









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PRAYER - 16TH JUNE 2011

Mr Louis Ferreira became Chairman of the School Governing Body in 2011. I would like to thank him for his leadership and commitment to the school. To be Chairman involves considerable responsibility and is very time consuming. I would like to express my sincere thanks to Louis for all his support and involvement in the school. He has been a pillar of strength in very difficult times as the school faces the challenges of sound financial management, curriculum change and maintaining the facilities at the school. Louis ends his term of office at the end of the year as his son is in Matric.

The dominant and most important activity of the SGB is financial management. Mrs Peacock, the bursar, is very experienced and does an outstanding job managing all financial affairs under the guidance of Mrs Biggs, the SGB parent, with the finance portfolio. The financial equation has not changed much over the years, only the balancing act has become more precarious. The equation is between school fee income, rising exemptions, increasing salary costs, deteriorating facilities, rising municipal costs and low government support. The majority of parents have been fantastic in supporting the school and meeting their financial obligations. I thank them. However a growing concern is that more and more parents are requesting exemptions, as is their legal right, however, they are receiving a quality education which other parents are paying for. I would like to thank those exemption parents who do pay a bit extra because they understand the importance of a good education for their children and the price of such an education. I would imagine that as the years unfold the staffing is going to be reduced, class sizes grow, facilities deteriorate and extra-murals downsized unless the government can support schools who are trying to produce quality results in the midst of seriously declining standards and difficult economic times. Matric failure rates are high and ANA results are poor so the government needs to make some drastic changes in the future. Let's hope the new CAPS curriculum will be the start of a process of raising academic performance and standards.

Throughout the years as principal, I have worked hard to try to build a stable and strong staff. Staff turnover in the past years has been low, however, 2012 will see a number of retirements and a restructuring of the school. The School is blessed with young and dynamic teachers who will be more than capable of assuming leadership and management roles. It is also encouraging to see more young teachers qualifying and looking for posts at schools, like Bryanston. It is the challenge of the SGB and myself to make the school an attractive prospect to come to teach in. Students need to understand that if they want good teachers they need to co-operate, do their work and not be a disciplinary problem. Teachers are special people and they need to be nurtured, protected and be given the tools to do their job to the best of their ability. I would like to thank all teachers at the school for a very good year and let's hope the Matric results will be as good as last year and reflect all their hard work.

The School is over 45 years old and the buildings are starting to show their age. While we have worked hard to keep the

gardens looking good and the fields are in the best condition in years, we find the plumbing is leaking, the roof needs constant attention, lighting fixtures are breaking and driveways need to The School is a state facility and yet parents be upgraded. are expected to maintain the building at their own cost. The GDE did get contractors to repair the ceilings and roof leaks but the job was not well done and the storms undid a lot of the repairs. It took the SGB a number of years to get the GDE in to do the job. It would be wonderful if all classrooms could be upgraded; a new office block built; storerooms and classrooms built where the shed is at the back of the school; all the toilets tiled and the prefabs replaced with brick. All physical development in the school over the past 45 years has been at parents' expense and future parents need to maintain the momentum of continually upgrading the school. The School has been promised computer labs from the GDE over the years but nothing has materialised, other than all the satellite dishes at the pavilion that have never been used. Each year we try to make improvements, such as tiling the lower toilets, the steps at the pavilion, the shade netting over the grand stands and a water feature in the main driveway. We are also proud of our new tractor to mow the grass. It has saved many man hours instead of having to use the smaller mowers. The burglar alarms have been upgraded. The ground staff, under Mr Toerien, has done a very good job using limited and restricted budgets and man power.

The number of students at the school has dropped from 1025 to 980. It has been very pleasing to have a very good group of Grade 8's which is very promising for the next 5 years. The Grade 9's have shown themselves to be good academically. The Grades 10's are probably the most talented group in the school. The Grade 11's have been very involved in many school activities and have enjoyed a very good LIA year. The Matric group has shown improvement over the years and we are expecting the matric results to be very good. I trust the university exemption rate is comparable to previous years and we expect our top candidates to get multiple distinctions. The enrolment for 2012 is promising, however, as a result of the new GDE regulations, the final decision over final acceptances can only happen at the end of October which is far too late for planning for 2012 and, I believe, too late for parents planning to send their children to high school. The GDE needs to start the process in the first term and complete the process by the end of the second term. Parents will then have the security in the knowledge that their children have been placed in a good high school and the SGB can complete more realistic planning for the New Year. We trust the Governing Body Foundation has addressed these issues with the GDE.

While most of the students at school come from strong and united families, it is still worrying how many social issues the Grade Controllers and the Psychologist have to deal with. Issues of self-esteem, insecurities, family trauma, drugs, bullying and petty assault are perennial issues and have to be dealt with firmly and compassionately. It is concerning that so many families are prepared to leave their children unsupervised and that they are given so much freedom and money that they eventually get up to some kind of mischief. We strongly appeal to parents to make sure their children are always monitored and supervised so that they grow up in structured and rules based environment. Then as they grow up the boundaries can be readjusted and greater freedom granted as they grow more responsible. Society is under threat as unsupervised children run rampant in our streets and shopping malls. The School has too many students who are left by parents after school and are only collected late in the afternoon. We now have teachers on duty in the afternoons to try to shepherd them home and to keep them out of trouble. I understand that both parents work and it makes collection difficult after school, but they need to ensure their children can get home and need to supervise their homework and study habits. It always amazes me that the students who do extra-murals are also the productive students in the classroom, while the loiterers after school make little

or no effort to do homework or participate in an extramural. Every afternoon it is the same 40 odd students who hang around for a couple of hours until their parents can collect them. Parents are contacted but it makes no difference. May I appeal to parents to collect their children promptly after school, after extra-murals and after night functions. One grade 11 boy came back to school on the bus at the end of the grade 11 camp at 12 am on a Sunday and was only collected later that evening after one of the teachers phoned the parents. Having made the above observations, we are very happy with the quality of students at the school and the effort they are making to get an education and build a CV and to make a future for themselves. We do worry about work ethic and standards, but generally the students' performance is very good. I would love to get in a reputable company that specialises in external tests to compare the academic standards of Bryanston students and teachers to international bench marks. I would think we compare guite favourably.

Extra-murals have always played a huge role in the functioning of the school. I have always believed that there must be a clear balance between academic endeavour and physical activity. Participation in a cultural, sporting or hobby after schools hours is vital to the developmental growth of a child. Bryanston has an active and vibrant programme, offering a wide range of activities at the school. We have achieved considerable success and have a reputation as a very good sporting school. Every year our musicals are superb and excellent entertainment. I am sure parents have noticed how our fixture lists have changed in recent years. We no longer play many traditional rivals and this is for the simple reason that these schools no longer have comprehensive extra mural programmes. I believe that sports, such as cricket, rugby and hockey are dying a slow death in many schools. Schools no longer offer these sports or they do not give us B and C teams, or teams from certain age groups. A good example of the deterioration of school sport is the annual rugby festival between Natal and Gauteng coed schools. The festival has been run for the past 35 years, alternating between Durban and Johannesburg and usually involves between 20 and 26 schools. We now face the situation where there are not enough Natal schools taking part and many Johannesburg schools have pulled out. The tournament is based on billeting players to stay with the families of the host school. Now schools place the players and coaches in the school hall or classrooms and they have to fend for themselves. At present we are debating the future of the festival and to change its format, possibly inviting some Cape co-ed schools, but we are committed to not letting the festival die. I believe this situation applies to most other sports, particularly in State schools and in schools where the management shows no energy or vision to have sport in their school and where teachers are not going to take the initiative as unions dominate their conditions of work. I want to state clearly that as long as I am at Bryanston we will have full teams and cultural events as we have done for the last 20 years and I urge parents to please support me. We have teachers who are more than willing to spend their afternoons,

Saturdays and holidays coaching. Our children need to be out on the playing fields extending their education by practising a sport or cultural skill which will facilitate their learning and education in the classroom. Extra- murals give our school a spirit, a soul and a focus that keeps the blue flame burning brightly and it enhances academic results, not hinders them.

So 2011 began with incredible Matric results where Jenna Fulcher was the shining light amongst many other outstanding results. The swimming season was great and we still have two teams. Our cricket is always strong. The new Grade 8s show talent and enthusiasm. The tours to Natal over the Easter holidays were very successful. The winter sports season is always the best although the rugby results were not great, but we had the best girl's hockey team ever. We steadily maintained the academic programme pushing all students to good Mid year results. One of our own teachers wrote the musical and it was a packed success. The athletic season was one of the best ever. Girls and boys tennis teams are rising in the school leagues and participation is very high. 30 rugby players and their parents are steadily putting together an exciting rugby trip to Italy next year. We successfully had a first cultural tour to Europe even though all bags were lost by the airline. Our teachers are ready for the new curriculum and are even training facilitators for other teachers. We have had one of the best councillor groups in years. Our cheerleaders successfully defended their national title for the 6th time. I could go on and on with the list. There were, of course, also many challenges and problems but we have an experienced staff to deal with them all.

The school has a good future but it is imperative that parents support the school, pay their school fees and contribute in whatever way they can and they will be amazed how their children and the teachers will be motivated to achieve and drive the school forward and therefore their own lives will also then show progress. The alternative is not worth contemplating.

I would like to thank the SGB for their support and the crucial role played by Mr Ferreira. A special thank you and farewell to Louis Ferreira and Jo Sfarnas for their contribution over the years. They will both be leaving at the end of the year and we wish them well. Thank-you to teachers, deputies, grade controllers, executive members and academic heads, for a good year. The admin staff are superb under the leadership of Mrs de Villiers and the finance staff under Mrs Peacock. The ground staff are always willing to do what is needed under Mr Toerien. Thank-you for a good year and may 2012 be even better!

And last but not least, I would like to thank all the Tuckshop mothers, SFC committee, the Italian Rugby committee and all other parents who have contributed to functions and activities at the school. Thank you all for your support!

Good Evening Ladies and Gentlemen. Thank you for attending our 44th Annual General Meeting.

I would like to thank my colleagues in the Governing Body for a year of hard work and honest commitment to the school. The governing body is blessed with members who have a wide variety of important skills that have made it function very effectively this year. Thank you for your commitment and support during my year of chairmanship. Running a governing body is particularly challenging in an environment where the GDE tries to dictate policy and in which the Management of the School has to comply with the requirements of legislation as set out in the South African Schools' Act. We have relied heavily on the guidance of the governing body foundation to give us advice so that the school can be run within the legal parameters of legislation. One particular issue that is concerning is that of admissions As of making this presentation, no government school in Gauteng has been given final permission to admit learners for 2012. We find

this frustrating as I am sure parents want to know where they stand and, in addition, the School requires this information for future planning for 2012.

The unity of good academic staff and our continuous intake of talented new staff, has enabled the school to keep up its academic standards and to achieve good Maric results. The Matric results at the end of 2011 were excellent and we expect this, even with having to adapt to all difficulties that come up, to continue to show successful results in the years to come.

The School has been run well financially over the year, however, like all schools across the country, we face the rising costs of electricity and water and the frustrating problem of trying to get the Municipality to accurately bill us for our consumption. In addition, we suspect that we do have a water leak but it has been difficult to pinpoint when the meters are not working properly. There is a distinct possibility that in the near future the old galvanized pipes are going to have to be replaced at the schools cost. Our collection of school fees has been very good this year and I would like to thank members of the governing body and members of the school financial department for keeping a close watch on collections. As is in the case with all governing bodies we are concerned about the growing number of exemption applicants which does threaten our income and ability to attract quality teachers and maintain our infrastructure. Because of the age of the school, there is a lot of ongoing maintenance required in order to keep the school looking respectable.

Obviously we do face an increase in school fees for 2012, driven mainly by the rise in municipal costs. Our other large expenditure is salary but we have slightly reduced the number of staff to try to offset rising costs, however, with limited government support, to run a school of the magnitude of Bryanston, is a costly expense. Parents, I encourage you to continue paying school fees in order to keep up our standards in a country where school standards are rapidly deteriorating.

In March 2012, the new governing body elections for all schools across the country, will take place. I encourage parents to become involved in the administration and management of the school. If you are able to offer any skills to this very important committee, please put your name forward.

I have been a member of the governing body for many terms of office and in this time I had the exemptions portfolio. I have enjoyed my term as chairman of the governing body in 2011 and I would like to wish the School everything of the best in the future. I would especially like to thank Jo Sfarnas for her contribution and wish her well as she will also be leaving at the end of the year due to her daughter finishing Matric. She was also responsible for providing wonderful eats at each meeting which I am sure will be greatly missed.

In conclusion, I would like to thank Mr Robinson, the teaching staff, the administration staff and the grounds staff for their commitment and contribution towards running an efficient and effective school.


Fundraising in today's climate is a very difficult process. The Debs and Squires programme sets target to qualify for the dance and a lot of effort goes into raising the money


In a novel of one girl's life, I learned how earth-shattering her pain and loss could be, and also how happy she truly could be.


