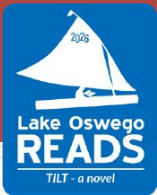
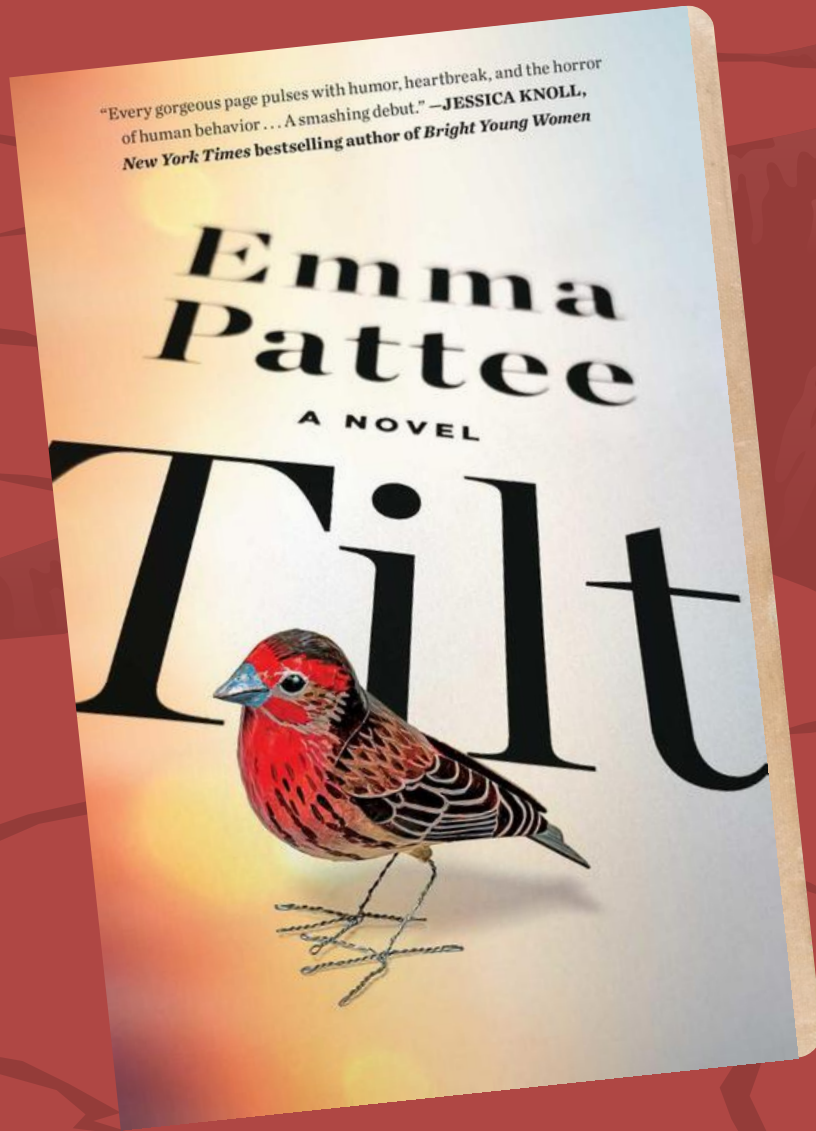

Book Summary

Tilt helps readers imagine the very real impact of a major Cascadia Subduction Zone earthquake on the Pacific Northwest. This propulsive novel follows Annie, nine months pregnant and shopping for a crib at IKEA, when a massive quake strikes. Cut off from her husband, without a phone, water, money, or transportation, Annie must walk across a city in chaos to find safety. As she moves through damaged Portland, Oregon, Annie encounters desperation, the generosity of strangers, and unexpected friendship.

Along the way, she reflects on the fault lines in her own life, including her strained marriage, stalled career, and anxieties about becoming a parent. These personal reckonings echo the fractures in the earth beneath her feet.

Tilt captures the surreal, frightening, and sometimes darkly comedic ways people respond to crisis, offering a deeply human portrait of survival, connection, and the possibility of change.
