Gulf of Mexico road signs stripped from Longboat Key

The Florida Department of Transportation started removing Gulf of Mexico Drive signs in Longboat Key last week, signaling what could lead to a name change for the island's main roadway known as Gulf of Mexico Drive since 1957.

The Florida Department of Transportation took down six signs last week under a new state law that directs agencies to update maps, materials, and signage to reflect the renaming of the Gulf of Mexico to the Gulf of America.

The road's local name remains legally unchanged and mail delivery and emergency services continue to use it. The Town of Longboat Key Commission is scheduled to take up the issue at a workshop on Oct. 20, where a cost

Trio of seagrass centers open via Mote



Last week, Mote Marine Laboratory & Aquarium hosted a ribbon cutting to celebrate the opening of three research facilities designed to advance the restoration, resilience and long-term sustainability of Florida's critically important seagrass ecosystems.

The new facilities are The Ron and Marla Wolf Seagrass Restoration Center for Ocean Sustainability Greenhouse Facility, Biogeochemical Carbon Sequestration Lab, and Publix Seagrass Genetics Research Hub.

The Seagrass Restoration Technology Development Initiative was established in 2023 through the Florida Legislature and Governor Ron DeSantis through the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), SERRC will further Mote's efforts to develop, test, and implement effective, costefficient, and environmentally sustainable technologies to reverse the decline of Florida's seagrass habitats.

"These new facilities provide a transformational leap forward in Mote's mission to restore Florida's vital seagrass meadows, and is the result of our strategic collaboration with the State of Florida, federal agencies, and generous philanthrop-

Kahane Stepping Down as Music Director of Sarasota Music Festival

After nine seasons as Music Director of the Sarasota Music Festival, conductor, pianist, and pedagogue Jeffrey Kahane will step back from the leadership role of the Festival, founded 61 years ago.

Board Chair Tom Koski said, "We are immensely grateful to Jeffrey for guiding the Festival through the pandemic period and for bringing fresh thinking to the post-COVID landscape. His development of the faculty and varied programs provides a launch point for the next iteration of our wonderful summer festival."

Kahane added, "It has been one of the great privileges of my career to lead the Sarasota Music Festival. The Festival holds a unique and vital place in the musical landscape, and I'm proud of what we've created together especially the extraordinary faculty and transformative experiences we've offered our fellows."

Kahane's Legacy

During his tenure, Kahane expanded the Festival's core by welcoming

internationally renowned chamber ensembles—including the Attacca, Calidore, Borromeo, and Pacifica String Quartets, as well as the Montrose Trio-to collaborate with fellows. He also broadened the Festival's scope to include world music, jazz, folk, and workshops on improvisation, yoga, and mindfulness.

Kahane also conducted the Sarasota Orchestra, the managing organization of the Festival, and served as an artistic advisor during its music director search that culminated in the appointment of Bramwell Tovey.

Currently Music Director of the San Antonio Philharmonic, Kahane maintains an active international career as soloist, chamber musician, conductor, and teacher at USC Thornton School of Music.

Sarasota Orchestra President & CEO Joseph McKenna confirmed, "We are thrilled that Jeffrey will return to perform as a guest soloist with the Sarasota Orchestra in the 26-27 season, and we are confident he will return to the Festival in the future as a teacher and performer."

ic donors" said Dr. Michael P. Crosby, President & CEO of Mote Marine Laboratory.

Seagrasses serve as the foundation for vibrant marine ecosystems and resilient coastal communities, which provide nursery habitats for key fisheries, improve water quality, prevent erosion, and capture carbon. Yet, Florida's seagrass meadows are vanishing at alarming rates due to dredging, runoff, reduced water clarity, and climate-related impacts in many areas.

Mote's Seagrass Ecosystem Restoration Research Program serves as the operational arm of the Initiative. The program, led by Mote Postdoctoral Research Fellow Dr. Dominique Gallery, addresses seagrass loss through a multifaceted, science-based approach that includes genetics resiliency, enhanced propagation technologies, and biogeochemical impacts testing.

SERRC will allow Mote and all of its research and commercial applications partners to continue to spearhead the development of Florida's 10-year Seagrass Restoration Plan, a requirement of the Initiative legislation, and shape the future of seagrass science. The buildings were designed to approach essential aspects of seagrass research and restoration in different ways:

• The Ron and Marla Wolf Seagrass Restoration Center for Ocean Sustainability Greenhouse Facility

Funded jointly by the Bernard and Norton Wolf Family Foundation, Florida DEP, and NOAA, the greenhouse provides a controlled environment for testing the effects of stressors such as salinity, temperature, turbidity, and grazing. These experiments help researchers identify and propagate genotypes most likely to survive in changing environments.

"Seagrass is an important component in creating nurseries for one of the world's most important food sources and it is also a major carbon sink, helping offset the effects of climate change. It is a true ocean wonder," said Ron Wolf, ICORR Properties International Founder and President. "The Ron and Marla Wolf Seagrass Center for Ocean Sustainability is excited to see all the progress made on researching resilient seagrass restoration and greatly appreciates Mote's leadership on this issue which is so important to our coastal ecology and economy."

The Ron and Marla Wolf Seagrass Center for Ocean Sustainability goes one step further, seeking to better understand the biogeochemical processes and associated carbon sequestration in the sediment and seagrass. By harnessing the huge carbon sequestration provided by seagrass, we hope to create a revenue stream from carbon offsets to benefit continued research and restoration

• The Biogeochemical Carbon Sequestration Lab

Also funded by the Wolf Family, this facility is the first of its kind at Mote focused on sea-

grass and marine sediment research and its role in carbon sequestration. Scientists at the lab aim to develop data-driven solutions that link seagrass restoration to carbon capture and long-term carbon credit strategies to benefit seagrass ecosystem restoration.

• The Publix Seagrass Genetics Research Hub

Support from Publix Super Markets made the development of this state-of-the-art genetics laboratory possible, where Mote's Dr. Gallery will identify genetically resilient seagrass populations to use in restoration. As the first international seagrass genetics library, this hub enables scientists to map, catalog, propagate, and recommend seagrass genotypes that are more likely to thrive under increasing worldwide environmental stressors.

"At Publix, we are focused on doing good in the communities we serve," said Maria Brous, Publix Director of Communications. "We are excited to see the positive impacts of the work Mote is conducting across Florida and beyond."

The Mote Seagrass Ecosystem Restoration Research Compound ribbon cutting is a milestone in the statewide movement to restore and protect Florida's imperiled seagrass ecosystems.

As part of Mote's effort to transfer the seagrass science and technology being developed, Mote has also entered into a formal partnership with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection to establish a new research and restoration site within Bahia Honda State Park in the Florida Keys.

analysis and public can weigh in.

The sign removals follow legislation signed by Gov. Ron DeSantis in April. House Bill 575 requires state statutes to adopt the term "Gulf of America," and House Bill 549 directs state agencies and schools to update maps, signs and educational materials. Both measures were written in response to an executive order signed by President Donald Trump on Jan. 20, 2025, instructing federal agencies to replace "Gulf of Mexico" with "Gulf of America." Federal geographic naming databases were updated shortly thereafter.

Google, Apple and Microsoft updated their services so that U.S. users now see "Gulf of America," users in Mexico see "Gulf of Mexico," and international users see both names together. Mexico's government objected and filed a lawsuit against Google.

If the Town of Longboat Key votes to rename Gulf of Mexico Drive, residents and businesses will need to update addresses and documents. For now, addresses and driver's licenses are unaffected.

Staying Alive

Time to go with the dogs

Much can be learned from the Swedish dog ownership study.

Can living with a dog improve your life? It certainly appears canine companionship might extend it.

The results come from a Swedish study at Uppsala University which used the longstanding public health advantages of that country. All the Swedish population between the ages

of 40-80 were surveyed. Out of those 4 million people, 3.4 million who demonstrably did not have major heart disease and had remained in Sweden were followed a full 12 years. At the same time, 41,000 Swedish twins were studied.

As was everybody's dog ownership.

Since 2001 every Swedish pooch has either an ear tattoo or subcutaneous chip implant, and is registered with the national Board of Agriculture. All certified pedigreed dogs are registered with the Swedish Kennel Club. The researchers estimated 83% of dogs were somewhere in the public record. d.

Combine human and dog registries with far better data than most countries can muster and gives you a pretty good idea of what happens when humans go with the dogs.



What Did They Find?

The biggest effect occurred on overall and cardiovascular mortality. Owning a dog cut death rates in both arenas. However, rates of heart attack and heart failure were only decreased for certain groups.

Who Benefitted the Most?

Singletons. People who lived alone benefitted the most from having dogs. Another group that did particularly well were the elderly.

Did Everybody Benefit?

Apparently not. The data from the 41,000 twins did not show much of a mortality decrease. The authors thought that was due to less usable data on lifestyle in this group, and the smaller sample size.

Did the Type of Dog Matter?

Yes. Pointers showed the lowest overall odds ratio of mortality (.6 versus the expected 1.) Breeds bred for hunting showed overall better results. Mixed breeds showed the least effect.

Does Everyone Agree With The Results?

No. Other studies have been equivocal. The large Norwegian HUNT trial did not show an improvement in mortality. That was a cohort study, different from a registry study like the Swedish one, where the data is mandated by law. Other smaller studies in the US are more or less in agreement with the Swedish data.

Was the Study Perfect?

By no means. It's pretty much impossible to do a perfect study. There are too many variables to observe with fidelity, plus loads of unknown variables affecting outcome not yet figured out. Still, following 3.4 million people with registered outcome over 12 years will be a very hard act to follow.

Why Did People Live Longer?

There are numerous studies showing the short term physiologic effects of dog ownership. People with dogs show less prominent stress responses. They demonstrate less elevated states of their sympathetic nervous systems.

Yet the biggest impact impact seems to come from several factors: 1. Dog owners walk more. This was particularly true of singletons. There's nobody else around to walk the dog. Even in harsh weather (and Sweden has plenty of it) you have to walk the dog.

Next, came the benefits of social engagement between species. Dog owners report a particular kind of happiness living with their animals (so do cat lovers, by the way.)

Third, people with dogs meet other dogs – and their owners. Social support is a very large factor in cardiovascular risk, which accounted for an estimated 45% of total mortality in Europe in 2016. People with dogs can develop attachments to their animal, other animals, and other humans. Increased social engagement may be a big factor in why singletons benefitted more from dog ownership than others.

Bottom Line

Much can be learned from the Swedish dog ownership study. Some implications are:

1. National health registries can provide a lot of useful data that can guide policy and treatment. To get good results you need good data. The Swedish dog ownership study not only had excellent human data, particularly on socioeconomic variables, it also had terrific animal data. Most cohort studies, generally used as "gold standards" in epidemiologic research, cannot enforce the same kind of followup results that national registry data can provide.

Plus only about 13% of Swedes were dog owners. The benefit to singletons and the elderly can help guide national public health policy.

- 2. There is little evidence that owning dogs has directly deleterious effects on human populations. Worries about dogs' overall effects on environmental resources must be contrasted with effects on health and mortality.
- 3. Social support matters a lot to survival. Much of this social support can occur cross-

In America today, perhaps 25% of people claim to have no clear, trustable friend. Despite the pervasiveness of social media, or as others would claim, because of it, people now declare they feel more lonely and alone than before. Loneliness is a major cause of mortality. It might be time to cue the aid of humanity's best friend.





That sounds like a good idea. When we reach out to them, we can let them know that they should remain "in the area" in case they are asked to come back for more questions. I think it might be awkward to have them in the same room/building, but we could ask them to remain in the vicinity, in case a need for follow up happens is something reasonable to expect from them.

Likewise, I can remain in the room if the Policy Board wishes me to be, so that I could answer any questions you may have. I do not think it appropriate for me to chime in on them, that's your role as a Policy Board. But if, for example, someone answers a question in an entirely incorrect manner, then I think I could be helpful by being around for such.

For example, if anyone doesn't know that we have to abide by Sunshine Law, that is something that you can ask, and they might not know. But if someone says we're not, for example, then I would have to respond to an inaccurate answer. Similarly, if someone doesn't know that there's a link between humans and making red tides worse, that's not "wrong" – but if they say there's no link, then that would be incorrect.

This sounds like a reasonable process, I might suggest that the final 4 or 6 applicants remain at the office for the duration of the interviews. If additional questions arise, and to observe their dedication, they will be available.

Applicants for ED Position

To: Longboat Key Commission, Sarasota City Commission

As you know, our next Policy Board meeting, to be held September 12th, will include not only an agenda with various items that need to be acted upon, but also will include the process for selecting the next Director of the SBEP. The process has been very transparent, and we've advertised the opening on social media, on job site postings, and put this out for our CAC and

TAC to disseminate as well. Literally thousands of people have seen social media posts where the job opening was highlighted.

All in all, we received 13 applications. Of those 13, 7 of them did not meet the basic requirements and were not considered further. That left 6 applicants who met the basic requirements. Those 6 were forwarded to our Screening Committee, which was comprised of members of our Management Board, plus one member of the Policy Board. We asked the screening committee to put an "X" by each of the qualified applications that they believed should advance to the next round, the actual interview process, to be conducted by the Policy Board. We set up this process so that the Policy Board would not have to wade through 10 (or more, potentially) different applicants, but would select from a smaller, more manageable number of applicants. The Screening Committee did not rank applicants, just noted those that they felt should proceed to the next stage of the process.

Why did we want to cull that number down a bit? Because the last time the position was advertised, each interview lasted about an hour, from 48' to 68' in length. That would be a very long day, on top of a regular two-hour meeting.

We received totals from six members of the Screening Committee, based on a deadline that passed at 5 pm today.

Of the six qualified applicants, one of them did not receive a single "X" suggesting a lack of comfort with that individual's chances of being able to perform the required duties. Another individual received only one "X". In contrast, there were four applicants who received multiple "X" marks, indicating the Screening Committee members felt that the applicant should proceed to the final stage of the review. Of those four, two received 6 "X" marks and two received 5 "X" marks.

There is a clear separation of four of the applicants from the other two. And since the interview process might take an hour per person, my recommendation is that the Policy Board restrict its interviews to the four applicants who received multiple marks from the Screening Committee.

If this path is chosen, then you'd have – hopefully – a two-hour (or less) meeting that starts at 9:30 on September 12th, 2025, when we go over normal business needs. Then, at approximately 11:30, we could cater a working lunch, allowing the Policy Board members to work out who would ask which of the suggested questions that we provided in an earlier email. Some of the proposed questions are required and straightforward housekeeping ones; others might take more time. If you start the interviews at noon, and keep to a schedule of one each hour, then you'd have all the interviews done by 4 pm, and that would leave an hour or so – until 5 pm – for discussions and votes.


My recommendation would be to follow the process from last time – pick an overall first place and then see if that person can attract enough votes to make the choice unanimous. Also, you should have a clear second-place applicant, should anything keep the first-place choice from being able to take the position.

If you have concerns or do not want to follow this process, please let me know – not via reply all. Otherwise, we'll move forward, likely after this Friday's Management Board meeting, with four applicants given notice of their upcoming interviews, and we will also forward their application packages to the Policy Board.

St. Armand's Meeting Update

Thank you for including the St. Armands Residents Association on these emails. We (SARA) would very much like to be included in this long series of discussions about the future of St. Armands Circle, which happens to be located smack-dab in the middle of our residential neighborhood. Contrary to what some developers have put out there in the past, residents would very much like to see St. Armands Circle revitalized and successful.

However, I don't feel that the discussion of an issue of this magnitude--the future of St. Armands Circle--should be done in haste (or in a closed-door meeting). Residents who are away will start returning in October, with most having returned after the holidays. When people are away, they are less engaged. To maximize resident participation, in-person community workshops should be scheduled in the January-through-April timeframe. However, several members of the SARA Board of Directors are in town year-round and available to participate at any location, at any time. Tell me how many landowner and merchant representatives will be at a meeting, and I'll send a corresponding number of neighborhood representatives.

Suggested talking points:

Current problems: traffic, parking, infrastructure, and the need for revitalization.

How will these problems be impacted by loosening regulations to allow increased size, density, and intensity of use?

How else can these problems be addressed? Even if loosening regulations were the only way, will the public agree that the trade-offs are worth it?

As a reminder, the city already hosted TWO community workshops about bigger buildings on St. Armands Circle within the last four years (August 5, 2021, and January 11, 2022). Why were there two community workshops about the same topic within six months of each other? I think it was because the developers didn't like the community feedback they got in the first one. And they didn't fare any better in the second. The City Commission voted 5-0 to reject bigger buildings on St. Armands Circle on November 21, 2022. Apparently the developers are



trying again less than three years later.

For the future of St. Armands Circle, which we agree we want to see revitalized and successful, we look forward to participating in this conversation, and I encourage you to involve all stakeholders: St. Armands Key residents and Lido Key residents, St. Armands Circle businesses and commercial property owners, and the Town of Longboat Key... all of whom have a vested interest in the city getting this right.



Late afternoon birding can be mellow

"Across the evening sky, all the birds are leaving But how can they know it's time for them to go?"

Lowering sun, hard shadows falling on white sand and gathering birds make late afternoon not only a very good time to bird on Whitney Beach but also a spiritual time.

One afternoon the setting sun is laying a golden carpet on the water's edge. Three dozen sanderlings race after small, gently rolling waves, put their small bills into the sand with startling speed and then run to avoid an incoming wave. At a distance they resemble scurrying insects. Up close the sanderlings have two elegant identifying features: a thin dark brown line that runs across the top of their wings at the joint and dark brown showing at the tail.

Full-bodied royal terns — beach regulars — are recognizable by their large orange-yellow bills. Mixed in with them are the smaller, more slender cousins, the sandwich terns that have long, thin, black bills whose yellow tips give them a banana-like look. Through binoculars I look at a ring-billed gull, whose yellow bill has a black band near the tip, floating in shallow water surrounded by the fiery yellow of the setting sun.

Most of the remaining birds fly out to the sun. How do they know when it's time to go? The sanderlings now fly into the path of the sun's red ball then turn north, flying low over the water. Turning again, they fly the other way. Walking down the beach there are two-dozen other birds clumped up on the wet sand at the water's edge. They apparently have a different curfew. In my mind's ear I hear the words from the old Sandy Denny song sung by Judy Collins. I don't take them literally. Instead I feel the music, and mellowness runs through me with a tinge of wonder at the birds' timing.

Another afternoon later in winter, passing in front of the assembled multitude of gulls, terns and skimmers, I hear a high-pitched two-note plaintive call. None of the royal terns has its bill open. The sound comes again, and this time I see a laughing gull morphing into summer plumage with a black head and white splotches on its face. Some red is starting to show on its bill, which is open and offers a tantalizing view of its mouth, a dark red toward the front and a bright, rich red at the rear. It flies.

Two other laughers morphing into summer plumage are facing each other with wing joints held away from their bodies. This is a strong indication of mating interest. Later the pair is looking in the same direction. Oddly they both seem content. Perhaps this is love.

Two willets, non-descript, large sandpipers, are walking down the beach looking lean, lithe and oddly like little merry-go-round racehorses. Their bills look a little too long for their bodies, and the birds always seem to be carrying them like a medieval knight did his lance on horseback. The birds plunge those bills, slightly open like chop sticks, into the wet sand searching for aquatic invertebrates. I almost have never seen anything in them when they are withdrawn from the wet sand and wonder if they got anything. These birds fly suddenly, their dull brown becoming exciting as their wings show a bold white pattern in flight. They land further down the beach where they continue feeding.

Between 100 and 200 black skimmers are here. Built low to the ground like dachshunds, their black bodies, red legs and feet give them a striking look. It is, however, their red and black bills with an upper mandible that is shorter than the lower one that makes them unique. Those bills, which resemble Halloween candy corn, allow the bird to skim the water with their lower mandible and when they touch prey, snap it shut. One is laying face and bill down in the sand "playing dead" and resembles a still life painting. The bird, actually resting, staggers to its feet at my approach.

I sit on a mound looking around at the passage of daylight to twilight as sunlight dances on water, hard shadows fall on the sand and "fingers" of waves make inroads onto the sand. This landscape helps bring me here in the late afternoon. Should most of the birds fly off simultaneously, I hope I'll hear the old music and feel mellowness tinged with wonder. That'll be icing on the cake.

BreakPoints

Both backhands should be your goal

I started off with a one handed backhand, but I'm curious do you generally advise learning a two-handed? What are the advantages and disadvantages?

The one handed backhand is a beautiful classic shot, but in today's modern game with the advancement in power and spin, the one handed backhand is becoming more and more extinct as the primary backhand.

If you look at the current top men's players most have

two handed backhands: Djokovic, Medvedev, Zverev, Rublev, Nadal, Berrettini, Ruud, Monfils, Isner, and Korda. On the women's side there are: Serena and Venus Williams, Barty, Pliskova, Osaka, Raducanu, Kerber, and Halep. The majority of today's players are going the two handed backhand route, but with the one handed slice for diversity and emergencies.



I generally advise and coach most of BOHANNON my players to have a two handed back-

hand with very few exceptions. There are also many players I have transitioned from a one handed to a two handed backhand because they were no longer improving, couldn't compete at the next level, or were starting to find their opponents picked on their backhand. Another reason people sometimes switch to a two handed is tendonitis. The one handed backhand can be harder on the arm and elbow as it is doing most to all of the work and never getting a break. The two handed backhand (for a right handed player) is left hand dominant so it helps spread the usage between arms.

The main advantages of the two handed backhand are power, consistency, and the ability to disguise the shot. In my opinion the only negative of the two handed backhand is that it requires more footwork. Extremely low or high shots can be more difficulty with a two handed backhand, but hitting



high backhands in general is one of the most difficult shots to conquer regardless.

The major benefits of the one handed backhand are diversity (slice and topspin) and reach. A one handed backhand can help you get out of trouble if you can't reach a ball and it can also help you block or chop the ball defensively if you are being overpowered. Many people find the one handed backhand more aesthetically pleasing than the two handed backhand. I find with perfect technique the one handed backhand looks more artistic while the two handed looks more athletic. There are many beautiful one handed backhands out there: Federer, Tsitsipas, Dmitrov, and of course you always have to mention Steffi Graf. Steffi can be used as a perfect example of how the game has evolved. She had one of the best one handed backhands of all time (slice) and in her later years really tried to add top spin.

My best advice for everyone is to have both backhands. You want to have diversity and lots of tricks up your sleeve. Both shots have advantages and your opponent and the shots they hit can often help you decipher what you need to hit back. If you were my client I would look at your current backhand

and evaluate it. If it is fluid and you have the ability to slice and rip the ball then I wouldn't change it. But if you aren't as consistent as your forehand, you are getting overpowered, or you cannot put the ball away then you need to think about adding the two handed backhand to your game.





Fine Wines for Turbulent Times


In an era of rapid changes in climate, some regions that depend on a specific feature appear. to be losing it.

Grape vines have evolved to tolerate dramatic variations in climate and soil. Vines that struggle to find water and nutrients produce the best of the fine wines. These grapes put down deep roots and survive droughts and heat wave. At the Mollydooker (Australian for a left-

handed boxer) vineyard in the McLaren Vale region south of Adelaide, the winemaker demonstrated how they make the vines struggle. Their irrigation system rations water to the vines to keep them just short of withering and succumbing in the winter and spring heat of one of the many arid regions down under. The resulting intense flavors of concentrated plum and blackberry, paired with an alcohol percent on the high side, appeal to many as cocktail wines, forcing European to counter with claims that these hot wines overpower foods that wines should complement.

The strong traditions of wine and food in Europe are increasingly conflicting with the realities of not only climate change but also the many socioeconomic, lifestyle, and population shifts that undermine traditional preferences for food and wine. The French fret over the taste of the younger members of the population for beer. Beer bars in the US stock a variety of white wines for customers concerned about putting on a few extra pounds.





No doubt the grapes will find their own way. Within the family of famous European grapes, cross-breeding produces clones of, say, Pinot Noir, Syrah, or Cabernet Sauvignon, that meet the challenges of changes in climate or consumer preferences. Though frowned upon, or often downright prohibited by the keepers of traditions in wine-making, hybrids of wines from different families of grapes have risen to overcome challenges that threatened the viability of traditional wine-making. During the late 19th Century, French noble grapes crossed with American vines produced hybrids resistant to the devastating pandemic of the root disease phylloxera in Europe. Today, some of the French hybrids are making inroads into regions that have cold snaps that would kill off the Northern European Riesling and Silvaner Eiswein vines. The Vidal Blanc grape, for instance, survives brutal winters in upstate New York and Ontario in Canada, and produces a highly competitive ice wine. We recently tasted and quickly finished a lovely 2019 Vidal Blanc dessert wine from Crow Vineyard in Kent County Maryland. As one would hope for in a dessert wine, it tasted sweeter than the dessert.

To the casual observer, the wine industry seems bound to tradition and static. When challenges arise, it does evolve quickly to counter them. When the paleontologists Stephen Jay Gould and Niles Eldredge initiated the theory of "punctuated equilibrium" to explain long stretches of minimal evolution follow by short phases of rapid change, they were not thinking of evolution in wine. Even so, expect to see greater varieties of clones within families of grapes and hybrids across families when changes in conditions favor changes in traditions.
