# Miss lay



As a Beacon School for Holocaust Education, we strive to give students opportunities to learn about and from the Holocaust. In January we had the privilege of taking 50 students from Ethics and History to Poland to get an insight into Jewish life before the war, and to visit Auschwitz. They also had the chance to meet Monika Goldwasser, a survivor whose parents had been brave enough to entrust her to others as a baby. Her story tied in with others that we had learned about those who had stood up for the Jews and were recognised by the Holocaust Remembrance Centre, Yad Vashem, for doing so.

Both students and staff were moved by her story and others that we heard on the trip. At the end our Historical guide led us in a small service where Lewis Golding was asked to read the famous words of Pastor Martin Niemoller, reminding us that if we don't speak out for others there will be no-one left to speak out for us. I know from student feedback that this was a very emotional trip, and one that will stay with them for the rest of their lives.








Thank you to parents and students for helping to make this such a moving experience. The Historical guide was extremely complimentary about the behaviour from all involved.

The Spring term was a busy one in the Sixth Form. We focused largely on exploring future options and assessing student progress in mock examinations. The Year 12 students have been getting to grips with Unifrog and setting up their personal profiles to kick start the University/apprenticeship process. We encourage students to explore courses and Universities they are interested in early and book Open Days to ensure they make informed decisions and don't miss out.

We have also spent time with both Year 12 and 13 exploring the apprenticeship options through our own careers fair and the local and National Apprenticeship shows.

As part of our Futures Programme, we have also continued our University visits. We pride ourselves on having strong relationships with Oxford University. As part of this we took a group of Year 11 and 12 students to Somerville College for the day. To find out what life is like as an Oxford Uni student they were treated to a campus tour, a Law tutorial, time with existing students and of course a lovely three-course lunch in their grand banquet hall.



We hope to have a number of Oxbridge candidates competing for these sought-after places next year and plan to do another trip soon for more aspiring students.



In our Year 13 cohort 85% of students submitted an application to UCAS. Popular universities this year are Loughborough, Bristol and Birmingham with students applying to a wide range of subject areas.

The University entry requirement acts as an excellent motivator and we have seen an increase in the number of students attending after school study clubs. We are pleased to see not only Year 13 students taking up this opportunity, but it is becoming more popular with Year 12 students too. Staying after school to work in the Quiet Study Room allows students to complete homework and independent revision in a quiet space without games consoles, TV or siblings to distract them. We've awarded six students with a £20 raffle prize throughout the last term and will continue this for the Summer. The more frequently students attend the study club the higher their chances of winning the prize - You've got to be in it to win it!

One student even spent his voucher on a flip phone to reduce the distractions on his smartphone during his study sessions; it's no surprise that his mock results reflect the admirable work ethic he demonstrates.



# EXAM?

The mock examinations for Year 13 allowed students to gain critical practice in the exam process and identifying crucial areas still to be developed in the coming weeks.

With only three weeks to the start of the formal A-level examinations we are now in the final stretch and students should be fine-tuning their exam technique. Our message is practice, practice, and more practice!

We have been encouraging habitforming practices with our students, using our 'exam count-up strategy'. This is a structured time restricted period where students focus only on exam questions. We encourage all Year 13 students to follow a revision timetable and stick to the exam practice commitment we have set them.

Year 12 students should now also be addressing gaps in knowledge and areas of weakness by practising different revision techniques ahead of the June mocks.

### Sixth Form Taster Sessions

This year we have approached our key stage 4 into 5 transition/induction quite differently. We invited students to experience life in the Sixth form by becoming a sixth former for the day. This has allowed them to join in with lessons and study sessions and see how Sixth form study differs to the rest of the school. The response has been incredibly positive and provides even more motivation for our Year 11s to achieve the GCSE grades they need to secure their Sixth Form place.

## Work Experience

Year 12 students should be thinking of how to secure relevant work experience which will help to boost their application for university and apprenticeships. This work experience should be linked to their career aspirations. We advise students to check the universities they are interested in to see if they have specific requirements for work experience. Students should speak to a member of the Sixth form team if they need guidance on this.












