

When admissions officers read your essay, they should feel like they're sitting across from you, listening to your story. That's why finding your voice is key. Maybe your voice is reflective, pulling meaning out of small moments, or maybe it's lighthearted, weaving humor into your experiences. Either way, it should be unmistakably yours. A polished but authentic voice not only makes your essay stand out, it also makes it resonate long after the reader moves on to the next application.


GETTING AHEAD BEFORE COLLEGE

began at Bowdoin College in Maine, where he contributed significantly to the growth of their Africana Studies program. In 2002, he joined Princeton University, where he has since become a leading voice in the field.



His scholarship focuses on the intersections of race, democracy, and social justice, and he has authored several influential works, including Democracy in Black: How Race Still Enslaves the American Soul.Dr. Glaude has served as the president of the American Academy of Religion, the largest professional organization of scholars of religion in the world. 

Dr. Haidt holds a Ph.D. in Social Psychology from the University of Pennsylvania. His academic journey has been marked by a deep commitment to understanding the moral and psychological foundations of human behavior. Beyond his academic work, Dr. Haidt is a frequent public speaker and commentator. He is also the author of several influential books that bridge psychology, ethics, and cultural studies. His research and writings have shaped conversations on morality, politics, 41 and the challenges of modern society.

LEADERSHIP AND INSTITUTIONAL CONTRIBUTIONS

Dr. Haidt has co-founded several organizations dedicated to advancing ethical leadership and constructive dialogue. One of the most prominent is Heterodox Academy, a nonprofit organization committed to increasing viewpoint diversity and mutual understanding within universities, thereby strengthening the intellectual climate for students and faculty alike. He also co-founded Ethical Systems, a collaborative initiative that applies insights from moral and social psychology to the world of business, helping organizations cultivate stronger ethical cultures and long-term trust. Beyond these ventures, Dr. Haidt has played an active role in advising initiatives that promote civic discourse, reduce polarization, and encourage respectful engagement across differences. Through this work, he has significantly shaped environments that prioritize ethical conduct, open inquiry, and intellectual diversity in both academic and professional contexts.




BEHIND THE SCENES: ADMISSIONS SECRETS
