Happy Fall, Saint Paul Methodist Church:

The Saint Paul of the New Testament, for whom our church is named, wrote letters to churches and pastors. We refer to his letters as *The* Epistles of Saint Paul. In other news, the Convening General Conference took place in San Jose, Costa Rica this past week, September 20th-26th. Many foundational pieces of legislation were put in place at this historic Convening General Conference. Let me share three primary decisions that took place:

- 1. The General Conference ratified the Constitution of the Global Methodist Church through our new Book of Doctrines and Disciplines [hereafter, BDD]. The BDD defines our central theology of the Lordship of Jesus Christ and requires all bishops, clergy, and laity who seek to be covenant members of the Global Methodist Church to confess Jesus as Lord. The BDD also serves as our book of covenant connecting every GMC congregation together in how we function and operate.
- 2. The General Conference elected a total of six transitional, part-time bishops to help lead our previously two elected bishops giving our denomination a total of eight episcopal leaders through the next General Conference in 2026. GMC Bishops will be responsible for maintaining our denomination through spiritual, theological, and doctrinal leadership.
- 3. The General Conference ratified the office of Conference Superintendent. Conference Superintendents will be responsible for temporal leadership [day-to-day work] in each annual conference. The new Conference Superintendent of the North Carolina Annual Conference is Rev. David Banks who moves into this new role from his previous office of President Pro Tempore.

Saint Paul Children's Choir





And now we're back on Sunday nights downstairs.

As parents, school years always seem to start like an avalanche-- there's a loud noise and then we all tumble downhill together out of control 'til we reach the bottom, all our energy spent, wondering "How in the world did we get here?" But oh, what a ride! Our hope is that Saint Paul Youth will be a bit of a refuge in that chaos. We want it to be a place where we have a great time together and ALSO a place where we draw close to God. Believe it or not, most kids don't know those things aren't mutually exclusive (well probably most of us don't always know that either)!

One of the big values we want to emphasize is familiarity and comfort with the scriptures. The Bible can be intimidating for teenagers. It's old. It's complicated. It's boring (at least to them, you and I would never think that...) But the simple truth is that as we spend time with Jesus, it's easy for us to do all the talking. We have to read the Bible so He can get a word in edgewise. And

- What does this say about who I am?
- And what made no sense to me?

But as we dive into the Scriptures this way, we start to realize this is a two-way conversation, one that we can have every day. And with all the noise and the tumbling avalanche of life students face these days, that conversation is one they need more than anything.

From Our METHODIST WOMEN

Ladies Night of Hope

On September 10, nearly one hundred women gathered at Saint Paul for the eagerly anticipated Ladies Night of Hope dinner. This special event was organized by the Saint Paul Methodist Women. Our Titus 2 Women's Ministry brought Marcy Gregg as the inspiring guest speaker. Joining the Saint Paul community were women from Garris Chapel Church, Bethel Fellowship, Mount Carmel Church, and Saint Joseph's Methodist Church, all uniting to enrich their respective Methodist Women's ministries and better serve the wider community.

The evening was particularly memorable thanks to Marcy Gregg, who delivered a powerful message on hope and resilience. Marcy, an abstract painter, author, and speaker, recounted the profound challenges she faced following a life-altering coma during the birth of her third child at age 30. This incident erased memories from her life from the age of 17 onwards, a period that included becoming a wife and mother to three young children. The loss thrust her into a period of profound confusion and exhaustion, leading her to misuse alcohol to cope with her despair.

However, in her darkest moment, God reminded Marcy that He had saved her life for a higher purpose. This epiphany sparked a transformative journey of recovery and self-discovery, teaching her the power of surrender and trust in God. Despite enduring further hardships like the loss of her father, severe injuries, and chronic arthritis, Marcy also cherishes the joyful moments, such as watching her children grow up and sharing her story with others. Today, Marcy finds comfort and joy in her art, embedding each piece with a scripture that guides her creative process.

Marcy's life underscores her belief that each experience layers upon the last to forge us into who we are meant to be. Her story serves as a beacon of hope and a testament to the belief that trusting in God through every chapter of our lives crafts us into divine masterpieces, as articulated in Proverbs 3:5-6: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to Him, and He will make your paths straight."

Marcy Gregg's journey is a vivid reminder that every layer of life is significant—every moment shapes us, and trusting in God's plan is paramount.



Dear Saint Paul Church Family,

It is so exciting to be sharing with you about my ministry abroad. I have officially finished my time in The Netherlands and will be starting my ministry in France on Oct 7. While leaving The Hague will not feel real until I land in France, I would love to share some of the ways I am celebrating in my last few weeks here, as well as ways to pray for the next season.

Our summer camps were a huge success, meaning they were fun, kids were seen and known deeply, and the Gospel was proclaimed. One exciting aspect from this year was bringing a handful of Ukrainian students, along with one Russian (who is their best friend! Amazing!), to camp. I felt out of my league in this situation, but the Lord sent me Liana, a young Ukrainian woman with a strong faith, a heart for teenagers, and a "coolfactor" to rival a TikTok star, to lead with me at camp. We bonded so quickly, and not only did she love her experience as

a leader with these students, she also wants to continue with our outreach ministry in her city. I am passionate about developing new leaders, and while Liana is naturally gifted in these areas, it is a privilege to train her before I leave. I pray that I can nurture this relationship so she can continue work in The Netherlands as a volunteer.

October 1st, I will move to France! I am excited about starting a new English-speaking ministry in a city that has had the tradition of Young Life in French. My first order of business will be, perhaps ironically, to take French classes. Being accepted in France without the language is just not possible, especially when you add "missionary" on top of that. I am enrolled in a five-week, full-time intensive language school. I do not anticipate having brain capacity for much more than this, but any additional time will be spent getting to know the city of Lyon. Learning a new city, culture, and language will feel like drinking from a firehose, but I am genuinely looking forward to building this foundation of living in Lyon.

Please pray for me through the transition process and language school. The Holy Spirit has a beautiful way with languages, and I know I will need His help in this next season.



All of this would not be possible without your prayers, encouragement, and support. I am thankful to be partnering with you all to bring the Good News of Jesus to lost teenagers in France.

May the Lord continue to bless you as you are blessing others "to the ends of the earth!"
