When I look back on the past year at Tech Exchange, I feel an overwhelming sense of pride in how deeply we've impacted the communities we serve. It's been a time of strategic growth, and it's exciting to see how far we've come! Thanks to our supporters, partners, Board, volunteers, and staff, Tech Exchange was able to bridge the digital divide for thousands of families in 2023-24.

Of course, no year is without its challenges. Scaling up our services to meet growing community needs, especially in new regions, was no easy feat. Our rapid geographic expansion frequently required coordination with complex government bureaucracies. At other times, our staff faced difficulties in establishing new locations for classes and events beyond our Oakland home.

We overcame these obstacles through our team's dedicated efforts and our community's involvement. Increasingly strong relationships with libraries, and other anchor institutions, were essential to our efforts. The resilience to pivot in the face of challenges was also crucial. Our achievements were astounding: we trained over 600 adults in basic computer skills and connected over 10,000 families in six Bay Area counties with devices and tech support! I'm particularly proud of our growing internship program, which empowered dozens of local youth with life-changing STEM career skills this year. Our social enterprise partner solutions also made remarkable impact, providing thousands of devices at discounted prices to schools, nonprofits, and other organizations across the region. This effort has not only contributed to Tech Exchange's revenue, but has also built on our sustainability mission to reuse and repurpose high quality devices.

Looking to the future, we aim to serve even more students and interns, provide greater access to affordable technology, and continue leading the charge toward digital equity across the Bay Area. With your continued support, we look forward to an impactful year ahead as we build on this momentum.

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THE DIGITAL DIVIDE: A CHANGING LANDSCAPE

In 2023-24, the pandemic's digital inclusion crisis response waned, but the community's need for computers, digital skills, and internet access continued. The elimination of federal credits like the Affordable Connectivity Program made it more difficult for low-income households to access home internet service. In addition, schools and community based organizations struggled to keep pace with program changes for device distribution to students and families.

Although progress has been made toward closing the digital divide, tens of thousands of Bay Area families are still left behind. One in five low-income families still lack access to a computer in their home, with a similar gap for home internet access*. What's more, many individuals who do have computers and internet access still face language barriers to gaining essential digital skills and tech support.

OUR MISSION

For nearly thirty years, Tech Exchange has been committed to serving our community and advancing digital equity. Founded in West Oakland in 1995, Tech Exchange is a Bay Area leader in the effort to close the digital divide. Our mission is to ensure that all families have a computer, internet access, and the technology skills necessary to improve and enhance their lives. We are dedicated to building a diverse community of digitally proficient Bay Area residents who have full access to engage online in education, employment, health, financial, and civic services. Tech Exchange envisions a digitally connected Bay Area where everyone has the technology resources they need to thrive.


Tech Exchange prioritizes underserved communities and closes the digital divide for individuals and families who qualify as low income. 90% of the participants we serve are eligible for programs such as School Nutrition Free/ Reduced Price Meals. CalFresh, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Supplemental Security Income (SSI), and/or are residents in Subsidized Affordable Housing in the Bay Area.



DEVICES AND WAREHOUSE

Electronic waste is the fastest growing waste stream in the world. Each day, Americans discard hundreds of thousands of computers, most of which are still viable for use. At the same time, nearly a quarter of homes in the U.S. lack a computer or tablet of any kind. This disconnect is especially pronounced in the Bay Area, primarily affecting low income households in communities of color.

Tech Exchange has a solution.

In 2023-24, our team continued our nearly 30 year operation to collect used devices from Bay Area partners, refurbish them alongside our interns, and give the old computers new life in the hands of the students and families we serve.

HOW IT WORKS Our team picks up batches of old devices from hundreds of local businesses. Viable devices Individuals can drop advance to the off devices at our refurbishing station, TecHub or at where our expert community technicians and trained events. interns conduct diagnostic tests and perform necessary upgrades. Our staff loads and transports equipment to our warehouse Unusable for sorting. equipment is responsibly recycled.

12,554 devices collected 70+ tons of e-waste diverted in 2023-24!

After the hardware has been updated, the operating system is securely wiped utilizing a three-pass process, and new operating systems are installed.

> Once devices receive a thorough physical cleaning, they are cataloged and prepared for shipment. All devices include a one-year warranty and tech support.

In the past year, this sustainable approach brought 6,742 high-quality devices to our community. Tech Exchange distributed devices through our digital skills classes, at our TecHub, through nonprofit partners, and through our social enterprise.



DIGITAL SKILLS CLASSES

In 2023, Tech Exchange re-energized our digital skills program, which had been paused during the pandemic. Our first sets of new class attendees, in Oakland and San José, completed the course in the spring.

In 2024, we ramped up efforts even more, expanding our digital inclusion footprint to serve six counties. In 2023-24, Tech Exchange brought our free multilingual classes to 642 Bay Area adults at libraries, schools, career centers, and other community organizations. Congratulations to our 2023-24 graduates!





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TECHUB AND TECH SUPPORT

Tech Exchange's TecHub is the only brick-and-mortar location in our region dedicated to providing computers and free digital resources to our community. Located in the heart of the Fruitvale district, the TecHub provided multilingual tech support and other services to over 4,909 visitors during the year. Many were Oakland students and their families, with a growing number of older adults dropping in.

Community members also visited the TecHub to shop for Tech Exchange's high-quality refurbished computers. The TecHub's retail space upgraded during the year to showcase our affordable laptops, tablets. and other devices. Excitement was especially high at our St. Patrick's Day Sale March 15. Over 75 visitors dropped by to celebrate our green technology, purchase a device, and enter drawings for free prizes. Additional inventory was brought in after we sold out of our initial stock in the morning, and the event was a huge success!

INTERNS & WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Promoting workforce development in under-resourced communities has been at the heart of Tech Exchange's digital equity mission since our inception. This longstanding commitment to developing tech career pathways for local youth continued to grow in 2023-24. Thirty-three interns completed the program during the year, compared to eight the previous year at the end of the pandemic.

Tech Exchange leveraged partnerships with Civicorps, Alameda County StopWaste, MetWest High School, Lao Family Community Development, Success Centers, Jewish Vocational Service, and Oakland Unified School District to place paid interns at our warehouse, our Oakland TecHub, and in other roles. Our team loved working alongside these bright young people!

All interns received valuable on-the-job training and perks like TechTalks with employees at local tech companies. As a refinement, in 2023-24, the program's curriculum was re-aligned to prepare interns to take a professional technical certification exam, with exam fees sponsored by Tech Exchange.

Over the years, Tech Exchange has trained over 350 interns and proudly hired several as part of our professional team.
