# **HIGHLIGHTS 2023**

## ■ Cochrane Colloquium 2023 in London: Brexit is dead, the Collaboration is alive

One thing became clear during the Colloquium: Cochrane is alive and kicking! Since the cancelled Colloquium in Chile 2019 and the subsequent Corona pandemic 2020-2022, 'the home base' invited its community to London. The world of evidence synthesis has not stood still, and the

Cochrane Collaboration (yes, we're calling ourselves a Collaboration again!) has confirmed the added value of methods research for advancing evidence syntheses. Jan Hoving, principal investigator for the Core Outcome Set for Work (<a href="www.cosforwork.org">www.cosforwork.org</a>), was delighted to hear the news.

Participants were keen to learn about Cochrane's transformation into New Cochrane. First generation Thematic Groups were present and excited to share experience in their new roles, as did our own Thematic Group *Work & Health & Social Security*.

Presentations, training workshops and lectures centered around global health, methods development, knowledge transfer, and consumer involvement.

Up to 700 people gather to exchange information on the latest developments from across Europe. 

# CIM Workshop: Cochrane (CC) reviews in insurance and occupational medicine: from research to reality and vice versa

An input presentation gave a brief overview of CC reviews in the field of Insurance and Occupational Medicine, including where and how to retrieve updated information from CC reviews, their strengths and limitations as well as their potential impact on practice and policy making. Small group discussions on information needs identified specific topics: tools to identify workers at risk for dropout, interventions to keep people at work, the role of artificial intelligence in evaluations of claimants, and prioritizing and improving collaboration.



# ■ CIM Annual Meeting 2023 at the University Medical Center Groningen, NL

On Nov 17/18, we held our annual meeting at the University Medical Center Groningen (UMCG), hosted by our new codirector, Femke Abma. We had two fruitful days of sharing ideas as well as social activities. We discussed a variety of educational activities and projects from the Netherlands, Sweden, Switzerland, and Norway. Topics included tracking the wellbeing of hospital workers using longitudinal cohort data, outcomes of sickness absence and work participation, and using new methods for qualitative evidence synthesis.

Following a comprehensive exchange with Prof. S.A. Reijneveld, Head of the Department of Health Sciences and the team of professors Sandra Brouwer and Ute Bültmann, co-chairs of the Research Unit "Work and Health", lively discussions arose in the workshops about activities and further collaborations for the new thematic group 'Work & Health & Social Security'.






#### ■ Meet and Greet - 25. April 2023 (organisers: Femke Abma, NL and Emilie Friberg, SE)

Although the idea was launched during the COVID pandemic, we continue to organize online lunch meeting with researchers and users of evidence to bridge the long periods between the annual autumn meetings. The Meet & Greet sessions offer researchers and practitioners across Europe low threshold opportunities to share ideas and activities, ask questions, get input, and find common interests.

# Cochrane's organisational transformation is approaching the home stretch.

In 2021, responding to a need for change, the Cochrane leadership set out to renew the organization, significantly restructuring the review production and working towards financial independence (see chart). To date, most changes have been implemented and review production has been centralized, to be carried out in evidence synthesis units by technical and methodological experts supported by subject matter experts. The roles of review groups (like Work) and fields (like Insurance Medicine) were redefined (see box). The proof-of-concept phase will end in 2024. - Produce and support the production of high-quality systematic reviews in the field of work, occupational health, and insurance medicine.

- Contribute to the Cochrane methodology by further developing the Core Outcome Set for Work (www.cosforwork.org) for use in research on work-related outcomes.
- Translate and spread Cochrane evidence on our topics across various formats and channels.
- Team up with global partners such as 'Evidence for Work', a network for occupational safety and health. (www.evidenceforwork.org)
- Promote our activities and engage researchers and stakeholders active within our own institutional networks as well as in organizations such as EUMASS and ICOH.
- Deliver educational activities on Cochrane and evidence-based care in professional training.

# A Core Outcome Set for Work Participation

In 2023, Margarita Ravinskaya and an international team, including Cochrane Insurance Medicine, completed and published two studies on the COS for Work completing the 5-part series of her PhD thesis at Amsterdam UMC (see below). One study reports on the development of the final COS with recommendations for three outcomes 'any type of employment', 'proportion of workers that return to work after being absent because of illness' and 'time to return to work'. Ten additional candidate outcomes were proposed, such as 'sustainable

employment', 'work productivity' and 'workers' perception of return to work'. The systematic review explored how these three COS outcomes are measured and provided insight on intermethod agreement of self-reported measures compared to registry data for sickness absence and return-to-work outcomes. The next phase of COS for WORK development will focus on how to measure, validate, and implement these outcomes.

# Peer-reviewed publications led by, or with participation of, CIM members

Insurance Medicine is a dynamic and broad field of study affecting medical, social, and psychological factors for large numbers of the population, stretching far beyond health economics, payment of benefits, treatment reimbursement, and compensation for damages and losses.

To better understand the role of these non-economic issues of research and research funding, we asked our colleagues at CIM to share with us the articles they have published in the last year. Our criterion: systematic reviews and reference to evidence-based medicine in the broadest sense. We collected about 65 titles in English or the respective national languages. Most were related to incapacity for work, sickness absence, or return to work.

On closer inspection, we were able to divide these studies into 11 different categories, with quite some heterogeneity. Since many studies fit into more than one category, we decided to place such studies in up to two categories to illustrate the richness of research at hand. We are pleased to share our findings with you. You will be surprised how many non-economic issues arise in the context of insurance medicine and social security to ensure social care for those in need and society as a whole. Happy reading!
