

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Our Prayer for You

Hello, TEAM MEMBER!

On a recent trip to Puerto Rico, I had the opportunity to sit with pastors who host PPM teams during their mission trips. As we discussed how PPM can best serve and support them and their churches, one pastor shared a powerful truth: beyond the tangible projects and financial assistance, it's the presence of our teams that is valued most. He shared how the arrival of a team opens hearts and doors, allowing the church to extend care and build relationships with community members who may have previously been distant. Another pastor shared that teams are like a strong cup of coffee, providing a jolt of energy and excitement to the church. Yet another pastor testified to how teams lift their arms, encouraging them to keep going despite the challenges they face.

There's something singularly powerful about strangers coming together to sacrificially serve with only their common faith in Christ as the basis of their connection. This unique opportunity is what awaits you as your mission trip begins.

Each year, approximately 12,000 people serve through the network of PPM, encouraging and assisting local churches and ministries in more than 500 communities worldwide.

So are you ready to make the most of this experience? As you prepare for your trip, we challenge you to embrace the following values to maximize the impact of your week of service:


The Local Church: Our approach is rooted in the local Church. We don't establish mission bases, we build bridges. Your team will be partnered alongside ministries that serve the community 365 days a year. This partnership will ensure that the impact of your work will last long after your trip is over. Embrace the opportunity to walk alongside our local partners, learn from them, and support their ongoing work. **Humility:** The opposite of humility is pride, which is the enemy of

collaboration. Intentionally and relentlessly pursue a posture of humility as you serve. This is the only appropriate posture as a follower of Christ and as a guest in the community in which you will serve. In humbling yourself, you will find that you open your heart and mind to learn from, connect deeply with, and understand the culture and needs of the people you meet this week.

Prayer: What can I say? It's in our name. Without God's presence, our efforts are empty. Our staff prays for every team that serves with us by name, and we've specifically lifted up your trip. We've asked God to go before you and guide you, to use you for His purpose, and to exceed even your greatest expectations. We invite you to join us in seeking Him through prayer as you serve.

In summary: Focus on humbly serving and supporting your partner pastor, their church, and your fellow team members. Put others before yourself. Assume the best in those you meet. Remember that being present is more important than any project. And don't stop praying. May God bless you and your team. Thank you for saying "yes" to going on this trip. This work is worth it.

Serving With DIGNITY

Over the years at PPM, we have strived to remain teachable. The truth is, the ministry of short-term missions often gets a bad rap. The fact is that even good intentions can be ineffective or, worse, cause harm when applied under the wrong circumstances. By striving to remain humble and teachable, PPM seeks to bridge the gap between servant hearts and the needs of the local community, filling real needs instead of focusing on what we think would be helpful.

We are constantly learning and being presented with better ways to do ministry. And when those better ways come along, we have two options: turn a blind eye and continue in our old ways, potentially harming the local community and name of Jesus in the world; or make a concerted effort to change things from the inside out – starting with us.

The good news is it only takes a simple adjustment to ensure that we're engaging in healthy ministry as we serve.

We call it the Dignity Mindset.

We need to take our cues from Jesus, the one who invites us to GO. If we follow His example of how He entered into our world, one common underlying theme is dignity.

Before we can serve with dignity, we need a deep understanding of what it means to be equal in the eyes of God. We are all created in His image and are all in need of a Savior. We are all part of one body, where every part is needed and no one part is more important or valuable than another. We are to value others above ourselves, dying to our own interests, comforts, and preferences, all for the sake of each other and what Christ is building in His Church.

That's the goal of each mission trip: to build relationships and partnership, link arms with others, and share in each other's joys, victories, challenges, and burdens.

To treat a person with dignity is to believe they are worth your respect and honor. Jesus is the best example of this. He believed we were worth more than just respect and honor. He gave up His life for us.

We should embrace the same mindset when serving the Church and serving one another. Our posture in serving should not be one of "I am better and have all the answers," but rather one of compassion and submission to the call to carry one another's burdens and to sacrificially love one another.

Let this sink in: when we enter into a partnership with preserving the dignity of our local host in the forefront of our minds, we are directly reflecting the heart of God.

You may be asking yourself, "What does this look like in practice?" When sharing about your expectations, and later your experience serving the Church on your mission trip, ensure your language matches your heart and mindset.

Here are four action steps to get started:

Join us in our effort to place our partners first. Before you leave, during your trip, and when you return home, prioritize the authority of the local host pastor and partner church. Place their desires above your own, understanding that they are the expert in their community and are serving there 365 days a year. When speaking with your church, family, or friends, speak in honor of the local pastor. Use their name and tell of their faithful service to the Lord in their ministry.

Be conscious of using inclusive language when speaking about your partner church. For example, we love to say "our host church" and "our host community" instead of "those people" or "that pastor." Make it a goal to learn names quickly and call people by name, just as Jesus knows us and calls us by name.

Refrain from highlighting the struggles of a community. Rather, speak life through prayer that can build up and encourage.

Don't crave the credit! Uplift, highlight, and dignify the work of God through the local Church as you return home and speak about your time of service.

We want to be a people who are known for our Christ-like love of others. As you serve with us, we invite you to join us in this pursuit and are excited to see this love displayed on your upcoming mission trip.

Clothing Guidelines

What is considered appropriate dress varies widely across our ministry locations, and some clothing can be considered inappropriate or offensive to the people you'll be serving. Don't allow your clothing to be a barrier between you and your host community. With that in mind, we opt to err on the side of respect and humility when it comes to how we dress. Please read through these clothing and packing guidelines carefully.

Here is what NOT to bring or wear on the field:

- 1. Items or attire that could be construed as taking a political or divisive stance
- 2. Jewelry or clothing that is valuable and at risk of being lost or damaged
- 3. Sleeveless tops
- 4. Shorts, dresses, or skirts that are shorter than fingertip length
- 5. Two-piece bathing suit showing middriff

Check with your Group Leader to find out if there's anything special you need to know about what to wear in your ministry location. Keep in mind that laundry facilities will not be available on your trip.

WHAT TO WEAR Ministry clothes and shoes:

You will likely want to pack 3-4 outfits for ministry. Pack clothes that can get dirty and sweaty, shirts that cover your shoulders and torso, and shorts that are fingertip length or longer. Pack athletic shoes or waterproof sandals. If service projects are in your ministry plans, bring a pair of long pants and closed-toed shoes.

Church clothes and shoes:

You will likely want to pack 1-2 outfits for church. For women, pack pants, skirts, or dresses that are at least knee-length, a nice shirt (no sleeveless), and nice sandals or shoes. For men, bring long dress pants, a nice shirt, and closed-toed shoes. For some USA church locations, church dress may be more casual.

Casual clothes and shoes:

You will likely want to pack casual clothes to change into after ministry. Pack shirts that cover your shoulders and torso, and bottoms of appropriate length. Pack athletic shoes or waterproof sandals/flip-flops.

Paiamas:

Pack bottoms of appropriate length and an appropriate top to sleep in. Pack a pair of waterproof flip-flops for showering.

Swimwear:

If your trip has opportunity for recreation in the water, you will want to be prepared. For women, please pack a full coverage swimsuit not showing any middriff. For men, please pack appropriate-length swimming trunks.

WHAT TO PACK

Based on a typical PPM trip itinerary and the clothing guidelines provided, you may want to pack the following outfits depending on the activities of the day:

Policy Agreement

Before you begin your mission trip, it is important to take a few moments to understand and agree to the PPM participant policy agreement. The following commitments outline the promise that you are making to your team, your partner, and PPM while you serve:

- As a representative of my own community, PPM, and above all else, Jesus Christ, I will behave at all times in a manner that brings honor to these institutions.
- 2. I am aware that my words and actions are noticed as a guest in the partnership community. Therefore, I agree to act and speak in a manner that glorifies the name of Jesus Christ. I want everything I do or say to draw people to Jesus.
- 3. I will be spiritually, physically, and mentally prepared for a mission trip that will stretch me and mold me. I will do everything I can ahead of time to prepare myself for a "trip of a lifetime."
- 4. I understand I am a guest in the community I am visiting. I will respect and follow the traditions and customs of the local people and leaders. For example: if the way I dress offends them, I will change. If I am offered food, I will graciously accept it with a "thank you" and a smile.
- I will not criticize the culture, efficiency, work habits, food, traditions, etc. that I am exposed to during

- my time on the trip. I have come not to judge, but to learn and to share the person of Jesus through my words, actions, and deeds.
- I will respect and follow the PPM Trip Leaders and Group Leader and their decisions.
- 7. I agree to have a servant attitude at all times. In all tasks and ministries, I will focus on finding where I can use my gifts and talents to encourage and assist others.
- 8. I will use words that encourage and build up my team members and those in our host community at all times. This means I will refrain from gossip or words that bring dissension and take focus away from the goals of the trip.
- 9. I will have a positive attitude at all times. Every trip has its challenges and unforeseen circumstances. People could get sick, items lost, and plans changed. I realize that there are times I will need to be flexible and look at challenges as opportunities to be a witness for Jesus Christ.

- 10. I will refrain from pursuing romantic relationships during the trip. Even if my spouse or significant other is on the trip with me, I will make every effort to spend time with each person in the group and interact with all team members.
- 11. I will attend all team meetings and fulfill the responsibilities I have agreed to before, during, and after the trip. If I am not able to attend a meeting, I will proactively be in contact with my Group Leader as to what I missed.
- 12. I will refrain from initiating or engaging in divisive conversation regarding politics and other sensitive subjects during the trip. I will put aside my opinions in these types of sensitive matters to protect the ministry and focus on our mission.
- 13. I will abstain from using, consuming, purchasing, or possessing alcohol, cannabis, tobacco, other smoking-related products, and illegal drugs while on the trip.
- I will not steal, commit any crime, or do anything illegal while on the trip.
- 15. I will meet all medical, logistical, and legal travel requirements. I will follow all import and export laws.

- I will not attempt to bring any illegal or banned item/ good into or back from the location in which I will be serving.
- I acknowledge that I will not bring a weapon, including firearms, on my PPM trip.
- 17. I will follow the travel, supply, clothing, financial, and medical guidelines, etc. set forth and explained to me prior to the trip. I am responsible for knowing and following everything in the PPM guide and explained at the group meetings.
- 18. If, in the future, I desire to return to the community and location on a mission trip to visit any of the connections or ministry partnerships, I must do so through PPM or receive PPM's written permission to do so. This will enable the overall vision for the ministry as agreed upon through PPM connections in the host community to continue.
- 19. I realize that to attend this trip and represent Jesus Christ on the mission field is a privilege, and if I abuse that privilege, that abuse constitutes the right for my trip to end prematurely.

I agree and acknowledge that if I violate this Policy Agreement in any way, PPM or a PPM representative, at their sole discretion, may remove me from the mission trip and send me home at my own expense.

Staying Healthy

It's one of the biggest frustrations on a trip when preventable injuries or sickness make it so that you can't fully participate. Whether you're on a work site, at your lodging, or out and about in the community, be aware of your surroundings and make smart decisions for the safety of your teammates, the community, and yourself!



Wear shoes at all times.



Discreetly use hand sanitizer before each meal, and wash your hands often.



Hydrate often! Bring a wide-mouth water bottle so it's easier to refill.



Avoid eating fruit that can't be peeled.*



Avoid brushing your teeth with or drinking water from the faucet.*



Be wary of the animals! Ask your trip leader what you need to know.



Keep your lodging location clean and zip up your belongings each day.



Quickly inform your trip leader of any injuries or illnesses.



Apply sunblock frequently.
The sun can be much stronger than you're used to in many of our locations.

Preparing for YOUR TRIP

You'll experience many things during this mission trip. You'll have the opportunity to be a learner, server, and listener. Before you start your trip, it is vitally important to prepare your heart and mind for what lies ahead. Here are some of our best tips to get in the right headspace and posture to serve:

CONNECT WITH GOD

We want to encourage you to connect with God early and often during this week. While you're sure to have devotion time in large group settings on your trip, ensure that you're still personally connecting with the Lord each day. Spending time in prayer and reading scripture can happen at any time, but some natural times to find a minute to dive in are before breakfast, during lunch, and before bed. Pray for your teammates, your host pastor, the local community, and your family back home. Pray that God will lead you and teach you, all while helping you find ways to encourage and invest in the people surrounding you this week.

BE PREPARED TO BE FLEXIBLE

One thing is certain: your plans are going to change during the week. Going on a mission trip is about coming alongside the people and leaders we are serving. This requires us to trust God with our plans. We have to allow Him room to construct moments of ministry that may disrupt our schedule. Letting go of our plans and leaving space for God to take lead often allows Him to do the amazing and unexpected! Don't shy away from unanticipated changes. Lean into the moment, let go, walk forward with humility, and watch how God can guide your steps to something even greater than you had planned.



FOCUS ON THOSE AROUND YOU

The ultimate goal of your trip is to show people the love of Christ and the hope found in the Gospel. This happens best through relationships. Even if you don't speak the same language, love and compassion go beyond words. We encourage you to focus on the people, not the projects. While you're working, look for ways to engage with people in the community who are experiencing the moment alongside you. Ask God for opportunities to share with those in the community about the work you are doing and the local church you are partnering with.

STAY PRESENT

Remaining present and in the moment while serving is crucial to ensuring that you are open and available to participate in all God has planned for you on your trip. Do your best to silence your electronic devices. If you can disconnect from social media, work, and everyday demands, you'll find yourself more firmly rooted in the here and now. Another effective way to stay present is taking time to reflect on what's happening around you. Spend time each evening journaling. Write about the lessons you're learning and the experiences you've had and how they're challenging you. Cultivate an attitude of gratitude by naming those things you're most thankful for. When you get home, you'll be so grateful you took the time to journal every day!

Devotions

This week, we will be spending time reading and reflecting on the book of Ephesians. Written by the Apostle Paul around AD 62-63 while imprisoned in Rome, this letter was addressed to a network of churches in Ephesus and the surrounding region – a community Paul had poured into for over three years. You can read more about Paul's time in Ephesus in Acts 19.

Ephesians carries a powerful message that resonates deeply with those who follow Jesus, and we can carry these themes into our lives and even more specifically into the unique purpose we have this week as we serve alongside a local church in a community that is different from our own. Paul's heart in writing this letter to the Ephesians was to affirm the believers' new identity in Christ, strengthen them in their battle against spiritual darkness, promote unity within the body of believers, and inspire a change in lifestyle that authentically represents their faith.

In the first three chapters of Ephesians, Paul describes our new identity in Christ. Then, in the final three chapters, Paul explores the practical impact of this Gospel identity in our daily lives.

Throughout this week, we will focus on three key themes from Ephesians: **identity, unity, and living out our faith**. We will explore how each of these themes connects to the Gospel and how they apply to our mission trip experience.

Identity in the Gospel

"But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions – it is by grace you have been saved. And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus." Ephesians 2:4-6

Unity in the Gospel

"Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace." Ephesians 4:2-3

Living Out the Gospel

"Follow God's example, therefore, as dearly loved children, and walk in the way of love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God." Ephesians 5:1-2

Each day, you will read one chapter of Ephesians and reflect on what it says, what it means, and how it applies to your life. Take time to read and reflect, using the provided questions or your own journaling. You can also come together with your team each day to discuss what God is revealing to you as you commune with Him.

Our prayer is that you would savor these moments with God, store His word in your heart, and openly share what God is teaching you with your team and those you meet this week. We boldly pray that through your time in the Bible this week and your experience serving alongside the local Church, the Holy Spirit would reveal fresh insights into your identity in Christ and inspire you to live a life of service for God's glory.



EPHESIANS 1

1 Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God,

To God's holy people in Ephesus, the faithful in Christ Jesus:

2 Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

3 Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ. 4 For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love 5 he predestined us for adoption to sonship through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will 6 to the praise of his glorious grace, which he has freely given us in the One he loves. 7 In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace 8 that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and understanding, 9 he made known to us the mystery of his will according to his good pleasure, which he purposed in Christ, 10 to be put into effect when the times reach their fulfillment—to bring unity to all things in heaven and on earth under Christ.

11 In him we were also chosen, having been predestined according to the plan of him who works out everything in conformity with the purpose of his will, 12 in order that we, who were the first to put our hope in Christ, might be for the praise of his glory. 13 And you also were included in Christ when you heard the message of truth, the gospel of your salvation. When you believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, 14 who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of his glory.

15 For this reason, ever since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all God's people, 16 I have not stopped giving thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers. 17 I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better. 18 I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, 19 and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength 20 he exerted when he raised Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms, 21 far above all rule and authority, power and dominion, and every name that is invoked, not only in the present age but also in the one to come. 22 And God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church, 23 which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way.

EPHESIANS 2

1 As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, 2 in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient. 3 All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our flesh and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature deserving of wrath. 4 But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, 5 made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions—it is by grace you have been saved. 6 And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus, 7 in order that in the coming ages he might show the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus. 8 For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God- 9 not by works, so that no one can boast. 10 For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

11 Therefore, remember that formerly you who are Gentiles by birth and called "uncircumcised" by those who call themselves "the circumcision" (which is done in the body by human hands)—12 remember that at that time you were separate from Christ, excluded from citizenship in Israel and foreigners to the covenants of the promise, without hope and without God in the world. 13 But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ.

14 For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility, 15 by setting aside in his flesh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace, 16 and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility. 17 He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near. 18 For through him we both have access to the Father by one Spirit.

19 Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household, 20 built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone. 21 In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord. 22 And in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.

4. Ephesians 2 reminds us that before Christ, we were dead in our sins and bound by the powers of the world, the devil, and our flesh. But, "because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ" (Ephesians 2:4-5)! Think about your own story - what was your life like before you began to follow Jesus? What has changed since then? What does it mean to you personally to be "made alive" with Christ, and how does that change how you live?

5. Ephesians 2 says that before we knew Jesus, we were separated from God and His people. But now, as Christians, we have direct access to God and are part of His family! How does knowing that change how you might talk to other people about Jesus?

EPHESIANS 3

1 For this reason I, Paul, the prisoner of Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles—

2 Surely you have heard about the administration of God's grace that was given to me for you, 3 that is, the mystery made known to me by revelation, as I have already written briefly. 4 In reading this, then, you will be able to understand my insight into the mystery of Christ, 5 which was not made known to people in other generations as it has now been revealed by the Spirit to God's holy apostles and prophets. 6 This mystery is that through the gospel the Gentiles are heirs together with Israel, members together of one body, and sharers together in the promise in Christ Jesus.

7 I became a servant of this gospel by the gift of God's grace given me through the working of his power. 8 Although I am less than the least of all the Lord's people, this grace was given me: to preach to the Gentiles the boundless riches of Christ, 9 and to make plain to everyone the administration of this mystery, which for ages past was kept hidden in God, who created all things. 10 His intent was that now, through the church, the manifold wisdom of God should be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly realms, 11 according to his eternal purpose that he accomplished in Christ Jesus our Lord. 12 In him and through faith in him we may approach God with freedom and confidence. 13 I ask you, therefore, not to be discouraged because of my sufferings for you, which are your glory.

14 For this reason I kneel before the Father, 15 from whom every family in heaven and on earth derives its name. 16 I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, 17 so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, 18 may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, 19 and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.

20 Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, 21 to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen.

EPHESIANS 4

1 As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. 2 Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. 3 Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. 4 There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; 5 one Lord, one faith, one baptism; 6 one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.

7 But to each one of us grace has been given as Christ apportioned it. 8 This is why it says: "When he ascended on high, he took many captives and gave gifts to his people."

9 (What does "he ascended" mean except that he also descended to the lower, earthly regions? 10 He who descended is the very one who ascended higher than all the heavens, in order to fill the whole universe.) 11 So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, 12 to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up 13 until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ.

14 Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of people in their deceitful scheming. 15 Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ. 16 From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.

17 So I tell you this, and insist on it in the Lord, that you must no longer live as the Gentiles do, in the futility of their thinking. 18 They are darkened in their understanding and separated from the life of God because of the ignorance that is in them due to the hardening of their hearts. 19 Having lost all sensitivity, they have given themselves over to sensuality so as to indulge in every kind of impurity, and they are full of greed.

20 That, however, is not the way of life you learned 21 when you heard about Christ and were taught in him in accordance with the truth that is in Jesus. 22 You were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; 23 to be made new in the attitude of your minds; 24 and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.

25 Therefore each of you must put off falsehood and speak truthfully to your neighbor, for we are all members of one body. 26 "In your anger do not sin": Do not let the sun go down while you are still angry, 27 and do not give the devil a foothold. 28 Anyone who has been stealing must steal no longer, but must work, doing something useful with their own hands, that they may have something to share with those in need.

29 Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen. 30 And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with whom you were sealed for the day of redemption. 31 Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. 32 Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.

EPHESIANS 5

1 Follow God's example, therefore, as dearly loved children 2 and walk in the way of love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.

3 But among you there must not be even a hint of sexual immorality, or of any kind of impurity, or of greed, because these are improper for God's holy people. 4 Nor should there be obscenity, foolish talk or coarse joking, which are out of place, but rather thanksgiving. 5 For of this you can be sure: No immoral, impure or greedy person—such a person is an idolater—has any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ and of God. 6 Let no one deceive you with empty words, for because of such things God's wrath comes on those who are disobedient. 7 Therefore do not be partners with them.

8 For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light 9 (for the fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness and truth) 10 and find out what pleases the Lord. 11 Have nothing to do with the fruitless deeds of darkness, but rather expose them. 12 It is shameful even to mention what the disobedient do in secret. 13 But everything exposed by the light becomes visible—and everything that is illuminated becomes a light. 14 This is why it is said: "Wake up, sleeper, rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you."

15 Be very careful, then, how you live—not as unwise but as wise, 16 making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil. 17 Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the Lord's will is. 18 Do not get drunk on wine, which leads to debauchery. Instead, be filled with the Spirit, 19 speaking to one another with psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit. Sing and make music from your heart to the Lord, 20 always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

21 Submit to one another out of reverence for Christ.

22 Wives, submit yourselves to your own husbands as you do to the Lord. 23 For the husband is the head of the wife as Christ is the head of the church, his body, of which he is the Savior. 24 Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit to their husbands in everything.

25 Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her 26 to make her holy, cleansing her by the washing with water through the word, 27 and to present her to himself as a radiant church, without stain or wrinkle or any other blemish, but holy and blameless. 28 In this same way, husbands ought to love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. 29 After all, no one ever hated their own body, but they feed and care for their body, just as Christ does the church— 30 for we are members of his body. 31 "For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one flesh." 32 This is a profound mystery—but I am talking about Christ and the church. 33 However, each one of you also must love his wife as he loves himself, and the wife must respect her husband.

4. Ephesians 5:1-2 calls believers to follow God's example and walk in love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us. How does this passage connect God's immense love for us, demonstrated through the Gospel, to the practical way we are called to live our lives? Specifically, how does understanding the sacrifice Christ made for us motivate and empower us to live a life of love toward others?

5. Ephesians 5 talks about how we should live as "children of light," not walking in darkness. Think about what that means in your life today – at school or work, with your community, and at home. How can you practically shine God's light in those different areas? What are some specific things you can do this week to show "goodness, righteousness, and truth" (5:9) to the people around you? What are some things that might try to pull you away from the light, and how can you resist those things and stay focused on living a life that honors God?

EPHESIANS 6

1 Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 2 "Honor your father and mother"—which is the first commandment with a promise—3 "so that it may go well with you and that you may enjoy long life on the earth." 4 Fathers, do not exasperate your children; instead, bring them up in the training and instruction of the Lord. 5 Slaves, obey your earthly masters with respect and fear, and with sincerity of heart, just as you would obey Christ. 6 Obey them not only to win their favor when their eye is on you, but as slaves of Christ, doing the will of God from your heart. 7 Serve wholeheartedly, as if you were serving the Lord, not people, 8 because you know that the Lord will reward each one for whatever good they do, whether they are slave or free. 9 And masters, treat your slaves in the same way. Do not threaten them, since you know that he who is both their Master and yours is in heaven, and there is no favoritism with him.

10 Finally, be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. 11 Put on the full armor of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes. 12 For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms.

13 Therefore put on the full armor of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand. 14 Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled around your waist, with the breastplate of righteousness in place, 15 and with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace. 16 In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one. 17 Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

18 And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people. 19 Pray also for me, that whenever I speak, words may be given me so that I will fearlessly make known the mystery of the gospel, 20 for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it fearlessly, as I should.

21 Tychicus, the dear brother and faithful servant in the Lord, will tell you everything, so that you also may know how I am and what I am doing. 22 I am sending him to you for this very purpose, that you may know how we are, and that he may encourage you.

23 Peace to the brothers and sisters, and love with faith from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. 24 Grace to all who love our Lord Jesus Christ with an undying love.

Now What?

From large paradigm shifts to figuring out where you fit into God's global story, it's pretty likely you're leaving your week of ministry feeling changed on some level. Maybe those changes haven't been fully realized yet, or maybe they're feeling all-consuming. Either way, we want you to know that you aren't alone, and change is a good thing!

Ask any Jesus-following person, and they will tell you that faith is a journey. It never really comes alive until you begin to put action to the things you hear at church each week. In fact, the Bible warns against a passive faith in Revelation 3:16: "But since you are like lukewarm water, neither hot nor cold, I will spit you out of my mouth!" It's a tough love statement about those who know all about God and His Word but can't be bothered to act on what they know.

You just spent a week living out the Gospel by serving others and immersing yourself in the work of the local Church. There is nothing lukewarm about what you just experienced. It took faith, sacrifice, and probably more than a little bit of courage. As a result, God used you to impact the church and the community in a big way. Our prayer is that you don't stop here. We believe that seeing and doing the work of God in the local Church will change you forever. We hope that this experience will stick with you and shape how you experience God for the rest of your life.

BRING THE MISSION HOME

Mission trips are a unique experience. They are a time of growth, challenge, joy, and exhaustion. Memories of this trip, whether they be of your host church or your fellow team members, will last a lifetime. But would you be surprised to know that the goal of this trip isn't complete? God's calling on your life does not start at the beginning of a mission trip or stop at the end. Instead, the Lord often uses service as a vehicle for refining and growing us in our faith, preparing us for new Kingdom work, wherever we end up in the world. It's our prayer that you will allow the Lord to use the growth you've experienced this week to transform and impact your community, school, workplace, family, or church.

Here are just a few ways you can continue to build on the gifts and talents you utilized this week, even after you head home.

FIND NEW WAYS TO SERVE

Which part of this week stirred your heart? Pay attention to how you felt when getting involved in different ministries during the week. Did kids ministry fill your soul? Were work projects something that excited you and left you feeling closer to Jesus? Write it down so you don't forget, then find similar local ministries at home and volunteer there. Engage with your local church and don't be afraid to step out and lead in a new ministry that may be needed. Intentionally uplift and encourage the ministry leaders in your life. Ask your team leader how you might be able to use your passions to serve your church and community!



KEEP DOING THE LITTLE THINGS

Chances are at some point this week you made an impact on someone without even realizing it. Something as simple as a smile and a wave can be a small but powerful way to show God's love to someone. When you get home, keep your eyes open for the people around you who might be having a tough day and find a way to be uplifting. A genuine "Hey, how are you?" can go a long way! A phone call, a text, or a word of encouragement to a friend can change the course of someone's day.

STAY CONNECTED

You've spent the last week serving, laughing, playing, and maybe even crying with the people on your mission team. Personal connection is such an important part of being part of the body of Christ! Stay in touch with those around you. Support each other in your walk through everyday life. And even more importantly, stay connected to God by continuing to chase after Jesus and listen to the Holy Spirit's leading. Do not forget the ways your faith in God was expanded and strengthened this week. Seek God through prayer and scripture reading and by continuing to walk in obedience and love. As Jesus shares in John 15:4, "Remain in me, as I remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me."

KEEP THE MEMORIES ALIVE

Remembering how you felt during your time on the mission field is an excellent way to encourage yourself to seek out those experiences at home! Take time to occasionally revisit your journal entries from this mission trip. Post a photo from the trip on social media every once in a while to remind yourself and those around you of what you experienced. Those memories will serve as a powerful reminder of your week.
