The giant American flag, visible to everyone driving along US Highway 90 and crossing the Pascagoula River Bridge, has been a familiar sight for years. It has been a part of the local shipyards through different owners, from HAM Marine to Colle Towing, and now Signet Maritime.

The Flag and Its Care

Dale Cortez is responsible for the flag, which requires a team of three to properly raise and maintain. The flag is enormous, measuring 22 feet by 37 feet. The team monitors federal websites and receives daily emails to determine when the flag should be at full or half-staff. The flag is taken down if winds are consistently above 15 miles per hour or if severe weather is impending. "People notice the flag," says Ben Shoenberger, Senior Manager of Operations. "We get calls all the time asking why the flag is at half-mast."

Significance of the Flag

Hans Schmidt, President of Signet Shipbuilding and Repair, emphasizes the importance of the U.S. flag to Signet. "The Snyder family considers flags at each of its five locations as our calling card," he says. "You'll notice we don't have a sign out front. The flag is our sign."

Signet's Heritage and Operations

Signet Maritime Corporation, a diverse international marine transportation and logistics services company, has a rich history. Founded in 1976 as Bulkfleet Marine Corporation by J. Barry Snyder, it designed, constructed, and operated the first 30,000 deadweight ton heavy-fuel 8,000 horsepower tug/barge units. Bulkfleet later expanded its operations, engaging in bulk petroleum distribution, inland towing, rig and energy support, and ship management.

In 1984, Bulkfleet consolidated into Signet Maritime, expanding into ocean towing and intermodal services. That same year, Signet purchased Ocean Transportation Services from Foss Maritime, enhancing its break-bulk and project cargo capabilities. The merger allowed Signet to focus on its core maritime technology competencies.

In 1999, Signet acquired the Gulf of Mexico to South America shipping business from Sea Freight Companies, enabling it to move project cargoes and break-bulk materials worldwide. The purchase of Garrett Marine, Inc. in 2003 increased Signet's presence in Ingleside/Aransas Pass with three additional tugs.

Expansion and Community Engagement

In June 2010, Signet acquired Colle Towing Company, Inc. in Pascagoula, Mississippi. This acquisition included a full-service shipyard, now known as Signet Shipbuilding & Repair, which specializes in construction and general shipbuilding overhauls. Currently, 150 personnel are employed at the Pascagoula shipyard, where the company focuses on hiring locally and uses only American-made parts and components for their projects.

Signet services more than 700 dockings annually in Pascagoula, including operations with LNG, Chevron, Bollinger, the Port of Pascagoula, and Huntington-Ingalls Shipbuilding. The Signet Reliance and the Signet Resolute also provide firefighting capabilities to the port and regularly train with the Pascagoula Fire Department using an on-site ship simulator. Looking ahead, Shoenberger mentions that Signet is prepared for future Panamax expansion opportunities at the Port of Pascagoula.

Our Lodge is proud to recognize this patriotic business and community partner for their efforts in ensuring our nation's flag is honored and respected. The presentation was made on Wednesday, May 29, 2024.

George Jackson Haines, Jr




Initiated October 30, 1980 Died April 8, 2024

Welcome Home Kits Assist Newly Homed Veterans With Household Items

The Pascagoula Elks Lodge 1120 has partnered with the Veterans Administration and US Department of Housing and Urban Development to participate in "Homeless to Home Bound", a program that places homeless US Military Veterans into housing. The Lodge applied for and received a \$2,000 Spotlight Grant awarded by the Elks National Foundation to purchase Welcome Home Kits as starer packages to provide the program's participants with basic household necessities to make them comfortable in their new homes.

"[the grant] was used to purchase items from our list such as pots and pans, knives sets, and etcetera," said Olson as he described the Elks' involvement. The Lodge purchased ten sets of each item on the list for which the organization was responsible, which included kitchen rugs, beside tables, tv trays and more.

Leslie Flynn, RN, Case Manager with the Veterans Administration Biloxi offices, explained that many participants in this program have very low incomes and that this donation, "goes a long way in fulfilling in the gaps in their needs. Flynn, along with Veterans Administration personnel Chip Lechner and Joe Devlin received the items from the Lodge on Tuesday, March 26, 2024.

The House Committee occasionally will hold a 'work day' to gather member effort and complete tasks effectively. Elks Lodge 1120 has one of the busiest and fresh Lodge calendars in the State of Mississippi, if not the entire nation. There's always somewhere to volunteer any free time available throughout the calendar year.

So, can you help us in any of the following areas?

Grounds Maintenance

Cutting grass, weed pulling, weed trimming, gutter cleaning, flowerbeds, leaf and debris removal, repainting parking lines, repairing parking signs or the gate on the west side of the building.

We have plans for two major projects in the RV parking. We have selected new RV power pedestals to be installed, along

with new water spigots to accommodate the four parking slots. Each pedestal will have two 30amp and two 50amp outlets and water spigots. They can also be removed easily for storm preparation. These run about \$1600 per pedestal, and we are in need of donations for these items. If you wish to donate towards this, please see me.

Additionally, lighting in parking lot on the south side of Krebs Ave desperately needs improvement. Again, funding is an issue, and we want to raise \$3500 to provide at least two poles and lights. This will provide a safer and more secure parking area and to allow for outdoor night events in this areas well, such as Trunk or Treat.

Interior and Exterior Building Maintenance

Painting, carpentry, electrical, plumbing, tile and flooring, doors, HVAC. The doors to our lounge and heritage hall could user automatic closers. The hanging ceiling tiles in the main hall need to be aligned and reset in spots.

Event Management

Calendaring, contracts, event monitoring, lodge event cleanup. We need help manning the beverage window during public events to restrict access to the Lounge to members only.

Social quarters, Bathroom, and Grand Hall repairs and upgrades. Sweeping and cleaning around the building, including the roof gutters.

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Gardening Tricks and Tips for the Summertime in Mississippi

- Drought-Resistant Species: Incorporate droughtresistant plants like lantana, rosemary, and succulents. These plants require less water and can survive periods of low rainfall.
- Planting Times: Plant heat-sensitive vegetables, such as tomatoes and cucumbers, in early spring to ensure they mature before the hottest months. Transition to heat-loving crops like eggplants and hot peppers as summer progresses.

Coreopsis Tinctoria {Plains coreopsis}

is an annual herb that has been used in traditional medicine for centuries in North America, Europe, and Asia. It is used to



treat a variety of disorders, including: Diarrhea, internal pain, bleeding, sexual infection, dysentery, red-eye swelling, hypertension, palpitation, gastrointestinal discomfort, and loss of appetite.

Echinacea {Echinacea purpurea}

Echinacea, commonly known as purple coneflower, is a vi-



brant perennial that thrives in Mississippi's summer heat. This plant is well-known for its immune -boosting properties. Native Americans traditionally used Echinacea to treat wounds and infec-

tions, and it continues to be popular in herbal medicine today. The roots, flowers, and leaves can be used to make teas, tinctures, and capsules aimed at enhancing the immune system, reducing the severity of colds, and speeding up recovery from illnesses.

Black-eyed Susan {Rudbeckia Hirta}



Has been used for medicinal purposes by native Americans for centuries The roots are used to make tea that can treat colds, worms, sores, snake bites, and swelling. The juice from the roots

can treat ear aches. Other uses include:

- Digestion: The Menominee and Potawatomi people used it as a diuretic.
- Heart issues: Root teas can treat heart issues.
- Immunity: Some say the roots can boost immunity and fight colds, flu, and infections.

Soil Preparation and Mulching

- Soil Quality: Mississippi soil can vary from sandy to clayey. Improve soil structure by adding organic matter such as compost or well-rotted manure. This enhances water retention and nutrient availability.
- Mulching: Apply a thick layer of mulch around plants to conserve moisture, reduce soil temperature, and suppress weeds. Organic mulches, such as straw, pine needles, or shredded bark, are effective and decompose to enrich the soil over time.



Weed Control: Weeds compete for water and nutrients.
 Mulching helps, but regular weeding is essential. Consider using landscape fabric in garden beds to further reduce weed growth.

Watering Techniques


- Deep Watering: Water deeply and less frequently to encourage deep root growth. This makes plants more resilient during dry spells. Aim for about 1-1.5 inches of water per week, delivered in a single session if possible.

Pest and Disease Management

 Integrated Pest Management (IPM): Use a combination of methods to control pests. Encourage beneficial insects like ladybugs and lacewings, and use organic pesticides as a last resort.





3. **Healthy Plants**: Healthy plants are less susceptible to pests and diseases. Ensure proper spacing for air circulation, adequate watering, and appropriate fertilization.

Unraveling the Tapestry of Flag Day: From Patriotic Observance to Legal Recognition

Since its inception as a national holiday in 1916, Flag Day has held a significant place in American culture, serving as a testament to patriotism and national unity. Observed annually on June 14th, it commemorates the adoption of the Stars and Stripes as the official flag of the United States in 1777. However, the journey of Flag Day from a grassroots celebration to a federally recognized holiday is a tale woven with the threads of history, activism, and the enduring spirit of American identity.

The Origins of the US Flag and the Betsy Ross Connection

On June 14, 1777, the Continental Congress passed a resolution defining the design of the national flag, featuring thirteen alternating red and white stripes representing the original thirteen colonies, and a blue field adorned with thirteen white stars forming a new constellation. This symbolic representation of unity amidst diversity became the cornerstone of American identity.

The story of the American flag's origins has been intertwined with the legend of Betsy Ross, a Philadelphia seamstress, for centuries. According to popular belief, Ross was commissioned by George Washington to create the first American flag, featuring thirteen stars and stripes representing the original colonies. However, historical evidence surrounding Ross's involvement in the

flag's creation is sparse, and scholars have cast doubt on the veracity of the story. While Ross may have been a skilled seamstress who produced flags for the Revolutionary cause, there is no conclusive proof that she designed the first American flag.

Despite the uncertainty surrounding Betsy Ross's involvement, her name has become synonymous with the American flag, perpetuating a narrative that has endured for genera-



tions. Instead, the design of the American flag is commonly attributed to Francis Hopkinson, a signer of the Declaration of Independence and a talented artist. Hopkinson's contributions to early American iconography, including the design of the Great Seal of the United States, suggest that he played a significant role in crafting the flag's symbolism. According to an interpretation attributed to George Washington, "We take the stars from heaven, the red from our mother country, separating it by white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes shall go down to posterity, representing our liberty."

Regardless of its origins, the American flag has evolved, with the arrangement of stars standardized in 1912 and subsequent adjustments made to reflect the addition of new states. The current 50 star design of the flag became official on July 4, 1960 — its design was the result of a high school American history

project by Bob Heft, a junior at Lancaster High School, Lancaster, Ohio Bob was awarded a grade of B for his efforts. His teacher later changed the grade to an A when the United States Congress adopted the design two years later.

Early Observances

While the adoption of the flag was a pivotal moment in American history, formal observances of Flag Day did not emerge until much later. The first recorded celebration occurred in 1861 in Hartford, Connecticut, at the suggestion of George Morris, but it failed to gain widespread recognition. It wasn't until the late 1800s that schools across the nation began incorporating Flag Day into their curricula as a means of fostering patriotism among immigrant children.

One of the most notable proponents of Flag Day was Bernard J. Cigrand, a schoolteacher at Stony Hill School, in Waubeka, Wisconsin, often hailed as the "Father of Flag Day." Cigrand tirelessly advocated for the establishment of a national holiday to honor the flag, organizing events and delivering speeches across the country.



Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks: A Stalwart Champion

The road to official recognition of Flag Day was long and arduous. Efforts by individuals like Cigrand, as well as organizations such as the American Flag Day Association and the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks (BPOE), played crucial roles in popularizing the holiday. Establishing its recognition of the flag in



1907, the BPOE designated June 14th as Flag Day, making it mandatory for all lodges to observe the occasion.

Woodrow Wilson, the 28th President of the United States, shared a notable association with the Elks as Wilson's presidency coincided with a period of

heightened national consciousness, particularly regarding symbols of American identity such as the flag. During Wilson's tenure, the BPOE played a significant role in advocating for the observance of Flag Day. As a staunch supporter of patriotism and national unity, Wilson was receptive to the Elks' efforts. His recognition of Flag Day in 1916 through a presidential proclamation was a testament to his alignment with the values espoused by the BPOE. He understood the importance of fostering a sense

of pride and allegiance to national symbols, including the American flag.

Calvin Coolidge, the 30th President of the United States, also had a notable connection to Flag Day and the BPOE. Coolidge's presidency followed in the footsteps of Wilson's, and he continued to uphold the traditions and values associated with the Ameri-



can flag. In 1927, Coolidge issued a proclamation reaffirming June 14th as Flag Day, echoing Wilson's earlier recognition of the holiday. Like his predecessor, Coolidge understood the significance of honoring the flag as a symbol of national pride and unity. Coolidge's association with the BPOE mirrored Wilson's, as both presidents recognized the organization's dedication to promoting patriotism and civic engagement. By aligning himself with the Elks' advocacy for Flag Day, Coolidge demonstrated his commitment to preserving American traditions and values.



However, it wasn't until 1949 that Congress passed legislation officially recognizing Flag Day as a national holiday, with President Harry Truman signing it into law. The Elks played a pivotal role in garnering presidential recognition for Flag Day, prompting President Woodrow Wilson to acknowledge their efforts. President Truman, himself a member of the Kansas City Elks Lodge 26, drew inspiration from his lodge, to proclaim Flag Day as a national observance.

Laws Regarding the American Flag

The American flag holds a revered position in the United States, and as such, there are laws and regulations governing its use and

display. These laws, though sometimes controversial, aim to uphold the respect and dignity befitting the nation's most cherished symbol.

One of the most well-known laws regarding the American flag is the United States Flag Code, first established in 1923 and later amended by Congress in 1942. The Flag Code outlines guidelines for the display, handling, and disposal of the



flag, intending to ensure its proper treatment and reverence.

According to the Flag Code, the flag should be displayed from sunrise to sunset, unless properly illuminated at night. 





Revolutionizing Agriculture



Unveiling the Science Behind Aquaponics and Hydroponics

I was first exposed to hydroponics when the family and I took a trip to Disney World. After the usual vacation activities and the family was resting at the hotel, I decided to look for something a little different than rides and restaurants. It turned out Disney offered a behind-the-scenes tour of their hydroponics facility. The tour was amazing. I was hooked on the science behind growing food this way. When we returned home, I started researching hydroponics and how to build a system for myself. It turned out to be easy to build a unit, But the hard part turned out to be in the selection of the proper plants. More on that later. During my research I stumbled into a process called Aquaponics. Which is the process of combining growing vegetables and raising fish together. The following is a summary of my research.

In the ever-evolving landscape of agriculture, two innovative methodologies have emerged as frontrunners in sustainable farming practices: aquaponics and hydroponics. These systems represent a departure from traditional soil-based agriculture, offering a glimpse into the future of food production. But what exactly is the science behind these methods, and how do they work?

Understanding Hydroponics:

Hydroponics, derived from the Greek words "hydro" (water) and "ponos" (labor), is a method of growing plants without soil. Instead, plants are grown in a nutrient-rich water solution, either directly exposing the roots to the solution or using a variety of inert mediums such as perlite This method offers precise control over factors such as nutrient concentration, pH levels, and environmental conditions, optimizing plant growth and yield.

The Science at Work:

Nutrient Absorption: In hydroponic systems, plants absorb nutrients through their roots via a process called osmosis. This process relies on the movement of water and dissolved nutrients across semi-permeable membranes within the plant roots. By carefully managing nutrient solutions, growers can ensure plants receive the ideal balance of nutrients essential for healthy growth.

Oxygenation: Roots require oxygen to function efficiently, facilitating nutrient uptake and supporting overall plant health. Hydroponic systems incorporate techniques such as oxygenation through air pumps or aerated nutrient solutions, ensuring roots remain oxygenated even in water-based environments.

pH Regulation: Maintaining the appropriate pH level is crucial for nutrient availability and uptake. Hydroponic systems enable precise pH control, allowing growers to adjust acidity or alkalinity to suit specific plant requirements. This finetuning ensures optimal nutrient absorption and prevents nutrient deficiencies or toxicities.

Water Conservation: Hydroponic systems typically use significantly less water compared to traditional soil-based farming. By recirculating nutrient solutions and minimizing water wastage, hydroponics offers a sustainable alternative for regions facing water scarcity or drought conditions.

Advantages of Hydroponics:

Year-Round Cultivation: Hydroponic systems can operate indoors or in controlled environments, allowing year-round cultivation regardless of external climate conditions. This flexibility enables consistent crop production and reduces dependence on seasonal variations.

Space Efficiency: With hydroponics, plants can be grown vertically or in compact arrangements, maximizing space utilization. This efficiency is particularly beneficial in urban areas or regions where arable land is limited.

Enhanced Crop Quality: By providing precise control over growing conditions, hydroponics can result in higher-quality produce with improved taste, texture, and nutritional value. This level of control minimizes exposure to pests, diseases, and environmental contaminants, ensuring healthier crops.


Resource Efficiency: Hydroponic systems use fewer resources such as water, fertilizers, and pesticides compared to conventional farming methods. This resource efficiency reduces environmental impact and promotes sustainable agricultural practices.

Aquaponics: Symbiosis in Action

Aquaponics takes the principles of hydroponics a step further by integrating aquaculture into the system. In aquaponic systems, plants and aquatic animals coexist in a symbiotic relationship, where fish waste serves as a nutrient source for plant growth, and plants help purify the water for the fish.

The science behind aquaponics lies in the nitrogen cycle, a natural process that converts ammonia, produced by fish waste and decaying organic matter, into nitrites and then nitrates, which are essential nutrients for plants. Beneficial bacteria present in the system facilitate these conversions, creating a self-sustaining ecosystem where plants thrive on the nutrients generated by fish metabolism.

By harnessing this natural symbiosis, aquaponic systems offer several advantages. They utilize resources efficiently, with fish providing nutrients for plants, and plants filtering the water for fish, resulting in minimal waste and water conservation. Additionally, aquaponics eliminates the need for synthetic fertilizers and promotes organic farming practices.

Comparing the Two Systems

While hydroponics and aquaponics share similarities in their soilless cultivation methods, they differ primarily in the nutrient source. Hydroponics relies on synthetic nutrient solutions, carefully formulated to meet plant requirements, whereas aquaponics utilizes organic nutrients derived from fish waste.

Both systems offer significant advantages over traditional agriculture, including higher yields, faster growth rates, and reduced environmental impact. However, each has its unique considerations and challenges. Hydroponic systems require precise nutrient management and regular monitoring of pH and nutrient levels, while aquaponics necessitates balancing the needs of both plants and fish to maintain a healthy ecosystem.

Pioneering Sustainable Agriculture

Aquaponics and hydroponics represent groundbreaking approaches to sustainable agriculture, leveraging scientific principles to redefine how we grow food. By minimizing resource consumption, reducing waste, and optimizing growing conditions, these systems offer a glimpse into a more resilient and efficient food production system for the future. As we continue to confront global challenges such as climate change and food insecurity, embracing innovative solutions like aquaponics and hydroponics will be vital in building a more sustainable and resilient food system for generations to come.

Building a Hydroponic System

I found commercial made hydroponic systems to be extremely expensive and outside what I wanted to pay to get into the practice. So, Mr. Google and Mr. YouTube became very good friends. It turns out building a unit to house the plants was easy. I used 10-foot sections of 4-inch PVC sewer pipe (new of course) reducers, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch 90-degree fittings and $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch pipe. The length of the pipes and space between them are

dependent on what you want to plant and how far you want to bend and reach.

Using scrap material, I built a rack on a 45-degree angle and attached the PVC pipes. I used Dixie cups as my plant receptacles, drilling holes in the sewer pipes so that the bottom of the Dixie cup stopped in the center of the pipe.

The Dixie cups had to be modified to function as the plant receptacle. I used a small soldering iron to put holes in the bottom ¼ of the cup. This allowed the water to reach the roots of the plants.

I used a 30-gallon tote to hold the water for this system and built a wooden structure to support the sides of the tote. It was too weak to support the weight (250 pounds) of water. To get the water to the plants I ran pipe from a submersible fountain pump to a valve (throttle valve) to the top pipe. At the opposite end of the lower pipe, I ran a pipe back to the tote. Creating a closed loop system.

There are several types of units for hydroponics. For this system I used old rain gutters to channel the water around to the plants. You must connect them, so the water is shared between the gutters and the unit must be at an angle to facilitate water flow. Here I used an old ice chest and hoses to store and route the water. You may also notice the red plastic tray. I had the plants just sitting in the water.

To get the plants to function in the cups you will need a filling material. You can always buy hydroponic fill material, but you may have noticed I am cheap. I used small rocks I picked up at a local creek, washed then in weak bleach solution to kill any fungus or bacteria. This reduces the risk of diseases for the plants.

The plants you put in the cups must have roots established. I started my plants using a 96-cell seed started tray. Once the plants had 2 – 3 leaves I transplanted them to Dixie cups. You fill the cup approximately ¾ full of rocks, remove the plants from the tray keeping the soil with the roots. Place the plant in the center of the cup and use the rocks and soil to support the plant upright. Place the cups in the hydroponic unit. Watch them for the next few days, it takes time for the water to saturate the rocks and the roots to reach the saturated rocks.

Now it's time to get the water ready. Add your water-soluble nutrients to the water, mixing to dissolve. Turn your water on with the throttling valve fully open. Make sure the water is returning to your water source. For three weeks have the water level at ¾ full in the sewer pipes. After the plants have established themselves, you can reduce flow to the height of the holes you put in the Dixie Cups. Just adjust the value to do this.



As the plants mature you can lower the water flow because the roots will go through the holes in the cups and rest on the bottom of the sewer pipes.

Aquaponics System

After the Hydroponic system is created, it is time to incorporate an Aquaponics System. Mark out an area approximately 6-foot x 6-foot for the fish storage tank. I used a 275 gallons food safe IBC tote for my fish tank. Understand, the completed system will weigh approximately 2500 pounds, so you need sufficient support for this if it is not on the ground.

I used a Hydroponic/Aquarium Pond pump to supply wastewater from the fish tank to the mechanical filter and the bio filter then to the supply tank for the plants. The fish create waste material that holds ammonia. Bacteria then break down the ammonia firstly into nitrites and then into nitrates, which the plants use as food. I used a 55-gallon plastic barrel to create a swirl filter for the mechanical filter. It is not hard to build but takes several steps. YouTube has detailed videos on how to build one.

I used a 5-gallon bucket to build a Bio filter, connecting pipes at the top and bottom of the bucket. To create a large surface area I filled the bucket with Scotch Brite material. The beneficial bacteria thrive on the large surface area and easily converted ammonia into nitrites and then into nitrates or nutrients for plants to use.

Lessons Learned

Research your plants. Different plants require different pH levels, and different nutrients needs. You can build multiple smaller units that operate independently in order to maintain different pH levels for the plant varieties in each. Knowing what you are going to grow and making sure they are compatible within the same hydroponic unit is important for success.

Remember, the height/size of the plant. Large plants have large root balls. I had to remove a butternut squash plant because the root ball blocked water flow. You also don't want to grow tomatoes or okra that will grown very large in Dixie Cup. Too, space between levels of the unit may need to be considered if using a stacked rack such as mine. You will want to modify the growing vessel to accommodate those larger root balls or taller plants, or create a more horizontal layout.

For Aguaponics system, make sure the fish used in your tank are acceptable for your area. Most areas will not allow nonnative species of fish in your system. The concern is introducing a species of fish with no predator into your local watershed if there is a flood, or accidental release of your system. So, be sure to check with your local planning department for more information. The local Mississippi State University Extension Office may also be able to assist with what species can be used, and where to obtain them.

Having the greenhouse allows for year round growing conditions with either Hydroponics or Aquaponics. Make sure to watch temperatures in the winter if you have an aquaponic system—plants are not always hardy to low temperatures or freezing if the greenhouse alone doesn't maintain enough heat—and your fish may also freeze to death. Also, make sure you consider the fish in an aquaponics system if you stop growing plants. This may be the time to also harvest the fish and have a nice baked fish with a lemon and white wine sauce, and rice pilaf.

I love my aquaponics system. We had fresh vegetables nearly all year round, though I am having to rebuild following a hail storm that destroyed my greenhouse and caused damage to my units. Also, there's this little issue with previously having a non-native fish species that I am working out. A friend of mine uses wild caught bass in his system, so maybe a fishing trip is in order soon.



Succulent Pork Tenderloin

- •3 pounds Pork Tenderloin
- •Garlic powder
- Onion powder
- Cumin
- Black pepper
- Salt
- Olive oil

- 1. Preheat your oven to 400°F (200°C).

Known affectionately as "Tippy J," she exuded a joyous vibrancy and a precociousness that hinted at the extraordinary path her life would take.

Jada, the eldest of four siblings, is the daughter of Calvin and Amanda Brown and her biological father, William Brown. Her childhood was steeped in the strong values and unwavering faith of her family. Growing up in Columbia, Mississippi, Jada was surrounded by the spiritual guidance of her grandfathers, both pastors and deacons, and her grandmothers and greatgrandmothers, who were also preachers. This rich spiritual heritage profoundly influenced her, instilling in her

a deep sense of purpose and a commitment to service.

From an early age, Jada was an active participant in church activities. She attended Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and was a youth leader on the Praise Dance Team at New Life **Fellowship** Church. Greater Fast Owens Lampton, and Chapel Church in Columbia, Mississippi. Her in-

Jada's academic journey began at Columbia Primary School, where she quickly distinguished herself. Jada's high school years at Gautier High School were a testament to her multifaceted talents and dedication. She was a vibrant presence in the Choir, Color Guard, Cheerleading team, Dance, Theatre, and Band. Remark-



ably, she was the first student to participate in Color Guard, Band, and Dance simultaneously during football season, a feat that highlighted her exceptional time management and commitment. Her academic achievements were equally impressive; she maintained a spot

on the Principal and Honor Roll Lists and was an active member of the Student Council, Key Club, National Honor Society, and the City of Gautier Mayor's Youth Council, where she served as secretary. She attends First Baptist Church Gautier on Wednesday nights, adding to her already full schedule, always having enough time for God.

Despite facing bullying and other challenges, Jada's unyielding spirit and the support of her family and faith helped her overcome these obstacles. She graduated in the

top 20% of her class with High Honors, boasting a 3.78 GPA. Her community service contributions exceeded 500 hours, reflecting her dedication to making a positive impact.



Jada's journey is set to continue at Pearl River Community College, where she will pursue a band scholarship and major in Pre-Law Studies. Her ambition to become a judge is driven by a desire to serve justice and inspire others. Jada's life motto—God, family, and career—encapsulates her priorities and her mission to spread love and inspire through her actions.

From the Lodge Chaplain

When the social group, the Jolly Corks, was formed, it was formed as a social club to circumvent New York's "Blue Laws". After a member of their little group died unexpectantly leaving the family in a dire straight, Charles Algernon Sidney Vivian decided it was time to change the direction and become more charitable and help others. His father was a member of the clergy in the Church of England (or Established Church) so Charles was familiar with the concept of Christian Charity. This leads us to understand why charity is one of the foundational pillars of the Benevolent Protective Order of Elks.

Acts 20:35 (NKJV)

35 "I have shown you in every way, by laboring like this, that you must support the weak. And remember the words of the Lord Jesus, that He said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.'"

The Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks was chartered and established on February 16, 1868, and Charles Algernon Sidney Vivian was elected to lead the organization which through his insight and leadership has grown to be one of the premier charitable organizations in the United States, if not the world. Though Vivian died of typhoid fever at the young age of 37 in 1880, the organizational structure that was put in place under his leadership and others has been proven through the test of time.

2 Corinthians 9:7 (NKJV)

7 So let each one give as he purposes in his heart, not grudgingly or of necessity; for God loves a cheerful giver.

Over the years, charity to the surrounding communities and beyond has been a mission for the Elks. Either through direct giving to those in need locally or through the Elks National Foundation, Elks willingly give of their time and treasure without expectation of being recog-



nized for their charitable hearts. "Elks Care, Elks Share" is not just a motto, it is a way of life.

The Order donated more than \$80,000,000 last year for youth programs, storm relief, veteran's programs, special needs children, homelessness, food banks, and the list goes on. A shining example of the "throbbing heart of Elkdom" is that during WWI, the Elks donated more than \$2 million to establish base hospitals in France. Shortly after, the Elks saw a need to help wounded soldiers and built a 700-bed hospital that was donated later to the War Department to assist the healing of veterans, becoming the forerunner of the VA. BPOE 1120 has been beneficial to the local community through disaster aid (Rolling Fork, Ms.), Christmas food baskets, widow's baskets, scholarships, student recognition, charitable events for those in need, and veteran support, to name a few.

Matthew 6:1-4

6 "Take heed that you do not do your charitable deeds before men, to be seen by them. Otherwise you have no reward from your Father in heaven. 2 Therefore, when you do a charitable deed, do not sound a trumpet before you as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may have glory from men. Assuredly, I say to you, they have their reward. 3 But when you do a charitable deed, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, 4 that your charitable deed may be in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will Himself reward you openly."
