

### A TEACHER'S IMPACT BEYOND THE CLASSROOM




### Meet Mrs Paula McIntyre: OUR NEW HEAD OF GIRLS' PREPARATORY SCHOOL

### MATHS TRIUMPH ACROSS ALL THREE SCHOOLS

This term, pupils from the Girls' Prep, Boys' Prep and Senior School have excelled in a range of national Mathematics competitions, showcasing their problem-solving skills, logic and determination.

At the Girls' Prep, all pupils in Year 5 and Year 6, along with selected Year 4 pupils, took part in the MA Primary Maths Challenge, achieving 7 gold, 10 silver and 9 bronze awards. In the more advanced UKMT Junior Maths Challenge, typically aimed at Year 8 pupils, the girls achieved an impressive 5 gold, 10 silver and 19 bronze awards. Three pupils have qualified for the Junior Kangaroo round, a significant leap from last year's results.

The Boys' Prep also celebrated strong performances, with Year 4 to Year 6 pupils earning 32 gold, 22 silver and 26 bronze awards in the MA Primary Mathematics Challenge. Of the 21 boys who reached the bonus round, 8 received bronze, 6 silver and 2 gold certificates. In the UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge, boys achieved 12 golds, 11 silvers and 15 bronzes, with 7 pupils qualifying for the prestigious Pink Kangaroo round – a School record. The youngest pupils are also gearing up for the First Mathematics Challenge this June.

Meanwhile, the Senior School's Maths Department was thrilled with this year's UKMT results. In the Intermediate Maths Challenge, 133 pupils in Year 9 and Year 10 achieved 8 golds, 41 silvers and 48 bronzes. The Junior Maths Challenge saw 126 Year 7 and Year 8 pupils achieve 33 golds, 37 silvers and 41 bronzes, with 19 qualifying for the next stage – including 4 from Year 7.

From their first explorations of numbers to complex problemsolving, our pupils' enthusiasm for Mathematics continues to grow.





### **SELF DEFENCE WORKSHOP**

On Saturday 17 May, we were thrilled to welcome Debi Steven and her team from Action Breaks Silence for an inspiring Level Two self-defence workshop, building on the success of our Level One training earlier this year. Founded by Debi in 2013, Action Breaks Silence is an educational charity committed to creating a world free from violence against women and girls. The workshop explored powerful topics such as the impact of harmful language and aggression on our response, effective strategies for verbal de-escalation, and vital ground defence techniques. Pupils also had the exciting chance to practise self-defence moves on instructors, gaining confidence and practical skills in a safe and supportive environment.







### **SUCCESS AT YOUNG ENTERPRISE FINALS**

Two Surbiton High School teams – 'Sidera', led by Managing Director Siyona P, and 'Bio-Divers', led by Managing Director Allegra E, delivered an outstanding performance at this year's Young Enterprise Kingston Area Finals. Competing against eight local schools, including Kingston Grammar School and Tiffin Girls' School, both teams impressed the judges with their professionalism, creativity and entrepreneurial spirit. Out of six awards available, Surbiton High School students proudly took home three:

- Best Individual Presenter Rose H
- Runner-Up Best Company Award Team Sidera
- Best Company Award Team Bio-Divers

Following this impressive success, both teams progressed to the South London Finals. At the regional stage, the students once again demonstrated their innovation and determination. Team Bio-Divers secured the award for Best Marketing, while







Team Sidera received an honorary mention for Best Journey, recognising their impressive progress throughout the programme. What makes Bio-Divers particularly noteworthy is their successful collaboration with pupils from the Girls' Prep. 

### **GYMNASTICS GLORY AT NATIONAL FINALS**

Surbiton High School's gymnasts delivered outstanding performances at the British National Finals, competing in both the Acrobatics and Floor and Vault disciplines.

In the Acrobatics Finals, pupils secured impressive national placings, including 4th place for the U14 Girls Pair (Amber J and Eva R) and the U19 Group, and 5th place for the U11 Girls Pair (Tilly J and Camilla M-T) and U19 Girls Pair (Daisy A and Louisa S).

The highlight came in the U19 Floor and Vault competition, where the School's senior team delivered exceptional routines

in one of the event's most competitive categories. With a margin of just 0.45 points separating first and second place, Surbiton High School's U19 team were crowned 2025 Floor and Vault National Champions.

Congratulations to Emmie A, Annabel C, Maeve H, Eva R and Louisa S on this remarkable achievement. A special commendation also goes to Emmie A, awarded Highest Overall Scoring Girl, closely followed by Maeve H.


# Sports ROUND-UP

### **U11 VERNEY CUP – SECOND ROUND VICTORY OVER ROKEBY**

Surbiton U11s produced a commanding performance in the second round of the Verney Cup, overcoming Rokeby with a well-rounded display of batting, bowling, and fielding.

After being asked to bat first, Surbiton posted an impressive 158 for 6 from their 20 overs. The innings was built on a powerful middle-order display, with Matthew A. leading the charge with a composed 25 from 27 balls. Jude C. brought some fireworks with a rapid 24 from just 16 deliveries, including a six that cleared the ropes with ease. Barney R. added a vital unbeaten 22, keeping the momentum going late in the innings.

Contributions also came from Jamie H. (19), Akhil P. (10), and Faaiz A. (11), each playing their part in a confident batting performance. Extras were plentiful, but Surbiton capitalised well to reach a strong total.

With the ball, Surbiton showed excellent control and discipline.

Matthew A. was the pick of the bowlers, finishing with 2 wickets, while Jude C., Faaiz A., and Yaqoob M. each claimed one. The bowling unit kept things tight, backed by sharp fielding and alert work in the deep.

Rokeby fought hard, but tight bowling and smart field placements kept them at bay. Surbiton closed out the match with Rokeby restricted to 127 from their 20 overs, sealing a 31-run win and a place in the next round of the Verney Cup.

After the match, Mr Blood praised the team, saying: "All 11 boys were outstanding today, and the fielding was exactly what we have been working on. This is the furthest we have got to in the Verney Cup and I am proud of the boys."

This performance showcased the depth, discipline, and determination within the squad. The team moves forward with confidence as they prepare for the next round of the competition.





## SURBITON HIGH SCHOOL SECURES EIGHT NATIONAL FOOTBALL TITLES

Surbiton High School has made history this year by winning 8 national football titles across prestigious competitions,

including a memorable victory in the 2025 Utilita Girls Cup Grand Final at Wembley Stadium.

The School secured titles in multiple age categories in the English Schools Football Association (ESFA) competitions, achieving a clean sweep of victories and setting a national benchmark for school sport performance and development.

### ESFA NATIONAL FINALS: DOMINANCE ACROSS ALL AGE GROUPS

Surbiton High School achievements are unmatched given the strong competition in each age category:

- TU13 National A Team (9-a-side)
   Champions out of 494 schools, winning the final 3-1 for the second consecutive year.
- **U13 National B Team (9-a-side)** Won 3-2 against 32 schools.
- **U15 National A Team (11-a-side)** Won 1-0 from 375 schools.
- **U15 National B Team (9-a-side)**Defended their title with a 1-0 win among 19 schools.
- U16 National A Team (11-a-side)
   Secured a fourth consecutive title with a 2-1 win from 340 schools, mostly

Year 10 pupils.

• **U18 National A Team (11-a-side)**Claimed their first title with a 1-0 win from 125 schools.

This clean sweep surpasses previous years' results when fewer teams reached finals.

### UTILITA GIRLS CUP GRAND FINAL: WEMBLEY GLORY

On 13 April 2025, the U13
Girls Football Team won 1-0 at
Wembley Stadium against Sandbach
High School, representing AFC
Wimbledon. Over 700 schools entered

the competition, which includes local to regional rounds. Surbiton High School has reached the Wembley final three of the last four seasons.

The School also won the U15 Independent Schools National Cup and qualified for the U13 ISFA National 7-a-side Finals in June.

Led by Mr Elbekri and the dedicated coaching team, Surbiton High's Football Programme develops football skills, resilience, and confidence.




### CULTURAL CONNECTIONS IN FREIBURG
