

A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Hong Kong and all Festival Goers,

"Inspiring Generations" is a statement year for us at the HKILF. For twenty-five years, our community — writers, storytellers, poets, illustrators, creators, and those who devour words with curiosity — along with our volunteers, advisors, board members, supporters, and donors, have united to celebrate the importance of literature.

Some days, bringing all these people together feels futile. It is like climbing a great mountain: wondering if it will work, if the funds will arrive, chasing deadlines, having to say "no" more often than "yes." Doubt creeps in: *are we really making a difference? Do people still care about literacy education?*

I am grateful to my parents and family members who valued stories, investing time to read with me as a child and gifting me books for as long as I can remember—a tradition that continues to this day. When I worked in schools, our literacy programmes taught students to read and write, but they also encouraged families to enjoy reading together; it was often shocking how many did not do this until prompted.

I know my own love of books grew slowly as I watched with young eyes: the volumes collecting on our shelves, the special editions that came out only during festive holidays, the dinner conversations about a recent read. Without realizing it, I was deeply impacted by being surrounded by book lovers and newspaper readers. I watched them sit quietly and read. I had role models. I saw people I admired write poems and handwritten notes—not with the intent to publish, but simply because it was a joyful, heartfelt form of expression.

I have inherited my love of books, just as I have inherited my role as Festival Director, from those before me. Leading the HKILF and the Young Readers Festival are tremendous tasks; we never know if the community will abandon us for modern devices or if the funding will disappear. Each year is uncertain, but we have made it here by the skin of our teeth and a whole lot of love for the power of words. So, this year, my heart feels full knowing that a generation of Hong Kongers do care, and have kept our festival alive and beating with stories and conversations for a quarter of a century.

Please help books be seen. Tell stories to each other. Invite your friends and family to celebrate the gift that we have all created together.



European Literature Night (ELN), a literary initiative launched in Prague in 2006, will return to Hong Kong this February for its third edition, following the success of the previous two years. This year's event will form part of the Hong Kong International Literary Festival, presenting an exceptional line-up representing 11 European countries. ELN aims to showcase contemporary European literature through public readings in distinctive, non-traditional venues. Over the course of five hours, prominent Hong Kong personalities will present 10-minute excerpts from works by European authors at 10 different locations. Readings will occur simultaneously at 30-minute intervals, enabling audiences to design their own literary route using a dedicated map.

The event is organized by the EUNIC Hong Kong Cluster, comprising the Consulate General of Czechia in Hong Kong, the Goethe-Institut, Alliance Française, and the Italian Cultural Institute, in collaboration with Czech Centres, the EU Office in Hong Kong, and other Consulates General and cultural institutions. Local partners include the Hong Kong International Literary Festival, Bookazine HK, Zolima CityMag, and the venue partners.

Arshay's journey began in one of Chicago's most underserved communities, where he used the unlikely sport of rowing to confront racial barriers, build trust, and ignite a movement that redefined what was possible for young people of color. His story, captured in the book and documentary *A Most Beautiful Thing*, reminds us that transformation begins when those who feel invisible discover their collective strength.

Though Hong Kong's challenges differ, many here also navigate the realities of invisibility — from migrant workers to local minorities seeking belonging in an ever-changing city. This event invites reflection on how community, empathy, and collaboration can make us all visible.

Mashiul Alam is a Bangladeshi fiction writer and translator. His notable works include *Second Night with Tanushree* and *The Meat Market: Ten Stories and a Novella*. He translated Dostoyevsky's *Notes from Underground* from Russian into Bengali. Translations of his short stories appeared in *Words Without Borders*, *Asymptote*, *Aleph* (Pakistan), and more. His work earned multiple accolades, including the PEN/Heim Translation Grants in 2020 (translated by Shabnam Nadiya), the Himal Southasian Short Story Competition Award (2019) and the IFIC Bank Literature Award (2020). An IWP Fall 2022 Residency participant, he is also a Civitella Ranieri Fellow (2025).

Beatrice Alemagna is an author and illustrator from Bologna who has published over 40 titles with leading publishers. She has received numerous international awards, including the Golden Medal of the Society of Illustrators in 2017 and 2024, while her books were selected by the New York Times and the New York City Library as one of the "10 Best Illustrated Children's Books" for the years 2017 and 2019.

MYRNA AYAD

For over two decades, Myrna Ayad has authored, edited, and contributed to several books, magazines and dailies on visual art and culture from the Arab world and Iran. A frequent panellist, jurist, and moderator, her role as an independent cultural strategist allows her to work on projects within the luxury sector, government entities, private companies, and non-profit organisations. She is the founder and author of *Noor's Heroes*, a series of illustrated children's books focused on Arab greats.

Gabriela Babnik Ouattara is a writer, critic, and translator whose work spans fiction, essays, and radio plays. He is the proud child of Mexican immigrant parents and became an immigrant himself when he moved to Singapore. He loves comics, LEGO, books, games (analog and video), science fiction, and food. He plays a lot of video games in his free time.

KIM HO-YEON (金浩然)

Kim Ho-Yeon is a South Korean storyteller whose work spans novels, screenplays, and comics. His novel, *The Second Chance Convenience Store* (不便利的便利店), sold over 1.7 million copies in Korea, and has been published in 45 countries. It was named Book of the Year by major Korean bookstores and chosen as a "One Book One City" title in 38 regions. ERICA LYONS

Erica Lyons is a Jewish Hong Kong-based children's book author with a preference for historical fiction, lesser-known histories, and folktales. Her 2022 debut picture book, *Alone Together on Dan Street*, was a National Jewish Book Awards Finalist. Other titles include: *Mixed-Up Mooncakes*, *On a Chariot of Fire*, and *Saliman and the Memory Stone*. *Lily's Hong Kong Honey Cake*, her most recent title, perfectly blends her role as chair of the Hong Kong Jewish Historical Society and her love of kidlit.



ANN MORGAN

Ann Morgan is an author based in Folkestone, UK. In 2012, she read a book from every country in a year, recording her quest at ayearofreadingtheworld.com. This led to her non-fiction book *Reading the World*. Ann continues to blog, write and speak about international literature. Her debut novel was the international bestseller *Beside Myself*. Her second is *Crossing Over*. Her next non-fiction book, *Relearning to Read: Adventures in Not-Knowing*, was published in October 2025.



MARK O'NEILL

Mark O'Neill was born in London, England and educated at Marlborough College and New College, Oxford. He worked in Washington, DC, Manchester and Belfast before coming to Hong Kong in 1978. Liam Pieper is an Australian Book Industry Award-winning ghostwriter of global bestsellers as well as more modest successes with his name on the cover. He was recipient of the 2014 M Literary Award, winner of the 2015 Geoff Dean Short Story Prize and the 2016 Christina Stead Fiction Award, the inaugural creative resident of the UNESCO City of Literature of Prague, and the 2018 National Library of Australia Creative Arts Fellow for Australian Writing. *The Feel-Good Hit of the Year*, his memoir, was shortlisted for the National Biography Award and the Ned Kelly Best True Crime award.

The coffee table book immerses readers in each hike through narrative descriptions and concise summaries, paired with vintage-style posters that give each trail a distinct identity. Rashmi Sirdeshpande is an award-winning neurodivergent children's author who loves taking big ideas and making them accessible and exciting for young readers. She writes a mix of picture books, poetry, fiction and non-fiction. Her books have been published around the world and featured in a number of national and international newspapers.

Adam Sisman is the author of *Boswell's Presumptuous Task*, winner of the US National Book Critics Circle Award for Biography, and the biographer of John Le Carré, A. J. P. Taylor, Hugh Trevor-Roper, and Asa Briggs. Among his other works is *The Professor and the Parson: A Story of Desire, Deceit and Defrocking*. 
