

Volunteer Victor at the heart of Deans Marsh

Victor Goldsztein and his husband Chris bought land and built near Deans Marsh 14 years ago with the partial aim of getting away from it all.

Then he discovered how irresistibly vibrant his new community was and couldn't help but get involved in it all.

Now after years of volunteer service to organisations including the Deans Marsh Community Cottage board, festival, community market, and hall and reserve Community Asset Committee, Victor is being hailed as Surf Coast Shire's latest Local Legend.

His nomination recognises and celebrates his commitment and passion for helping his community to connect and thrive.

"Victor has been an integral part of the Deans Marsh community, volunteering in numerous ways for the best part of a decade," his citation read.

"He has shared his expert skill set generously and thoughtfully, in particular being an active leader for the Deans Marsh Community Festival, markets and recycling initiative.

"Victor has enviable organisational skills and a friendly willingness to undertake anything. His non-judgemental and enthusiastic attitude encourages others to join the ride!"

Victor said he felt slightly embarrassed and very humbled to be acknowledged.

"The reality is I'm one of many in Deans Marsh," he said.

"It is very nice that someone made this recommendation about me, but the community is full of people who do lots."

He said that in establishing a weekender away from Melbourne, he and Chris bought 11 hectares at Pennyroyal 'so that we couldn't see another living soul'.

"But then the first really lovely thing about the experience was the neighbours in our street," he said.

"We just found this amazing connection with people, some full-timers, some weekenders like ourselves."

Something special flourished, but really it was an ad on the local store noticeboard which unlocked his community involvement.

"The community cottage was running a program called Chainsaws for Chicks and I rang them up and said I'm not a chick but I know nothing about chainsaws, would you consider taking a bloke," Victor said.

"The workshop was a great experience. That was on the Saturday, and on the Tuesday they were running a first aid course, so I figured on Saturday I'll learn how to chop my arm off and on Tuesday I'd better learn how to stop excessive blood loss!"

During the first aid course he was effectively recruited onto the community cottage board by the then coordinator. "Turned out I was on the cottage board for three years and it was a great way to meet people in the community and really get a sense of how the community runs," Victor said.

One volunteer role led to another, and with professional skills honed by years in hospitality and event management Victor moved on to the Deans Marsh Festival committee, and spent seven years running the town's popular community market, pre-pandemic.

"I think one of the nicest times I've had in the community is the first market that we ran after the 2020 lockdown," Victor said.

"It wasn't a large market but there was such a buzz from the stallholders and from the community, just being able to be at the oval and be together. It was a special day."

Victor has also helped establish the Deans Marsh Community Action Network, develop a community strategic plan, and played a central role in compiling a Deans Marsh community emergency phone contact list.

After the rigours of the pandemic he has taken a breather from community work during 2023 but has pledged to be back.

"My involvement will continue," he said.

"I don't know, I enjoy it."

The Australasian Centre for Corporate Responsibility (ACCR) issued their Climate Science report this week and it ain't pretty.

There is not a continent on the planet that has not seen record breaking extreme weather in 2023. China set a new national temperature record of 52.2°C; Antarctica saw record low ice levels; record-breaking monsoon rains in South Asia brought deadly floods to north India and Pakistan; a relentless heatwave in the United States put more than 100 million people under excessive-heat advisories; an intense heatwave in southern Europe led to a sharp rise in hospitalisations; smoke from prolonged wildfires in Canada blanketed large parts of two countries; and temperatures soared above 30°C in Argentina and Chile in the middle of winter. July was Earth's hottest week on record, with temperatures once deemed statistically implausible.

While extreme weather comes and goes - and with it the media attention - the underlying changes in climate processes do not. Changes to climate processes like the ocean circulation, El Niño and La Niña, and the jetstreams are irreversible, will drive more extreme weather, and have large consequences for the livability of the planet.

In this short report, ACCR's Climate Scientist, Dimitri Lafleur steps through the big climate related changes we are seeing in the world right now. It is the science that shapes ACCR's engagement with heavy-emitting companies, and the science only strengthens our resolve to drive decarbonisation and the urgent imperative to move the mindsets of all investors. In our engagements with our core companies, ACCR will continue to focus on absolute emissions reductions, and where we see no progress against meeting 2030 targets, we will need your support to hold these companies to account.

2023 is on target to become the hottest year on record, with a slew of extreme weather events across the globe.

Irreversible changes to climate processes like the ocean circulation, El Niño and La Niña, and the jetstreams will drive more extreme weather, and have large consequences for the livability of the planet.

The science points to the critical importance of limiting global warming to 1.5° C above pre-industrial levels.

Ocean overturning circulation

The warming of oceans has been relentless for decades, with some of the most recent observations of reduction of sea-ice extent and extreme ocean temperatures so unprecedented (38.4°C ocean temperature off the coast of Florida) that they are yet to be scientifically explained.

However, the consequences of any single, extreme event are dwarfed by those of the fundamental changes occuring in ocean processes. There is increasing evidence that the global ocean conveyor belt, a constantly moving system of deep ocean water around the globe, is changing in response to climate change. The Southern ocean system (Southern Ocean overturning circulation) around Antarctica has weakened by 40% since 1991 and is forecast to weaken by another 40% by 2050. The Atlantic Ocean system (Atlantic Meridional Overturning Circulation, AMOC) has also weakened over the last century, and is modelled to weaken further, reaching a tipping point around 2050 (95% uncertainty range 2025-2095), which would see a collapse of this system.

The global ocean conveyor belt is weakening due to warming air and ocean temperatures escalating ice melts on Greenland and Antarctica. The melting ice dumps fresh water in the ocean that is less dense than the salty water in the ocean, which makes it harder for that water to sink to the bottom in the Arctic and around Antarctica, slowing down the circulation system.

Ocean circulation is crucial for transporting nutrients, oxygen and carbon flows around the globe, and further weakening of the AMOC could start depleting fisheries within decades. It also plays a critical role in redistributing heat and regulating weather patterns. The weakening of the AMOC may have already brought cooler temperatures to high latitude countries around the Atlantic and influenced the generation of heat waves in Europe. Further weakening could have dramatic global consequences on weather patterns, including, but not limited to, reduced rainfall in Africa's Sahel region, hampering crop production; more winter storms in Europe; and regional sea-level rise around the Atlantic.

The AMOC is now weaker than at any point in the last millennium. Scientists agree it has a tipping point - a threshold where it grinds to a halt, i.e. complete collapse - and that this would be catastrophic, leading to drought, crop failures, storms and rising sea levels impacting billions of people. Less certain, though, is the timing. One recent paper estimated collapse will occur around mid-century under the current scenario of future emissions. [16] Other analysis points to the risk being "far greater than 10% during this century – even rather worrying for the next few decades."

LOCAL SUPPORT FOR VICTORIA'S INCREDIBLE CARERS

The State Government is investing \$900,000 in a grants program to increase local support for the more than 700,000 unpaid carers across the state who selflessly look after loved ones.

The Connecting Carers in the Community grants program provides grants of up to \$40,000 each to reduce the isolation experienced by many carers.

Victoria's carers provide essential and unpaid support to loved ones with care needs. Many carers provide care around the clock, making it difficult for them to access the support they need to look after themselves or connect with others in their community.

The grants program will be administered by Carers Victoria and focus on prioritising support for carers in regional and rural areas.


Carers Victoria is the peak body for Victoria's unpaid carers. It provides advocacy, advice and information to help carers access support services by working closely with the community and the carer support sector.

Applications for the grant program are encouraged from carer support groups, community groups and grassroots organisations that connect with unpaid carers in regional communities, including First Nations, multicultural, LGBTIQ+ and other diverse Victorian carers.

Carer support groups, community organisations, health services, councils, neighbourhood houses and other organisations are eligible to apply.

The grant program is part of the State Government's efforts to support unpaid carers and aligns with the objectives of the Victorian Carer Strategy.



Modewarre Joey Scouts learn all about plastic pollution

1st Modewarre Joey Scouts visit Southern Environment Ocean Link.

Our Joeys have been investigating marine plastic pollution recently. Ahead of a visit to the Southern Ocean Environment Link (SOEL) in Queenscliff, Joey families had been collecting the bottle caps off milk, juice and other containers. These caps have to go into our red landfill bin as they can't be mixed in with our general recycling.

The Joeys know that, in the sea, plastic bags resemble jellyfish which larger sealife will eat, the plastic rings from 6 packs can get stuck around necks, and that microplastics aren't good for fish. Sarah from SOEL got them to think of the cumulative effect of microplastics in the food chain, when 10 little fish which have ingested a little bit of plastic, are eaten by a bigger fish, 10 of which are in turn are eaten by an even bigger fish and then when WE eat that bigger fish, just how much we may be ingesting.

The first step in recycling the plastic tops was to sort them into 3 bins – one for those with number 2 in the recycling triangle, one for number 4s and one for everything else. The 2s are High Density plastics, the 4s are Low Density plastics and the others are of unknown materials.

We then had to wash and dry the lids so we didn't have any food contaminate our plastic. Sarah said we should rinse all our plastic, tins and jars that go into our recycling bin at home, as otherwise the dirty ones won't go through to be recycled.

After washing and drying came the shredding of the lids into pieces of plastic about the size of a Joey's little finger nail. Sarah had tubs of different colours – white, orange, green, blue, yellow and rainbow – and the Joeys could choose what they liked best.

Each Joey decided what they would like to recycle the shredded plastic into – a keyring of a dolphin & a seal, a shark & a turtle, a pen, or a mini spinning top. The moulds are made of heavy metal with a base plate, a mould plate, and a top plate with a centre hole for the plastic to be squeezed into by the machine. Turning up the heat on field crop research

At a time when record temperatures and extreme heatwaves are causing concern globally, the Free Air Temperature Extreme (FATE) facility at Agriculture Victoria's Horsham SmartFarm will provide vital information on the impact of climate change on field crops.

Agriculture Victoria Research Leader of Crop Agronomy Dr Glenn Fitzgerald is testing the effect of heatwaves on cereal, pulse and oilseed crops using computerised, custom-engineered trolleys mounted with infrared heaters.

'Unlike standard chamber-based studies on heatwaves, these trolleys sit in the 'free air' in paddocks and radiate heat directly on to the plants growing underneath, while still exposing them to wind, rain and other atmospheric conditions in a real-world setting.

'We can program the FATE computers to dial the heat up or down and change the frequency, severity and duration of our simulated heatwaves,' he said.

'There are lots of variations that we can explore including the effect of warmer nights on crops versus a frost event that might be experienced by our reference crops.'

Dr Fitzgerald said the research goes far beyond the obvious conclusion that a hotter climate and heatwaves will reduce crop yields and grain quality.

'This season we are doing heatwave research on wheat and lentils which will feed into other work done at the SmartFarm on grain traits being studied by our teams who work in crop quality, plant genomics and breeding.

'We are aiming to simulate drought-like conditions which will allow us to understand the different impacts heatwaves and drought have on crops.'


