

This Season's Bouquet



The end of the blooming season is still filled with opportunity. Harvest some of your faded favorites and save the seeds for planting next year. You'll have plenty for next year's garden, with plenty to share. Seeds make great holiday gifts, too.

You'll need something to put each type in to dry out before separating out the seeds. I've found paper kraft lunch bags work well. And they can easily be labeled with a marker.

Some of my easy-growing favorites are: Black-eyed Susan, Purple Coneflower, Cosmos, and Zinnias. Black-eyed Susan and Purple Coneflower are native, and perennials. They'll come back next year. Cosmos and Zinnias can self-seed, but in our Wisconsin climate they are best planted as annuals. They do well in both pots and in flower beds. All of these are popular with bees, butterflies, birds, and other pollinators.









Snip off the faded blooms before the seeds have fallen. Store them in the bags to dry out further if they're not ready for seed pulling. Once they are dry, and the petals come off easily, you can separate out the seeds from the center of the seed head.



You can store or package the seeds any way you like, however, you'll want to make sure they stay cool and dry, and aren't disturbed by sunlight.

I purchased a large quantity of pre-printed seed packets, and then filled in the type of flower, etc. But you can use kraft enevelopes or letter envelopes. If using clear glass jars or containers, be sure to label and store them in a cool, dry, dark place until you're ready to use them.

STEVENS POINT SCULPTURE PARK

Stevens Point Open Daily: Dawn to Dusk

Stevens Point Sculpture Park is a fantastic blend of nature trails and art installations. The park resides on 20 acres of winding woodland trails, via the Brickyard Trail, and connects to the <u>Green Circle Trail</u>, a 27-mile hiking and biking trail that loops through Stevens Point.

The sculptures are as varied as they are many; creations by local, regional, and national artists. The sculptures are placed within the woodlands, each taking residence within the natural surroundings along the trail. Fall colors will frame them out even more.





OLBRICH BOTANICAL GARDENS

Autumn is a great time to visit Olbrich Botanical Gardens. The birch trees are stunning year-round, but incredible in fall. The outdoor gardens are free to roam year-round.

Head into the conservatory to warm up and enjoy tropical blooms. Waterfalls and fountains add to the vibe.

BOBROWITZ SCULPTURE GARDEN

This spectacular six acre outdoor sculpture gallery displays the artworks of local sculpture artist Paul Bobrowitz. Clever, colorful, whimsical, thoughtful, and plentiful. Everywhere you look there is art. And things that will soon be art.

The outdoor gallery is open to the public from sunrise to sunset. Keep in mind, this is not a park, but an art gallery. All pieces are for sale, but visiting is free. There is a sculpture that serves as a donation box, should you be inclined.





A few years back we made our first trip to hike through Hobbs Woods, in Fond du Lac. It was early October, a crisp, colorful fall day. The 60-acre county park includes about three miles of walking trails, through woodlands, over boardwalks, and along Parson's Creek. It's a beautiful, peaceful preserve. Definitely worth the trip.

A little October magic crossed our paths that day. We were met in the parking lot by a friendly black cat. As we made our way onto the trail she followed along. I don't know about you, but I've never gone hiking with a cat before. She was sweet, and a grand hiking companion. She walked along with us the entire way. It was truly enchanting.

Last fall I embarked on a weekend driving tour of Marinette County that featured waterfalls, scenic overlooks, and plenty of turning leaves. It was a lot of driving and wandering, but it was so worth it! All of it was beautiful. The weather, the changing colors, the waterfalls.

I took my trip in early October, when the colors were really beginning to change in Marinette County. To pick the best time to enjoy autumn leaf peeping in Wisconsin, make it a point to check out Travel Wisconsin's online annual **Fall Color Report**. Its a fantastic resource.

Heckrodt Wetland Reserve - Appleton

Enroute to Marinette, I took the opportunity to take a break from the drive and get in a nature walk at Heckrodt Wetland Reserve in Appleton. It was definitely worth the effort. I can see why it's a popular nature spot in the area.

The 91-acre nature preserve features just under three miles of walking trails. A majority of them an easily accessible boardwalk. They wind through the reserves multiple habitats: upland forest, forested wetland, prairie meadow, and marsh. The 4,000 square foot nature center offers a wide array of exhibits that educate on the landscapes and wildlife found in the reserve.

MENOMONEE RIVER PARK - Wausaukee

This 65-acre Menominee County park resides along the scenic Menominee River. Located about 18 miles north of Marinette, it's a great spot to spend an afternoon relaxing by the water. A day-use area, it offers picnic tables, horseshoe pits, fishing, a boat landing, and a rentable open-air pavilion. If you're looking for a peaceful spot for a wander near the river, or to enjoy a picnic lunch, check it out. There is a \$5 day use fee.

The fee can be paid using the self-serve envenlopes on-site, or you can pre-pay online and print out a pass to put on your dash. One pass can be used to access multiple Marinette County Parks in one day. If you reside in the area, a yearly park pass will run \$25.

HWY 141 SCENIC OVERLOOK - Wausaukee

Headed north along Hwy 141, just past Island Lake Road, up the hill, and on the left, is a scenic overlook. In fall, especially, it's worth the stop. Here you'll find a stunning view of some of Marinette County's forest land. There's a sign detailing the logging history of the county through generations come and gone. It's a good spot to stretch your legs and enjoy the view.





DAVE'S FALLS COUNTY PARK - Amberg

There are 15 waterfalls in Marinette County. Dave's Falls is one of the largest, and more notable. It's a spectacular park. A short walk from the parking lot, including a lengthy stairway, leads down to the falls. The walking trails themselves are pretty easy going, but keep watch for the exposed roots and rocks. Plenty of rock formations to climb around, and a footbridge over the Pike River, with stunning views in all directions of the river, the waterfalls, and the trees. A sturdy pair of shoes would be a wise choice.

You'll find a picnic area, children's play area, and pit toilets near the parking lot. Even a designated dog walking area. Winter Use: the park is open for use during winter months, although the parking lot is not always maintained. Restrooms, bridges, and trails are not maintained during the winter months, so plan accordingly.

Entrance Fees: There is a \$5 day use fee. The fee can be paid using the self-serve envelopes on-site, or you can prepay online and print out a pass to put on your dash. One pass can be used to access multiple Marinette County Parks in one day. If you reside in the area, or plan a longer stay, a yearly park pass will run \$25.

GOODMAN COUNTY PARK/STRONG FALLS - Athelstane

Goodman Park is 240 acres of gorgeous located on the Peshtigo River in Marinette County. The park features hiking trails, ski trails, trout fishing, an ATV/UTV trail access spur, campgrounds, and a day use lodge. A highlight of the park is the scenic Strong Falls, which flow through the Peshtigo River.

I was impressed by the lengthy, all-accessible footbridge over the falls, which offers some great views. The landscape here is stunning and impressive, twisting trees sprouting out from among large flat rocks scattered through the falls.



Entrance Fees: There is a \$5 day use fee. The fee can be paid using the self-serve envelopes on-site, or you can prepay online and print out a pass to put on your dash. One pass can be used to access multiple Marinette County Parks in one day. If you reside in the area, or plan a longer stay, a yearly park pass will run \$25.

THUNDER MOUNTAIN OVERLOOK - Crivitz

Located in Western Marinette County, Thunder Mountain Overlook is 160 acres of walking and mountain biking trails that feature stellar views of the surrounding area. Three miles of mowed trails traverse native plants and trees, along varying hilly terrain. Reaching the top of the overlook, the autumn colors in view are vivid and breathtaking.

Rustic restrooms, and picnic areas are located along the trails. A water pump is available.

Pets: dogs are permitted on-leash, and must be cleaned up after

Hours: Open Daily 5am - 10pm, May 1 through end of hunting season. Closed in winter.

HARMONY ARBORETUM & GARDENS - Peshtigo

To say I was impressed with <u>Harmony Arboretum and Gardens</u>, in Peshtigo, is an understatement. On my autumn trip to Marinette County, I took a side trip to visit the arboretum and gardens. I'm so glad I did. At nearly 500 acres, I barely scratched the surface.

Collaboration between the Northern Lights Master Gardeners, Friends of Harmony Farms, Chappee Rapids Audubon Society, and UW-Extension Marinette County manage the gardens, Children's Learning Garden, and Harmony Hardwoods Memorial Forest.

A 17-acre prairie is managed by Land & Water Conservation. Walking trails wander through the prairie among native plants and grasses.

The hardwood forest features walking trails among trees over 150 years old, some remnants/survivors from the Great Peshtigo Fire of 1871. The forest is a popular bird watching spot, and is alive with wildflowers in spring. Guided tours are offered on occasion. The forest, like the gardens, is open to the public.

The <u>Children's Learning Garden</u> is, open to the public, but is also a popular local field trip destination for school groups. The learning garden serves to introduce children to gardening, and to connect them with nature in a multitude of ways.

COPPER CULTURE STATE PARK - Oconto

Copper Culture State Park is a 42-acre Wisconsin State Park, located just west of the city of Oconto. It's an easy access from Hwy 41, and a perfect spot to stop and stretch your legs, get some fresh air, and take in some beautiful scenery and local history. If you're on a road trip through the area, add a visit to this park to your itinerary.

There are four walking trails through prairie, woodlands, and along the Oconto River. It also connects to an accessible paved <u>3-mile Copper Culture Trail</u>, via a Hwy-41 underpass. The trail offers both walking, wheelchair access, and biking around the Oconto River, and connecting the state park to the city of Oconto. Pets on-leash are also permitted on this trail.

The site was officially designated a Wisconsin State Park in 1959. It was added to the National Register of Historic Landmarks in 1961. The park building was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1966. Now a museum, the brick building was originally built in 1924, as a home for Charles and Emma Werrebroeck, an immigrant family from Belgium. The museum is open daily, 10am - 4pm, from Memorial Day through Labor Day. Entrance is free, though donations are welcome.









There is ample parking, a modern restroom, and an open air picnic shelter.

Hours: Open Daily 10am - 4pm

Fees: No entrance fee.

No state park sticker is required.

BEAUTY ON THE ESCARPMENT

The Niagara Escarpment, is a wide swath of ancient and natural rock formations that run northeast 230 miles through Wisconsin, beginning in the Southern Kettle Moraine Forest, and up through Door County. It then travels on through Michigan's Upper Peninsula, and extends east, through part of Canada, and all the way to Niagara Falls (yes, that Niagara Falls).

EXPLORING DOOR COUNTY

One of the most popular tourist destinations in Wisconsin is Door County. My first trip to The Door was on a rainy early November weekend in 2022. Though it rained most of the time I was there, I was able to get out and enjoy some of the areas spectacular beauty. I returned again in early June, 2023, to enjoy more of it heading into summer. 
I've made many trips to Horicon over the years, most often to visit Horicon Marsh. On the way to the marsh we often passed signs for Ledge County Park. We finally made the trip to Horicon specifically to visit Ledge County Park, and it was so worth the effort!

The park is 82 acres, and lies along the <u>Niagara Escarpment</u>. This natural rock ledge divides the park into upper and lower areas, and, from the upper ledge, provides stunning views of the not too distant Horicon Marsh. Views of the surrounding area can be seen from both the upper and lower ledges.


The ledges themselves, are amazing rock formations, embellished by incredibly lush trees, plants, and vegetation. I was in awe of the ferns, mosses, and Wild Columbine, that adorned the cavernous rock. On a steamy summer day, a walk among the ledges can offer the comfort of cooler temperatures.

The ledge trails are quite rocky, and a bit tricky at times, so good hiking shoes are a must. The upper-most scenic lookout has its own parking lot, and a new all-accessible boardwalk and deck for taking in the view. Three other <u>hiking trails</u> make their way through woodlands, and circle back to the campground area.









The park offers picnic sites, and 45 camp sites, with nearby showers. Both 30 amp, and non-electric sites are available. Grills, shelters, and picnic tables are available. There are pit toilets along some of the trails. A playground is available on the lower level, and volleyball facilities on the upper level.







Ellis cannot bear the guilt and eventually leaves her husband and sons behind. Fearing she is not a good mother, and that they would be better off without her, she embarks on a trek through the wilderness of the country, avoiding making lasting connections with anyone.

Raven is a young girl growing up in a remote part of Washington, home schooled by her mysterious, over protective mother. She yearns for connection to other kids her age, to experience more of the everyday world, instead of her isolated life. Will she be able to convince her mother to give her that chance?

It's been a while since I couldn't put a book down. This story drew me in and kept me there. All the elements I love in a story were represented. Interesting lead characters, a bit of mystery, connections to nature, a pinch of magic, and love. A story of healing and redemption, forgiveness and hope.


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
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
