Bee education for children

New education program puts a buzz in student learning

Classrooms across Australia will be abuzz with bee learnings, thanks to a new online education hub dedicated to inspiring children to understand the vital role bees and other insects play in the environment and food production.

The new Centre for Bee Education is a collaboration between Wheen Bee Foundation and Bee School by Beechworth Honey, and provides a wealth of learning resources and tools ready to roll out into the classroom.

Wheen Bee Foundation CEO Fiona Chambers says it is critical that children understand the importance of bees, and the new Centre builds on the passion for insects that many children already have.

"Kids are fascinated by bugs," Ms Chambers said. "At our live hive demonstrations, we have seen how much children already know about bees and how excited they are to learn more.

"The Centre for Bee Education will broaden their existing knowledge, providing students with a scientific framework to build a deep understanding of bees and pollination."

The collaboration brings together two organisations dedicated to improving community understanding of bees.

Wheen Bee Foundation is Australia's premier not-for-profit organisation dedicated to promoting the importance of bees in food security, biodiversity and ecosystem health, with education for people of all ages at the heart of everything the Foundation does.

Beechworth Honey has a long history educating young people, nurturing their inquisitive minds and developing their passion for bees through the hands-on, interactive Bee School in Victoria's North East.

Beechworth Honey Co-founder and Director Jodie Goldsworthy said creating the interactive Bee School was a natural progression for the business, with a beekeeping tradition spanning four generations.

"As a former teacher I understand the importance of investing in education,"



Ms Goldsworthy said. "It is vital to teach young people about the issues facing bees and the planet so they are more likely to take action when they are older.

"Partnering with the Wheen Bee Foundation was an obvious step to ensure there was one dedicated place for as many people as possible to have access to this information."

Through the Centre for Bee Education, teachers and students can access learning resources, information sheets and lesson plans for hassle-free and engaging learning that fosters a lifelong passion for bees.



All Bee Education Learning Kits and resources are linked to the Australian Curriculum and the Victorian Curriculum, making them easy for teachers to integrate into classroom learning.

The beautifully designed high quality learning materials have been developed by the Bee School's staff of dedicated board-registered teachers, including Bee School Lead Teachers Amelia Bourke and Olivia Jacobs. "As teachers who are working in a bee environment every day, we are in a unique position to be able to bring specialised knowledge about bees, pollination, food security and biodiversity into learning environments," Ms Jacobs says.

"We've designed the lessons to cater for a variety of learners and learning styles, with videos, sound clips, andcraft activities for visual, auditory or kinesthetic learners.

"And all the resources required to implement the lessons have been included so educators can focus on imparting knowledge and bringing the learning kits to life."

Each Bee Education Learning Kit includes lesson plans for a unit of work, with resources that enhance the classroom experience, whether it's books, videos, bee-themed accessories, cards or seeds to plant a pollinator friendly garden.

Each unit has versions designed for specific age groups – Kinder to Level 2, Levels 3–4 and Levels 5–6.

The first unit is Planting for Bees and looks at the relationship between honey bees and their environment.

At the edge of the Grampians Gariwerd National Park on Djab Wurrung and Jardwadjai Country, Marj Light and her partner Dave have made their home on the northern slopes of a 40 hectare recovering bush block.

It's a haven for native plants and wildlife, with ancient red gums, grassy woodlands, orchids, lilies and Diamond Firetails.

It's also been protected by Trust for Nature, which means this precious jewel of habitat can never, ever, be destroyed. Such enduring protection was an easy choice for Marj who, like you, understands what's at stake:

Upgrade works to begin on Birregurra water supply system

Barwon Water will begin work this month to upgrade Birregurra's water supply.

The upgrade will see the town's ageing local water treatment plant, open supply channel and storage basins replaced with a 19-kilometre underground pipeline from Colac.

Barwon Water General Manager Planning, Delivery and Environment Seamus Butcher said "We have enjoyed working with the Birregurra community to save water through the Birregurra Sustainable Communities - Water project and there are significant water savings to be gained by connecting the town to Colac's water supply."

At present, Birregurra's water is sourced from the open Wurdee Boluc and Birregurra channels and is stored in open basins prior to treatment.

The treatment plant has reached the end of its operational life and Barwon Water analysis has shown that the best approach to managing the town's supply from a water quality, cost and environmental perspective is to connect Birregurra to Colac's supply via the 19-kilometre pipeline.

"As this new water supply option is already treated at the Colac Water Treatment Plant, it alleviates the need to treat it at the old Birregurra plant, significantly reducing electricity usage, in turn reducing carbon emissions and electricity costs."

Mr. Butcher said the supply upgrade would also save water by reducing losses from evaporation from the Birregurra storage basins, particularly during summer, and through other system efficiency improvements.

Whale season is back - and so are some rules

Attention all boaters – Victoria's whale season is back

Whales are expected to return to Victoria's south-east coastal waters in the coming weeks.

After spending their summer feeding in the sub-Antarctic waters, the whales return each year from May to October to birth and raise their young. They are the only whale species to calve in Victorian waters.

During this time, a vessel exclusion zone is in place around Warrnambool's Logans Beach to protect whales and allow them space to nurse and rest.

Bird or animal nesting boxes are available from The Men's Shed. These can be made to order. Call in on any Wednesday to have a chat. Boat operators are reminded to avoid the area when the vessel exclusion zone comes into effect on June 1. It will remain in place until 31 October.

The Conservation Regulator enforces the exclusion zone, which prevents all powered watercraft, including boats and jet skis, from entering the area between Gaul's Cave and Point Richie.

The fine for entering the Logans Beach Exclusion Zone is \$3,698.

Southern Right Whales are listed as endangered in Victoria, with the southeastern Australian population estimated to be around 300 individuals.

Every boater can help protect the species by following 3 steps:

WATCH OUT FOR WHALES: Stay alert, Southern Right Whales can be difficult to spot. These whales have no dorsal fin, so they can look like floating logs as they rest near the surface, sometimes in shallow water close to shore.

SLOW DOWN TO 5 KNOTS: Within 300m of a whale you must slow to 5 knots. It's best to travel at speeds less than 10 knots when within 1km of whales to keep vessel noise low. Mothers and calves need rest and communicate in whispers.

KEEP A SAFE DISTANCE: Do not go within 200m of a whale in a boat, 300m on a jet ski (legal requirement). Stay out of their way and avoid boxing them in.

If you find yourself too close to a whale, put your engine in neutral and let them pass.

The community is encouraged to help in whale conservation efforts by uploading any photographs and sightings of the visiting whales to the app, WhaleFace. If photographers choose to use a drone to take pictures, they must not fly within 500m of the whale.

The information collected will help future research and provide updates on the whales during breeding season.

Anyone who sees vessels within the exclusion zone or breaching minimum distances can report the incident to Crime Stoppers Victoria on 1800 333 000. Details such as date, time, and location of the incident, as well as a description and photographs, can assist investigations.

Colleen White, DEECA Regional Director, Barwon South West says

"Logans Beach is the only established nursery in south-east Australia where female Southern Right Whales regularly return to nurse and feed their calves. It is essential we abide by the exclusion zones and give them space.

HARDING STREET

William Harding (1814-1884), brother of Elizabeth Austin, held the Mount Hesse No. 1 pastoral run nearby,

and was responsible for the erection of one of the first large wool sheds in the district, which was built for the purpose of contract shearing in 1851.

Habitat loss is one of the greatest threats to bees and other pollinators, with increasing urbanisation, along with severe bushfires and floods, reducing critical areas where bees forage and breed.

Now a new tree grants program is helping reverse this loss, providing small community groups across Australia with the opportunity to make a big difference for bees.

The Trees for Bees Community Tree Grants program is offering grants of up to \$500 to community organisations, schools, sporting clubs, gardening clubs and environmental groups to plant pollinator-friendly trees and shrubs in their local area.

The Climate Report

Judy Cameron

This is from Bill McKibben, leader of the climate campaign group '350.org' on May 17, 2023.

Something very troubling is happening on and under the 70 percent of the planet's surface covered by salt water. We pay far more attention to the air temperature, because we can feel it (and there's lots to pay attention to, with record temps across the globe. But the truly scary numbers are showing up in the ocean.

That's the averaged surface temperature of the earth's oceans, and beginning in mid-March it was suddenly very much hotter than we've measured before. In big datasets for big phenomena, change should be small that's how statistics work. But a big wide open gap between 2023 and the next hottest year (2016) is the kind of thing that freaks scientists out because they're not quite sure what it means. Except trouble.



A little-noticed recent study (by Mercator Ocean International - read here: https:// essd.copernicus.org/

articles/15/1675/2023/) found that "over the past 15 years, the Earth has accumulated almost as much heat as it did in the previous 45 years," and that 89 percent of that heat has ended up in the seas. That would be terrifying on its own, but coming right now it's even scarier. That's because, after six years dipping in and out of La Nina cooling cycles, the earth seems about to enter a strong El Nino phase, with hot water in the Pacific. El Nino heat on top of already record warm oceans will equal—well, havoc, but of exactly what variety can't be predicted.

And the 'can't be predicted' part is the real problem. Remember, people, this is an experiment we haven't run before, and the test tube we're using is the whole planet. Lots of things will happen: maybe the Beaufort Gyre will release a whole lot of freshwater into the north Atlantic, further disrupting the already weakened Gulf Stream. Or maybe there will be more drought forcing farmers to abandon wheat crops at a record rate. Or ocean oxygen levels will keep falling, putting pressure on lots of species (except jellyfish).

We better be prepared to give one last vigorous push for clean energy projects. More on that next week!

COVID-19 Weekly Data

There were 9,316 COVID-19 cases reported in Victoria this week, an increase of 24 per cent on the previous week. The average daily number of new cases this week was 1,331, up from 1,085 last week.

The total number of reported COVIDrelated deaths in Victoria since the pandemic began is 7,720.

Steps to protect yourself and others Protecting yourself from getting infected is

the best way to protect yourself and the community. If you don't get Covid, you can't spread Covid.

These six steps can help you stay ahead of Covid:

- Wear a mask: a high-quality and well-fitted mask can protect you and others from the virus.
- Get your 2023 booster: new bivalent vaccines targeting Omicron variants are available at your GP or local pharmacy. To find out if you're eligible for your next booster, visit the Coronavirus website. Flu vaccines are also now available.
- Let fresh air in: open windows and doors when you can – it reduces the

spread of the virus.

- Get tested: if you have symptoms, take a rapid antigen test.
- Stay at home: if you have Covid, you should stay at home for at least five days and until you have no symptoms.
- Talk to your doctor: if you are at risk of falling very sick, you may be eligible for Covid and influenza medicines

 and early testing and diagnosis are important. With expanded criteria, more people are now eligible for COVID medicines.

2023 boosters

Eligible Victorians who have not had a Covid vaccination or confirmed infection in the past six months can now receive their 2023 booster. This is irrespective of how many prior doses a person has received. Vaccination continues to provide the best protection against becoming severely unwell or dying from Covid.

For those not infected or vaccinated in the past six months, a 2023 booster is recommended for:

All adults aged 65 years and over

Adults 18-64 years who have medical comorbidities or disability with significant or complex health needs.

For those not infected or vaccinated in the past six months, a 2023 booster should be considered for:

Adults 18-64 with no risk factors for severe Covid

Children and adolescents aged 5-17 who have medical comorbidities or disability with significant or complex health needs.

Victorians are encouraged to book a free booster appointment through their local GP or pharmacy. You can find your nearest vaccination provider through the Health Direct Service Finder.

RATs available through local councils All Victorians are eligible to pick up two free packets of rapid antigen tests (RATs) through their local council.

The council RAT distribution program is currently operating across more than 400 local sites, such as libraries and council customer service centres. The program is open to all Victorians, with all eligibility requirements now removed.
