Subsidy for bus hire available for 2 years from September 2025

Surf Coast Shire

Eligible community groups and organisations in the Surf Coast Shire can apply for subsidised commercial bus hire fees from 1 September 2025, after the Shire ceases operating the current community buses.

From health and wellbeing outings to educational excursions, Surf Coast Shire Council will subsidise bus hire fees for eligible groups and activities.

"This new subsidy offers community groups an option to hire a bus following Council's decision to transition from its current fleet to increase safety and the variety of vehicles groups can access," Cr Tony Phelps said.

Eligible priority groups – such as older people and people with a disability – will receive a 100% subsidy for each booking, up to a maximum \$1,500 each financial year.

Other community groups – including sports clubs and schools – are eligible for a subsidy of 50% towards the value of each booking, with a maximum \$250 per claim and totalling a maximum \$750 each financial year.

The subsidy will be in place until 30 June 2027. It can be accessed via bookings with approved regional transport providers: Wave Rider, Coastal Chauffers, Hutchinson Buslines Birregurra, MyBus Geelong, Murrell Group and Surf Coast Transfers.

"After eligible groups and organisations have booked and paid through their chosen transport provider, the group/organisation can request a refund from Council for the amount," Cr Phelps said.

"The shire has numerous not-for-profit groups, committees and organisations which arrange much-valued outings that deliver wide-ranging benefits, including community connection. I'm pleased Council can play a role in supporting them."

The Movie Club has been running out of the Globe Theatre for 8 years. Before the white ants decided the floorboards made a good lunch and the hall was closed for 18 months, a Globe Theatre Hall committee managed everything. As a user group, we loved working with the locals on that committee, especially when we, the Movie Club committee were needing equipment from the shire for the Movie Club. We are working with the Surf Coast Shire again to upgrade this equipment after 8 years. Times change and administration is now from Torquay but when things are not working, we are able to contact the shire through a simple phone call or a CRM. An example recently is the heater in the supper room. Quickly attended too.

The Movie club is membership based but open to everyone over 18. This ensures we roughly know our income for the year instead of having a nightly fee and not knowing if people will come while still having overheads of hall hire (\$100), royalties, movie and supper fees. We joined the Federation of Victorian Film Society so pay only \$82.50 per session royalties instead of what could be over \$200 per session for permission to show the movie. This allows us to keep the membership fees down. We have not changed them (yet) for 8 years.

Membership is

- Annual full fee for 10 sessions \$70 (\$65 with Health Card)
- Seasonal Fee of 5 sessions \$40 (\$35 with Health Card)

Membership includes supper.

Movies are set for the year.

Winchelsea – Home to the Platypus

Platypus are lovable creatures that are an important part of our town. They are a treat when sighted in the Barwon River and are often seen near the bottom pub, just after 9 am. My daughters have seen one in the river, not long after 5 pm up past the train bridge. There is one thing, I think, all Winchelseans can agree on, we love our Platypus. So I thought I would do a little research into these beloved semi aquatic egg laying mammals. Raising our knowledge of how we can care for our precious Barwon River and Platypus is important in ensuring they remain in our town.

What makes the Barwon River in Winchelsea friendly to Platypus?

Platypus live in rivers with native vegetation; gums, wattles and native grasses on the banks. They build their burrows in the gently sloping banks of the river, and rest and hide in the shade of the overhanging trees. Nesting burrow lengths have been found to be up to 10 m long. Platypus eat aquatic insects and other small aquatic prey like yabbies, so it is important to avoid fishing nets and yabby traps in the river.

Will platypus survive urban development in Winchelsea? Platypus are sensitive to urban development. As we build our

Platypus are sensitive to urban development. As we build our homes and other developments in Winchelsea, we need to be mindful of the impacts of large roofs and hard surfaces like roads and carparks that collect stormwater. Urban town's rivers banks are eroded by the large increase in stormwater dumped into the river, causing cavernous river sides. If possible, it is better to direct stormwater from roofs into rain tanks, to be used in the house and garden. Choose a tank size which collects most of the runoff and therefore only a small amount goes to the overflow outlet, to the river.

Driveway runoff is better directed into gardens/wetlands via swales than into stormwater drains. Stormwater pipes get directed to the river and can erode the river banks, and could destroy the platypus habitat. Therefore it is important to ensure that, as development increases in Winchelsea, stormwater dumped directly into storm water pipes and then into the Barwon River, is limited.

There are Water Sensitive Urban Design modelling tools to reduce the impact of urban development on local rivers. Although there is no proof our Platypus will survive the development of the suggested extra 10,000 people that Surf Coast council are projecting.

What can we do to help our platypus survive?

It is up to everyone to help protect our river, through thoughtful developments. Small urban footprints with smaller efficient buildings, plenty of greenspaces and limited hard surfaces like roads, driveways and concrete courtyards, will produce less amounts of stormwater collected into stormwater pipes and will therefore impact our river less.

Also, you can help restore native vegetation along the river which will support the platypus habitat with our Winchelsea Land and River Care Group. (HOW DO WE FIND THEM?)

Art and Country event held in Winchelsea

Jess Butler, Surfcoast for Reconciliation

On Sunday 17th of August a group of locals gathered on Gulidjan Country at the Shire Hall to listen to stories of Art and Country told by three Surfcoast artists. The event was hosted by Surf Coast for Reconciliation.

Winchelsea Shire Hall was transformed into a yarning circle, where our community could sit to listen and reflect on the stories that were being told. Artworks from each artist also featured prominently and helped to create a further sense of connection with what was being shared.

First to speak was **Dr Jenny Murray-Jones**, a Yorta Yorta, Baraparapa and Wiradjuri artist who lives on Wadawurrung Country in Winchelsea. Much of Jenny's art is based around the experiences of her family, including the painful realities of the Stolen Generation and other policies that promoted racism and discrimination.

Jenny shared generously with a rawness and honesty that invited us to consider our shared histories and how we can hold and make space for the painful realities of the past. Her sharing around country included the ways a number of her family members had been forcibly removed and separated from country, family and culture.

Jenny explained that much of her creation process has been an exploration of this separation and led her to spend periods of time in the various places her family members had lived reflecting on their stories and lives. Jenny's experiences of these places have deeply informed and inspired the creation of her paintings.

While much of what Jenny shared was moving and difficult, her warmth, humour and resilience shone throughout the conversation drawing us all into her stories. Jenny's story challenged concepts of country and family being somehow separated and instead asked us as listeners to consider that family and country are deeply entwined.

Following Jenny, was **Gerard Black** a Worimi man who lives on Gulidjan country. Gerard created the mural at the entrance to Hesse Health entitled "Harmony of Boundaries".

Gerard discussed his deep sense of connection to Country and how this enables the creation of his art. Gerard explained that he does not really see himself as an artist, instead he immerses himself within Country and its stories, and feels he is a conduit for these stories to be told. Gerard's explanation of this process was powerful and moving, particularly in the context of his sharing around growing up in 2 very different worlds and his struggles to find a sense of belonging.

Gerard explained it was through this artistic process that he created the mural "Harmony of Boundaries". This artwork is a representation of the Barwon River here in Winchelsea, embodied with many stories of Wadawurrung and Gulidjan Country including landscapes, animals and the passage of the sun across the river each day as it rises over Wadawurrung Country and sets on Gulidjan Country. The creation process included spending many hours walking the river and even immersing himself within it to feel the stories it held.

Gerard also shared his deep commitment to promoting respect between Aboriginal people and others who have come to call Australia home. This commitment was deeply evident in the way he spoke, inviting us into a shared sense of story and connection to Country.

The third speaker was **Ferne Millen** a Surfcoast based artist who lives on Wadawurrung Country. A number of Ferne's stunning

photographs were on displaying including a beautiful portrait of the late Archie Roach. Ferne discussed her commitment to working with and alongside Aboriginal people and her feelings around connection to Country. Ferne shared bravely around some of the difficulties in this space, including the fact that you don't always get it right and sometimes you mess things up.

Through Ferne's honest discussion of these issues her strong commitment to keep going with this important work was deeply evident and invited us to consider how we can be part of the reconciliation journey, even when this might feel difficult and uncomfortable. Ferne explored her artistic journey in both photography and painting, and how she has been deeply inspired by Country in the creation of her artworks.

It was a true privilege to be able to attend this event and listen to the powerful stories that were shared. In discussions with others afterwards and the space held in the room during the conversation it was evident that many of us were deeply moved and inspired to reflect on how we can connect to and care for Country here in Winchelsea.



Cromwell's Quirks

Gender-Based Taxation?

PART TWO: Retirement comfort determined at birth

Global perspectives

Scandinavian nations such as Sweden and Norway declined to adopted Gender-Based Taxation (GBT), but their combination of high-quality childcare, generous parental leave (with nontransferable quotas for fathers), and individual taxation has lifted women's workforce participation dramatically. Here, structural supports rather than tax differentiation appear to be working well. There is a school of economic thought arguing that simply shifting to individualised taxation could achieve much of what GBT promises, without resorting to gender based solutions. The focus for the Commonwealth of Australia averts from tax differentials, preferring to turn to superannuation reforms. Various governments have proposed co-contributions targeted at low-income earners, (always, disproportionately women), and ensuring superannuation is paid on paid parental leave. While not GBT in name, these policies reflect the same concern: that current systems fail to account for gendered realities of work.

The feminist lens

The debate around gender-based taxation also resonates with a longer feminist tradition. From Mary Wollstonecraft's call in the 18th century for women to be treated as rational beings in their own right, through Simone de Beauvoir's critique of women as "the second sex," to Gloria Steinem's insistence that women do not need to change for men — the thread is clear: inequality persists not because women fail to adapt, but because social, political, and economic structures built for men remain the default. Writers such as Kate Millett, Shulamith Firestone, and Mary Daly pushed this argument further, suggesting that true liberation requires systemic transformation. Firestone, for instance, argued that the family and reproductive structures lock women into economic dependency, while Millett identified patriarchy itself as a political system. Seen through this lens, the tax code is not a neutral instrument but a mirror of the society it serves. What follows, then, is a shift in emphasis: the question is not whether women should adapt to tax

systems designed for uninterrupted, full-time, male-pattern careers. The question is whether tax and superannuation systems should be redesigned to reflect the realities of women's lives. Or, to borrow Steinem's framing: women do not need to change for men; rather, men and the institutions they dominate, need to change for women.

So where does this leave us?

Alesina and Ichino's proposal was never meant to be the final word, but rather a provocation. It forced economists, politicians, and the public to grapple with an uncomfortable tension: should tax policy treat everyone identically, or should it account for real-world differences that make "neutral" systems unfair in practice? The debate is far from settled. For advocates, GBT remains to seem an elegant theoretical solution to labour-market distortions. For opponents, it embodies the risks undermining both equality before the law and the push toward dismantling traditional gender roles. Perhaps the lasting contribution of the GBT debate is not the policy itself, but the space it opened. By asking the seemingly outlandish question, "Should men and women pay different tax rates?", it forces societies to examine why women remain disadvantaged in retirement, why their labour is undervalued, and what governments might do to change that.

Drawing the threads together

For older Australians watching their super balances closely, the question might feel less like a theoretical puzzle and more like an urgent reality. The unfortunate and outrageous truth remains that women retire poorer, despite often working harder both in paid and unpaid roles. The feminist tradition reminds us this is not because women have failed to adapt, but because systems have failed to adapt for them. Taxation may not be the whole solution, but it cannot be argued out of the picture. If fairness in retirement is the goal, then the path forward cannot rest on women changing their lives to fit a system designed for men. Rather, it must vest in reshaping that system so that everyone, gender-regardless, can retire with dignity.



Child safety overhaul

Victorian Government

The Victorian Government will take immediate action to strengthen the Working With Children Check and child safety in early childhood education and care settings with a \$42 million boost to the sector, by:

- Accepting and implementing all 22 recommendations of the independent Rapid Child Safety Review
- Bringing legislation to the next sitting week to allow for the immediate suspension of individual Working with Children Checks (WWCC)
- Establishing a new, nation-leading regulator that will more than double the frequency of compliance checks

- Beefing up the Social Services Regulator (SSR) by bringing the WWCC, the Reportable Conduct Scheme and Child Safe Standards under the one roof by the end of the year, giving it new powers, removing silos and weeding out predators
- Introducing mandatory child safety training and expanding professional support programs, including through changes to the National Law, to build a greater culture of speaking up, and
- Calling on the Federal Government to prioritise quality and safety in the national childcare system.

The work has already started and will continue in the coming weeks and months to restore trust in the sector.

history of winchelsea

Elizabeth Austin, Winchelsea philanthropist, founded the Austin Hospital

This week's article is about Elizabeth Austin's contributions to the Austin Hospital. Next week is about her Geelong homes for women.

Elizabeth Phillips Harding, from Somerset, lived at Mt Hesse station near Winchelsea from its inception until her marriage to Thomas Austin of Barwon Park in 1845. After twenty-six years as Thomas Austin's wife, Elizabeth spent nearly forty at Barwon Park. After a visit from the Duke of Edinburgh in 1867 left them feeling their home was too modest, the Austins began construction on the grand mansion for which Barwon Park is famous today. After Thomas passed away in 1871, then three of their eleven children died young, the other eight having married into pastoral or city families, Elizabeth began a second career, as a philanthropist.

Following the death of a servant from an incurable illness, in 1880 Elizabeth donated £6,000 to establish a hospital for people with long-term conditions. Her example prompted others to donate money and the Austin Hospital for Incurables opened on her birthday in 1882. By 1892, her generosity had also helped establish a children's ward. She continued funding the maintenance and visited the hospital which she called 'my hospital' monthly. Continuing the family connection, three of her granddaughters served on the hospital committee until the 1960s.

Her other principal benefaction was the Austin Homes for Women at South Geelong, built to commemorate Queen Victoria's jubilee in 1887. Mrs Austin also supported the Servants' Training Institute, St Thomas's Church, Winchelsea, the Ladies' Benevolent Society and local charities. By 1892 her name was a household word throughout the colony. She died on 2 September 1910 at Winchelsea and was buried in Geelong cemetery with Anglican rites; the funeral was a civic event. Elizabeth Austin was the most prominent woman philanthropist of her generation and a pioneer of female benefaction in Victoria.

Community input needed for Winchelsea Pool to be at its best

Part 1 of 4 weekly parts: An opinion piece on community involvement in the Winchelsea Swimming Pool project

I believe there is something biologically built into us as human beings that receives deep value on a mental, physical and spiritual level when we connect as a community to share company, work on common goals, and interact across a diverse age (and cultural) range to engage in activities as a collective group. Our indigenous brothers and sisters have known this for thousands of years as have many other cultures (think Greek, Italian, French or even tribes in Africa) who gather together to share meals, important events and social, sport and leisure occasions. The provision of daily or weekly time in 'togetherness' is, quite simply put, good for us! There is countless research out there on the negative effects to one's health and wellbeing of isolation and social withdrawal that could support this notion.

With respect to developing and sustaining strong healthy communities, I also feel that success relies on the people on the ground and the efforts they make. When we work together on unified goals that advance a greater communal objective, we often achieve good outcomes. Acting as a collective with motivation and focused intention provides opportunities to nourish and build healthy connection, relationships and wellbeing.

Over the years, there are countless examples of local communities doing just this. Football and Netball clubs (along with all other sporting clubs at a grass roots level) would not exist if it were not for the people behind the scenes doing all the hidden work building and holding the clubs together. Playgroup and Parents groups, art and music events, book-clubs, men's sheds, surf clubs, senior citizens clubs and more. Their success are all largely attributed to the everyday people who live in the town and group together to make things happen for the benefit of the whole, often on a shoestring budget.



Haidee Benning grew up in Winchelsea during the 70s and 80s riding horses, playing netball and swimming at the local pool. At 18 the pull of the sea called her to the coastal townships of Anglesea, Aireys Inlet and Torquay where she worked for the next 6 years not only in education and childcare but also in healthcare as a Remedial and Sports massage therapist.

During her 20s some of the roles Haidee filled included working at Anglesea and Aireys Inlet Primary school co-ordinating the After School Care programs, and also in Torquay where she co-ordinated the Surfcoast Shire's school holiday programs, various sport and recreation programs, and youth at risk programs throughout the shire. She also did a stint ant H.M. Kininmonth Kindergarten in Winchelsea working with preschoolers.

One of her favourite jobs during her 20s was spending many afternoons a week teaching children swimming at the Torquay Swim School with a fabulous team of staff headed by Olympic swimmer Marjorie McQuade. Haidee still fondly recalls Marjory as an incredible woman, teacher and mentor with an infectious love for teaching swimming that rubbed off on Haidee and has lasted more than 30 years. Swim teaching is a "Love Job", she says. "There's not much money in it, but you don't do it for the money, you do it for the love of it".

Haidee also worked in musculoskeletal medicine in a wide range of settings. For over a decade, she worked at various community health centres (including Hesse rural health in Winchelsea and Beeac and Anglesea community health centre), physiotherapy, chiropractic, and sports medicine clinics as a remedial and sports Having grown up in Winchelsea and been involved in the community there in one way or another for the past 50 years, I know many of these 'pillars' of community service. These key community minded folk become integral to the history of the place they live and work in because of the selfless contributions they make for the good of their town and its various groups, clubs and organisations. They have assisted in forming the very fabric of this town's values, ethos and community spirit (not to mention the example they set to others through their leadership and generosity). My point is, that often the best things about the communities we live in are a result of the people themselves and how they work together sharing a vision to make things happen.

The population is steadily on the rise in Winchelsea. This brings a fresh wave of new inspiration, vision and motivation to the region which has helped lead to diversification and growth in some wonderful projects and offerings that could benefit us all. Community dinners, new use of the Shire Hall for Yoga, Qi Gung, monthly community markets and wellbeing programs, the shareshed, new sport and recreation offerings like Karate and Dance groups, just a few great examples of such initiatives.

I would like to see the revival of the newly rebuilt Winchelsea Swimming Pool become another success story of community led initiative. Currently managed by the Surf Coast Shire (for 2025/6 season), the pools management after that will be handed on to contractors (who will also manage the new Aquatic complex being built in Torquay). I believe that in order for our community to maximise this wonderful new venues full potential, and gain access to it in a way that best serves the region's needs, it will be necessary to call forth that same gathering of community spirit and sense of collective purpose.

massage therapist. She worked with elite athletes, olympians, AFL and national soccer and rugby teams, elite surfers competing on the world surfing circuit, the Victorian springboard diving team, along with everyday people injured at work, senior citizens and many others. She also co-ordinated hydrotherapy and exercise rehab classes at various locations throughout the Geelong and Surfcoast region.

In 1999 Haidee returned to University to study a 5 year double degree in Osteopathic Medicine in Melbourne. Upon completion, she returned to the Winchelsea community to start her family and open the Winchelsea Osteopathic clinic which she ran for over 20 years, and has only just recently handed it on to colleagues.

In 2011, Haidee moved to the South of France with her family where she lived for several years. During this time she studied Ayurvedic Medicine in both France and India. Upon returning from Europe, Haidee incorporated Ayurveda into her practice and divided her time between Winchelsea and Port Fairy running two busy clinics in both locations whilst raising her family. Haidee rekindled her love of teaching swimming in Port Fairy where she has been involved in the local Surf Club and also the fabulous indoor pool, the community run Belfast Aquatics centre.

As a long term Yoga and Qi Gung practitioner she has also recently included the healing art of Zen Thai Shiatsu Therapy to her practice. In 2024 Haidee had another opportunity to travel and she currently divides her time between Phnom Penh in Cambodia, and Winchelsea. When she is back in town, she still works at the local Osteopathic clinic and enjoys re-connecting with the local community, both in Winchelsea, along the Surfcoast and in Port Fairy.





Weekly Garden Tips

Peter Groves

Rosemary is a drought-tolerant shrub with fragrant, evergreen, needle-like leaves and blue flowers (but also can be white, pink, or purple).

It is a great herb in cooking, especially on roast lamb. Plant one or more in sunny parts of your garden. Bees and their pollinating neighbours love it and it flowers in Winter when not much else is available for them.

Water is a vital component to life so providing it for the birds and bees with a shallow bird bath in the garden is important.

Position it away from buildings to catch natural rainfall but not too open and exposed to large predatory birds. Close to trees and shrubs for some shade is good and where birds can sit to survey the area before they bathe.

To prevent bees drowning place a small rock, or something they can land on, in the bowl to drink.

If you want to get a hole in one... then go to the Winchelsea golf course and have lots of fun!!!







As the last round of the Home and Away games finishes and signals Finals for some, for others all sorts of milestones become apparent in different areas within the Club.


AUSKICK
