I am a very visual person, however I have no vision when it comes to trying to imagine what something will look like so the thought of a remodel was overwhelming to me because I couldn't envision what the end result would look like.

The thought of starting completely new also seemed daunting knowing there is so much that goes into building a new house.

I knew there were pros and cons to both, but admittedly I truly had no real idea the amount of work that would go into either, as home improvements and building are not in my areas of expertise.



My husband thought it would end up being easier to just build completely new, but I kept going back to the fact I hated to give up on a house that had sentimental value and seemed to just need a "remodel" from what I could see. After much prayer, consideration and conversation we decided to go with the remodel. Although my husband had his hesitations, he also was willing to go with my "we can fix this up and it be like an HGTV show" knowing very well I had no idea what I was truly asking for. Being his agreeable and hard working self, he agreed knowing the amount of work I was getting ready to ask him to undertake.

What I quickly realized was our remodel wasn't just cosmetic, it was a complete renovation.

As in gutting the house down to the studs, rewiring, plumbing, new insulation etc. You see, I quickly realized when you start pulling back the layers of an over 70 year old house there are a lot of things hidden by paint and siding.

What I didn't teach them they will learn, maybe even better than how I would have taught them.

One evening she Googled: "How to make a quesadilla?" We laughed. A lot. But as the mother, I felt a stab of guilt. How come she didn't know how to make a quesadilla? Why didn't I teach her that simple process? I'm a terrible mother. Suffice it to say, it wasn't on the SAT and she got a scholarship.

Some things are okay to GOOGLE. Other things are best taught by the parents.

I'll begin with what may have been of help to my children, but I didn't actually think about teaching them (I've apologized more than once.)

How to Do Laundry All the mechanics. Using money to begin the machine. How to interpret all the Egyptian-like symbols of hot, cold, warm. Separating lights and darks. Oh, and when to use fabric softener (I'll blame my mother who didn't teach me about fabric softener.)

2. How to Do Banking All the intricacies of opening a checking and savings account. Learning to balance your statements. I took each of the girls into the bank at age 16 and we sat down with the nice bank lady and I ended up inviting her to dinner. I'm not sure what else happened that day but we made a new friend. Of course, everything is online now and my girls can never find their checks if they ever have to write one.

3. How to Change Your Oil Really? We have daughters. I'm sure they could find a nice, young man to help them out—especially if bribed with a Google-inspired quesadilla. Besides, their dad's love language is service. You can find him under any number of cars when blessed by visits from his female tribe.

4. How to Buy a Car

What I learned from buying a car was to make sure you had good credit. It's easier. Also, take your father. He brings a certain authority so your girls don't get swindled.

5. How to Get Good Credit Spend money and then pay it off. It works. I borrowed \$2,000.00 to go to Europe for 10 weeks with a backpack and two girlfriends. I paid it back (I had to. It was deducted automatically from my paycheck.) Without my knowing, I got great credit. 6. How to Cook Healthy Meals Well, yes, that would've have been a good idea, obviously (see London example above.) But our girls live near Trader Joe's, and often date fireman or attorneys who cook better than their mother.

7. How to Clean Toilets

8. How to Make Meals for a Month I liked this one. It led to surprising dinners since I forgot to label the freezer bags. The girls may have rejected this teaching due to the mysterious meat that appeared too many nights in a row.

They all worked in the restaurant industry. I didn't have to teach them. They over-tip as a matter of principle.

10. How to Get a Job

We started early. At 16, they made a list of potential employers, washed their hair, practiced their pitch ("Excuse me, Sir. Are you hiring? I'm a hard worker. My dad's from Iowa.") They bowed their trembling heads while I prayed over them that they would be met with kindness, and that they would return home with a job, and off they went. They all have jobs.

1. How to Lead/Follow

You don't need to be loud to be a leader. Lead with guiet assurance, confidence in your values, and compassion for those you are leading. Look out for the person less-secure, and show them their strengths. They will grow, and you never lead alone. When will following, you may not always like your boss, but respect the "office" if not the person. Keep from badmouthing those in authority when you're with others. Instead, be a leader with your fellow-employees in how to be a better person in a difficult situation.

2. How to Say "I'm Sorry."

Humility is the road to maturity. Own your responsibility and say out loud to the one who is hurt, "I'm sorry I hurt you. Please forgive me. I was wrong." Even if you were also wronged, take the high road. Keep short accounts with God and others. Repentance is one of God's greatest gifts.

3. How to Ask Questions

People love to talk—even the introverts. Asking questions is one of the best ways to gain wisdom, and to love your neighbor. There's not enough love in the world. Change your world by asking questions and discipline yourself to listen to their answers.

4. How to Work Hard

It will pay off. Maybe not how and when you think. Remember that

you work not only for yourself, but for an Audience of One. How you

work is a way to worship God who created you with unique strengths.

You honor Him when you work hard, and you gain a holy self-

satisfaction which will carry you through challenging days.

5. How to Seek Wisdom

Sitting at Jesus' feet is the beginning of wisdom and it's available when we ask. (James 1:5) Ask God for it, even when you feel reasonably confident you know what you're doing. God's wisdom is beyond the world's, so when we invite Him into our daily lives, we have an advantage that Jesus spoke of when He chided Martha, "Martha, Martha, you are worried ... about so many things; but only one thing is necessary, for Mary has chosen the good part that which is to her advantage." (Luke 10:41,42 Amplified)

6. How to Be People of Integrity When you say you will do something, do it. And vice-versa. Honest intent and follow-through is rare. Be rare and you will stand out. More importantly, God will use you for His kingdom.

7. How to Create Boundaries

You are only one person, and you can't do everything to please everyone even half of the time. It takes life-experience to learn your limits. Embrace them and guard your heart, mind and body. People- pleasing doesn't help you nor the person you are trying to please. Practice the "sanctified 'no.'" Rid your life of toxic people, and let God deal with them. You are not anyone's savior. That job's been taken.

8. How to Host a Gathering

There are always people needing to be gathered. It doesn't have to be elaborate. Purposefully host. Is it to celebrate someone or something? Will you include a mix of strangers and friends? How can you show others that God loves them? Loneliness is rampant. Hosting will help your loneliness, as well.

9. How Deal with Failure/Success
Failure is hard. Grieve the loss, but ask
God to teach you all you
need to know from that loss. You learn
more from failure so make
sure you do, so you don't find yourself
back in the same place.
Success is sweet. Give your accolades
to God. It's good practice for
later on when we will throw our crowns
at His feet. And celebrate
or
each success with a toast to Heaven and
to those who helped you
along the way.

10. How to Know God

You are deeply loved by God. He's there for the seeking, but seeking is a verb. Your spiritual life is your responsibility, but don't think you can do it alone. Find community that will nurture your relationship with Him. Every day wake up and say, "Lord, I love you but I want to love You more. Help Yourself to my life. Show me how to love my neighbor well. Thank You and Amen."

You don't need to go to Stanford Business School to be successful. You do need to love God and love others like you love yourself. And if you don't know what to do on a Saturday night, call your mother.

LET IT BE!

This year, the Lord began to speak to me about letting things in my life be what they need to be, whether that is saying "yes" to what needs to remain, or to let go to what He asks of me. As I began to dwell on thought, I started reading and studying about four women in the Bible, all with different stories, but all who were met with the faithfulness of God. Just like the May flowers that so faithfully appear each year with their beauty to enjoy, it reminded me of God's faithfulness that continues to show up to bring something beautiful in our lives when we say "yes" to Him, and let Him do His work in us.

In the same way, just like these four women in the Bible, I knew I needed to let some beauty come to my life by letting God do some things in me.



After time passed, and Moses grew into a man, he became one of the greatest leaders. In life, letting go of things is sometimes hard, whether good or bad. It is a sacrifice. When we are unwilling to let go of things in our lives, we can tend to hide them just as Jocabed did. How about hiding our unforgiveness and bitterness, not to mention sin that needs to go? There are things that need to end. "Letting go" can change the trajectory of our life.

The first woman is Jocabed. (Exodus 2: 1-10) Jocabed was the mother of Moses, and she hid him to protect him from Pharaoh's death order which was to kill all Hebrew boy babies.

But, she then made the decision to let go of her most precious child by putting him in a basket where she placed him on the Nile River in hopes that God would still save his life.

In her decision to let go of Moses, it brought about so much more than she could ever expect. He was rescued by Pharaoh's daughter, and brought to safety. Jocabed, Moses' own mother, became the very one to nurse and care for this special child. The second woman was Rahab. (Joshua 2) She chose faith by letting the red cord down the window. Rahab had a not so good history. She was considered a harlot. She lived in Jericho and many men visitors came to her along the way. She was probably not proud of her life choices.

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When two Israelite spies came by, she rescued and hid them from the soldiers who were looking for them. Rahab more than likely heard of the Israelite people and that God was on their side. She and the spies made an agreement that when they came to capture the city, they would remember her and her family as long as they saw the red cord coming down from her window, and they would be spared. Her life was spared, and she was graciously given a husband. .The third woman was Ruth. (Ruth 1 & 2) Ruth chose to stay and cling to Naomi. She was a Moabite woman, who was married to the son of Naomi, Mahlon, who were Israelites. Ruth's husband passed away along with his brother and father. This left Ruth and Naomi as widows. Naomi made the decision that she would go back to her homeland. Upon telling her two daughter-in-laws her decision, Ruth decided to go with Naomi, as it is so well stated in scripture, "Wither thou goest, I will go."

Faith in God is the turnaround to all our desperate struggles and hopeless moments. God is the God of the impossible!

She also became in direct lineage to Jesus. By letting go of fear and the unknown, she put her faith in God and believed that God would make something new of her life.

I can picture them singing songs and talking along the way about their God. I am sure too, that to Ruth, the sense of family and love for her mother-in-law kept her feeling secure in their journey. Once they arrived at Naomi's homeland where her kinfolk lived, Ruth met a man named Boaz. He was a farmer, and a generous man. Ruth gleans in His fields, and eventually he takes her as his wife, and she has children.



In this, she became in direct lineage to King David and to Jesus! Just like Ruth, when we cling to Jesus, and let him keep us in his perfect embrace, we become safe and secure by the Lord's presence, even when He takes us through places that are unknown, a place we have never been before. We live in a time where we must cling to Jesus with everything within us and hang on tight.

The fourth woman is the Woman at the Well. (John 4: 1-29) This woman was a Samaritan, and during this time, Jews and Samaritans did not socialize, but here is Jesus asking her for a drink of water. She replies to Jesus, "How is it that you, being a Jew, ask a drink from me, a Samaritan woman?" John 4:13-14 Jesus answered and said to her, "Whoever drinks of this water will thirst again, but whoever drinks of the water that I shall give him will never thirst. But the water that I shall give him will become in him a fountain of water springing up into everlasting life." Jesus tells her, if you knew who I was, you would ask him for a drink. He is the living water and whoever drinks of Him will never thirst again and have everlasting life.

He begins to tell her all about her life, all the secret things. I am pretty sure she wasn't proud of her life, and she felt empty, unfulfilled, and less than those around her. But Jesus came to bring living water to her.

We may be in a place we feel less than, empty, dry, almost like there is no meaning to life. Jesus is the living water. Let our emptiness be filled with all of Him.

These are just a few of my favorite women in the Bible. As I learn from their lives, I am confident that there is so much beauty, joy, and fulfillment that can be ours. In each of their stories, I see that through their "yes", God did a beautiful and miraculous work in their lives. He is a faithful God.

 - sugar Envy Apples, sliced or cubed
 - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg salt, to taste
 - maple syrup

Ricotta Filling:

- cup ricotta cheese lemon, zest and 1
- juice only 2-3 tablespoons sugar, or to taste

To make crepes: In bowl, combine flour, sugar and salt. Add milk, eggs and vanilla then, using whisk, combine thoroughly. Mixture should be silky smooth. Refrigerate.

To make apple topping: In pan over medium heat, heat butter and brown sugar until bubbly and golden. Add apples, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt, to taste; cook over medium-low heat until apples are soft. Turn off heat and finish with maple syrup. To make ricotta filling: Combine ricotta, lemon zest, lemon juice and sugar, mix well and set aside.

In nonstick pan over medium-low heat, melt small amount of butter Add one ladle crepe batter, cook until bubbles form, flip and cook until golden. Repeat with remaining batter. Stack crepes to keep warm and soft.

warm and soft. Spread ricotta mixture thinly onto crepes and fold into quarters. Top with apple mixture and serve.





Apple, Tomato and Goat Cheese Frittata

- eggs
- teaspoon hot pepper sauce 2
- teaspoons kosher salt turns fresh cracked pepper cup whole milk 20
- 1/4
- cup whole milk Envy Apple, small diced cup sundried tomatoes, chopped ounces goat cheese, crumbled 1/2
- 4 ounces goat cheese, crumorea2 tablespoons thinly sliced chives

Preheat oven to 350 F.

- In large mixing bowl, whisk eggs, hot pepper sauce, salt, pepper and milk until well combined.
- Stir in apples, tomatoes, goat cheese and chives until well combined.
- Using 1/3 measuring cup, spoon frittata mixture into oven-safe large skillet or 9-by-9-inch pan. Bake 25-30 minutes, or until eggs are set.
- Let cool slightly then serve.

As a former intelligence officer in the CIA, I spent over ten years in the Middle East helping to fight the War on Terror. If you asked me as a child what I wanted to be when I grew up, becoming an international spy was not on my radar.

However, God had other plans. Instead of the American dream of having a nice house in the suburbs with a white picket fence, my home became war zones and my office became battlefields.



Although this may seem wild and scary to some, I could not be more grateful for all God has done in my life and all that He has brought me through.

It was through these experiences that I found my voice, developed an unassailable faith, unshakable perseverance, and a willingness to do hard things. (One of the most beautiful things that God has taught me is that ordinary people can do extraordinary things when our faith is bigger than our fears.)

faith over fear



I spent the beginning of my career in espionage pushing through my own selflimiting ideas, false assumptions of my capabilities, conscious and unconscious bias in the CIA, and the misogynistic views of our terrorism sources.

It seemed as if there were giants in front of me, but once I finally defeated these obstacles I discovered that I was more than capable of overcoming them all along. I was capable because I remembered that God had crafted me in His hands. I remembered that He had created me for hard and beautiful things.

I remembered that in Him I was strong and courageous and that He was going before me and behind me. I also remembered that I could have courage, and I could have comfort, but I couldn't have both. If I wanted to move forward in my career and even just survive working in dangerous places, I had to choose courage by pushing past my comfort zones and walking into all that He had for me.

Fear is a common emotion. You don't have to be face to face with a terrorist or spend your lunch break in a bomb shelter like I did to experience it. We all have fear in our lives in some form or another, and you can't be brave without the presence of it. However, choosing to drive through fear is when the courage comes in. When we make the choice to trust God and step onto the other side of what we are afraid of, the miracles in our lives start to take flight.

faith over fear

God is not going to force you to do anything, but He knows you are wildly capable of the incredible things He has planned for you. He knows He has given you a spirit of love, and power, and of a sound mind. Whatever it is you're afraid of, whether it's finally starting that business, putting up that boundary, or confessing that sin; with Him, all things are possible when we believe and trust in Him.

In my time overseas, I learned a whole new meaning of trusting in the Lord. When He said in Genesis 28:15, "I will protect you wherever you go," I had to believe Him. When God said in Isaiah 54:17, "No weapon formed against you shall prosper," I had to trust that He was telling the truth. By His amazing mercy and grace, He really was doing exactly what He said He would, and He has never let me down.

God is in the business of doing exceedingly more than we ask.

I've learned that God is always in the business of doing exceedingly more than we can ask, think or imagine when we put our lives in His hands. However, sometimes more than we can ask or imagine seems more than we can comprehend or handle

What has consistently brought me through even the most difficult season of life is gratitude. Gratitude does something beautiful in us. It can shift our entire demeanor and perspectives when we stop in our tracks and just give thanks. I used to think God would be disappointed if I was feeling anxious or defeated. But we do not serve that kind of God.

We serve the God that cares so much for us that He knew anxiousness would be something His children struggled with He even gave us the antidote for it. Philippians 4:6-7 NLT states, "Don't worry about anything, instead, pray about everything. Tell God what you need and thank Him for all He has done. Then you will experience God's peace, which exceeds anything we can understand. His peace will guard your hearts and minds as you live in Christ Jesus." Gratitude changes everything. I am so grateful for our God. Being in so many different countries in the Middle East, I watched people give their entire lives for a religion that was based on fear.

How special is Jesus, that He said our relationship with Him would be based on love. I am so grateful that He has carried me across oceans, that He has protected me and provided for me in every season.

I am so grateful that He gave me my husband, the kindest man to walk by my side and experience this life with.

I am so grateful for the prayers of my family and friends; prayers that have gone to war for us on earth in the Heavenly realm.

Most of all, I am so grateful I said yes to Jesus. Saying yes to Him was the beginning of the greatest adventure of my life.

We went out snorkeling at the last stop, Nassau, Bahamas. It was there that a seemingly normal day on vacation turned into a life altering event that should have ended my life. But God!

I remember crying out to Jesus in that water with half my arm missing as I was desperately trying to swim back after I had gotten free from the shark's jaws. I remember prayers flowing from my lips with every stroke I took. I had no time to think, it was just what came out of me. I remember being wheeled into the hospital after the 30 min boat ride to the port and watching the chaos of the emergency room staff trying to take care of me. Thoughts of fear came and I remember taking those thoughts captive and making them align with God's word just like 2 Corinthians 10:5 says. I didn't have time to pull out my Bible and research a scripture, it was coming alive in me because I had hidden it in my heart. I remember the next day when the ministry of tourism came into our hospital room and told us it is impossible for us to get back home for another 3 days, even though we had been told by the Bahama surgeon that we needed to get to an American doctor immediately. But I remember praying with my husband after she left the room and claiming scripture over our circumstance. We believed we served a God of the impossible and He could move the mountains in our way to get us back home.

And God did – less than 24 hours later, we were transported to the hospital in our hometown. It wasn't my own strength, or wisdom, or even spiritual maturity that was kicking in.

No, I know me - I am not that strong. But greater is Jesus that is in me then the one who had tried to take me out! It is in those moments where I can confidently say, what I put in was flowing out of me.

God by the second secon

See, as Christians we want to have strong faith. But we never really know the depth of our faith until it is tested. If you would have told me 10 years ago that I would have survived a shark attack and this is how I would respond, I would have told you that you're crazy! I am not strong enough to handle something like that. But it is in those times of crisis that the rubber meets the road and all the times spent with Jesus in prayer, worship, and studying His Word come flowing out. 2 Timothy 3:16-17 says, "All Scripture is inspired by God and is useful to teach us what is true and to make us realize what is wrong in our lives. It corrects us when we are wrong and teaches us to do what is right. God uses it to prepare and equip his people to do every good work."

God equips us through His word not only for the everyday moments of life, but for when the wind, rain, and all out storms come. The Holy Spirit calls to mind the biblical truth and promises we have already hidden in our hearts and all of a sudden, we see the fruit of all of the time we spent with Jesus.



You probably know the song, "Do It Again," by Elevation Worship. That song became popular right before the shark attack. I remember listening to it on repeat! In fact, it got stuck in my head while we were on the cruise and I vividly remember belting it out when there was nobody around while my husband and I waited for the elevator one night. That had to be just a day or two before everything changed. I had no idea what was coming, I was just enjoying an amazing vacation with my husband. And yet the lyrics to that song were playing on repeat in my head. Lyrics that were saying to remember His promises, God is Faithful, and He won't fail me. I didn't know how much I would need that truth in my life just a day or two later. I wept later in the hospital bed as I recalled this song and the memory of me belting it out on the cruise. It was as if God had set it on repeat in me to remind me of His promises when I needed it the most.



Listen ladies, don't put off your time with the Lord. Don't let the devil trick you into thinking it doesn't matter. Don't busy your schedule so much so that you can't spend time with Jesus. It is a necessity! Even when we don't feel like we get a huge revelation or the "holy spirit goose bumps" after we have read the Bible or spent time praying & worshipping - He is faithful and His word does not return void. We may not always feel the immediate impact, but time with Jesus is never wasted time!

When we root ourselves in Jesus, who He is becomes who we are!

When we choose to fill ourselves with His word, spend time in worship, and talk to Jesus through prayer, we are getting deposits of peace, joy, love, strength, hope, confidence, patience, etc. The very characteristics of Jesus take root in our hearts and we are filled with God's power. That's how the same power that raised Christ from the dead lives in us (Eph 1:19-20). And that power activates in us when we need it. When we root ourselves in Jesus, who He is becomes who we are! And what does that look like?

•An outpouring of love when being attacked (Luke 6:27-31)

•An overflowing joy when depression should be taking over (Psalm 16:10-11)

•Hope unfolding when the mountain looks unmovable (Matt 17:20)

•A renewed mind when PTSD tries to rear its head (Phil 4:8-9)

LAYING DOWN STRIVING FOR Surrendered Effort

66 God never intended me to balance my life.

It's been an imperfect journey, but over the last few years, I've realized why I never achieved that life balance I strived so hard to find:

God never intended me to balance my life.

The word "balance" implies everything in your life has equal importance. But God's Word lovingly teaches about our priorities:

"But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you" – Matthew 6:33

In simple terms? Put God first, and He orders everything else.

Ι know I've spent large а portion of my life striving to get "all the things." Growing up, I strived for good grades and praise from adults. In my teen years, I added striving for extracurricular achievements, the right clothes, and popularity. Then, it was about getting into the right college, getting the right job, and getting married. The striving cycle continued into adulthood. I strived to be a great mom, to be a leader in my work, and to be an encouraging and influential voice within my church, my community, and on social media.

It wasn't necessarily that I wanted bad things. But my striving tried to accomplish good things in the wrong way. God doesn't want us to go about our lives striving for our own purposes, friend. The Christian life isn't about striving to be good so we "measure up" to deserve Jesus. God knew that no matter how hard we tried, in our sin, we would all fall short of His glory, so he offers salvation as a free gift (Romans 3:23).

Jesus came to live the life we never could, to die the death we deserved, and to defeat the grave, so we could share in His righteousness and victory through our faith in Him (2 Corinthians 5:21).

The gospel centers on surrender, and so should our lives. Through Jesus, God provides us a way out of the cycle of striving for our own goals that will never satisfy us. Instead, we can surrender to live for Him fully, which is the only way to find lasting satisfaction.

Striving is about me and what I want. Surrendered effort is about God and what He wants.

Surrendered effort is about God and what He wants. Here are three ways I've discovered I can put this truth into practice:

 Priorities aren't proven by merely a written list, but how we actually live.

If we don't live proactively, we will naturally default to living reactively. With reactive living, our priorities will change depending on the opinions and opportunities in front of us at that given moment. Proactive living allows us to keep our priorities by honoring them as we make decisions. For example, saying we prioritize family before work is easy.

But do we actually live that out? There will always be exceptions, but consider these questions:

- Are you more likely to make work wait because it's family time or more likely to cheat family time so you can get more done?
- Who gets your best and who gets your leftovers?

And here's the one that always gets me.

I call it the Proverbs 31:28 Test: "Her children rise up and call her blessed; her husband also, and he praises her."

Husbands and children won't always recognize and praise our work. As our faithful efforts go unnoticed, we must ultimately work unto the Lord. Even if others around us aren't calling us "blessed," it's a question that challenges us to consider whether or not our family feels loved and cared for:

• From the way I lived my life today, would my highest earthly praise come from my family?

Deciding to live our priorities means that, most of the time, our big decisions are already made before specific situations arise.

John Maxwell said it best: "Learn to say 'no' to the good so you can say 'yes' to the best."

2. Her life won't look exactly like yours (and that's a good thing!).

Social media is not terrible in itself, but just like a hammer is a useful tool in the hands of a carpenter but it becomes a dangerous weapon in the hands of your toddler, we must be careful not to let the ability to watch someone else live their life prevent us from living our own lives.

Too often, we fall for the lie that the unfulfilled feeling that rises up inside of us would leave if we just had that new job, or that natural ability, or if we were simply in that next season of raising kids.

But often, that unfulfilled feeling is simply because we aren't making the most of where we are right now. We can stop waiting for what's next or wanting more. Fully investing in where God has us now is far more fulfilling than waiting on things beyond our control.

In fact, a popular verse about "doing all things thought Christ" that we often see accompany victory is really about contentment more than achievement. Read the preceding verses:

"Not that I am speaking of being in need, for I have learned in whatever situation I am to be content. I know how to be brought low, and I know how to abound. In any and every circumstance, I have learned the secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me." – Philippians 4:11-13

Contentment is much more likely to result from trusting God, no matter what, not in longing for another assignment.



3. Join God's main mission to find your specific assignment.

Most of us would prefer our own burning bush moment like Moses had or the blinding light on the road to Damascus that sparked the Apostle Paul's conversion. But those moments are the exceptions in the Bible, not the rule.

Think of it this way. If you played a sport when you were younger, you joined a team first, and then, you were assigned a position.

So ask yourself: Are you asking God for a specific position without showing up to be a part of the team?

Jesus put it this way:

And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age" – Matthew. 28:18-20



This is God's agenda.

So when we find ourselves in those new seasons, trying to identify where God wants to use us, we can aim to be obedient to His general call to all believers.

Right where He has us.

Right now.

You know the beautiful part of the Great Commission? God doesn't ask any of us to take on this giant task alone. As Christ-followers, we come together, knowing God has uniquely placed and called each of us to be His representative to those around us.



For some, God's call will mean actually picking up and going to the ends of the earth to spread the gospel.

For others, it will mean pursuing intentional discipleship in their homes and their local churches.

Both matter, and both are needed. There are no insignificant Kingdom contributions.

God doesn't merely love what is big; He loves what it His.

Please know the work you do to display the gospel, whether leading a Bible study for hundreds, or reading a Bible story to your kids at bedtime, is eternally significant.

There is a very real battle for your heart happening. The world's view often makes us believe that our impact is attached to doing "more."

But God's truth reminds us that our impact is tied to doing less of most things so we can do more of what really matters.

So the next time you find yourself navigating "all the things", remember this:

Striving will never satisfy you. Surrendered effort leads you to the only One who satisfies.
