International Tech Recognition

Welcome back! We've been hard at work behind the scenes this summer, getting ready for the first day

of school. WE can't wait to have our students back in our buildings.

The start of the 2019-20 school year is right around the corner and we're excited to launch new programs and open new learning spaces for our kids. The Lakota Cyber Academy kicked off over the summer. More than 40 seniors enrolled in Cyber Sprint have already begun the curriculum and an additional 115 sophomores and juniors will join them in the fall. Our elementary school students will

have new learning spaces as their media centers have been turned into innovation hubs this summer, complete with new learning tools and collaboration spaces. Most of our youngest learners will have a new home as our preschool moves to VanGorden Elementary, Liberty Early Childhood School will also have two preschool classes. This decision was made to create more room at our ECS buildings to accommodate enrollment projections.

Additionally, our sixth-graders will now be a part of our "WE are Empowered" program. The Chromebooks collected from last vear's eighth-graders will now be used by our sixth-graders in a modified 1:1 program, meaning the devices will be available for use at

school, but will not be taken home as they are in our secondary grades.

WE believe so strongly in the power of relationships that the first two days of school will once again focus on making connections. By setting the tone of the classroom together, our teachers and students will be invested in the relationships and culture that will continue to grow throughout the school year.

Enjoy the remaining days of summer. WE can't wait to have you back on August 15.

Portrait of a Lakota Graduate

With this in mind, district leaders have developed a Portrait of a Lakota Graduate (POG).

Inspired through input from students, parents, administrators and the district's business and community partners, the portrait portrays the skills that every Lakota graduate should possess.

"The Portrait of a Lakota Graduate encompasses more than daily lesson plans," said Keith Koehne, executive director of curriculum and instruction. "Our students must also have critical thinking, communication and collaboration skills to help them succeed in life."

The POG is a visual reminder that in order to successfully pursue one of the 4 Es, Lakota students must be:

- Critical Thinkers:
- Persistent Problem Solvers;
- Responsible Collaborators;
- Effective Communicators;
- . Engaged Community Members; and
- · Adaptable Learners.

The goal is for graduates to not only possess these skills by the end of their senior year, but to have mastered them. That's why the district will introduce them at an early age.

"Aspects of each attribute will be introduced at all grade levels so that by the time a student graduates, these important skills will be second nature to them," Koehne said.

FROM THE TREASURER

It's an exciting time to be in Lakota. Our students will enter the new school year with several new opportunities for

expanded learning - all being introduced in a fiscally responsible way.

Lakota continues to be financially sound. In fact, we ended the 2018-19 school year with a stronger cash balance than we anticipated. The fiscal stability and strength we have in this District allows us to think bigger for our students. This didn't happen overnight and we don't take it for granted. Whether the fiscal climate is stable or challenging, we continue to make fiscal responsibility a priority in this District. It should never be a contradiction to provide an

excellent education for our students while at the same time being good financial stewards for the taxpaying citizens of our community.

Our technology department has been hard at work this summer preparing the Chromebooks used by last year's eighth-graders for the incoming sixth-graders. While the devices will remain at school, a modified 1:1 program will be in place for these students. Not only will it give them access to a new learning tool on a regular basis, but it will also help to prepare them for the junior school experience the following year.

The expanded zero bell option introduced at our high schools is also being done in a fiscally responsible way. A flexible work schedule for some of our current teaching staff has allowed this to take place for our students.

Being good stewards of our taxpayers' dollars is a top priority - one that doesn't stop when school ends. This summer, the Lakota Board of Education approved three new finance policies designed to be guardrails for our budget. Written with the guidance of our Finance Committee, these policies are an additional step in maintaining the district's financial stability.

Cyber Academy Takes Off

Learning doesn't get much more real-world than Lakota's new Cyber Academy experience.

With the launch of these new course options for sophomores through seniors, a new wave of cyber security analysts will likely be coming from Lakota soon. The district's partnership with Belcan, LLC to help kick start the program this summer with an accelerated "Cyber Sprint" option for graduating seniors is a direct response to the prediction that by 2021, there will be approximately 3.5 million jobs unfilled in the cybersecurity industry.


"It is critically important that we graduate students who are equipped to take the next step in their professional career and support the demands of the current workforce," said Lakota's Executive Director of Curriculum & Instruction Keith Koehne. "This program will open doors to our students after graduation, should

they choose any one of the 4 Es - continuing their studies in higher education, enlisting in the military, entering the workforce or starting an entrepreneurial path."

The 155 students enrolled in Cyber Academy this school year will have the opportunity to earn up to six industry certifications and qualify for job shadowing and internship opportunities with the district's growing portfolio of industry partners. Beyond on-the-job experience, Lakota is also seeking out partners to support the program in the form of design challenges, mentorships and even direct sponsorship.
