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

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HEADMASTER'S REVIEW



1997 has been an eventful year at Bryanston High School!

Mr Paige, the Headmaster for the past 13 years, received the Voluntary Severance Package and, very sadly, left Bryanston High School at the end of January. Any change has an unsettling effect, but, in spite of so much insecurity surrounding the new Headmaster's appointment and the changes in education, the staff and pupils showed tenacity to ensure another successful year for Bryanston High School.

It is significant to note that the staff turnover this year is well below 5% which clearly indicates the stability amongst the teaching staff. The staff who left the school during the course of the year all emigrated either to the U.K. or Australia. We have been very fortunate in the quality of the teachers who replaced the staff who left. To the staff who have served us so well in 1997 - academic, secretarial and grounds - thank you for your dedicated contribution. For me, one of the most rewarding aspects of teaching remains the pleasure of the close working contact with a team such as ours.

Bryanston High School has always been acknowledged as a centre of excellence in educational circles. The maintaining of high academic standards is a priority at the school and the staff is totally committed to ensuring that the pupils receive the best possible education. The school has been pro-active in preparing all staff members for the implementation of Curriculum 2005 in Grade 8 in 1999, by arranging workshops and in-service training on a regular basis.

There was also a change of guard in the Governing Body of the school with long-serving members like Jacques Sellschop, Viv Viljoen and Colin Mc Murdo, laying down the reigns. The new Governing Body under the Chairmanship of Dr Derek Swemmer, has already proved to be motivated and committed to steering the school to greater heights. My appreciation

goes to the Governing Body, Parents' Association and Mothers' Committee for their dedication and service to the school.

One of the things that struck me when I started at Bryanston High, is that the type of pupil at this school is of a very special calibre. The vitality and vigour displayed by our pupils has resulted in the establishing of new standards in all spheres of life at this school.

On the cultural front our staff and pupils built on the very high standard of the House Plays to produce probably the best Major Production in the history of the school.

In keeping with previous years, our Rhetoric Society again produced orators and debaters of a very high calibre.

Bryanston High School was one of the venues for the recent Eisteddfod. Hundreds of our students entered, and we achieved 5 bronze medals, 23 silver medals, 53 gold medals and 11 diploma certificates overall. These fine achievements resulted in Bryanston High School winning the High School section of the Eisteddfod for 1997. In addition to these outstanding performances, our Dance Group came third in the Inter-Schools' Dance competition. Undoubtedly, cultural life at Bryanston High is alive and well and the school has become a lighthouse for cultural activities among the Northern Suburbs Schools.

We also achieved unprecedented success in three Olympiads. One pupil in the English, five in the Afrikaans and one in the Mathematics Olympiads came in the Top 20 nationally.

On the sportsfields, there were once more many notable achievements. Our Badminton, Squash and Tennis teams did admirably. The Boys' Hockey team was in a building phase this year and we can expect a superb season from them next year. The highlight of the Girls' Hockey season was their overseas trip to Australia. This young team will, I'm sure, produce some fine results next season. Netball was, once again, very strong, with our Under Nineteen B team reaching the finals of their league. Rugby continued to improve, especially in its depth, and next year's First Team promises to be superb. Our Swimming team continued to perform very well by coming Second at the Inter-High. The resurgence of Athletics continues. Foundation Cross Country ensured that this year's Athletics team, was without doubt, the strongest team in the School's history, resulting in Third place at the Inter-High. Our Boys' First Shooting team won their section for the second time in the Gauteng West Region which ensured that Bryanston High took the overall first place in the League.

All in all, 42 provincial colours were attained in the following extra-mural activities: Girls' Hockey, Hockey Umpiring, Boys' Hockey, Shooting, Rugby, Cross Country, Swimming, Chess, Squash, Athletics, Cricket.

Unfortunately, these highlights of the extra-mural programme simply record achievement at the highest level of competition. While they are an indicator of the success of some of our pupils in many spheres, they do not reflect the life blood of our extra-mural programme: the regular participation and involvement of hundreds of pupils at all levels. The fact that so many different extra-mural tours or excursions took place this year reflects the level of the staff involvement and pupil opportunity. The number of tours which took place also indicates something of our range of activities in sports, such as Netball, Hockey, Cricket, Rugby, Athletics and Swimming to the Grahamstown English Festival, Leadership Camps, Wild Life tours, not to mention a host of various shorter excursions.

In conclusion, I would like to assure you that the management of this school has the foresight in our strategic planning to anticipate and provide for the changes in education that are evident.



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GOVERNING BODY CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

As 1997 draws to a close, it is a time to reflect on a momentous year, a year of change and renewal. The year began with the early retirement of Roy Paige followed shortly thereafter by the promulgation of new legislation which resulted in the formation of a new governing structure for the school. The old nine-person governing body was replaced with a much larger and democratically representative committee.

Membership includes representatives of learners, staff (both teaching and support staff), the principal and parents. Of the outgoing committee only two made themselves available for reelection, and so we said our farewells to those who had served so ably under the chairmanship of Mr J. Sellschop. Their service was greatly appreciated.

The new Governing Body was elected in May and faced substantial challenges in its first five weeks of office. Its first task was to appoint a new Principal. At the start of the third term Mr D. Visser took up the office officially, after having acted in this capacity since the departure of Mr Roy Paige. We note with much enthusiasm the dedication and focus that Mr Visser has already brought to the School in his new appointment.

In parallel with the process of selection, a constitution for the Governing Body had to be drawn up and submitted to the Gauteng Department of Education for approval. We managed to complete this task on time, thanks to the drafting skill and careful attention to detail of Jeff Bolus.

In August and September, our focus shifted to the development of a strategic plan which was adopted in its refined version on 14 October 1997. In the weeks thereafter it has been presented and discussed with the staff, learners and parents. This plan is subject to ongoing review and attention as it is used to direct and focus the endeavours of the School's paid professionals, volunteer supporters and elected representatives.

The new leadership of the school is inevitably different from which precedes it. But its differences will, I believe, serve to enhance and exploit the excellent traditions and facilities that have been left to Mr Visser and those who work with him for the benefit of the learners at Bryanston.

What lies ahead is a period of ongoing change. Modern business wisdom suggests that we need to shift from the philosophical attitude of steeling ourselves to "survive" this period of change, to a new paradigm which accepts that we will live in a state of perpetual

transition. This is an important adaptation to make, but one that is essential if we are to develop the necessary harmony with every new step we take as we move to the new millennium in an emerging and different educational dispensation.










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PARENTS' ASSOCIATION REPORT

We look forward to an even more successful 1998!



GRADE ELEVEN BOYS' LEADERSHIP CAMP





Group work was also an important aspect. Encouraging us to meet new faces and reflect Upon certain problems presented to us -Which of course we solved without much fuss.



STUDENTS' REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL






GRADE TWELVE BIOLOGY EXCURSION TO DELTA PARK


On the 17th of August this year, Bryanston participated in the FNB company relay. We entered two teams - a men's team and a women's team.



As Squash is a very labour intensive activity it was wonderful to have many of the parents involved in transporting the teams. This enabled them to support their boys. Well done to everybody.



The first detail started at seven O'clock sharp with hardly enough light to walk straight, let alone shoot straight. But with true Bryanston courage we battled on and received a second place with our Senior Boys' team. This was the only competition they did not win this year. Doug Reekie placed third with Michael O'Connell taking a commendable second place in the Junior Boys section.

Trials were held for the second time to select a team to represent Transvaal at the S A Championships. We were proud to have five of our shottists reselected to the Transvaal team: Susan Houghton, Nicola Ager, Doug Reekie, David Maskell and Michael O`Connell. They did their school proud with David Maskell placing first in Transvaal, tenth in the South African Senior Boys' division and a remarkable twentieth overall. In the Junior Girls' division Nicola Ager placed tenth in her age group for South Africa and 40th overall across all age groups.

This has been a very exciting year for shooting and one that will not be forgotten. It is to the credit of all our shottists this year, whose dedication and skill have managed to keep us ranked as one of the top schools in Gauteng.

BEST PLAYWRIGHTS' COMMENT

The Jupiter Senior House Play, "Annaliese, my love" was chosen to be performed by pupils for a number of reasons. This romantic tragedy was written by two matric pupils, providing them with the opportunity of exercising their skills in playwriting. Directing and co-writing a play, ensured that "Annaliese, my love" would be performed with the playwrights' intentions being carried out, yet allowing room for the creativity of the actors and actresses to interpret the personalities of the characters. The play was also chosen for its youth-orientated message and setting. Our set was simple and the costumes - school uniforms - suited the budget.

Although this play was written with the intention of getting a strong message across to scholars, it still had a relevant message to the older generation. The play's message is a serious one which we find is an important feature when taking on a senior play. The play conveys the brevity of life; it is imperative that we all make today an important day in our lives. Living in our South African society - and closer to home, in our Bryanston community - we are challenged daily to educate ourselves not just within our syllabus but also with the realities of life. That is what the thrust of the play is - dealing with life's hardships in one's own way and being made aware of how others cope with the same pressures.

The reality of life is depicted here in this play as the tragedy of death. Through this idea the dramatist is trying to convey how we as people confront and react to such an ordeal, with grief, nonchalance or with an attitude of positivity towards life. We should make the most of our time on earth. For example, take the risk of asking the girl you like out or telling your sister that you love her or appreciate the time you have with your friends.

The classroom is a representation of the pupil's state of mind. At the beginning of the play it is filled with the excitement of youth yet its neat rows show that their foundations are normal and filled with stability. But by scene two the classroom is in disarray, resembling the shock the pupils have just experienced after hearing the tragic news of their classmate's death, and the atmosphere of hustle and bustle and the feeling of youthful joy has been replaced by a tense atmosphere of silence and mourning, epitomising the feelings of grief and anger. A bomb has just exploded and they are left in this scene wondering if the classroom and the pupils within it will ever be the same again. The classroom, however, regains order and so do their lives as shown by Sam's speech.

We have tried to make the message powerful by placing much emphasis on the angel's entrance with her flower, commemorating the loss of life and with her undertones of spirituality. The sharp light at the play's commencement shows that the pupil's path of direction is clear and has not yet been marred; it is filled with hope and vitality. This brightness of light commences after the speech and has placed them back on the path of life, this time with more caution and awareness of what lies ahead of them. Their path will hopefully lead them forward, and not to a cul-de-sac.

At first glance, the characters portrayed in this play will be seen as stereotypical - a nerd, a hot hunk, a raver and so forth. This is used to indicate that at first young people are known by a label that they have stuck to them. In other words, their identity comes from their circle of friends. This is to emphasise the futility of peer pressure and "clicks" because we are all unique. The fact that we individuals will only register in the play when the pupils experience the reality of life.We will soon discover there is more to Sahara than her nails - this being her insecurity, causing her to be jealous of Annaliese. And there is more to Stephen than his image, his feelings of love for Annaliese and his grief over her death.

In the words of Samantha:

Dream of tomorrow, remember yesterday and live for today.

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
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HEADBOY'S ADDRESS

Je rentre après- demain. Malheureusement pour moi mais heureusement pourtoi.


