Netrakumbh 2025: Restoring Sight, Transforming Lives



Netrakumbh 2025, an eye-care initiative, provided free eye screenings and spectacles at the Maha-Kumbha, in Prayagraj, Uttar Pradesh, India

Netrakumbh 2025, one of the largest eye-care initiatives, has brought vision and independence to thousands at the sacred Maha-Kumbha. Through Project Jyoti-Al Pro, the initiative aimed to distribute 200 Artificial Intelligence-powered assistive kits, each priced at \$400, to visually impaired children, helping them navigate the world with confidence.

The event provided free eye screenings and spectacles, with expert medical support for vision restoration. Cutting-edge technology, including Al-powered Smart Glass, Al Ring, and Al Reader, will enable children to read, recognize objects, and move independently.

The AI Reader, a key feature of the initiative, converts text into speech, offering instant voice feedback. Its lightweight and portable design makes it an accessible tool for learning and daily life, fostering greater independence for visually impaired individuals.

Netrakumbh 2025 offers a beacon of hope—spreading light, restoring vision, and transforming lives. By combining medical expertise with assistive technology, the initiative is not only restoring sight but also empowering lives.

Bay Area ASPIRE Volunteers Log 1500 Hours; Program Expands to Livermore

Since January 2025, ASPIRE (Achieving Students Progress, Instilling Resilience, and Excellence) has expanded its supplemental program to support students in English, Math, Science, and Spanish. Over 10 members serve in this program at BGI, Schilling, and Lincoln schools in Newark, CA. Results from one school show a 30% increase in math scores and a 28% increase in English scores. ASPIRE members have contributed over 1,500 service hours this academic year.

ASPIRE expanded through diverse activities. In collaboration with PALS (Parent Teacher Association) team, Sewa hosted the Scripps Spelling Bee, engaging 150 students at Lincoln Elementary, with three advancing to the next level.

ASPIRE art classes fostered creativity through watercolor, blending, and pastels, while Global Explorer sessions fueled curiosity. High schoolers-led robotics lessons made Friday evenings both fun and educational.

Additionally, money management classes equipped elementary students with essential life skills—distinguishing wants from needs and managing time and money. These classes helped students discover their personal "lkigai"—the Japanese concept "lki" means "to live," and "gai" means "reason," together translating to "a reason to live." In February, ASPIRE expanded to two new schools in the Livermore School District, with seven additional members teaching Math, English, and Science.
