families and visitors an opportunity to see some of the amazing opportunities we provide for our students.

As has been the case since I was appointed as Principal to the College in 2019, it is a privilege to work with our students, families and staff to make the school the best it can be; this of course is an ongoing goal for everyone, as we continuously strive for improvement.

It has been particularly pleasing to watch our 1,200 students develop toward caring, capable, responsible young adults. Supported by their families and guided by their teachers and support staff, our students have experienced considerable successes, many of which are documented in this yearbook. Accompanied by our posts to social media platforms, I hope that everyone has a sense of the joy we experience as we all learn together at Charles Campbell College.

Throughout 2024, College leadership has worked to position the College as a STEM / VET Centre of Excellence, serving students from schools across eastern Adelaide. We have significantly expanded the Vocational Education and Training (VET) options onsite to include courses in Engineering, Automotive Services,

Electrotechnology and Construction from 2025. Of particular note is our Engineering Pathways package which enables students seeking tertiary studies in engineering gain handson experience in addition to their studies in Specialist Mathematics and Physics. Building upon our success in the F1 in Schools World Final in 2023, we have developed a F1 in Schools pathway for students from Years 7-10. In 2025, we will continue our work with Engineers Australia to create new STEM pathways for students in Years 3-6.

Student leadership remains a key focus across the College, and our prefects continue to make a positive difference to the lives of our students, and valuable contributions to our local community. I'd like to thank our 2024 Head Prefects, Joshua Hynes and Charlie Sproule, for their steady and supportive leadership of other prefects and members of our Rotary EarlyAct Club. Our EarlyAct student projects in support of Second Chances SA and Catherine House resulted in significant financial and in-kind support for both organisations, and morphed into our highly successful and award-winning Wakakirri dance and drama performances. We will continue to support and guide our growing number of student-led clubs across the College, creating opportunities for students to engage and connect with other like-minded students.

In January 2024, the Campbelltown City Council acknowledged old scholar Rishi Adhikari (2018–2022) as the Young Citizen of the Year for his extensive work with the 'Youth Crew' in Campbelltown whilst a student at the College. The Council also acknowledged the considerable contributions to the community by our Parents and Friends Chair, Kayla Petrovansky, who was awarded the honour of Citizen of the Year.

Congratulations go to all of our students who achieved individual success in academic, and sporting competitions, and others who made significant contributions to the community; many have been acknowledged at assemblies and special events, in this yearbook and in our social media.

A showcase of the College continues to be our Reception to Year 6 Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Program, which provides an incredible learning experience for our younger students, thanks largely to the tireless efforts of Andrew Adair. Andrew has created amazing opportunities for students to appreciate the wonder of the natural world and the importance of fresh produce in healthy living. We are fortunate to enjoy Andrew's stewardship of the program, which includes his ability to create delicious recipes enabling students (and staff) to produce nutritious meals for themselves and others. Our orchard was established this year, and in 2025 it will be fenced and a hen-house constructed.

The College held its third annual Valedictory Dinner for Year 12 students and their families, accompanied by teachers, to celebrate their completion of secondary education. This year's event was held at JDF Receptions in Windsor Gardens.

I am grateful to our incredible Parents and Friends Community for the tireless work they do to support our students and staff, and to build such a positive culture amongst our families and friends. Without their support many of the events, activities and services that we enjoy here at the school could not continue; these include the breakfast clubs on the R-6 and 7-12 campuses, the second-hand uniform shop, Mother's and Father's Day stalls, after-school netball and other after-hours sports, the annual Campbell Fair, intermission drinks and snacks at performance nights, barbecues on sports days, open nights and transition days to name just a few.

I enjoy working with our very supportive
Governing Council, made up of dedicated
volunteers and community representatives.
Governing Council provides me with valuable
insights and community feedback which enables
my leadership team and I to continuously
improve what we do at the College, and how

we do things. Governing Council members are committed to enhancing community connections and I thank them for their service.

The College enjoys the ongoing support of our local community service clubs: the Rotary Club of Campbelltown, the Kiwanis Club of Rostrevor-Campbelltown and the Lions Club of Athelstone-Rostrevor. The City of Campbelltown is a proactive, branch of local government and has a strong commitment to youth and environmental sustainability; we continue to nurture a strong relationship with local council that has led to increasing connections between our students and youth across Campbelltown.

Charles Campbell College is a great place to work. I am grateful to all of my staff, teachers and support officers, for their ongoing support, and for their kindness and dedicated service to our young people. Despite the challenges that arise, my staff continually rise to even greater heights to support and guide our students and families.

This yearbook would not be possible without the hard work, skill and attention to detail of Jenny Noel and I thank her for what is another tremendous yearbook.

I hope that you enjoy reading the articles and looking through the images as much as I have; I am so proud of our community here at CCC. I'd like to thank all of our families and students for their ongoing support, and wish everyone a safe and happy Christmas / New Year holiday. I look forward to seeing you all again in 2025.

Most of all, we'd like to thank the audience for supporting the show. Without audiences to come to shows at The Fringe, artists would not be able to do what we love to do.





Our R-6 Aboriginal Education Teacher led a number of cultural activities including ball games and art-based learning to further share the messages and symbolism of togetherness.
















Eden V has been accepted in to the Adelaide Crows Academy program



Congratulations to Kardi House for organising a great week of activities and for raising money for Beyond Blue.















International Review

2024 has been an enormous year for the International program.

140 different international students were enrolled at CCC for anywhere between 4 weeks and the whole year, ranging between Years 2 to 12. The majority of students arrived from Vietnam, China and Japan, but we also attracted enrolments from Cambodia, Brazil, Italy, Germany, France, Hong Kong, Iran, Korea, Pakistan, India, Nepal, Peru, Colombia, Chile, USA, Laos, and the Philippines. Our students completed short Study Abroad Programs or have enrolled in the ongoing Graduate program, with aspirations to continue in Australian universities.

Through our partnership with the International Education Service (IES), international students participated in the state-wide 'welcome' events, Student Ambassador program, multi-sports day, as well as visits to Victor Harbor, the city, Waterworld, and West Lakes aquatics.

The school extended a heart-felt welcome to nine study tours, comprising over 150 students and staff, from:

- Japan: 2 from Chuo Morioka Junior High School, Kadoma City Junior High School, Kansai Hokuyo High School, Hachioji Junior High School and Ushiku High School
- Thailand: Satriwittaya School
- South Korea: Chungcheongbuk-do, and
- India: Open Forum for Principals

A study tour from Taiwan involved 25 Visual Arts teachers who spent time immersed in a range of classes in the Arts Learning Area. This was a wonderful opportunity to share teaching practice and highlight our use of student agency to drive learning.

Another visit consisted of 34 international agents who will promote our school, and study

opportunities in Adelaide in general, to their clients around the world. This visit allowed us to showcase a range of student talent and the quality of learning in Dance, Music, the Formula 1 in Schools Program and Student Leadership.

Our gratitude and sincere thanks go to our student buddies, homestay families and staff, who have continued to welcome these visitors with open arms.

We are delighted to be South Australia's biggest and most ambitious international program, and look forward to welcoming a new wave of visitors in 2025.








































Japan Study Tour


TOKYO AND MOUNT FUJI

On 21 September, two teachers and eighteen students from Years 10 to 12 stumbled out of bed at 3am and travelled to the airport, ready to embark on an adventure of a lifetime. After a brief, hectic stop at Queensland airport, and a long tiring flight we finally landed in Tokyo, greeted by the twinkling city lights and a very welcoming bed. Everyone was up bright and early the next morning ready to see the sights of the city. Starting with the Meiji Shrine and the Nezu Museum, we got our first taste of the rich Japanese culture and history whilst enjoying their beautiful gardens. A change of pace in the afternoon saw us explore the vibrant Hajajuku district, a visit to the chaotic Shibuya crossing before ending our day at an indoor amusement park, Joypolis, where we were treated with an unexpected and beautiful sunset over the city. The next day we boarded our bus and headed to central Honshu, home of Mt Fuji. A long bus ride brought us to the amusement park, Fuji Q Highland, with those of us game enough spending an exhilarating day on the vast

variety of roller coasters, including the steepest rollercoaster in the world, while others were more content wandering through Thomas Land, trying different Japanese food stalls and buying souvenirs. The afternoon saw a quick trip to Lake Kawaguchiko which promised a beautiful view of Mount Fuji. Unfortunately, the clouds were covering the famous mountain, but we enjoyed a cable cart ride and a scenic view of the lake and the surrounding area.

USHIKU HOMESTAY

Leading into our visit to Toyo University Ushiku, we were a little unsure about what the next few days would bring but from the moment we arrived we experienced a warm welcome and endless generosity. After a tour of the school, a welcoming ceremony, and an exchanging of gifts, we were introduced to our buddies and their families and headed to their homes (one of us even staying in a temple) to begin our authentic Japanese experience. Over four days, we were immersed in Japanese culture, trying different foods, participating in cultural



customs and experiencing the city of Tokyo and surrounds. Experiences included trips to Disneyland, aquariums, delicious home cooked meals, plenty of Mario Cart and fireworks. During school hours we travelled to either the Uneo Zoo, or National Museum of Nature and Science, visited the gigantic Ushiku Buddha and local shopping malls, and experienced traditional Japanese classes including lessons in calligraphy and Japanese counting, giving us a priceless experience of Japanese school life. It was with heavy hearts that we farewelled Toyo University Ushiku, our buddies and their families to whom we had grown close with, waving farewell but promising to keep the friendships alive.

NAGOYA, KYOTO AND HIROSHIMA

During the final few days, we travelled via Shinkansen (bullet train), experiencing both the peak of Japanese infrastructure and the rich cultural history. In Nagoya we participated in traditional Japanese crafts, designing a pendant using sand before visiting the Nagoya Train Museum and learning about the history and development of bullet trains. In Kyoto we enjoyed a walk through the Arahiyama Bamboo grove before exploring the Tenryuji temple and the scenic surrounds. A tough hike up the hill to Arashiyama Monkey Park was worth the effort when we were able to get up close with native Japanese Monkeys, wandering around freely at our feet. The day ended with a visit to the Samurai and Ninja Museum, where we learnt about the history of these brilliant warriors and learnt how to throw shuriken's and dressed up like a traditional samurai. The next day we wandered through thousands of red gates at the Fushimi Inari Shrine and a beautiful Japanese garden before heading to the Higashiyama District for an afternoon of exploration. At Hiroshima we visited the Hiroshima Peace Park and Atomic Bomb Museum for a sobering, eyeopening look at the devastation caused by the atomic bomb. Afterwards, we toured Hiroshima Castle, where, along with the history, we enjoyed an excellent view of Hiroshima city. With mixed feelings we arrived back home, thankful for having the assistance of our teachers Ms Taylor and Mr Butler, the fond memories of the incredible experience and suitcases full of Japanese treats and souvenirs.

Year 8 students have participated in work based on the regions of Italy, designing menus, participating in the Masterchef competition, being television




presenters, building imaginary cities, and participating and winning in the Italian State Language Competition on famous Italians.









To represent the topic of looking up, I decided to create a series of photos that start by looking down towards the ground, and end by looking up towards the clouds.
