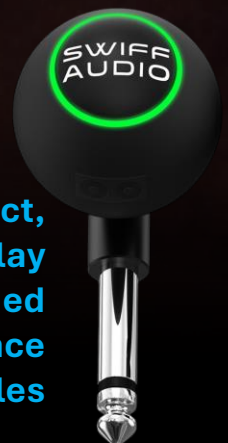

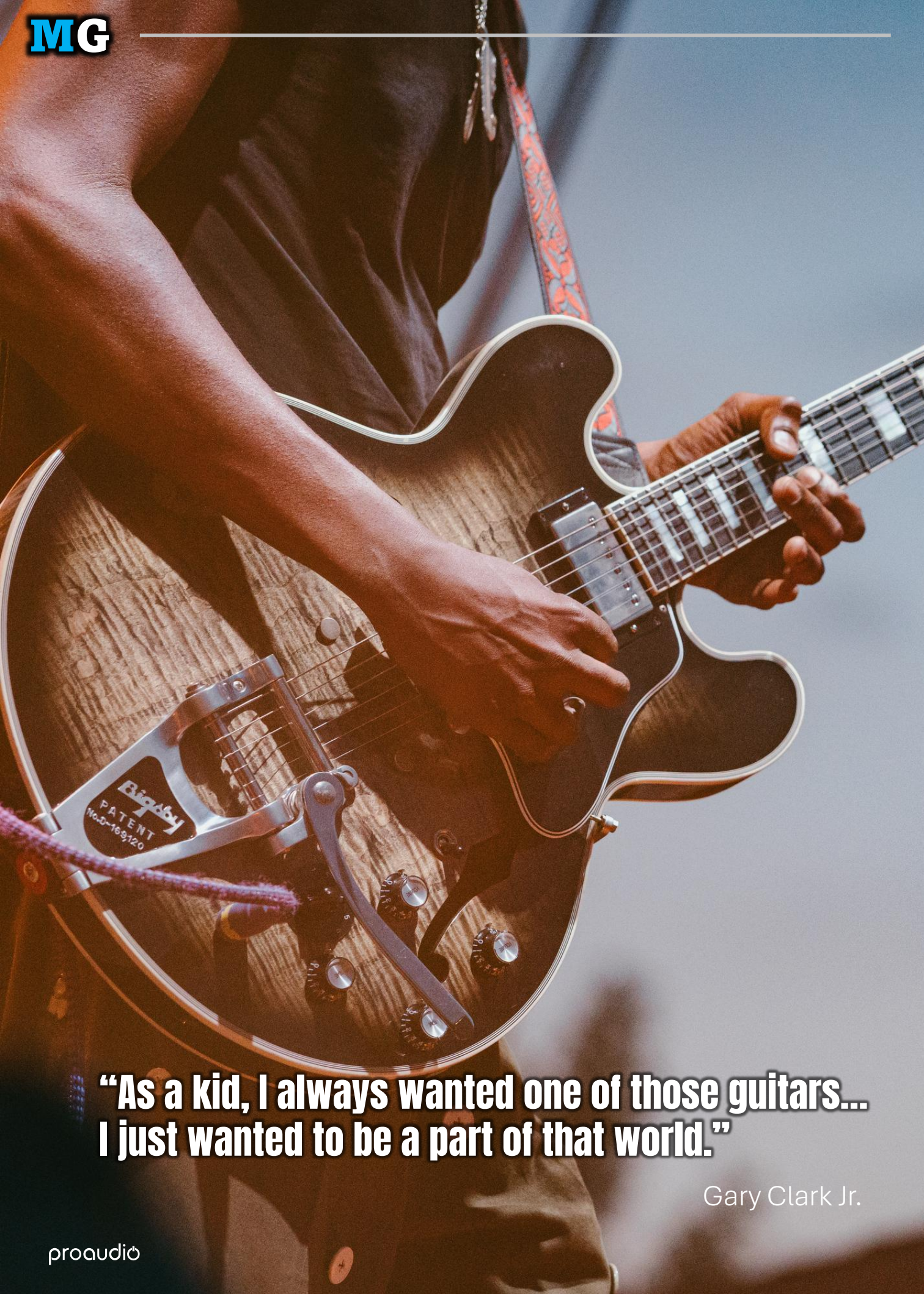

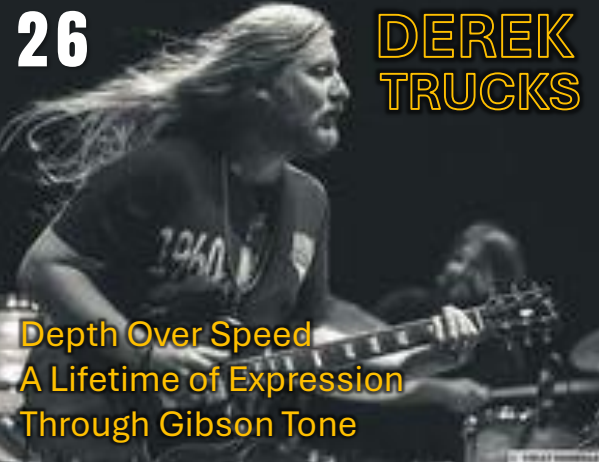

COACHELLA VALLEY MUSIC AND ARTS FESTIVAL



Coachella 2026 marked more than just another year in the desert — it celebrated 25 years of one of the most influential music festivals in the world, bringing together a global mix of artists across genres and generations.

From pop and hip-hop to indie, electronic, and rock, the stages were filled with diversity, energy, and constant evolution.

But beneath the scale of production and the spectacle of performance, something far more grounded stood out — the continued presence of real instruments, and the unmistakable sound of the guitar.



And within that, the voice of Gibson was impossible to ignore.

Walking the festival, it became clear very quickly that Gibson wasn't just present — it was everywhere. I genuinely lost count of how many Gibsons I saw at Coachella.

From SGs to Les Pauls and ES models, they appeared across performances, carried by artists and musicians who still rely on the raw, expressive power of a well-built guitar.

Make no mistake — rock music was well represented, and more importantly, it's thriving.

Acts like The Strokes brought their unmistakable guitar-driven sound to the stage, reinforcing the timeless appeal of rock in a modern festival setting.

At the same time, artists such as Dijon blurred genre lines with performances that leaned heavily on live instrumentation, where guitar remained central to the emotional delivery.



Across the weekend, countless band members and session players could be seen using Gibson-style guitars, particularly SGs and Les Pauls, further cementing the brand's quiet but powerful presence throughout the festival.

What stood out most was not just who played, but how music continues to be expressed. Even in an era dominated by digital production and electronic soundscapes, the guitar remains a vital voice — not as nostalgia, but as a living, evolving instrument.

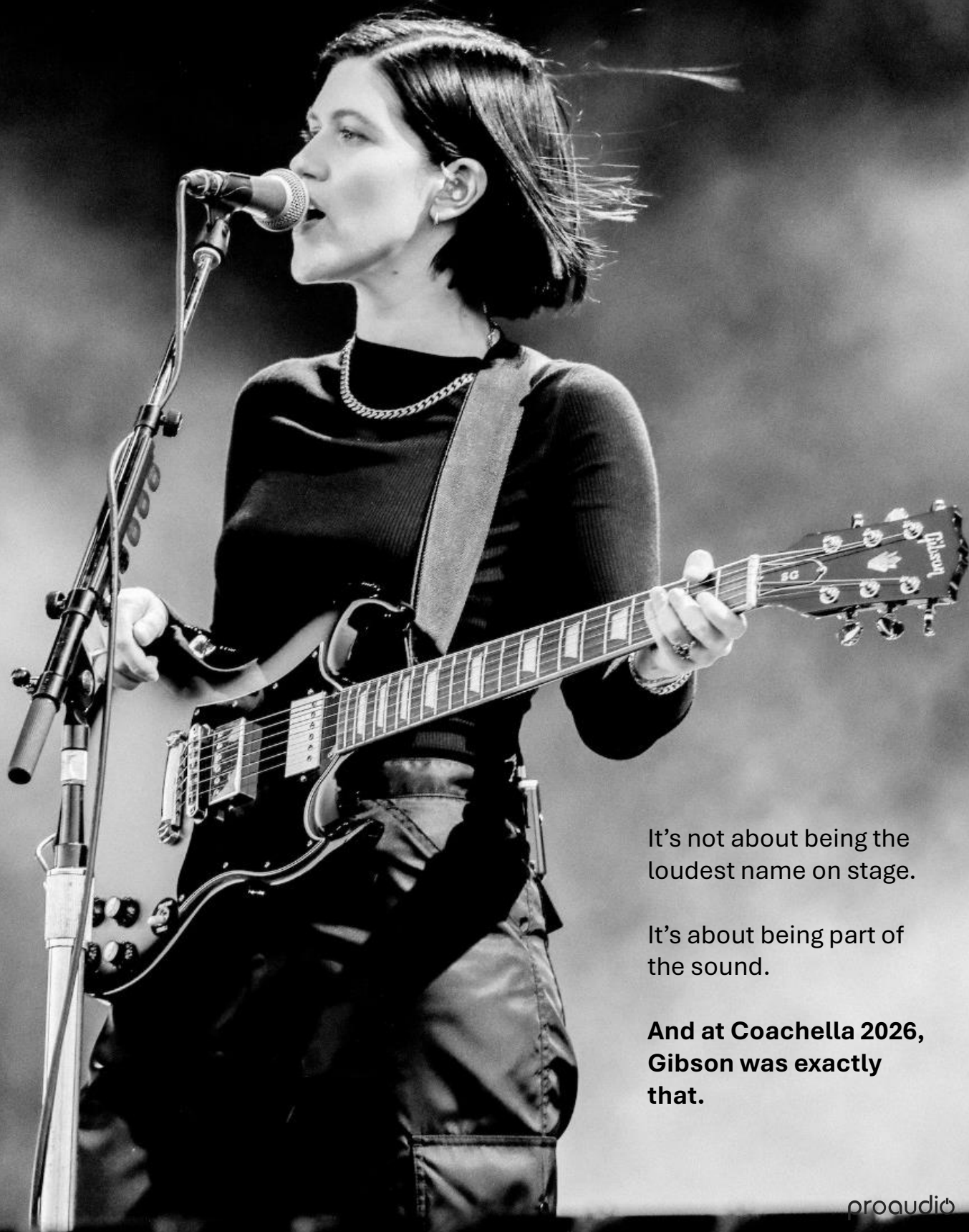




Gibson sits confidently in that space, bridging past and present, tradition and innovation, without needing to announce itself.

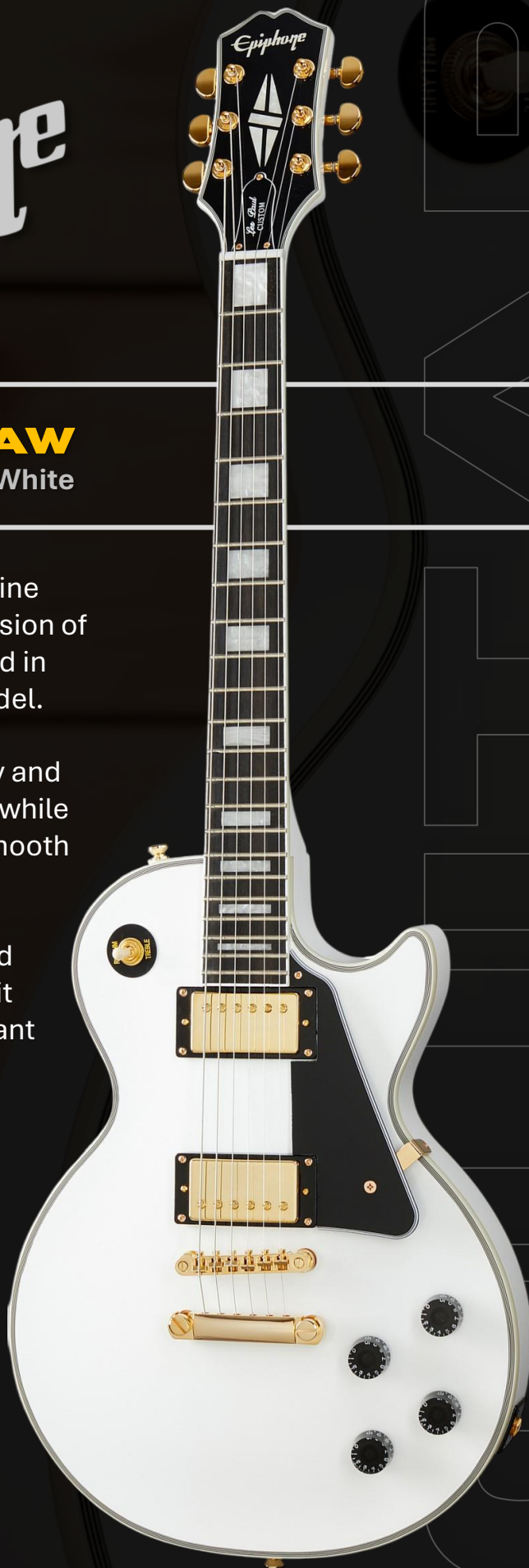

Where Blues Tradition Meets a Modern Gibson Voice



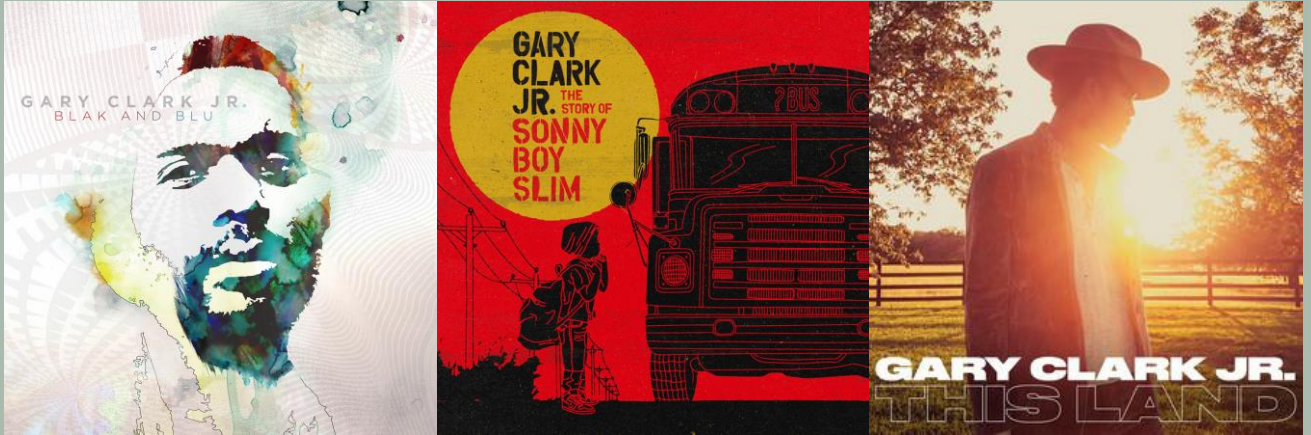
Some artists play guitar. Others *speak* through it — and **Gary Clark Jr.** has built a career doing exactly that.

Born in Austin, Texas in 1984, Clark grew up surrounded by a city where live music is part of everyday life. It didn't take long for him to find his place in it.

By his teenage years, he was already performing, developing a style that didn't rely on speed or flash, but on something far more difficult to master — feel.

From the beginning, his playing carried a sense of space and intention, allowing every note to land with purpose rather than excess.

That approach would go on to define his sound and ultimately reshape how modern audiences experience blues music.



His breakthrough came with *Blak and Blu* in 2012, an album that didn't just introduce him to a wider audience, but redefined expectations.

Blending blues, rock, soul, and R&B, the project showed that tradition didn't need to be preserved in isolation — it could evolve. He followed this with *The Story of Sonny Boy Slim* and later *This Land*, the latter earning multiple Grammy Awards and solidifying his place as one of the most important guitar voices of his generation.

More than the accolades, *This Land* confirmed something deeper — Clark wasn't just playing music, he was telling stories rooted in identity, tension, and lived experience.






What makes Gary Clark Jr. remarkable is not just his ability to play across genres, but how naturally he does it. Blues sits at the core, but his music moves freely through rock, soul, and even hip-hop influences without ever feeling forced.

His vocals mirror that same flexibility, shifting from controlled restraint to raw intensity in a way that feels instinctive rather than calculated. Every performance becomes a balance between precision and emotion, structure and spontaneity.


At the centre of that expression is his relationship with Gibson — not as a brand, but as a tool for translating feeling into sound. Clark has worked closely with Gibson on several signature instruments, including the Gibson SG Standard, Epiphone Casino, and the Gibson Custom Shop ES-355 — a guitar that reflects both heritage and modern performance.

These instruments aren't designed for show; they are built for responsiveness, allowing him to move effortlessly between subtle phrasing and explosive lead work.



As Clark himself once reflected on his connection to these guitars, “As a kid, I always wanted one of those guitars... I just wanted to be a part of that world.”

That sense of aspiration has come full circle, with his signature models now placing him firmly within the lineage of players who have defined the sound of electric blues and rock.



And that is where his true impact lies. Gary Clark Jr. is not trying to recreate the past, nor is he trying to move away from it.

He stands in the space between — carrying the emotional weight of blues forward while reshaping it for a new generation. His influence is not built on imitation, but on translation, taking a timeless musical language and making it relevant again.

In doing so, he reminds us that the electric guitar is still capable of saying something meaningful — not through complexity, but through honesty.

And in his hands, it continues to speak.



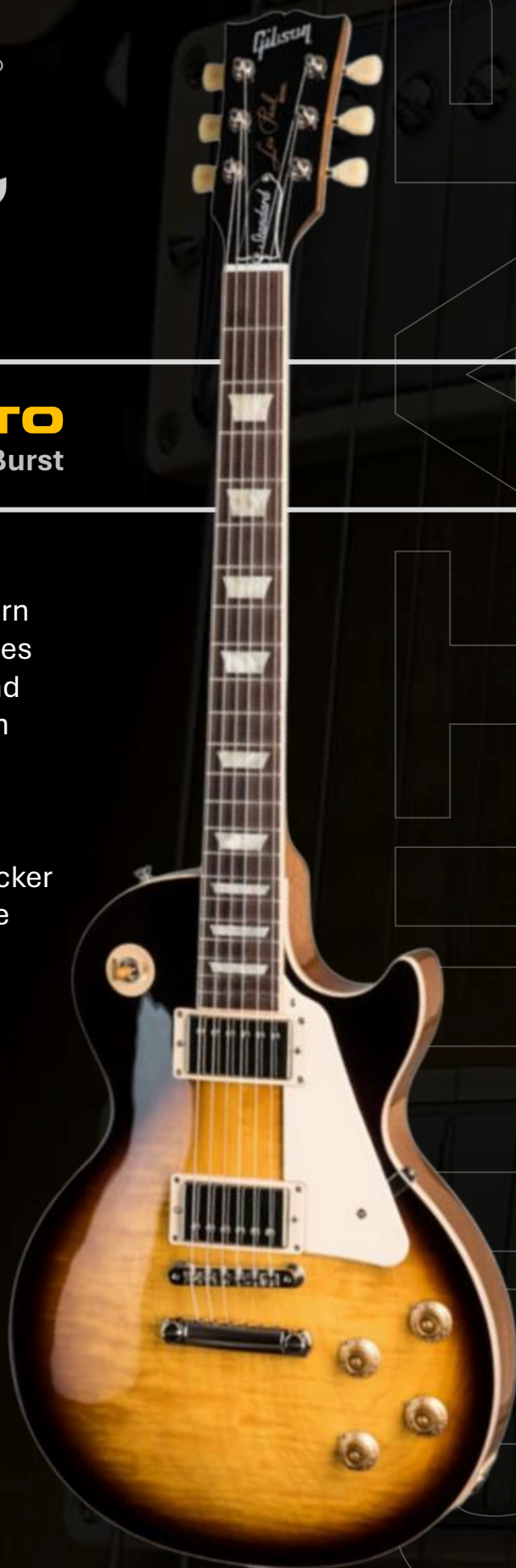

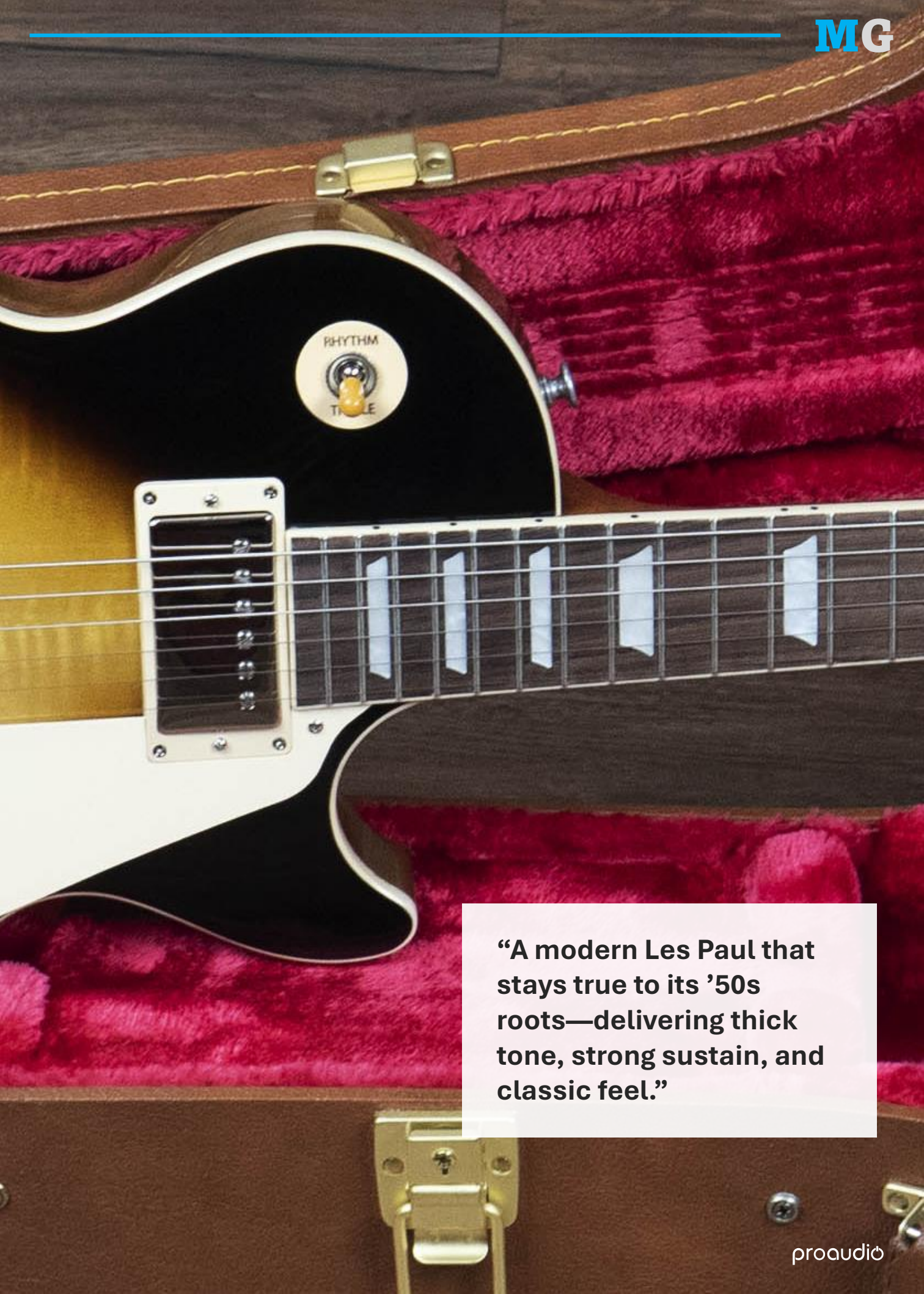

DEPTH OVER SPEED

A Lifetime of Expression Through Gibson Tone

Derek Trucks belongs to the latter — a musician whose playing is less about performance and more about exploration.

Born in 1979 in Jacksonville, Florida, Trucks picked up the guitar at a young age and quickly moved beyond conventional playing.

By his early teens, he was already performing professionally, and by 20, he had joined The Allman Brothers Band — one of the most respected groups in American rock history. It was here that he began shaping a voice that would become unmistakable.

But Trucks never followed the expected path.

Instead of chasing speed or technical showmanship, he turned inward — focusing on phrasing, tone, and emotion. His slide guitar work, influenced by blues, jazz, and Indian classical music, became his signature. It's not about how many notes he plays, but how deeply each one resonates.

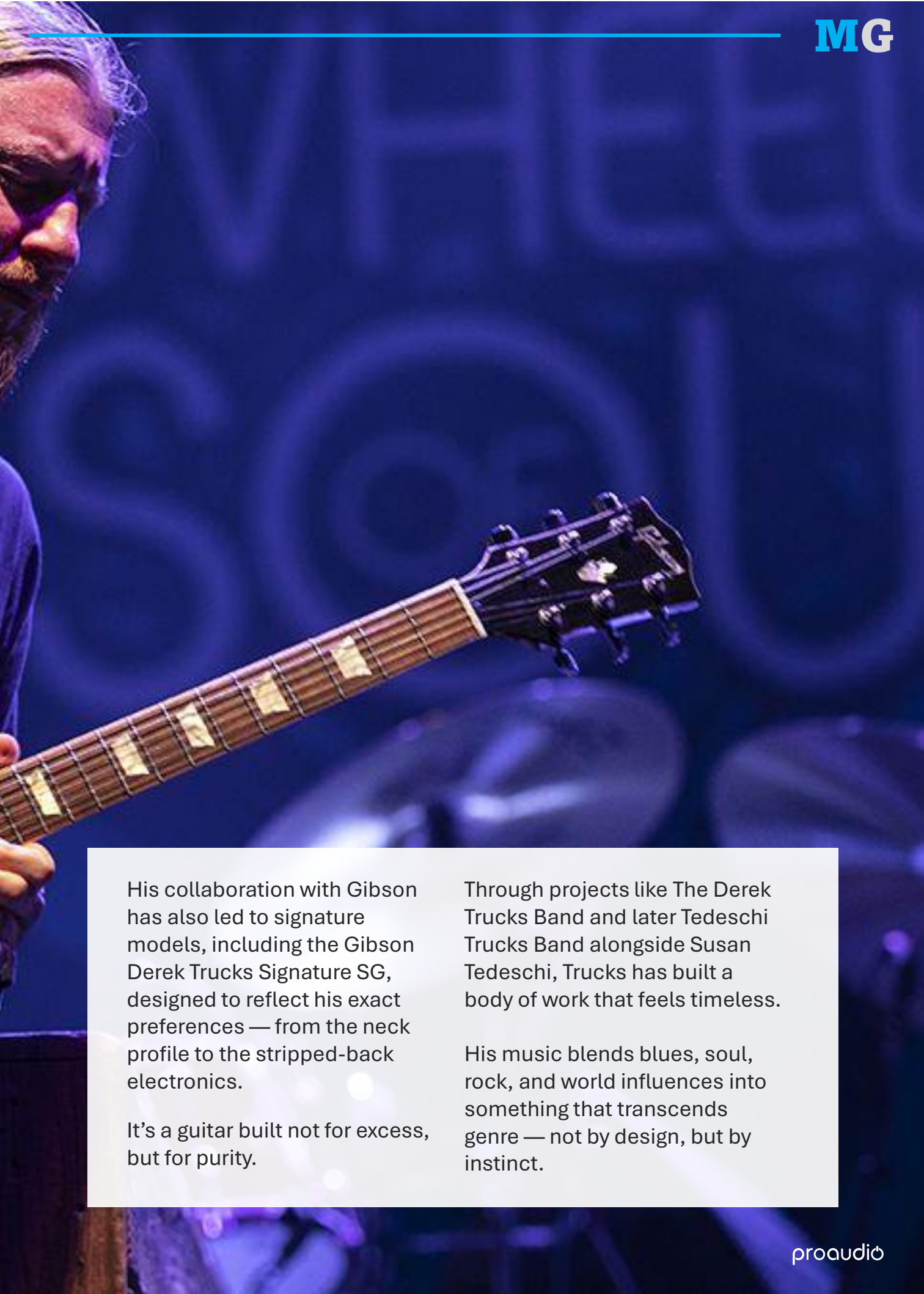
At the heart of Trucks' story is a philosophy rarely seen in modern guitar culture: "You don't need more — you need to go deeper." That idea defines everything about his playing. And at the centre of that sound is his long-standing relationship with Gibson.

Trucks is most closely associated with the Gibson SG — particularly his iconic 1961-style SG, which has become almost inseparable from his identity as a player.

Unlike many modern setups, his approach is strikingly simple. He typically runs straight into an amp, relying on touch, dynamics, and control rather than pedals or heavy processing.

**That simplicity
is intentional.**





His collaboration with Gibson has also led to signature models, including the Gibson Derek Trucks Signature SG, designed to reflect his exact preferences — from the neck profile to the stripped-back electronics.

It's a guitar built not for excess, but for purity.

Through projects like The Derek Trucks Band and later Tedeschi Trucks Band alongside Susan Tedeschi, Trucks has built a body of work that feels timeless.

His music blends blues, soul, rock, and world influences into something that transcends genre — not by design, but by instinct.



What makes this guitar so important to his sound is not just its history, but its character. The 1961 SG is known for its lightweight feel, fast neck, and open, expressive tone — qualities that respond instantly to the player.

For Trucks, whose slide technique depends on nuance and control, that responsiveness is everything. Every movement of his hand, every slight variation in pressure or vibrato, is translated directly into sound.

There is very little between him and the music. No heavy effects, no unnecessary layers — just the SG, his slide, and a direct connection to the amplifier. It's a stripped-back approach that demands honesty. The guitar doesn't mask anything; it reveals exactly what is there.



Live, that approach becomes even more powerful.

Performances stretch, evolve, and breathe. Songs are not repeated — they are rediscovered. Each note feels like it exists in the moment, shaped by emotion rather than expectation.



That's what separates Derek Trucks.

He doesn't try to stand out.
He simply goes deeper.

And in doing so — with a Gibson SG in his hands — he reminds us that the guitar isn't just something you play... it's something you *listen through*.



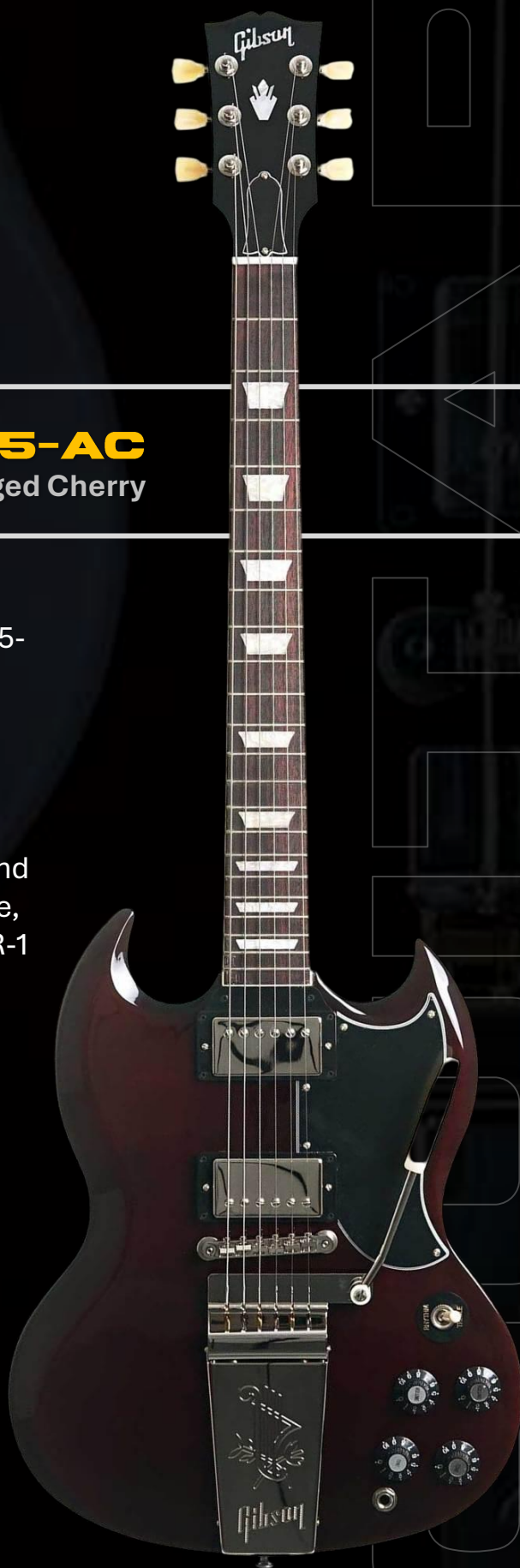

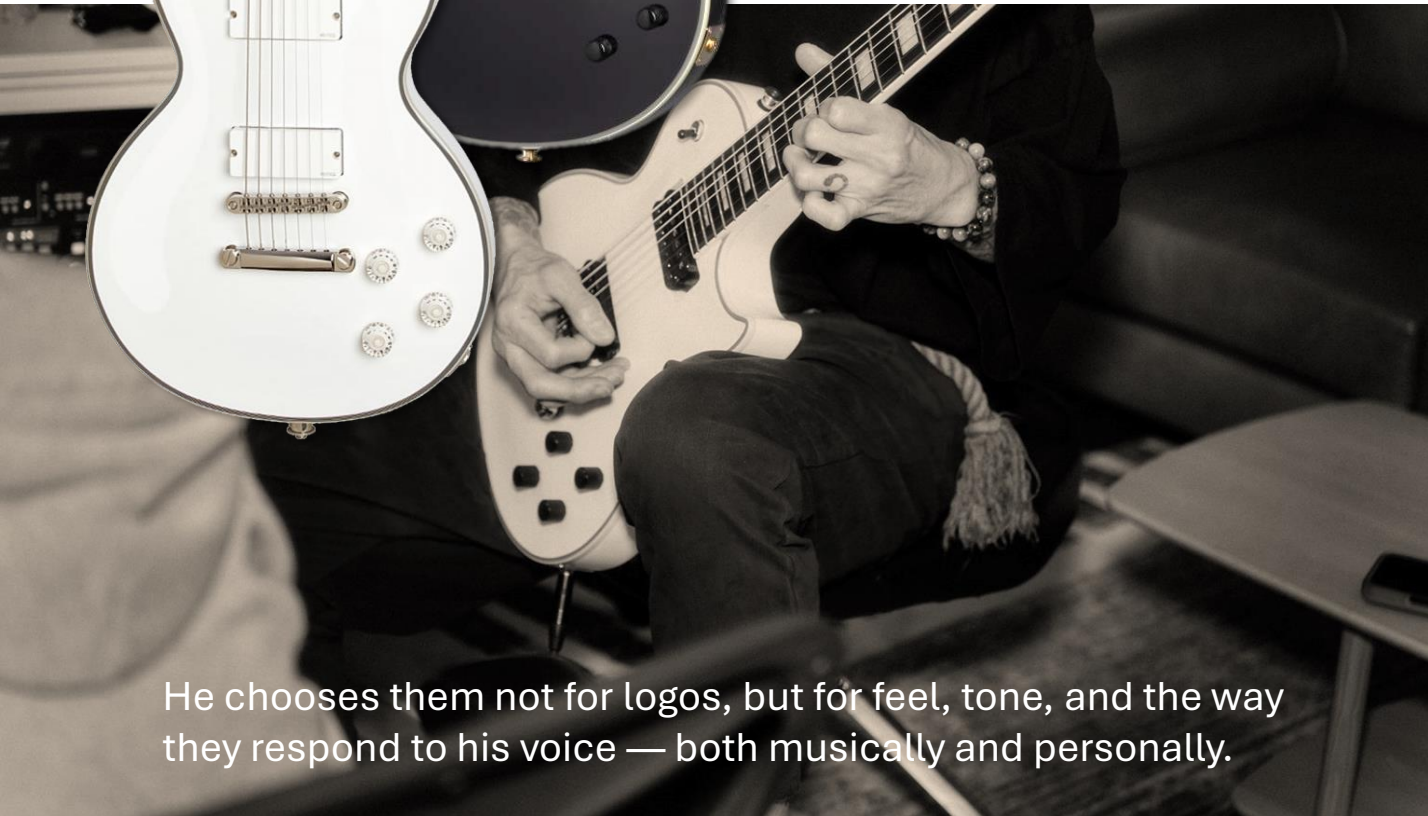




As Heafy's reputation grew, Epiphone collaborated with him to create signature models tailored to his exact preferences.

This was followed by the Snøfall Les Paul Custom, a visually distinctive model inspired by the Silence in the Snow era of Trivium.

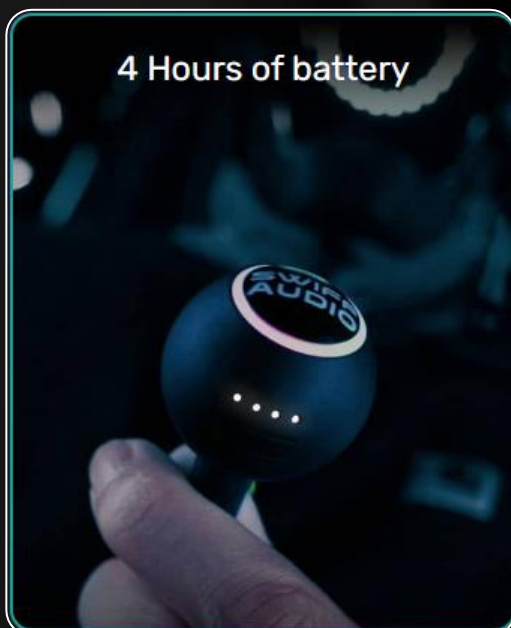

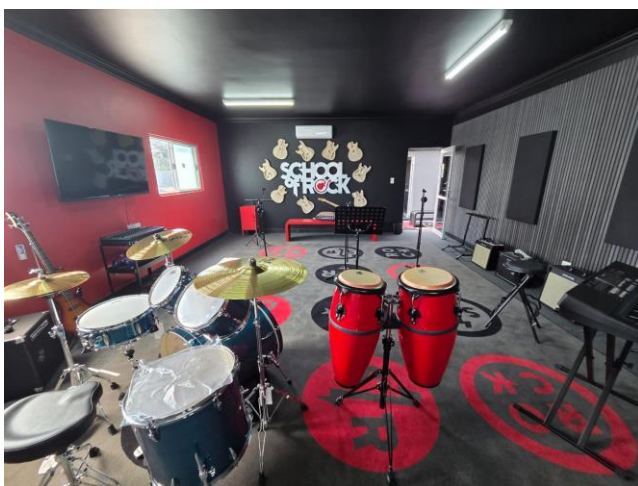

Building More Than Musicians

Russel, owner of School of Rock Sandton, shares his vision for creating more than just a music school. With a strong focus on performance, community, and real-world experience, his goal is to build a creative hub where musicians develop not only their skills, but their confidence, identity, and sense of belonging within the local music scene.

MG What excites you most about bringing the School of Rock experience to this new location, and how do you see it impacting the local music community?

RL What excites me most is that School of Rock brings a genuinely different way of learning music to Sandton. It's performance-based, which means students aren't only learning in isolation — they're learning through private lessons, band rehearsals, and real live performances.

For the local music community, I think that has real impact. It creates more than technically strong musicians — it creates confident performers, collaborators, and young people who feel part of something bigger. My hope is that School of Rock Sandton becomes a place where talent is nurtured, community is built, and more young artists feel empowered to step onto a stage and into the broader local music scene.

And what makes it especially powerful is our Patented SongFirst approach: students learn through the songs that inspire them, and through those songs they begin to understand technique and music theory in a way that feels practical, exciting, and immediate.

MG What role do you see this new branch playing within the broader local music and creative scene?

RL I see this branch becoming much more than a music school — I see it becoming a creative hub. School of Rock’s model is designed not only to build musical proficiency, but also confidence, teamwork, resilience, and a real sense of belonging through playing with others. That matters in any creative scene, because great artists don’t just need skill — they need community, confidence, and opportunities to perform.

In Sandton, I’d love to see this branch become a space where future bands are formed, where young musicians discover their identity, and where the local creative ecosystem feels stronger because there’s a place actively developing the next generation of performers.

MG For aspiring musicians thinking of joining, what advice would you give them about making the most of their time at the school?

RL My biggest advice would be: fully embrace the process. Don’t just come for the lesson — lean into the rehearsal experience, the performances, the teamwork, and the challenge of growing with other musicians. The more open you are to the full experience, the more you’ll get out of it.

And finally, don’t wait until you feel “ready.” Growth happens by doing — by showing up, trying things, making mistakes, and getting back on stage again. That’s where confidence is built, and that’s where the real magic happens.

MG Can you walk us through what a typical student journey looks like here — from their first lesson to performing live?

RL A typical student journey starts with us getting to know the student with a Trial Lesson — their musical interests, experience level, and what excites them. From there, they move into weekly private lessons and weekly group rehearsals, with songs and parts tailored to their age, ability, and stage of development.

The goal is always to help them grow steadily while building toward live performance. Every few months, that work comes together on stage at a real local venue, in front of a live audience.

What makes that journey really special is our teaching Method. It’s not just about learning notes or scales in a vacuum — it combines performance, song-based learning, Method Books, and the Method App to make music education more engaging and more practical.

The Method App, for example, gives students assigned exercises and songs, instructor feedback, access to thousands of song transcriptions, adjustable playback and tempo, backing tracks to rehearse with, and even tools like a built-in tuner.

It helps students keep progressing between lessons and makes practice feel much more interactive and motivating.



Building Community Through Music

In this short conversation, Jarred shares his vision for bringing the School of Rock experience to a new location, focusing on community, real performance, and creating opportunities for musicians at every level. It's a simple but powerful reminder that music isn't just about playing — it's about people.

MG What excites you most about bringing the School of Rock experience to this new location, and how do you see it impacting the local music community?

JR A new venue means building a new community. The excitement of having a real, positive impact on peoples lives

MG Can you walk us through what a typical student journey looks like here — from their first lesson to performing live?

JR From complete beginners to advanced musicians, the journey is very similar. Our curriculum addresses every student's needs. From your individual lessons where our skilled instructors will teach what's required, to band rehearsals, culminating in a real rock performance.

MG What role do you see this new branch playing within the broader local music and creative scene?

JR I see it forming and growing a community of music lovers. Kids meet like-minded kids, adults meet like-minded adults. That is where it all starts. Once there is that, the rest happens organically.

MG For aspiring musicians thinking of joining, what advice would you give them about making the most of their time at the school?

JR Show up committed, push yourself outside your comfort zone, and practice with purpose. Learn from the people around you, take every chance to perform, and build relationships along the way. Most importantly - have some fun!

Ridge unpacks what it means to bring the School of Rock into a new space, not just as a place to learn, but as a hub for community.

MG What excites you most about bringing the School of Rock experience to this new location, and how do you see it impacting the local music community?

RH What excites me most is filling a genuine void in our local scene. Right now, there's a huge gap for musicians who want more than just solo lessons—they're looking for a real community to create with. Bringing the first School of Rock to this area means providing that missing connection. Plus, seeing students thrive in a professional-grade space with top-tier equipment will raise the bar for what our local music community can achieve together

MG Can you walk us through what a typical student journey looks like here — from their first lesson to performing live?

RH The journey kicks off with a trial lesson, where we really get to know the student's goals and musical taste. From there, they dive into a dual-track approach: weekly one-on-one sessions to sharpen their technical skills, and group rehearsals where they learn the 'magic' of playing in a band. It all builds toward the ultimate payoff—taking all that hard work out of the practice room and onto the stages of great local venues for a live performance.



MG What role do you see this new branch playing within the broader local music and creative scene?

RH Since we are the first of our kind in the area and have such incredible facilities, I see this branch becoming the go-to community space for music. It's a place where everyone is welcome and where 'mass encouragement' is at the core of everything we do. My goal is for this location to act as a bridge—connecting our students with local artists and music stores to build a thriving scene where every musician feels empowered to grow.

MG For aspiring musicians thinking of joining, what advice would you give them about making the most of their time at the school?

RH My biggest advice is to be open-minded and really trust the process. Learning an instrument has its ups and downs, but if you believe in yourself and lean into the support of our instructors, the progress will follow. Most importantly, remember to have fun—the best music happens when you're enjoying the journey and the people you're playing with.



Building the Next Generation of Musicians

Ryan shares his vision for creating a space where musicians of all ages can develop their skills, connect with others, and step onto a real stage.

With a strong focus on community and hands-on experience, it's all about inspiring the next generation to find their sound and enjoy the journey along the way.

MG What excites you most about bringing the School of Rock experience to this new location, and how do you see it impacting the local music community?

RP The new school is a place where we build our own community for musicians and where kids can learn and be inspired to become our future rock stars

MG Can you walk us through what a typical student journey looks like here - from their first lesson to performing live?

RP Our students start with a trial lesson for whichever instrument or singing they like. Our song's first approach helped them jam from the get-go which keeps the lesson engaging and goal orientated. They are placed in a band setup to understand the dynamics of playing together and to understand each other within that setup. Within 3 months they are ready to perform on a real stage with their bands, gaining experience while attending weekly lessons and band rehearsals.

MG What role do you see this new branch playing within the broader local music and creative scene?

RP To create a bigger platform and music community for everyone interested in music and performance.

MG For aspiring musicians thinking of joining, what advice would you give them about making the most of their time at the school?

RP Have fun, learn as much as you can, play music and always ask many questions.



Where Talent Meets Opportunity

Snazo shares the vision behind creating a high-energy, performance-driven space that goes beyond traditional lessons.

MG What excites you most about bringing the School of Rock experience to this new location, and how do you see it impacting the local music community?

SV What excites me most is the opportunity to move beyond traditional, isolated music lessons and give local students a purposeful, high energy environment. I see us becoming a community within a community. We plan to collaborate with local venues for our student performances, which not only gives our kids real-world experience but also breathes fresh energy and new audiences into the local live music ecosystem.

MG Can you walk us through what a typical student journey looks like here — from their first lesson to performing live?

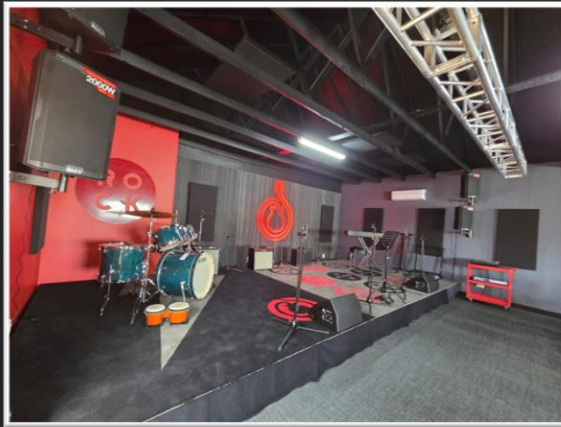
SV At School of Rock, we're thrilled to bring our performance based approach to the local community. The student journey begins with the Song First method in private lessons, quickly moving into weekly group rehearsals where they learn the essential teamwork of a real band then to the spotlight where they get to be a part of the local music scenes by performing full sets in professional venues.

MG What role do you see this new branch playing within the broader local music and creative scene?

SV We see this new branch serving as a vital talent incubator that bridges the gap between music education and the professional stage

MG For aspiring musicians thinking of joining, what advice would you give them about making the most of their time at the school?

SV My advice is to lean into the community and say yes to the stage as soon as possible. While private practice builds your skill, the real growth happens during rehearsals when you're collaborating with your bandmates and learning the language of teamwork. Never be afraid of making mistakes, this is your safe space to experiment

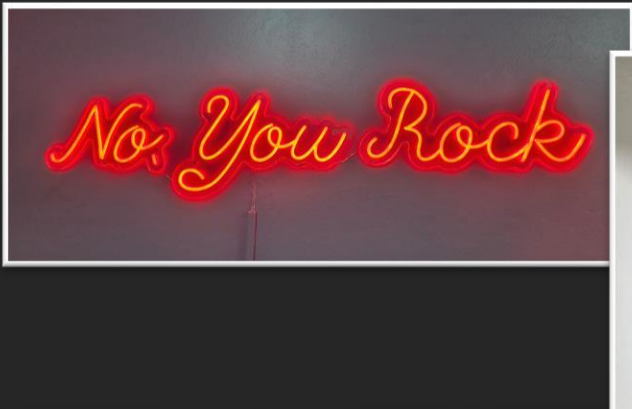
