Gila Silverman, PhD


Gila holds a PhD in Sociocultural and Medical Anthropology and a Master's in Public Health, both from the University of Arizona. She also completed a certificate in Congregational Health Ministry at Andover Newton Theological School and was a member of the second cohort of the Jewish Pedagogies Research Fellowship with M²: The Institute for Experiential Jewish Education. Prior to joining Shomer Collective, Gila served as Director of Jewish Lifelong Learning at Case Western Reserve University's Siegal Lifelong Learning Program. She has also held positions at the New Israel Fund, Shatil, the Hadassah-Brandeis Institute, and the Shleimut Institute, an initiative to develop health care programs for synagogues.

Much of Gila's academic and communal work has focused on the intersections of religion, spirituality, health and healing, exploring the diverse ways that we find meaning and relevance in Jewish tradition and ritual, particularly at times of illness and loss. Her most recent writings have focused on kaddish and Jewish mourning, both from ethnographic and personal perspectives. She also co-edited a special issue on Anthropology and Grief, in the journal Death Studies.
