Registered/accredited assistance animals are welcome at all Festival events and venues.

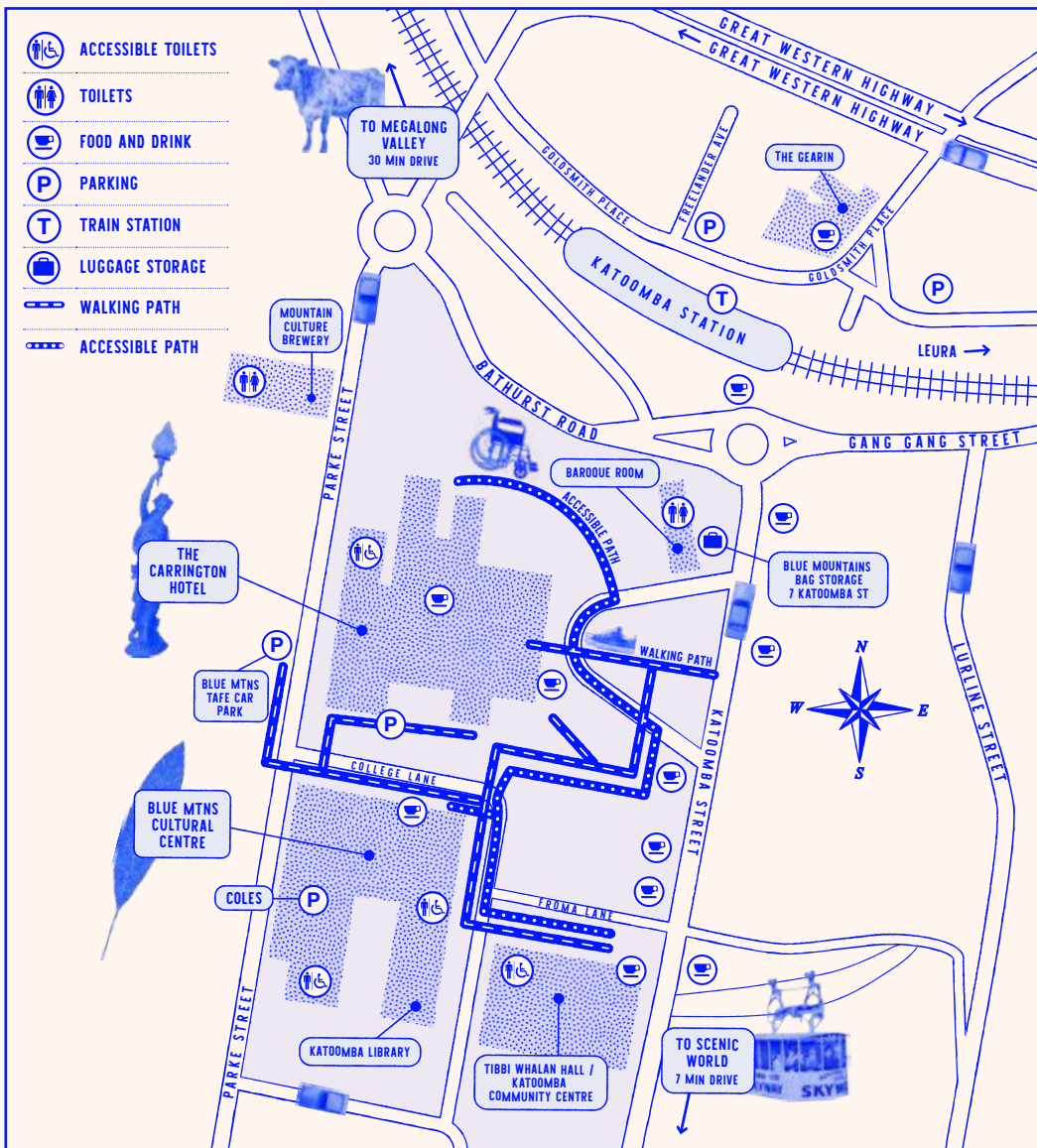
The Blue Mountains Writers' Festival is a member of the **Companion Card scheme**.

Accessible toilets are located at the Carrington Hotel, Katoomba Community Hall, Blue Mountains Cultural Centre, as well as Scenic World.

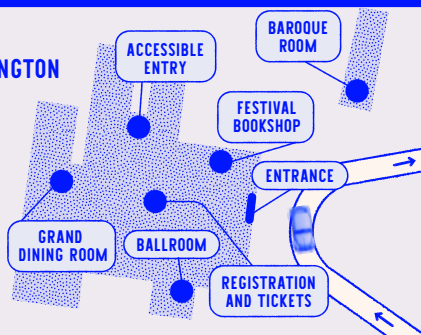
