

NEWS FROM AWLS FOOD SERVICES ¹

NEW USDA MEAL STANDARDS COMING IN 2025

School meals meet strict federal nutrition standards aligned with the Dietary Guidelines for Americans. These standards ensure a balanced diet, including fruits, vegetables, whole grains, lean proteins, and low-fat or fat-free milk, making every meal both nutritious and delicious.

Starting in 2025, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is updating meal standards to further improve school nutrition. These changes include:

- · New limits on added sugars, including those in flavored milk
- Further sodium reductions

Schools will continue to offer balanced meals with items from all five food groups. This includes fruits, vegetables and whole grains. Flavored milk is still permitted, but with a lower sugar content.

In addition, there are specific standards for snacks offered at school, requiring the following:

- 200-calorie limits
- Low in sugar and fat, with whole grain options
- No added sugars in bottled drinks

Why the Updates?

USDA updates reflect the latest Dietary Guidelines for Americans to combat excessive added sugars, sodium, and insufficient fruits, vegetables, and whole grains in children's diets. These improvements aim to reduce diet-related diseases and promote healthier eating habits.

MANAGE YOUR CHILD'S CAFETERIA ACCOUNT ONLINE

AWLS uses <u>PaySchools Central</u>, a web- and app-based cafeteria management software that allows parents to easily manage their child's cafeteria account. When you create an account, you can:

- Securely add money to your child's school meal account.
- View student purchase and account balance information.
- Receive low balance notifications.
- Complete a free and reduced meal application.

FREE & REDUCED MEAL APPLICATIONS


If your family's financial situation has recently changed, you may qualify for free or reduced-price school meals.


PORTRAIT OF A GENERAL

LEARNER'S MINDSET	Generals approach new ideas and challenges with curiosity, embrace learning from failure, and demonstrate integrity in their growth.
CRITICAL THINKING	Generals analyze and reconstruct information thoughtfully to propose meaningful, responsible solutions.
ADAPTABILITY AND FLEXIBILITY	Generals demonstrate awareness, reflect on options, and adjust course as necessary to achieve their goals.
COLLABORATION AND COMMUNICATION	Generals articulate ideas effectively, listen actively and seek diverse perspectives to take collective action when needed.
EMPATHY	Generals connect with others with sensitivity, fairness and respect - valuing diverse experiences and perspectives.

Since their adoption, the District has focused on pairing these competencies with rigorous academic instruction in order to ensure our students are prepared to be positive, contributing citizens. Anthony Wayne Board of Education Briefs

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE DECEMBER MEETING: [VIEW RECORDING]

- The Board heard from Brad Contat, Human Resources Director for updates from District's Wellness Committee and its initiatives for promoting physical, mental, social and intellectual wellness among staff.
- Megan Menchaca, Food Service Director explained the upcoming changes to the school meal standards coming in early 2025 as required by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
- The Board approved the addition of an Engineering Design and Biotechnology course at AWHS and an Automation and Robotics class at AW Junior High, and an upgrade to the FTMS math coursebook to the newest edition.
- The District also entered into an agreement with Kleinfelder Architecture, Inc. to begin the process for evaluating and planning several significant facilities repairs.
- The Board accepted \$6587.63 in donations and grants.
- Following adjournment, members toured each District building to observe their daily operations and enjoyed lunch with second graders at Monclova Primary School.


