Are you sitting comfortably? Then let's begin...




In a town, not too far from here,

because that is what good friends do!




It is a very exciting day today because Auntie Duck is coming to visit.









Duck's Mom's phone sent out a 'ping' to let her know she had a message.


Auntie Duck had used the wings free feature on her phone

Duck heard Auntie call out to him.


'Hello young Duck,' said Auntie as she glided into the back garden, landing with an elegant little plop.


Duck's Mom then came outside and also gave Auntie a hug, they were very pleased to see each other too.

is often not good because

make.'

tablet, or laptop, you'd see the air has
changed; you'd see that the air
we breathe is actually
quite dirty.'

is really important especially
for anyone with a breathing

'Pollution comes from factories that make things, from power stations that give us energy, from the fires we light to keep us warm and the cars, motorbikes and planes we use to get us about.'


'You often can't see

'Anyone with asthma would definitely be affected.
Your friend with asthma Duck, may be affected by poor air quality, but they might not even know that!'

Duck now looked quite worried. He was thinking that the air he breathed was unsafe, which meant he was in danger.

Auntie has guessed this by looking at his face and carried on speaking.





'Duck,' said Auntie, 'you don't need to worry too much, whilst the air quality in this country is not as good as it should be, for anyone with healthy lungs it is not normally too dangerous, so you'll be ok. But, as I said before though, for people with breathing issues and conditions like asthma, the air can be dangerous, even in this country, and we would all feel better if it was cleaner.' 'What can we do?' said Duck.

'Well,' said Auntie, 'here are some excellent things we can all do to help:' 1

'We can use cars,
motorbikes and planes less
to reduce their impact and cut down
on pollution and this will improve
air quality.'

'Did you know
that when a car is parked,
and the engine is left running
for just 1 minute, it releases
more harmful carbon monoxide gas
into the air, than 60 cigarettes
being smoked!'

'If we wheeled,
walked, scooted or cycled
more it would reduce the amount
of pollution as we wouldn't be
turning our cars or travel
machines on.'

'That means
that in only 1 minute,
an idling car engine, can produce enough
toxic gases to fill 150 party balloons.
So, by just turning a car off when it is
parked up it can have a massive
impact on air quality.'

'And, we can all
work together to try and
make the air we breathe
as clean and safe as it can
possibly be.'



'Thank you for telling me all about air quality,' said Duck to Auntie, 'it was very interesting, and I learnt a lot!'

'Can we do an air quality test in our garden Mom,' said Duck. 'I'd like to know what the quality of the air is like around here, would that be ok?'

Why don't we all do it together!

Why don't we all do it together!' said Mom and Auntie at the same time. They both laughed as they knew each other so well they often came up with the same ideas.



Mom and Auntie sat in the lounge together. Mom thought Auntie Duck seemed a little sadder than she had let Duck believe, so she said to her very good friend; 'Are you sure you're ok Auntie?'

'It just worries me that the air we breathe, that you and Duck breathe, isn't very good. Whilst it is not terrible here now my worry is it will become worse.'
