Building Independence Through Self-Care

This term, learners have been working towards Preparing for Adulthood (PFA) goals with a focus on self-care.

Together, we explored which self-care products are essential—like soap, shampoo, and deodorant—compared to non-essential items like hairspray or make-up. Through a sorting task, learners discussed their choices and even introduced a "nice to have" category for things like moisturiser and lip balm.

The following week, we took a similar approach to homecare essentials, helping learners recognise the key items needed to maintain a clean and organised living space.



Learners also had a practical lesson on shoe polishing, learning how to prepare for formal occasions like job interviews—an important skill for making a great first impression!



In week three, we ran a centre-wide survey on oral hygiene, and the results were interesting!

Over 90% of learners and tutors brush their teeth twice a day, with lots of flossing taking place too.

However, despite their strong knowledge of oral health, more than 50% hadn't seen a dentist in the past year, with many not currently registered with one.

Despite this, the topic certainly gave everyone plenty to smile about!

A big well done to all learners for engaging so well with these important life skills.



A crafty learner at our **Exeter centre** has been busy putting their crochet skills to good use—by making tiny woollen rats! This unusual project is part of a wider call for 500 crocheted rats to feature in a special 3D World War Two exhibition.

The initiative, launched by a Devon woman, aims to bring history to life through a unique knitted display, showcasing the wartime experience in an engaging and creative way. Our learner has been contributing their own handmade rats to the collection, helping to support this fantastic community effort.

Dylan Digs into History at GWR Newton Abbot Museum!


Dylan has started his work experience at the GWR Newton Abbot Museum, getting handson with a variety of tasks that help keep the museum running smoothly.

Looking forward, we're preparing to welcome Cann Bridge. They'll be part of the brand-new **NEAE+21** programme, designed for SEN learners over 21.




Autism Unlimited receiving certificates
