by the Court; or the person or institution who has paid, or who is responsible for the payment of the deceased's funeral expenses; or the surviving spouse or commonlaw partner of the deceased; or the next-of-kin of the deceased.

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
