

Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst

The 42,000-contiguous acres of JB MDL are home to more than 80 mission partners and 40 mission commanders providing a wide range of combat capability. The base spans more than 20 miles, from east to west. It is situated in the two largest counties in New Jersey—Burlington and Ocean—and includes portions of eight municipalities: the borough of Wrightstown and the townships of New Hanover, North Hanover, Pemberton, and Springfield, in Burlington County, and the townships of Jackson, Manchester, and Plumsted in Ocean County. The 87th Air Base Wing provides installation management support for 3,933 facilities. More than 44,000 airmen, soldiers, sailors, marines, coast guardsmen, civilians, and their family members live and work on and around JB MDL.

The United States Air Force's McGuire Air Force Base, the United States Army's Fort Dix and the United States Navy's Naval Air Engineering Station Lakehurst were merged on 1 October 2009. JB MDL is the Department of Defense's only tri-service joint base.

As America's premier joint warfighting base, Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst is uniquely capable of projecting air, land, and sea power in support of our nation's defense.

Though consolidated into a single joint base, the three facilities which were adjoining, but separate military installations remain commonly known by their pre-merger names. Although the installation management functions have been consolidated, the missions of each of the three installations will continue.

The Air Force provides global mobility and expeditionary combat support, the Army mobilizes and train soldiers, and the Navy continues to assure fixed and vertical wing aircraft operate safely and effectively worldwide.

78TH TRAINING DIVISION DESIGNS A UNIQUE CSM COIN

JOINT BASE MCGUIRE-DIX-LAKEHURST, N.J. – When Master Sgt. Carlos Meza, an automated logistical specialist at the 78th Training Division listened to the voices on a conference call, his thoughts suddenly turned to an entirely different skills set.

"Hey CSM, I do graphic design if you want to work with me on creating a coin," he remembers telling his command sergeant major. Units don't produce coins very often, but then CSMs don't always launch a brand new one.

Under the direction of Command Sgt. Maj. Jodi R. Renner, a new, one-of-a-kind CSM coin has been produced by the 78th headquarters here on Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst.

Army coins, sometimes called challenge coins are a tradition in the Army as well as the Army Reserve. They're used to recognize Soldier's achievements, build camaraderie, and helps boost unit morale. Anyone serving in the military can tell you, one of the most important keys to a unit's success and readiness is morale.





Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, N.J. - Army Support Activity, Fort Dix concluded its Mobilization Exercise (MOBEX) Level II on May 3, 2025, following more than five weeks of continuous operations designed to evaluate the installation's capability to mobilize, deploy and sustain combat-ready forces in support of Army requirements.

The exercise, which began March 27, was a large-scale mobilization validation event that tested every phase of the mobilization process, from initial in-processing through Soldier readiness, equipment staging and convoy movement. More than 1,200 service members participated in the training, representing units from the Army Reserve, National Guard and active-duty components. ASA, Fort Dix coordinated closely with mission partners across Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst to ensure comprehensive support throughout the duration of the exercise.

"This exercise was about validating our ability to support a rapid and scalable mobilization effort," said Bob Hood, lead MOBEX planner for ASA, Fort Dix. "From reception and in-processing to movement and final departure, every element of our team was tested, and they performed exceptionally well."

The MOBEX Level II scenario simulated a time-sensitive deployment requirement for overseas contingency operations. Units arriving at Joint Base McGuire-Dix-

Lakehurst were rapidly processed through Soldier Readiness Processing, medical and dental evaluations, and finance and legal stations. Commanders were evaluated on their ability to complete deployment checklists, account for personnel and equipment, and execute movement timelines in accordance with Army regulations.

Mobilized forces also conducted training on tactical movement procedures, convoy operations, Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and nuclear readiness, and communications planning. The Mobilization Support Force activated its full operations center and executed real-time support to all participating units. The exercise also introduced updates to digital tracking systems, allowing for improved accountability and situational awareness throughout the mobilization cycle.

"Our mission is to support the Army's ability to project power whenever and wherever it's needed," said COL Dunker. "Exercises like this ensure that we remain a ready and reliable

mobilization platform, capable of supporting large-scale deployments at a moment's notice."

ASA, Fort Dix is one of the Army's designated Mobilization Force Generation Installations and plays a vital role in the nation's ability to respond to global contingencies. A key partner at the tri-service led joint base, the Army supports Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst as a a critical power projection platform for the total force. •

AMC REACTIVATES 21ST AF REALIGNS NUMBERED AIR FORCE STRUCTURE

Published Sept. 8, 2025 Air Mobility Command Public Affairs

SCOTT AIR FORCE BASE, III. -- Twenty-First Air Force reactivated Sept. 5, realigning units from the Eighteenth Air Force and U.S. Air Force Expeditionary Center under the new Numbered Air Force structure responsible for Air Mobility Command's forces.

The NAF activation and command structure realignment allows AMC and subordinate units to achieve a more effective posture, diversify mission sets and better equip Airmen to project and sustain power at relevant speed, scale, and distance in support of national strategic objectives.

"Today, the USAF Expeditionary Center and the USAF Expeditionary Operations School are going to continue to thrive. Right next to it, we are going to stand up the 21st Air Force," said Gen. John Lamontagne, AMC commander. "The vision was to take the 18th Air Force, at 30,000 strong, and the USAF Expeditionary Center, at 11,000 strong, and bring those to about even. We are going to put flying operations at both Numbered Air Forces, put the global air mobility support system in both Numbered Air Forces, and bring unity of command, at the NAF level for the installations, to have a clear prioritization of what needs to be done."

Lamontagne presided over the 21st AF activation ceremony, where Maj. Gen. Darren Cole assumed responsibility for leading the Air Force's newest numbered air force. Cole is now responsible for nine Wings, one group, the Expeditionary Operations School and associated subordinate units that

enable contingency response efforts, humanitarian aid, and global-reach operations in support of national objectives.

"For the last 13 years, the Expeditionary Center has a proud history of organizing, training, and equipping the global air mobility support system, sustaining critical power-projection bases, and training Airmen for expeditionary missions," said Cole, Twenty-First Air Force commander. "As we consider the future, we have to change. With the activation of the 21st AF, our mission is to deliver rapid global mobility excellence. It is in our DNA, it is who we are as mobility Airmen, and it is the standard. It is time to deliver."

Cole will also lead the U.S. Air Force Expeditionary Center as a dual-hatted commander. No units will be physically moving and the Center's mission will continue alongside the Twenty-First Air Force.

Meza explained his approach. "It was mentioned she (CSM) wanted to create a new coin. "I said you know, 'I've done several coins, I can give you samples of them' and she's like sure, no problem and so that's how we got the whole thing started."

He and Renner sat down together for about ten minutes and jotted down some of the elements Renner needed on the coin. "Once we got talking, the coin was basically done in my head," explained Meza, "it was just a matter of getting it done, presenting it and just tweaking it. I think we only did one or two versions of it before it was complete.

The 78th motto "Audaciter" which means boldly, is placed around the top of the coin. "A lot of coins have slogans or mottos, but it's just on the very top and kind of small. I figure I want to bring that out you know, so you can see it from anywhere," said Meza.

The coin's imagery includes the 78th lightning patch on the front as well. "I said 'let's add things on the inside of the patch itself like 'lightning strikes'" Meza explains, "CSM said let's try to wrap a flag around the patch, you know because we all fall on the United States flag."

"There's a large 78th TD on it. You can see the numbers and you can see what units it is," said Meza also citing the words "Presented for Excellence" appearing on the bottom side of the coin. "It stands out a lot so you can see it better, it's different from other coins."

Renner asked to incorporate the history of the 78th by including some numbers on the coin which carry special meaning to the unit. When it comes to the 78th Training Division, there's a rich history over the years going back as far as World War One.



Appearing on the back of the coin is "1917" the year the division was constituted, as well as "125" representing the 125 days 78th served in combat.

The number "3" is on the back of the coin, representing the three Medal of Honor winners while the unit was the 78th Infantry Anyone serving in the military can tell you, one of the most important keys to a unit's success and readiness is morale

Division. Prominently represented on the back are the rank symbols of Command Sgt. Maj Renner and Brig. Gen. Scarcella.

"The numbers and words on it are just for somebody to start a conversation about the coin with more of a history of the 78th. That's what she (CSM Renner) was targeting basically," Meza said.

The image of "Sparky" the 78th's mascot was re-created and placed on the back of the coin. Sparky was originally created during World War II by created by Warner Brothers' director of Looney Tunes and Merry Melodies, Robert McKimson.

"I like the image, I like the cartoon part of it, so, I said 'well, let me try to recreate it,' to basically retrace it in Adobe Illustrator, give it color and bring it to life," Meza explains, "it was one of the things I suggested, that maybe we could put Sparky in because there's really not Sparky in the (78th) coins I've seen, so she's like 'yeah, let's go with it."

He cited CSM Renner's enthusiasm for designing of the new coin. "Oh, she's like 'I love this' and she was coming up with good ideas, 'OK, let's tweak this and that," said Meza.

Meza has deployed twice and works as a civilian as well as a Soldier for the 78th. While normally working in Exercise Support Opps for the 78th, he's completed multiple graphic art projects throughout his Army career including coins, posters and printed displays as well as some animated presentations for Guardian Response training.

Renner appreciated the new coin so much that she selected Meza himself as the first to be awarded the new coin. Meza describes how he received the coin. "I think I was in Wisconsin and went to go pick CSM up at one of the air bases she was flying into. She's like 'Oh, I have something for you!' and presented it to me," Meza said pridefully, "I got the first the first coin."

"When you tie everything together and you love doing it and it's like your passion, it's like

there's no work involved. So, when we talk about something like this to do, it's already done in my head you know I mean? It's just a matter of now using my tools," said Meza.

Receiving a coin from leadership is considered a significant honor and can represent acknowledgment of exceptional service, going above and beyond in duty, or exemplifying the core values of the Army, such as Loyalty, Duty, Respect, Selfless Service, Honor, Integrity, and Personal Courage.

"Our job as the 78th Training Division is to basically plan and implement exercises to train other units, so when there's Soldiers that stand out and stuff like that, when they get these things, of course it's a morale booster," said Meza. "It shows the leadership is actually

looking at you or seeing what you're doing or watching how other soldiers react to you or how you lead."



U.S. service members gathered June 23-27, 2025 at Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, New Jersey to participate in one of the Department of Defense's premiere joint military training courses.

Leading Edge is a joint operations-focused course offered twice a year that provides service members between the ranks of E-4 to E-6 the opportunity to demonstrate their capabilities and gain insight into how their peers from different branches contribute to a unified, joint mission.

During this intensive 40-hour course, students learn through a combination of classroom instruction by senior leaders and hands-on group training scenarios that simulate real-world challenges. The program culminates with capstone presentations, where students address national security issues and brief their solutions to instructors and classmates.

This summer's cohort included 19 active duty and reserve students from all service branches, providing a valuable opportunity to practice joint operations together.

"It was cool to see and understand what each branch really does and the other jobs and skillsets I had in the room with me," said U.S. Army Sgt. Alithia Hollenkamp, 87th Medical Group Veterinary Services food inspection noncommissioned officer. "Really understanding each

branch's role and how we all have different missions but also work cohesively together to be successful was extremely eve-opening."

The course included a range of training activities such as using a damage control trainer to simulate responding to hull damage, firing various weapon systems in electronic simulators, and touring each branch's facilities to learn about their operations and equipment.

This year's courses were planned and led by the JBMDL's Leading Edge Top III Professional Development Committee, including U.S. Air Force Master Sgt. David Liu, superintendent of Group Tactics, 305th Maintenance Group, and Master Sgt. Dane Kelly, director of operations for the 818th Mission Support Advisory Squadron, Air Mobility Command. They helped revive this professional development program, which dates back to 2013, with a renewed emphasis on joint leadership development.

Liu emphasized that the benefits of the course extend far beyond the classroom, fostering a strong network of jointservice professionals committed to supporting one another.

"Some Leading Edge alums reached out to us to help when they found out we were soliciting their branch for support," said Liu. "This proves that the Leading Edge course has had a significant impact on the participants who have attended this course."

During this large-scale exercise that included joint and multinational partners, more than 12,000 USAF and U.S. Space Force personnel and more than 350 aircraft participated with a focus on enhancing rapid global mobility capabilities.



177TH FIGHTER WING STRENGTHENS PACIFIC READINESS THROUGH HISTORIC EXERCISE

The 177th Fighter Wing of the New Jersey Air National Guard participated in exercise Resolute Force Pacific (REFORPAC) 2025, a first-of-its-kind Department Level Exercise (DLE) at Komatsu Air Base, Japan, this July and August. The DLE was designed to demonstrate the armed forces' ability to rapidly deploy personnel, equipment and aircraft to the Indo-Pacific theater of operations.

The DLE series encompasses all branches of the Department of Defense, along with allies and partners, employing more than 400 Joint and coalition aircraft and more than 12,000 members at more than 50 locations across 3,000 miles.

"REFORPAC will help solidify Agile Combat Employment (ACE) concepts and execution among the men and women of the 177th Fighter Wing," said Lt. Col. Eric Emerson, 119th Expeditionary Fighter Squadron commander. "Lessons learned from this exercise will have a direct effect on how we train, fight and win our nation's future conflicts."

ACE concepts include the ability to rapidly deploy forces, altering enemy understanding of friendly intentions, capabilities, and posture, to gain advantages.

"Every lesson learned here, every process refined, directly contributes to making our Wing more capable and agile," said Chief Master Sgt. Grant Holway, 177th FW Quality Assurance Senior Enlisted Leader. continued on page 24



Desired outcomes for units participating in REFORPAC include enhanced interoperability and readiness across the Pacific theater.

"This exercise tests our ability to generate airpower with limited support and resources as we repositioned multiple times around Japan," said Emerson. "We relied on Airmen to step outside of their comfort zones, use their judgment backed up by their training, while solving complex problems." REFORPAC offers Airmen an opportunity to interface with service members of various U.S. military branches as well as service members from other allied countries.

"In addition to our State Partnership Program mission, this has been another successful venture in creating relationships with other nations and allies," said Holway. "Overall, I have met nothing but friendly people overcoming language and logistical barriers to help each other."

Maintaining strong relationships with allies ultimately enhances combined capabilities for all parties. During these engagements, the 177th FW members had the opportunity to teach as well as learn different tactics, techniques and procedures.

"Everything from refueling aircraft, towing aircraft, providing equipment, and training in emergency procedures, pilot extraction and hydrazine response, has been bilateral adding to mission success," said Holway.

This iteration of REFORPAC is the largest crisis response exercise in Pacific Air Forces history.

"It is an honor to be part of such a monumental exercise," said Emerson. "The lessons learned from this exercise will set the foundation of how we fight; projecting power and security throughout the 21st century. We had a part in that, and that's pretty cool! I'm incredibly proud of what the Jersey Devils accomplished during REFORPAC."

While the scale of the exercise was historic, it was the commitment and resilience of individual Airmen that drove the mission forward.

"From junior Airmen to senior non-commissioned officers, everyone has stepped up without hesitation, adapting to constant change, long hours, and new environments with professionalism and grit," said Holway. "Exercises like this test not just our equipment and plans, but our people. It's about shaping how we fight in the future, and that starts with the groundwork we're laying right now."

Response Squadron, based out of Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, New Jersey, participated in the DLE, showing 621st CRW's capability to form a Contingency Response Element whose main mission is to open, operate and close airbases anywhere in the world on demand.

"The U.S. Air Force has shifted its focus towards the partner integration and combat readiness exercises to sharpen its capabilities across the spectrum of conflict as we prepare to rapidly respond to any contingency or challenge worldwide," Bill Hoeft, 621st CRW Inspector General director of inspections said.

To properly support DLE, the 621st CRW and its subordinate units trained rigorously over multiple iterations of Exercise Unified Devil, its largest internal force generation exercise in the unit's 20-year history that culminated in a contingency response inspection by AMC's Inspector General.

AMC's support to the DLE is the largest and most complex global air mobility exercise to date, focused squarely on testing logistics, readiness and allied interoperability. It also incorporated space-based and space-enabled capabilities to include, but not limited to, space electromagnetic warfare, space domain awareness, orbital warfare and navigational warfare.

The exercise marks a significant evolution in the U.S. military's approach to strategic deployment, combining airlift, aerial refueling, aeromedical evacuation and joint command-and-control operations in a contested environment. The operation is being integrated with all the exercises under the DLE umbrella to include Exercise Bamboo Eagle, bringing together combat, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance elements in an expansive, multi-domain scenario.

"Blending mobility logistics into combat and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance operations provide a level a realism that has not routinely been integrated in past mobility-centric exercises," Foy said. "This allows us to





COAST GUARD LAUNCHES 2025 HURRICANE SEASON WITH FOCUS ON PREPAREDNESS

PORTSMOUTH, Va. — The Coast Guard reminds mariners and residents of the Atlantic and Gulf of America coasts to prepare for the 2025 hurricane season.

The Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1st to November 30th, with the peak occurring between mid-August and late October.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration anticipates an above-normal Atlantic hurricane season this year. Forecasters predict a 60% chance of an above-normal season, a 30% chance of a near-normal season, and a 10% chance of a below-normal season.

The Coast Guard is actively monitoring all potential tropical weather threats and taking necessary precautions to ensure the readiness of its personnel and assets. The public and maritime community are urged to stay informed, heed all warnings from local authorities, and take proactive steps to prepare for potential impacts. The dedicated men and women of the Coast Guard stand ready to respond and safeguard America's waterways and coastal communities.

It is essential for mariners and the public to take proper measures before a storm arrives. Ensure you have proper equipment, have a hurricane mooring plan or a safe place to

> store your trailered boat, and monitor the weather and VHF-FM channel 16 prior to a voyage and while out on the water.

The Coast Guard recommends the following preparedness tips for this hurricane season:

Know Your Hurricane Risk, Hurricanes are not just a coastal problem. Find out how rain, wind, water and even tornadoes could happen far inland from where a hurricane or tropical storm makes landfall. Start preparing now by visiting: https://www.weather.gov/ wrn/2020-determine-your-risk.

Make an Emergency Plan. Make sure everyone in your household knows and understands your hurricane plans (https://www.ready.gov/plan). Include the office, kids' day care, your boat, and

anywhere else you frequent in your hurricane plans. Ensure your business has a continuity plan to continue operating when disaster strikes. If you have a boat, make sure it's ready to move when Port Condition Yankee is announced to minimize drawbridge closure impacts.

Know your Evacuation Zone. You may have to evacuate quickly due to a hurricane if you live in an evacuation zone. Learn your evacuation routes, practice with your household and pets, and identify where you will stay. Follow the instructions from local emergency managers, who work closely with state, local, tribal, and territorial agencies and partners. They will provide the latest recommendations based on the threat to your community and appropriate safety measures.

Recognize Warnings and Alerts. Have several ways to receive alerts. Download the FEMA app and receive real-time alerts from the National Weather Service for up to five locations nationwide. Receive community alerts in your area and be aware of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA), which require no sign up.

Port condition changes in advance of storm systems and hurricanes will be available on the Coast Guard Navigation Center website and announced on official unit social media pages. Check below for your regional Coast Guard District page:



incorporate the logistics required to get from home station to the fight is a vital aspect of war fighting that must be exercised, understood and tested."

Building upon past Mobility Guardian iterations, this year's exercise seeks to push the boundaries of operational agility under stress. Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David Allvin says the goal is clear: simulate large-scale force deployment and sustainment "at speed and scale" across vast, contested terrain.

"Exercising at this speed, scale and tempo is how we prepare for the future fight," Allvin said. "We need Airmen to move fast and think outside the box, disrupting the operational status quo. We also build trust and understanding through deliberate planning, operating and learning alongside our partners across the Pacific.

The DLE spans more than 3,000 miles across the Pacific and is the DAF's premiere mobility exercise.

"This exercise, the first of its kind since the Cold War, marks pivotal moment for our Air Force and Space Force, bringing together Airmen and Guardians to bolster our nation's war fighting capabilities," Secretary of the Air Force Troy Meink

said. "Training like this alongside the Joint Force, our allies and partners in realistic operations environments using distributed operations is how we integrate capabilities to overcome any national security challenge."

AMC forces are an integral part of the DLE series, that will incorporate multiple command exercises into one overall threat deterrence scenario, including Resolute Force Pacific (REFORPAC), Resolute Space, Mobility Guardian, Emerald Warrior and Bamboo Eagle 25–3. It will also integrate multiple allies and partners in specific component exercises with shared interests.

"The 621st Air Mobility Advisory Group mission is to integrate partners to shape and strengthen rapid global mobility," Col. Angela Polsinelli, 621st AMAG commander said. "For the DLE, our air mobility operation squadrons are fully integrated to plan and execute mobility missions across the entire exercise, including REFORPAC."

Polsinelli added that the air mobility liaison officers (AMLOs) and expeditionary air ground liaison element (EAGLE) Airmen have embedded with joint partners throughout the theater to streamline joint logistics, going so far as to parachute in with

With AMC's participation with the DLE still underway, one thing is for certain, the 621st Contingency Response Wing is a community of ready warriors, anywhere where they are needed. •





Historic Princeton Battlefield

Nestled on approximately 100 acres of rolling landscape one mile southwest of downtown Princeton, New Jersey, lies Princeton Battlefield State Park. It was the scene of a fateful battle between American and British forces during the American Revolution nearly 249 years ago. Now, designated on the U.S. National Register of Historic Places and as a U.S. National Historic Landmark District, the park welcomes thousands of visitors each year who come to enjoy its natural scenery and historic programs. Next year expects to see a real celebration in Princeton as the nation commemorates its 250th Anniversary in 2026!

The Battle of Princeton was the culminating event of the period between December 25,

1776 and January 3, 1777 historically known as the 'Ten Crucial Days'. This ten-day period witnessed the crossing of the Delaware River by General Washington and the American forces, the first and second Battles of Trenton, and the Battle of Princeton. At Princeton, the clash between American and British forces forever changed the direction of American and world history.

Through interpretive signage located throughout the park, visitors can retrace the events of the battle and the people affected by it. They can view museum quality exhibits inside the Thomas Clarke House which still stands as an eyewitness building to the battle and the difficult recovery afterwards. Sightseers can also visit the Colonnade on the northern side of the battlefield, currently being restored to its original beauty, and pause in the Memorial Grove at the medallion venerating the American and British soldiers that are buried there in one common grave.





Historic preservation and restoration remain forefront in the efforts being made at Princeton Battlefield. The Trace Road where Washington marched his troops to surprise the British in Princeton is being reestablished. In the fall, an apple orchard will be replanted where it stood on the battlefield in front of William Clarke's (Thomas' brother) house. The armies collided in the orchard first and the hottest fighting happened there.

Through the Princeton Battlefield Society (PBS), a volunteer and non-profit organization officially recognized under the auspices of the New Jersey State Park Service, much more is offered. The society runs several public events on the battlefield throughout the year which includes, but is not limited to, park 'Clean Up Days' in the spring and the fall, public and private battlefield tours including those with a military leadership focus, Memorial Day and July 4th programs, and Young Patriots' Day full of activities for young children. Programs also include the new Cadwalader Lecture Series and Men Without Shoes initiative. Each year, however, starts off with a bang in January with the 'Experience the Battle' reenactment. Consisting of hundreds of reenactors surrounded by musket fire, cannons, and soldiers on horseback, this winter event celebrates and acknowledges the sacrifices and dreams of independence of our colonial ancestors.

ARMY RESERVE'S DOUBLE EAGLE TEAM SOARS ACROSS TRAINING AREAS

"We are the best military in the world," said Command Sqt. Maj. Gregory Betty, command sergeant major of the U.S. Army Reserve, during a visit to Warrior Exercise (WAREX), Regional Medic, and Diamond Saber training areas here.

Betty, along with Chief Warrant Officer 5 Lashon White, chief warrant officer of the U.S. Army Reserve, visited numerous training sites, observing operations and speaking with Soldiers on what it means to be, "Twice the Citizen."

The phrase "Twice the Citizen" is a motto of the U.S. Army Reserve, symbolizing the dual role of Reserve Soldiers who balance civilian careers and personal lives with their military service.

Army Reserve Soldiers typically train one weekend a month and two weeks per year.

"Maximize your training days," Betty said. "Use them to train your basic Soldier and military occuaptional skills."

"Continue to train to never get it wrong," White added.

The U.S. Army Reserve focuses on enhancing lethality through targeted training programs. WAREX and Diamond Saber are an integral part of these programs, aiming to prepare Soldiers for disrupted environments, moving away from counterinsurgency to multi-domain combat.

These programs reflect a shift toward preparing Reserve Soldiers for high-intensity, near-peer conflicts, balancing part-time service with civilian careers.

continue naval service that I would be completely fine and able to move forward. Prior service nuclear operators are highly sought after in the civilian sector due to their work ethic and intelligence."

Valdez believes his time in the nuclear Navy sharpened his ability to diagnose and solve problems, a necessity when maintaining complex systems aboard a nuclear-powered warship.

"I'm an analytical person and being a submariner in the nuclear program has really sharpened that," Valdez said. I'm comfortable diagnosing and fixing all kinds of mechanical and technical issues on a nuclear-powered warship, whether it's something simple like a valve repair or air conditioning problem, or a big, complex evolution that only happens every five years or so."



"Being a nuke and submariner have taught me critical thinking, the value of knowledge, a questioning attitude, and the ability to seek answers and solve problems efficiently,"

Valdez applies the same analytical approach to his personal life, helping him stay focused on long-term goals, many of which he credits the Navy with helping make possible.

Beyond financial security, the Navy offers competitive compensation, health care, education benefits, credentialing programs and retirement options for those who serve 20 years or more.

"I have a goal of becoming financially independent," said Valdez. "The steady pay is great for that, and the bonuses are amazing. Being smart with my money has helped me generate passive income, and my goal is to increase that passive income even more to achieve greater financial freedom. Ultimately, I want to retire as a Navy officer."


Looking ahead, Valdez hopes to apply his skills through hands-on hobbies.

USAFEC COMMAND TEAM VISITS 521 AMOW UNITS IN GERMANY

U.S. Air Force Brig. Gen. Stephen Snelson, U.S. Air Force Expeditionary Center commander, and Chief Master Sgt. Dennis Fuselier, USAFEC command chief, visited Airmen from the 521st Air Mobility Operations Wing, April 8-18, 2025.

During their visit, Snelson and Fuselier made their first stops at Ramstein and Spangdahlem Air Bases, Germany, where they gained a greater understanding of the vital support that the 521 AMOW provides to the Air Force's overall mission of Rapid Global Mobility.

"We have an opportunity to come out here to get eyes on our Airmen, to see the things they are doing out on the flightline, the training they are executing to be ready to do any of those missions, and lastly to walk away with a to do list on how we can understand what obstacles are in the way of our Airmen," Snelson said.

The 521st Air Mobility Operations Wing is a key unit within the Global Air Mobility Support System (GAMSS), which provides a logistical network of Total Force Mobility Airmen and the capabilities necessary to project, connect, maneuver, and sustain combat power anywhere around the globe.

The 521 AMOW specifically accomplishes U.S. Transportation Command missions within the U.S. European Command, U.S. Africa Command, and U.S. Central Command areas of responsibilities by providing command and control, en route aircraft maintenance, air transportation services for theater and strategic air mobility missions, expeditionary aircrew support and inter-theater aeromedical evacuation.

"When we see some incredible Air Force and United States achievements overseas, Chief Fuselier and I know how much work goes on behind the scenes to make those things happen," Snelson said. "Support to the middle east with its unique mission sets and various operating locations has an impact for our 521 AMOW Airmen."

Fuselier echoed this impact by highlighting the unique capabilities of the air mobility teams that the 521 AMOW can supply.

"The AMT mission, with the ability for our folks to forward deploy and do the things that they do here in the en-route system to provide support anywhere in the world, is pretty impressive," Fuselier said. "The en-route system is paramount to people and equipment being able to get in and out of the theater. But more importantly, the relationships that we have with our partners has strengthened our interoperability to ensure the mission happens."

Snelson and Fuselier will continue their immersion visiting AMOW units in Türkiye, Spain, and Italy. •





A visit to the Army Chaplain Museum in Columbia, South Carolina, unexpectedly revealed a remarkable family legacy for a chaplain currently serving at Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, New Jersey.

U.S. Air Force Chaplain (Col.) Jonathan Hurt, JB MDL senior chaplain, was taking a course several years ago at the Air Force Chaplain Corps College in Fort Jackson, South Carolina when he decided to visit the museum. During the visit, he was surprised to discover that the first Army chaplain, John Hurt, bore almost the same name as him. He found it fascinating and wondered if they could be distantly related, but did not give it much further thought.

It wasn't until years later that his father researched their family history and they discovered that John Hurt was indeed Jonathan Hurt's seventh great grandfather.

The synchronicities continued when shortly after learning of this family connection, Hurt was assigned to JB MDL and found a painting hanging outside of his office door at the McGuire Chapel depicting a scene of soldiers kneeling in snow, while

"The picture inspires me daily to continue to give my best," said Hurt. "As the senior chaplain at JB MDL, I have the incredible opportunity to follow in John Hurt's footsteps as I lead an inspiring team of chaplains, religious affairs Airmen and non-commissioned officers to care for the Airmen, Sailors, Soldiers, Marines, Coast Guardsmen and families who live and work in our community."

John Hurt was born in Virginia in 1752 into a family of devout Anglican ministers. He was ordained as a minister in 1774.

The Continental Congress authorized chaplains to the Continental Army on July 29, 1775. Two years after being ordained, Rev. Hurt, a close friend of Washington, joined the Virginia 6th Infantry Regiment, and later the 4th and 5th Infantry Regiments, as well.

Hurt served alongside Washington and his Soldiers in Revolutionary War battles throughout Pennsylvania and New Jersey, and at the encampment at Valley Forge before being captured by the British and held as a prisoner of war. After his release, he returned to the battlefield to comfort the soldiers. He is best known for his sermon, "The Love of Our Country," providing hope for soldiers

during the war. After the war, Washington formally appointed Hurt to be the first official U.S. Army chaplain in 1791.

The spirit of dedication and service exemplified by Rev. John Hurt has clearly echoed through the generations, inspiring Chaplain Hurt in his own ministry and leadership today.

Since arriving at JB MDL, Hurt has taken the opportunity to visit nearby Revolutionary War battlefields, finding deep meaning in retracing the steps of his ancestor.

"It is truly inspiring to walk the same ground my great grandfather once walked," said Hurt. "He served and I serve so that generations to come will be able to experience life with incredible choices. We have the freedom to speak our minds and worship our God openly. These are freedoms we often take for granted, but they continue to require steadfast service and sacrifice."



Service is a strong tradition in Hurt's family. His father, Dr. Ray Hurt, was a successful pastor for over 55 years and a leader in expanding churches nationwide, a role later taken by Hurt's brother after his father's passing. Hurt's nephew, Bradford Hurt, is a

third-year cadet at the Air Force Academy, continuing his family's legacy of military service.

"When I was a young lieutenant, a command chief master sergeant pointed at my chest and said, 'Whose name is that on your uniform?" said Hurt. "I cautiously replied, 'It's my name, chief.' He quickly replied, 'No it's not, it's your grandfather's name. Remember everything you do now reflects on your entire family." I have always remembered that encounter with a very wise chief and it means more today than ever before."

As the U.S. Army Chaplain Corps marks 250 years of service, it continues to uphold its mission of nurturing the living, caring for the wounded and honoring the fallen. Hurt loyally upholds this tradition of service to others, proud to continue the legacy of his ancestors before him.






