Who it's for:

Perfect for children aged 2 to around 10.

The room is genderneutral and easy to adapt as your child grows, just update the bed or add a desk when needed.

It also works well for siblings or shared spaces, thanks to its neutral base and thoughtful accents.



Colour Palette

This room uses soft, balanced tones to keep it calm but interesting:

Warm:

ochre-orange – used on one wall for warmth and contrast

Cool:

grey-blue, and navy – adds depth and a feeling of quiet

Neutral:

cream, light and dark greys – soft base colours for flexibility



How to Use This Palette in a Kid's Room



This colour set
creates balance
beetween cool
and warm colours
in this room.

Design Tip - Think of this palette as a recipe:

Warm = heart of the space

Cool = sprinkles of flavour

Neutral = the calm plate it's served on



How to Use This Palette in a Kid's Room

Furniture: Natural wood or painted pieces in muted browns or ochres.

Textiles (bedding, cushions, rugs): Mix soft textures like muslin, velvet, and cotton in navy blue, light grey or

Layer with neutrals to keep it cozy.

Décor:

Add framed wall art in matching earthy tones.

Chre with muted ochre brown, Cool: navy blue Gols

Walls: are the mix of cool and warm tones. Keep it if you like this colour duo, otherwise opt for one wall colour preferably warm tones of beige as the cold wall could be a bit too much with navy blue around.

In this room, "Cool" tones are the main focal points, like the tent, bed house canopy. However, there are plenty of warm colours for a good balance. design

Moodboard Instructions in 5 Steps

(If you're not too busy running the world)

1. Start with the walls

Go big or keep it simple — it's your call.

In this room concept, the walls are kept simple with two-tone colour blocking, an easy and stylish solution. You can paint the lower part of the wall in a contrasting shade or use wallpaper, wainscoting, or even chalkboard paint in black or brown to add function and fun.

2. Define the function

Is this a bedroom, a playroom, or an all-in-one?

Here, the teepee tent and house bed make it a multi-use space: cosy, playful, and flexible. But yours might be mostly for sleep or shared by siblings. Know what you need — and then design to fit that purpose.

3. The room is their universe

From playdates to pillow forts, this is their world.

The teepee tent is a hideaway. The jeans bed canopy creates structure and softness. Floor cushions, a play mat, and layered pillows give comfort and opportunity — for rest, storytelling, and invention.

4. The (not-so) optional layers

Add soft pillows, rugs, and textures.

Use natural fabrics like cotton and velvet. They're not just pretty, they create depth and comfort. Look for cushions in the shape of leaves, clouds, or stars to add character without clutter.

5. Make it theirs

Hang a garland. Frame their drawing. Leave space for mess.

This room doesn't have to be perfect, just personal. Because when it feels like theirs, that's when the room works.



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
