# **Election of City Mayor** Pro Tem tabled

During its Dec. 8 meeting, Abbeville City Council had prepared to elect a Mayor Pro Tem, but ended up tabling the election until later due to a tie vote in the election process.

Council member Faye Thomas, who had been serving as Mayor Pro Tem, was nominated, as were Council members Benii Greeson and Chris Craw-

Thomas received two

Greeson each received three votes apiece.

City Attorney Tombo Hite, listening in on the meeting electronically though he was physically absent, advised that Council have a runoff election between Greeson and Crawford, since each had three votes, and Council member Faye Thomas had

However, this election resulted in a tie vote as well, and Hite then advised votes, while Crawford and that the election matter be

tabled.

There are typically nine members of City Council, including the Mayor, but the seat formerly held by Trey Edwards on Council is now vacant since Edwards became Mayor--leaving eight members of City Council altogether.

A special election is slated to be held to fill the City Council seat formerly held by Trey Edwards before he became Mayor (see related

# **Special City Council** election set for March

A special Abbeville City Council election is scheduled to be held on Tuesday, March 9, 2021, to fill the Abbeville City Council District Three seat, according to the Abbeville County voter registration office.

That seat had formerly been held by Trey Edwards, who vacated it after he was elected Mayor of Abbeville last month.

Those individuals wishing to file as candidates for the special election may do so at the Abbeville County voter registration and elections office in the Abbeville County Administrative Complex at 903 West Greenwood Street in Abbeville.

Voting in the election in March will be done at the Administrative Complex.

Abbeville City Council elections are nonpartisan.

For more information, one may call the Abbeville County voter registration office at 366-2400, extension 53.

Edwards noted Wednes-

day that his time on City Council District Three included serving about seven months of the unexpired term of the late Franklin Cape, and then he was elected in 2018 to the term he was serving when he was elected Mayor of Abbeville.

# Vaccine on its way as coronavirus cases continue their sobering surge

We can see the light

Representing a glimmer of hope in the sea of pandemic darkness, the coronavirus vaccine is on its way to hospitals across the country this week, and that includes Abbeville Area Medical Center.

"We expect it this week, but have not received a firm date," said Meg Davis, marketing, foundation and volunteer services for AAMC, Monday morning.

The plan is to vaccinate front line health care workers first, and then the rest of the population, according to reports published Saturday.

The vaccine is on its way as the coronavirus case numbers in Abbeville County continue to climb in a big way.

Indeed, at press time, Abbeville County was closing in on 1,000 cases. As of Sunday, at approximately 11:30 a.m., Abbeville County had 954 coronavirus cases, and

18 confirmed coronavirus-related deaths, as of the morning of Sunday, Dec. 13, according to data released by DHEC.

Among Abbeville County's neighboring counties, Anderson County had 9,017 confirmed coronavirus cases, and 232 coronavirus related deaths, while Greenwood County had 3,322 cases, and 79 deaths.

Laurens County had 2,811 cases, and 70 deaths, while McCormick County had 351 cases, and seven deaths.

The state of South Carolina has reached some enormously sobering milestones.

According to reports published Saturday, the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control reported 3,137 confirmed cases and 47 additional deaths Friday.

More than 220,000 have been recorded in South Carolina since the beginning of the outbreak, and 4,332 South Carolinians have died due to the coronavirus, according to published reports.

Indeed, case and hospital numbers in South Carolina are returning to levels not seen since the state's last spike over the summer, those reports indicate.

South Carolina is not alone. Other states, such as California, are also experiencing a "sobering surge."

In the nation as a whole, the number of COVID-19 deaths was approaching 300,00 at press time.

The phrase "grim milestone" has become widely used when reporting coronavirus death numbers.

# Two face attempted murder charges

Two men face charges of attempted murder following an incident in Honea Path, according to an Abbeville has already started in the County Sheriff's Office in-

Travis Howard Patterson, 31, of 1528 Grove Road, Anderson, and Christopher Broadmouth Church Road, Honea Path, face charges of attempted murder, in addition to burglary first degree and possession of a weapon during the commission of a violent crime.

The two men were arrested in connection with shots fired into a residence on J.T. Ashley Road in Honea Path

on Dec. 3. "I did visually observe approximately 14 shell casings as well as multiple bullet entries into the residence," a deputy indicated in the incident report.



# Fatality arises from structure fire in county

Abbeville County fire fighters fought two structure fires recently, one of which produced a fatality, Abbeville County Fire Marshal Tim Williams said.

One of them was on Wednesday, Dec. 8, at 9230 Highway 184 East, with Broadmouth, Donalds, and Ware Shoals fire departments responding to a reported structure fire, following a call at 7:15 p.m.

Units arrived on the scene with a fully involved single family dwelling. Fire fighters extinguished the blaze in about 40 minutes.

Fire fighters were on the scene within 10 minutes of

dispatch, and approximately 27 fire fighters from the three departments fought the blaze, bringing it under control within 40 minutes.

The cause of the fire is under investigation by the Fire Marshal's Office, SLED, and the Sheriff's Office, Williams said. No injuries were reported to civilians or fire fighters.

The second fire occurred on the same evening, about 1 a.m. at 30 Rice Road in the Donalds area.

The Donalds, Cold Spring, and Due West fire departments responded with 23 personnel, and upon arrival they found a single wide mobile home, 80- percent

Fire fighters found an elderly man with burns and smoke inhalation, and fire fighters treated him until Abbeville County EMS took over.

Life Flight medical services were requested, and he was airlifted to a burn center in Augusta, where he succumbed to his injuries early Sunday morning, Williams said.

Fire fighters extinguished the fire in about 40 minutes, the Fire Marshal continued.

# School District acquires two activity buses

The Abbeville County School District has acquired two activity buses for the various schools in the Abbeville County School District to use.

Each bus can seat as many as 20, but the School District, due to coronavirus-related guidelines, will be seating fewer students on each bus: 12 instead of 20, according to Abbeville County Director of Student Services Dr. Skip Hopkins.

The buses, whose acquisition was in keeping with the District's capital improvement plan, are white with blue trim.

The buses will be housed at the high school, but can be used by any of the District's schools.

They can be used for a variety of activities, from field trips to excursions relating to sporting events. Baseball, softball and basketball teams can use them to travel to away games, for

example.

The new buses cost the District \$56,630 each. They were purchased from Interstate Transportation Equipment in Columbia, SC, and both buses are 2021 Models, according to Dr. Gary and Dr. Hopkins.

Dr. Gary thanked "our school board for their positive approach in utilizing our Capital Improvement Plan to complete projects such as these which have a direct impact on our students.





# Council dispute arises over funds transfer

Abbeville County detention center personnel and Sheriff's deputies might be getting raises following action taken by County Council Monday night.

Each detention center staff member will get a raise of \$2,000 and each deputy a raise of \$1,000, according to Council members Jason Bonds and Kristi Smith.

The money for the raises is coming from the elimination of some positions in the detention center, which is under the control of the Sheriff's Office.

The main goal is to help Smith said.

The Sheriff has not been Smith said. able to fill those positions in a long time, so there "was no need to keep positions

that aren't necessary to be filled at this time," she said.

The money is coming from the elimination of a number of positions, Smith continued.

While, according to reports, the resolution passed, some Council members wanted further clarification on the matter.

The vote tally was four in favor, zero against, and three abstaining, according to reports.

Voting in favor were Council members Smith, Bonds, Simpson and Prince.

County Attorney Lee Roper is going to contact the with employee retention, Association of Counties to seek further clarification,

> According to the resolution, Council's personnel committee has made the

recommendation of salary adjustments in the Detention Center and Sheriff's Office "aimed at recruitment and retention."

"A surplus can be created in these departments by eliminating four open positions in the Detention Center while maintaining jail operations," the resolution continued.

These four positions have been open for several months, Smith has said.

The resolution, as passed, included an amendment for the County Attorney to seek guidance from the Association of Counties on the matter, and if the Association returns favorable guidance to the resolution, the resolution will pass.



# Video to promote Abbeville Promise

The Abbeville County Economic Development Partnership and Freshwater Coast Community Foundation are collaborating to produce a video to promote the Abbeville Promise.

The Promise is a scholarship program that will provide every student who is a resident of Abbeville County and earns a high school diploma the opportunity to complete a two-year degree program at Piedmont Technical College free of tuition and fees, according to the FCCF.

The Abbeville Promise campaign has raised more than \$1.2 million in contributions and pledges.

One highlight of the Promise is that it saw a 15-point change in the number of graduating seniors from Abbeville County schools who are attending Piedmont

Technical College in the year following graduation from 23 percent in 2017 to 38 percent in 2019.

The plan is for the video to be shown in high schools by guidance counselors, and to be shown as well on the Neighbor to Neighbor channel of West Carolina Tel and to current and prospective industries and companies, according to Lee Logan, administrator for the Abbeville Promise.

Logan provided a report updating the progress of the Promise.

Although PTC enrollment from entering high school seniors overall was down in Fall 2020 due to the impact of Covid, Abbeville County Schools retained increases in the number of graduating seniors attending PTC in the year following graduation--from 23% in 2017 to 28% in Fall 2020, the report

"While the percentage is lower this year than in 2019, we'd expect this to recover next fall as we're able to operate more normally, and as school counselors are better able to reach their students," the report goes on to say.

Students funded by the Abbeville Promise continue to do well at PTC, with an average GPA of 3.0. "This indicates that in addition to encouraging enrollment, the program is also helping students succeed," the report continues.

PTC continues to see cumulative increases in enrollment from eligible Abbeville County students, and 156 eligible students are attending this fall, and 59 have been funded by the Promise to date, according to the report.

I have never been prouder to work beside these recovery warriors than I have in the past five months.

September is National Recovery Month, and the goal every year is to not only celebrate recovery but increase community connections. The pandemic has brought the need for true connection to the forefront. Along with the challenges, the pandemic has also brought us an

opportunity for new ideas,

an increased passion for community, and hopefully more understanding of the







Council held a public hearing and passed second reading on Ordinance 2020-17 to amend the County's Zoning Map for an approximately 8.09 acre parcel of land located between Highway 72 East and Mill Road North at the Greenwood County Line, Abbeville, from a zoning district of Forest Agricultural to one of General Commercial.

Council passed a resolution directing the County Director to transfer funds for the purpose of accommodating salary adjustments in the Detention Center and Sheriff's Office.

Council tabled the resolution until after executive session, with Council members Hal Prince and Jason Bonds opposing the tabling, which had been proposed by Council member Charles Goodwin.

"It was time to vote on it," said Bonds, explaining why he voted against the tabling, and noting that in his perspective all the pertinent information had been presented.

In other matters Monday night, Council passed a resolution authorizing the County Director to enter into a contractual relationship with S&S Construction of Anderson in the amount David Garner as County

of \$193.280 for road improvements to KC Ranch Road in Abbeville County and Kershaw Subdivision in Calhoun Falls.

Monday night was also a night of recognition.

Council passed a proclamation recognizing and honoring Emily McMahan for service to Abbeville County.

McMahan served many years as Abbeville County Clerk to Court.

Council passed a proclamation recognizing and honoring James "Ronnie" Ashley for years of service to Abbeville County.

Ashley, who served as Abbeville County Coroner for many years, praised his staff for their assistance, noting that he could not have served effectively without them.

Council passed a proclamation of appreciation and recognition for service to Abbeville County to Kristi Smith,

Smith is an outgoing Abbeville County Council member, and she served as Abbeville County Council chairperson this past year. Council passed a proclamation of appreciation and recognition for service to Abbeville County to outgoing County Council member Hal Prince.

"I thoroughly enjoyed serving Abbeville County," Prince said.

He said that County government is fortunate to have

## Scott bill to strengthen partnerships between HBCUs and Federal Agencies Headed to White House

Today, the United States Senate passed the HBCU Propelling Agency Relationships Towards a New Era of Results for Students (PARTNERS)Act, introduced by U.S. Senators Tim Scott (R-S.C.) and Chris Coons (D-Del.). The bill, previously passed in the U.S. House of Representatives, is now headed to the president's desk for a signature. If signed into law, this legislation will strengthen partnerships between federal agencies and the country's more than 100 Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs).

The HBCU PARTNERS Act builds on the President's 2017 executive order on HBCUs. It will require federal agencies with relevant grants and programs to undertake annual planning and coordinate their efforts to support and expand HBCU participation those programs. The bill strengthens the rigor and transparency requirements of existing law by requiring that agencies track their progress toward past goals and share their plans with Congress. In addition, it codifies the President's Board of Advisors on HBCUs, ensuring an ongoing avenue for the institutions' priorities and policy concerns to be raised.

"Our HBCUs have unlocked opportunities for generations of students, especially in underserved communities, and I am excited that this bipartisan bill is making its way

to the President's desk," said Senator Tim Scott. "The HBCU PARTNERS Act is a great step forward for these schools and their students. I look forward to this critical legislation being signed into law to help these institutions continue their legacies."

"HBCUs like Delaware State University play a critical role in helping to ensure that every American has access to higher education, and I'm so proud that our bipartisan bill to support the missions of HBCUs is one step closer to becoming law," said Senator Coons. "We have much more work ahead to make college accessible and affordable for all Americans, and HBCUs are an important part of that work," said Senator Chris Coons.

The HBCU PARTNERS Act was co-sponsored by U.S. Senators Doug Jones (D-AL), David Perdue (R-GA), Kamala Harris (D-CA), Roger Wicker (R-MS), Tim Kaine (D-VA), and Marsha Blackburn (R-TN). A companion bill was introduced in the House by U.S. Representatives Mark Walker (NC-06) and Alma Adams (NC-12).

"Creating a comprehensive"

federal partnership with America's HBCUs is essential for Congress' shared goal of directing unprecedented support for North Carolina's HBCUs like North Carolina A&T, Winston-Salem State, Elizabeth City State, North Carolina Central, Bennett, Johnson, C. Smith, and Shaw – proud and historic institutions which I am priv-

ileged to support," Walker said. "With this bipartisan legislation passed through Congress and on its way to the president's desk, the HBCU PARTNERS Act further cements our nation's commitment to these vital educational institutions."

"Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) are agents of access and equity in this country," said Congresswoman Adams. "The HBCU PARTNERS Act recognizes these contributions in the most important way possible: by affording these institutions the ongoing support and investment needed to deepen their transformational work. This legislation will require every administration and the federal agencies it manages to plan and coordinate, on an annual basis, their efforts to strategically engage with and invest in HBCUs. In addition, it codifies the President's Board of Advisors on HBCUs, ensuring an ongoing avenue for HBCU priorities and policy concerns to be raised and addressed. Advancing the mission of HBCUs and the success of the communities they serve must be on the minds of our country's leaders, and more importantly, it must be part of their agendas."

"Thank you to my colleagues in the Congressional Black Caucus and the Bipartisan HBCU Caucus for their support, as well as all of the organizations that are tireless advocates for HBCUs, in getting this bill passed," Adams concluded.

# Dress up your landscape with winter-inspired container gardens

Clear out your fall containers and make room for some winter greenery. These planters are sure to brighten those dreary winter days and add life to your landscape.

Transform weatherproof summer and fall containers for winter. Fiberglass, plastic, cement and wood will hold up to the cold, ice and snow. Don't subject terra cotta and glazed pots to the harsh elements that can cause them to crack. Remove faded fall flowers and add a bit of potting mix to fill the container within two inches of the top. Or select a new weatherproof container and fill it with potting mix.

Consider your overall landscape design and other outdoor winter decorations when creating or purchasing a holiday planter. Place a couple of winter planters on your front steps or dress up your patio, deck or balcony and enjoy the view from the comfort of your home. Don't overlook those hanging baskets. Fill them with winter greenery to elevate your winter containers to a

fun new level.

Fresh-cut needled evergreens like spruce, white pine, fir and broadleaf evergreen boxwood and holly combine nicely to form the backbone of your container design. Make it easy by using spruce tips to create vertical interest in a container. You only need to set a few in the center of the pot to look like a pro. Surround these with graceful white pine boughs to anchor the arrangement to the container.

Add sprigs of other evergreens for additional texture and shades of green. Next, it's time to put your creativity to work. For those that prefer a natural look, consider white birch branches and stems of red twig dogwood, corkscrew willow or contorted hazelnut. Add a bit more color with berry laden winter holly branches and dried seed rudbeckias, allium, and coneflower seed heads or hydrangea flowers. Finish off your arrangement with a few evergreen cones and

Or add a bit of glitz with painted and glittered cones, twigs, ornaments, or other

holiday adornments. You can purchase these or create your own with a bit of paint and glitter. Just make sure your materials will hold up to the winter weather.

Once your arrangement is complete, water thoroughly. The moist soil helps keep greenery fresh and in place. Once the soil is frozen you can stop watering. The cold weather will help keep your greens looking good throughout the holidays and beyond.

Extend the life of your greenery with an organic biodegradable antitranspirant. These materials help seal in the moisture, delaying the browning of cut greens. Always read and follow label directions carefully. Most need to be applied to evergreen boughs outdoors and allowed to dry before bringing it indoors or beginning your arrangement.

# Anderson provides Civic Center update

By Henry E. Green

Center get a face lift?

The City of Abbeville is studying the possibility of renovating the Civic Center which is situated on North Main Street and is used for a variety of things, from meetings to basketball.

A memo fro m Assistant for an estimated cost of City Manager Fran Anderson provided an update.

The architectural firm of McMillan Pazdan Smith has made an initial assessment of the Civic Center building and parking area, and presented cost assessments, including one for updates to the current building and the other for the construction of a new event building, Anderson indicated.

Proposed renovations to Will the Abbeville Civic the current building would include bringing the building up to current codes, aesthetic updates to the entry way, the current event rooms, the addition of two warming kitchens, office and restroom updates with the addition of another restroom \$332,500, the Assistant City Manager continued.

These updates would also include updating the front exterior appearance with a canopy overhang and courtyard.

The City is currently having the HVAC system and the roof assessed in order to prioritize the different segments of the renovation project, the Assistant City


Manager continued.

Other updates would include new bleachers and new flooring for the gym.

Any updates that are not an impending requirement affecting the structure or use of the building could be implemented in phases depending on preference.

New construction of an approximately 3,000 square feet building for events to include one warming kitchen and two restrooms is estimated at \$1, 300,000. The event room could seat 186 with tables and chairs and 400 with chairs only, Anderson continued.

Council listened to the presentation and took it as information.

## Galloping goats, biting gators and more in your local newspaper

If you happened to read the Albuquerque Journal recently you would have learned about a family who used their (galloping) goats to gobble up weeds and earn some extra money while keeping the city's weeds and grass trimmed. In the Orlando Sentinel, you would have discovered that a man was attacked and bitten by an alligator while hunting near one of the local lakes. Neither of these stories are life-and-death issues, unless you happen to be the hunter, but they provide interesting glimpses into life in their communities. While these headlines easily grabbed your attention, these same newspapers also covered the more important stories, like the actions of the local city council, the school board and state government, and you probably won't see those stories elsewhere. Journalists tell the stories that are fun to read, but even more importantly, the ones we need to know. America needs journalists!

While you can't turn on a TV, radio or even look at Facebook without seeing mentions of COVID-19, there has been as much misinformation disseminated as actual facts. Chances are your newspaper has covered the pandemic and its real impact on your community. Your newspaper is a reliable source that provides information about the number of new cases, hospitalizations and deaths, so you are better equipped to make an informed decision about how best to cope with these new challenges. America needs journalists! And what if you really need to know

the details about which face mask works better and which ones you should avoid? Check your newspaper. It probably has the information, or you could give Google a try. Many of the results will be from newspapers. America needs jour-



I happen to live in Florida, the state with the most hurricane landfalls. Hurricanes are a big deal here, and if I want to know the path of the storm, there are lots of options. But if I want to know where my local shelters are located, where I can get sand bags, the expected impact on my city, and what I need to do to prepare, there is no better source than the local newspaper. And yes, Florida needs journalists. Whether you live in Iowa and face routine tornadic activity, or live in Montana with its blizzards, newspapers provide insights into dealing with those routine challenges better than any

other source. Newspapers also provide real benefits to those who never read them or even glance at a headline. Last year, the Anchorage Daily News did a series of investigative stories that showed how a third of Alaska's villages had no police protection. The series led to the U.S. Attorney General declaring an emergency for public safety in rural Alaska, and he was able to free up \$10.5 million to support local police efforts and public safety. While many people in the affected villages never saw or even heard of the series in the Anchorage Daily News, they all reaped the benefit. America needs journalists.

Newspapers, and journalism in general, is under siege as the disruption of the internet, the rise of Google and Facebook and their use of newspapers' content without payment have all wreaked havoc on the industry. With many restaurants and retailers closing the past few months due to the pandemic, advertising revenue has plummeted even further. While newspapers continue to tell the story, it has gotten more difficult. While America needs journalists, journalists need you. Your paid subscription and support of local journalism matters. Consider taking one additional step in support of your local newspaper: Ask your Congressional representative to support the Local Journalism Sustainability Act. 



# Poinsettia is rooted in traditions of Christmas

The poinsettia is one of the most familiar symbols of Christmas, with its brilliant red and green hues mirroring what seem to be the colors of this holiest of Christian holidays.

You see it everywhere at Christmas time. You buy them in grocery stores, you give them as gifts, you adorn your living room with them, and churches are filled with them.

This seemingly ubiquitous plant was named after Joel Poinsett, a 19th century South Carolina statesman. During his career, Poinsett was a member of the South Carolina state legislature, a member of the U.S. House of Representatives, and the first United States Minister to Mexico.

It was while he was serving

as a diplomat to Mexico that he came to know the plant that now bears his name. An amateur botanist, he sent samples of the plant back home to the United States, and the plant, which became known as the "poinsettia," grew in popularity in America, according to Wikipedia.

Celebratingholidays.com tells us that poinsettias bloom during the Christmas season, and the starshaped leaves call to mind "the Star of Bethlehem."

Native to Mexico, the poinsettia was very popular among the Aztecs, and the Aztec emperors had them brought in to the Aztec capital in what is now Mexico City, where they would not grow naturally at that high altitude.

star flower," and hundreds of years later, when Poinsett became familiar with it, the plant was already known as a holiday flower in Mexico, where it was called "the flower of Christmas Eve."

According to teleflora.com, the flower's association with Christmas was strengthened with a Mexican legend, which tells the story of a child who gathered weeds from the side of the road to place on the altar of the church at Christmas, because he was too poor to give anything else

The act of piety produced a holiday miracle, as the weeds were transformed into flowers of brilliant red and green, and thus the poinsettia became a "star" of the Christmas season.

# City applies for grant to strengthen infrastructure

The City of Abbeville is applying for a federal grant, administered through FEMA,, which helps communities be better prepared against the threat of natural disasters.

"The Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) supports states, local communities, tribes and territories as they undertake hazard mitigation projects, reducing the risks they face from disasters and natural hazards," said City of Abbeville Community

Development Director Mike Clary.

"The City of Abbeville is applying to the BRIC program for \$600,000 to help fund a potential tie in point to the Duke Electrical System. The tie in point would provide an alternative power delivery point and allow the City to restore electrical service in a much timelier manner in the Lowndesville and Lake Secession areas by giving utility crews the ability to better isolate outages and restore power to non-impacted sections of

ne grid.

"Additionally, this tie in point would provide system redundancy for the area of the City served by the Miller Street Substation."

During its Dec. 8 meeting, Abbeville City Council approved a resolution by which the City adopted Abbeville County's hazard mitigation plan.

City Manager Blake Stone told Council that the City is adopting the plan in order to apply for the BRIC grant.
