BOARD OF EDUCATION SEEKS FIVE-YEAR, 2.42 MILL OPERATIONAL LEVY

Last month, the AWLS Board of Education passed a Resolution of Necessity and a Resolution to Proceed with placing a five-year 2.42-mill operational levy on the March 2024 ballot.

As was <u>shared in a communication on December 13</u>, the Board decided that taking these steps would give the District the most flexibility in preparing options for the Financial Recovery Plan required by the state. This document must be submitted by January 31.

District administration will begin working with the new Board when it convenes this month to find ways to increase revenue and reduce expenses, while maintaining a high-quality education for students.

STAKEHOLDER FINANCIAL PLANNING SURVEY

The District asked stakeholders to provide their thoughts about the proposed operational levy and bond issue that were on the November ballot. Stakeholders were also given the opportunity to share their ideas for how the District can reduce costs and increase revenue.

While we are still evaluating the answers to the open-ended questions below is an early preview of the survey responses.



913 RESPONDENTS

On a scale of 1-5, respondents indicated at AWLS is performing at a raking of good or better

(3, 4, 5) in the following areas:

- 97.2% AWLS provides an excellent or outstanding educational experience.
- 86.2% AWLS is a responsible steward of taxpayer dollars.
- 93.5% AWLS as a good value for the money.
- 81.7% AWLS provides stakeholders with adequate information about District finances.
- 95.7% Are proud to say that they are a part of the AWLS community.

POG: CRITICAL THINKING & LEARNER'S MINDSET TIMELY TECH: AI AND EDUCATION

In the dynamic landscape of K-12 education, Artificial Intelli-

gence (AI) is gradually finding its way into classrooms, bringing with it conversation around its potential opportunities and challenges.

Al's role in K-12 education can support personalized learning experiences, adaptive tutoring systems, and streamlined administrative tasks. For example, <u>DreamBox</u> and <u>Knewton</u> leverage Al algorithms to tailor lessons based on individual student progress, ensuring a more customized and effective learning journey.

As with any emerging technology, it's important to discuss AI's potential risks and limitations. Ethical considerations, data privacy concerns and the risk of reinforcing existing biases are areas that require careful attention. <u>A report by EdSurge</u> dives into the nuanced discussion of the risks associated with AI in education, shedding light on the need for thoughtful implementation and ongoing evaluation.

The EdTech Magazine article, "<u>AI in K-12: Good, Bad, and a</u> <u>Whole Lot of Questions</u>," provides insights into the potential benefits, risks and unanswered questions surrounding AI in the classroom. It seems that AI functions will continue to grow in popularity and use in the future. As we navigate this new technology, educators will need to engage in informed conversations, ensuring that AI in education is a tool that safely enhances, rather than hinders, the learning experience for students.

PORTRAIT OF A GENERAL: LEARNER'S MINDSET WINTER BOOK STUDIES STARTING SOON


