Your local council or shire may have their own local laws about lighting fires. Contact your local council to find out what municipal local laws may be in place. Local laws may be in place all year



A Place Where People, Dogs And Cats Can Live Together Safely

Surf Coast Shire Council and the community can take the lead to help foster friendly relationships between pets and people, following adoption of the Domestic Animal Management Plan 2026-29.

The plan outlines how people, dogs and cats can live together safely in the Surf Coast Shire. It highlights the importance of both Council and the community playing their role to manage cats and dogs.

Councillor Liz Pattison said shared responsibility was one of four principles in the plan, along with education and training, knowing the rules, and improving together.

"In four years we want to look back on this plan and give pet owners and ourselves a pat on the back for doing all that we can to make the Surf Coast Shire a place where people, dogs and cats can live together in harmony," Cr Pattison said.

"From a Council perspective there will be a bigger focus on promoting pet registration and the desexing program, we'll work with Great Ocean Road Coast and Parks Authority to improve dog-related signage, and our Rangers will proactively patrol to educate people on responsible pet ownership.

"If you're a pet owner, we want to see things like dogs being under effective control in public spaces, adhering to the cat curfew, picking up after your pet, and being mindful of others.

"We know that the majority of pet owners do the right thing, and we thank them for that."

The four-year action plan supports Council's broader goals of safety, wellbeing and environmental protection. There is an increased emphasis on monitoring data to inform service delivery and assess effectiveness of actions in the plan.

The plan was informed by community feedback via two surveys which attracted a total 660 responses. It included 175 responses on the draft Domestic Animal Management Plan over a three-week exhibition period.

There are more than 5,500 dogs and 700 cats registered in the Surf Coast Shire.

The Domestic Animal Management Plan will be submitted to the Victorian Government, a requirement of the Domestic Animals Act.

Opera Australia's Carmen: A Review

Zinaida Campion is a classical soprano, vocal coach, artist and model raised in Winchelsea. She is an alumna of VOYCE Victorian Opera, a Windfire Vocal Scholar, and Co President of Geelong City Opera. She has a strong background in languages, a love of local history, and an all-consuming passion for promoting the arts in rural areas.

Did anyone get the chance to see Carmen at the Regent Theatre recently? Altogether a rather interesting production by Opera Australia.

Bizet's Carmen is one of the most popular operas of all time, and it's easy to see why. The whole plot is a smutty but deeply resonant cocktail of crime, lust, betrayal, deception, corruption, and eventual destruction. Let us analyse act by act Opera Australia's version of the cautionary tale that is Carmen.

Act One

The curtain rises on a square in Seville. Morales (Nathan Lay) and his soldiers are standing outside the cigarette factory and having a gossip about the passersby. Michaela (Jennifer Black), the only ray of light in this moral quagmire, is searching for Corporal Don Jose (Diego Torre), and is subjected to the crudeness of the leering soldiers. Minutes from the beginning of the opera, and the moral tone is already set. Masterful work on the parts of the two librettists, Meilhac and Halevy, who based the script on the novel by Prosper Mirimee. Michaela flees the scene, postponing her search for Don Jose.

The female cigarette makers emerge from the factory for their break, in the 2000s-looking uniforms designed by Marg Horwell. The light is warm and smoky, perhaps hinting at the seductive nature of Carmen (Sian Sharp), who leads the pack. Her roving eye settles on Don Jose, who has arrived, and she sings the sultry Habanera, ostensibly to all the men who have gathered to ogle, but her sights are set on the corporal. She slyly tosses him a flower.

Michaela reappears after the women have gone back to work, and here Black perfects the blushing country maiden. She hands Don Jose a letter from his mother, but is too shy to stay as he reads it. In the letter, his mother asks him to marry Michaela. He inwardly

resolves to do so, but just then, there is an uproar!

Carmen and another woman have had a fight in the factory, and the workers have split into factions, each side barracking for one of the two. The battle looked very realistic, with the frenzied women on either side of the stage and the guards caught in the middle of the maelstrom. Carmen is arrested, and Sharp portrayed her defiance well as she refused to answer why she had started the fight. She mocks the officer Zuniga (Richard Anderson), who leaves Don Jose to guard her.

Carmen doesn't waste any time. In the famous Seguedilla, she attempts to seduce him with an invitation to join her to drink and dance at Lillas Pastia's tavern, with the hint of more, come night. Sharp's rendition was not as full-bodied vocally as I had expected, but her acting was par excellence. Torre was the perfect foil, succumbing to her wiles as the weak minded Don Jose. By the end of the duet, Carmen had wrapped him in the rope that bound her, effectively reversing the roles of captor and prisoner. Bewitched, he releases her, only to be arrested himself for it.

Act Two

The tavern is crowded, and lit with neon lights. Carmen and her cronies Frasquita (Jane Ede), and Mercedes (Angela Hogan), sing a riotous trio, and Sharp's voice is sounding heartier. Escamillo (Luke Gabbedy) arrives and sings the famous Toreador Song, though the rendition was unfortunately lackluster.

After the crowd leaves, Don Jose, released from prison, arrives for a rendezvous with Carmen. She dances for him, and manipulates him into deserting and following her into the mountains with the smugglers. She accuses him of not loving her if he refuses. His answer is the famous aria, La fleur qui ma jete, in which he shows

her the flower she threw him, and which he has kept all this time. Torre's rendition was magnificent, reminiscent even of Placido Domingo, one the most famous Don Joses in history. The lovers join the smugglers, and their fate is sealed.

Act Three

Night has fallen on the smugglers' camp. Carmen's agitation is palpable; she is tired of Don Jose, but fears that he will kill her if she leaves him. Sharp was centre stage, and her loneliness was graphically illustrated by the rest of the smugglers having their backs to her, wrapped up in their own conversations. Mist filled the darkened stage. Frasquita and Mercedes read their fortunes, and their trivial babble about love and wealth provide a ghastly contrast to Carmen's brooding. She reads her own fortune: death. This scene gave me goosebumps, it was so emotionally accurate.

Like an angel of light, Michaela appears. She prays that God will protect her as she approaches the smugglers' lair. Black was extremely moving as she portrayed the inner courage of the simple girl. Michaela demands that Don Jose visit his mother who is dying, and is grieved by his fall from grace. Don Jose goes, but threatens Carmen that he will return.

Act Four

Carmen has taken Escamillo as her new lover. The set was a room full of flowers, that appeared to be the bullfighter's dressing room. He leaves for the bullfight. Mercedes and Frasquita enter, warning Carmen that they have seen a vengeful Don Jose lurking in the crowd. She decides to stay and talk with him, hoping he will see reason.

Their final duet was sizzling. Don Jose begging Carmen to come back to him, her insisting she no longer loves him. The tension was electrifying, interrupted

only by the noise of the crowd at the bullfight in the background. As the crowd cheers for Escamillo, Carmen confesses she loves the torero, and throws Don Jose's ring in his face. In a fit of rage and jealousy, he kills her. The climax was perfectly executed by the leads.

Uproarious applause!


Conclusion

Even though this production had a modern setting, which can sometimes feel less colourful than the original timeline, I feel that it was for the most part emotionally engaging enough to be arresting. Carmen is truly a story for any era, which explains why it remains such a favourite. It would be a good first opera for anyone wanting to discover the genre. I highly recommend.

Spring Vegetables

The coming of warmer sun and spring showers makes for an opportune time to consider growing vegetables in the backyard. Raised garden beds are a good way to make growing your own vegetables easier and it also helps the household budget by providing the family with chemical free vegetables.

The advantage of the raised beds is in the ease of management, keeping weeds and critters including the house terrier away from seedlings. Not to be under estimated is the benefit of being able to pick fresh, clean vegetables when required. These beds are illustrated in the photographs and are available at Bunnings. For summer plantings I recommend tomatoes and Lebanese cucumbers which enjoy the heat and a have long fruiting season.

For regular supply of greens, silver beet and spinach are a must and for a bumper crop of spinach try the perpetual variety. When these beds are netted it is also possible to keep out white butterflies which will make way to grow brassicas.

Rabbit hutches are available to purchase at hardware stores which are ideally suited to housing a couple of hens. The advantage of these rabbit hutches is that they provide rabbit proof and fox proof accommodation (and terrier proof). I strongly recommend Isa-brown as a suitable breed of bird. They are reliable layers and have very quiet temperaments. At Clifton Spring I found them to be friendly pets that enjoyed my company. A bonus is they do provide some garden manure.

Australia finally acknowledges the environment underpins all else. That's no small thing

"The winners stand to be future generations of Australians. In this instance, our elected representatives have demonstrated they understand that this is where their most weighty obligation is owed. But meeting that obligation is hard. Democracies often appear carefully designed to reward short-termism. Yet the success of a parliament can only be assessed according to what it does for the future. In the final sitting week of 2025, the Australian parliament appears to have delivered.

The package of reforms to the EPBC Act fixes an ugly policy mess. The mess had been called out in several reviews, including Graeme Samuel's review delivered more than five years ago."

La Niña declared days out from summer – what does this mean for Australia? Ben Domensino - Meteorologist at Weatherzone

"When La Niña is occurring, abnormally cool water lies near the surface of the central and eastern tropical Pacific Ocean and warmer than normal water sits in the western tropical Pacific. This sea surface temperature pattern is associated with changes in the overlying atmosphere, with easterly trade winds typically becoming stronger and blowing extra moisture towards the western side of the Pacific Ocean.".......

What can Australia expect from this La Niña?

"With Australia entering summer under the influence of La Niña, many people might be expecting to see above average rain and

many people might be expecting to see above average rain and cooler than average days in the coming months, particularly in the country's north and east.

However, the latest long-range outlooks from the Bureau paint a different picture, predicting near or below average rain and abnormally warm days for much of the country this summer."

"In 1995, when the first "conference of the parties" (Cop) of the UN's climate change convention met in Berlin, the atmospheric carbon dioxide concentration was approximately 360.67 parts per million As I write, the carbon level – recorded daily in this paper – has reached 426.68 parts per million – well over scientists' so-called "safe" limit of 350. According to them, the planet is heading towards oblivion. All that time news editors have told me not to be too downbeat; let's have some optimism.

IT'S JUST A PART OF MODERN LIFE,

We all know how much better we feel when we are on holiday, when we are walking more! Not slumped, tense, sitting behind the wheel. Right? BUT THAT'S NOT ALWAYS POSSIBLE! The little things we do on a daily basis to help (or hinder) ADD UP. Either for health or pain & sickness!

TATTOO these into your brain!

- Tilt your rear vision mirror up so you have to be up tall in the seat at the start of the day AND at the end.
- At a red light, push your head back into your headrest (this creates natural traction and lengthening).
 Or, if driving in the country, do it for a song or two.
 (Here's a pro-tip for the LADIES! Do
 - what I do and take those claw clips or buns out! They push you forward!)
- 3. Put your seat to 90 degrees. Make sure you aren't sinking back into your chair, like a camping chair, soft couch, or racing car-style seat. Have your knees at equal height to your hips, or lower. Don't have your knees higher than your hips. This puts too much strain on your lower back and causes

you to then slump forward

BONUS TIP! A rolled-up jumper in your lower back can be great here too!

In general, there are LOADS of little things you can do to help yourself. IT'S ALL ABOUT BEING WHOLISTIC.

I'm always sharing these with our clients on a daily basis. Unfortunately, NOTHING replaces being in balance and aligned through your spine and nervous system so you can heal and feel good... BUT this will help you out with DRIVING specifically.



A Little Food Trailer With A Big Dream.

Many years ago I received a dream to assist remote communities in Africa to become better self organized and resilient through defining their offerings and needs.

This came out of growing up in Zimbabwe, witnessing the challenges faced by the extended family's 'extra' children.

Tuckshops can be found in the most remote locations, they are small commercial enterprises like a food trailer they have a great reach into the local community.

Years later and many twists of fate, Life brought me to Winchelsea. The Hinterland Collective is a part of the local translation of this dream.

Our collective potential, products and purpose. Everything starts from an idea and then is built from the ground up. The ground needs to be fertile, abundant and not dependent on depleting inputs to have long long term viability.

All those farmers, gardeners who do use fertilizers and pesticides there is no blame, judgement or provocation intended. You are doing what you need to do to feed your families and keep your farms alive with the information you have available to you.

Do I only eat organically grown food? No. Would i like to? Yes! I do not have all the answers but i have questions and Believe we can do better. We can garden and farm without the use of toxic additives. Victoria has a well spring of experienced farmers from Biodynamic to Regenerative who have experience and results over decades.

Yes these things take time, investment and support. Yes, the Organic industry is full of fallacies. You are either building topsoil or depleting, leaving an inheritance in the soil or eroding it.

This hot topic is important in The Hinterland Collective (THC) as natural practices where possible are the fundamental we are promoting and selling. Conventional farming is a product of time and nothing anyone needs to defend.

Starting with the gardeners.

I believe Winchelsea's gardeners have

potential to grow far more food than we currently do. Seeing what has come through the honest and free stand at one point this has verified this but also observing some retirees' gardens.

Having a place to sell produce is the first step in the right direction for this. Beer money or saving for a trip. An outlet is vital to stimulate growers. I am working on a place for this and open to suggestions and help around achieving this.

Skills. Passing knowledge. There are many retired members of the community with years of experience in fruit tree pruning for example. What grows well in this area.

There are also youngsters looking for ways to earn a buck. RichEarth will register members' needs and offerings for the THC data bank. Our local asset. Act as a go between a coordinator of local produce, products and skills. RichEarth will be an interface to be able to meet, liaise and coordinate all things THC.

A great example: Retirees are needing help on their farm in Wensleysdale. The orchard has 40 or more fruit trees which are overgrown and need serious attention. Over time and registrations THC develops a database of willing pruners, teachers, harvesters. Their orchard is registered and offered to the network and a team is put together that matches the need.

Agreements are set in managing the orchard. During harvesting a broader team is called in to help and earn on the resale. Everyone participating earns dollars or tokens on resale or takes produce in exchange.

It could be a farm or garden that is available to the network and THC matches the farmers to the land owners. Links with investors.

Mediated over a cup of tea or coffee. Getting people who want to farm or garden on the land. Bringing the skills to us and making available the resources we have.

Landcare is not where this initiative ends. The dream is to promote local groups already in existence and support new families to find their fit in the community. Update some older structures and bridge the gap between town and country.

What skills do you bring to the table? What are your needs? Locally accountable relationships built around trust, sweat, coffee and cake!

None of us know what the future may bring but i believe if we are well organized we can weather any storm and be as self reliant as possible.

RichEarth is a place to come together.

Morning coffee and road snacks on your drive. Build your social project with like minded folks or support existing groups.

New Council Policy Aims To Reduce Single-Use Items And Packaging

Council has adopted a new policy seeking to further reduce single-use items and packaging in the Surf Coast Shire.

The Single-Use Items and Packaging Policy aims to help protect the natural environment and reduce the amount of waste being sent to landfill.

It replaces the previous 2021 Plastic Wise Policy.

The new policy has been broadened and will see the phasing out of many single-use items across all Council facilities, Council events, and events on Council land, over the next three years.

It also aligns with current state government single-use plastics bans.

The policy will apply to all formal use of Council facilities, such as:

- User groups, including sports clubs, who are tenants of Council facilities;
- Community members or businesses hiring Council facilities for parties, events, conferences or workshops;
- Facilities directly managed by Council; and
- Organisers hosting events and markets on Council land.

It does not apply to informal use of

Council facilities such as visiting a library or local park.

The policy outlines three categories of items to be phased out:

Category one – State bans: items already banned by the Victorian Government and EPA such as lightweight plastic bags;

Category two – Local bans: single-use items (including single-use compostable items) to be phased out, including all plastic bags and takeaway coffee cups and lids; and

Category three – Reduce your use: items that are harder to avoid but still important to try and reduce such as soft plastic packaging.

Exemptions are available in certain circumstances, including health and safety, existing commercial agreements, and lack of suitable alternatives.

A key change from the 2021 policy is that the new policy discourages all single-use items – including compostable items – where previously these were seen as a more sustainable alternative to single-use plastic.

Compostable packaging cannot be accepted by Council's FOGO processor due to the presence of PFAS (synthetic chemicals that contaminate compost) and the lack of regulation of 'compostable' labelling.

A draft of the new policy was open for community feedback between 29 May and 4 July this year and promoted to tenants and users of Council facilities.

Of 86 survey respondents, 93 per cent

expressed support for the policy (72 per cent were 'very supportive' and 21 per cent 'somewhat supportive'.)

Changes made as a result of community feedback include:

- Implementation period shortened from five years to two years for general facility users, and three years for markets and tenants with takeaway food service (such as sporting club canteens).
- Additional support for markets and sporting clubs, with a two-year testing and co-design phase followed by a one-year implementation period.
- Commitment to share supplier names to help users identify available alternative products.

Councillor Phoebe Crockett said the policy and implementation period would reduce the volume of waste being sent to landfill while being manageable for facility users.

"Single-use items and packaging are major contributors to waste and pollution," Cr Crockett said.

"The endorsement of this policy is a sign that this Council is still committed to leading the way with actions that avoid waste and maximise re-use.

"We will work closely with our facility tenants and offer a range of support to help the transition away from single-use items."

The policy is an important action in Council's efforts to achieve the aims in its Circular Economy Action Plan.





history of winchelsea

Stirling Women of Early Winchelsea

The town of Winchelsea today is a convenient shopping hub for the farmers of the surrounding country, with the bakery, pharmacist, Dr, Dentist, School, Kindergarten and various other services saving local farmers from a day trip out of their busy lives to bigger cities such as Geelong or Colac. But colonial towns needed to be completely self-sufficient, in the absence of modern transport, a trip to Geelong or Colac would be a day's walk each way and would likely require an overnight stop. Supply chains had to be short and everything that was required as essential needed to be produced locally or imported at great expense and inconvenience.

It is for this reason that James Stirling opened a blacksmith out of the Barwon Inn, where he would have made everything from farming tools and nails to door hinges, pots and pans. Meanwhile, the Stirling women were playing a crucial role in the supply chain for the town, producing food for locals to purchase in the family businesses. Ann (Fergie) Stirling, wife of , James Stirling, married 4 Dec 1818 in Govan, Renfrewshire, Scotland. Together, Ann and James had eleven children, seven of whom survived to emigrate to Winchelsea with them. Jane (Stirling) Roadknight, William Stirling, Elizabeth (Stirling) Meyler and Margaret (Stirling) Gullan. In June 1841, soon after Margaret's birth, the family was residing in Crossmyloof village in Cathcart parish, about two miles south of Glasgow centre. In September the same year they emigrated to the Port Phillip colony aboard the ship, Robert Benn and arrived in Port Phillip, Colony of New South Wales (Victoria) on 26 Jan

After Ann and James purchased the Barwon Inn (The Bottom Pub) from Beale and Trebeck, Ann established a market garden below the pub and Grew vegetables which supplied the township of Winchelsea, presumably sold through her brother-in-law's grocery shop on the adjacent corner.

Janet Johnston Stirling, established a fruit orchard, the remnants of which are rumoured to have survived on the Gulidjan side of the river, to the North of the bridge, down below the skate park and the back of the kindergarten. Janet grew fruit in this orchard, which she would have sold in the Crocer across the road on the site of the Bendigo Bank today.

William and Janet (Johnston) Stirling sailed on the ship Admiral Boxer from Liverpool on 3 December 1856, arriving in Geelong on 9 March 1857 It is believed that William worked as crew on that ship. Janet's mother Annie (Martin) Johnston came to Australia on the same ship as Janet and family. When they arrived in Winchelsea and united with William's brother James, William and Janet established the Grocer store across the road from the Inn. Their Children were John born 27 April 1841; Anne (died young); Robert Johnston b 1844 (?); William (died young) Elizabeth



Wilson; Johnston b 1849; Annie Martin b 1850; Margaret Johnston b 1852; Jessie Johnston b 1854; James Thomas b 1858 in Winchelsea (the only one born in Australia). Janet was known to give her produce away to the needy". The story in the family is that, as she grew older, she added 10 years to her age. Told everyone she was 99 years old. when she was 89 years! Janet was known as Granny Stirling to the Winchelsea Community and Ann was known as Aunty to everyone who knew her. When the famous artist Eugene Von Guerard came through Winchelsea on April 5 1857, he sketched the Barwon Inn and Mrs Striling's Vege garden in front of it.


Annual Reports 2024/2025

Wensleydale Rural Community Group (WRCG)

Our group continues to focus on providing a monthly network opportunity in the form of community dinners, Xmas events for both community and children and administering our local Facebook site to support members and each other in knowing where they live and supporting each other. We also seek to promote and connect residents with the various other groups such as Landcare, CFA, Recovery Group etc.

Our FFOTM (first Friday of the month) Group held social dinners every month at varying local restaurants. The dinners continue to play an important role in developing and maintaining a connected and supportive community with new community members attending. We average 25 members attending each month. Feedback is very positive with many friendships created



across the area.

Our group continues to support the local community and children's Xmas event by providing 110 sweet packs for Santa to hand out as the Wurdale Fire Brigade (WFB) truck travels around the local area. Significant work has been undertaken this year for the planning of a 100 Year Community Celebration for our local Wurdale Memorial Hall. The scope is confirmed as a Bush Dance and Sausage Sizzle on the night of August 23, 2025. Open to community members from Wurdiboluc, Wensleydale, Gherang and Winchelsea South to attend via invitation. In addition, many research hours have been spent in the developing a Wurdale Hall history booklet. We are very thankful that we received grant support from Surf Coast shire and a number of key community members have come together to work hard to make it a success.



Winchelsea Youth Leisure Drop-In (Wyld)

The WYLD group has not been active in recent years due to the personal commitments of Monique and Robyn, which limited opportunities for regular meetups.

Following our official resignation from the group, we promoted the opportunity for new volunteers to continue the WYLD legacy. We were fortunate to receive interest from several local people willing to step in and take the lead.

Unfortunately, before activities could begin, two core volunteers had to resign, which meant the group was again left without a leadership base.

To ensure WYLD has a pathway forward, Robyn has agreed to organise local meetups during Term 4, supported by youth mentors on a fortnightly or monthly basis. It is hoped that these gatherings will reignite momentum and attract additional volunteers to secure the group's future.

After several years of long and dedicated effort, the documentation for the functional operation of the W&SRN has been completed. To summarise the work:

- a) An Operational manual has been written
- b) Selected Inventory items purchased
- c) Committee members were introduced to Emergency Management Procedures in both theoretical and practical situations.

The committee work is anticipated to be continual & repetitive to some extent. Both existing & new committee members will continue to be educated, trained & encouraged to discuss incident response and recovery within their domestic and community environments.

The challenge now is to keep effective and selected information flow through to the community. In the reporting period, this has been achieved by:

 a) Presenting updates on Seasonal Weather and Community Expectations at the Wurdale Christmas Party in conjunction with the Wurdale Fire Brigade and Wensleydale Rural Community Group.

- b) Research, produce & deliver a copy of our "Community Safety Checklist" to every property in Wurdale & Surrounds. This initiative was supported by the Surf Coast Shire.
- c) Initiate regular postings on the Gherang & Wensleydale Community facebook page regarding topics such as weather conditions, Fire Danger Ratings & Warnings and general environmental warnings.

At committee member level, we have also had regular meetings to achieve a number of objectives including:

- a) Growth & Cohesion of the Committee
 b) Inventory checks and equipment
- b) Inventory checks and equipment maintenance
- c) Review procedures annually if required.

Solid procedural and practical skills have been established to support the Victorian Emergency Services and the Surf Coast Shire if and when required. More importantly, the W&SRN has an important long term desire to support our local community after a traumatic event.

The ongoing support and commitment of Winch House, the Surf Coast Shire and the Gherang & Wensleydale Community is gratefully acknowledged.



The Winchelsea Men's Shed continues to provide a friendly and inviting meeting place for men in the Winchelsea and surrounding areas. The Shed has a well equipped workshop and welcomes anyone who wants to drop in for a chat and a cuppa.

The Shed is open every Wednesday and holds monthly meetings on the second Wednesday of the month (or as required). We appreciate the support of the community and our sponsors whose contributions help to keep the Shed a thriving environment.

"Women's Workshops" are continuing with expert tuition from Stuart Forbes. We have regular attendance from ladies wanting to learn new skills. Stuart Forbes continues to give generously of his time in running these workshops.

The continued upkeep of the Winchelsea Community garden is overseen by the Men's Shed and made functional and productive by the continued hard work of our members, but special mention to Clyde

Stephenson who spends many hours tending to the garden. We would like to remind visitors to the garden that although the vegetables are free, please only take what you need so that others can also enjoy the produce.

The ongoing sale of timber offcuts, kindly supplied by a Geelong business and bagged by the Shed members, continues to earn the Shed a steady income through the colder months. Bags of offcuts can be collected when the Shed is open or deliveries can be made. Details appear weekly in the Winchelsea Star.

The Shed continues to support the community with assistance for projects in around the township. This year we completed and installed a cubby house for the Primary School, also a bbg unit for WinAngLo was constructed and delivered. Although we would like to take on more and larger jobs we are restricted by our small membership. Income from activities and projects goes towards maintaining the machinery and replacing it where necessary. The sale of items handmade by Shed members also contributes to overall income. These are usually on display at the Sunday Markets.

Surf Coast Shire Council outlines future of Anglesea Landfill

Surf Coast Shire Council has confirmed the path forward for the Anglesea Landfill, with the landfill's operational life approaching its end due to limited remaining capacity.

The landfill has served the community since 1974 and is now filling the final available cell, which is a sealed section where rubbish is placed, compacted, and covered to keep it contained and protect the environment.

Current projections indicate closure around 2030, although exact timing will depend on annual waste volumes. There are no options to extend the Anglesea Landfill within the current site.

When the landfill closes, the Anglesea Transfer Station and Resale Shed will continue to operate as normal, ensuring ongoing recycling and reuse options for the community.



Cr Mike Bodsworth said Council was planning carefully to ensure the transition is well managed.

"We know how important this facility has been to the community for decades and we are committed to a responsible, well planned closure process, including an ongoing role for the transfer station and much-loved resale shed," Cr Bodsworth said.

"Our focus is on meeting regulatory requirements, protecting the environment and keeping the community informed every step of the way."

Significant rehabilitation work will be undertaken once the landfill closes, including long term environmental monitoring to ensure the site complies with all EPA requirements.

"This is a major transition for our waste

services, but one that we can manage and extend by reducing the amount of waste sent to landfill."

"Although the Surf Coast community achieves 70% diversion of recyclables and organics, there's still too much going into general waste bins, impacting the environment, wasting recoverable resources and costing way more".

Council officers will continue to monitor landfill capacity, waste volumes and financial performance to determine the optimal closure date.

Operations at the Anglesea Landfill will continue as normal until a closure date is determined.

Surf Coast Shire Council Prepares For Fire Season With Annual Slashing Program

Surf Coast Shire Council's annual fire prevention roadside slashing program will begin early December, with slashing on Council reserves also scheduled as part of preparations for the upcoming fire season.

Contractors will start in the north of the shire and work their way south over approximately three to four weeks, depending on weather conditions.

Council officers have also been inspecting properties across the shire and issuing Fire Prevention Notices where needed to reduce bushfire risk on private land.

Mayor Libby Stapleton said the annual program is a vital part of keeping the community safe.

"We live in one of the most beautiful parts of Australia, but with that beauty comes one of the highest fire risks in Victoria," Mayor Stapleton said.

"The slashing program is one of the many ways we work to reduce fire hazards across the shire, and we are asking residents to do their part."

She said property owners play a crucial role in reducing fire risk.

"We all need to make sure we are ready for the fire season," Mayor Stapleton said

"If you receive a Fire Prevention Notice, please act quickly. These notices are issued to protect you, your neighbours and the wider community."

Council's Fire Prevention Officers offer free advice to help property owners understand how best to prepare their properties to reduce bushfire risk.

Carer Card For Free Weekend Travel

In an environment where so many carers are experiencing financial challenges, Carers Victoria has been advocating for practical initiatives that reduce the cost of caring

That is why Carers Victoria is so pleased with the Government's announcement that Victorian Carers Card holders will be able to access free weekend public transport – potentially saving carers who use public transport more than \$360 per year.

The Victorian Carer Card offers a lifeline for thousands of people who provide care for a family member or friend with a disability, mental illness, chronic condition, or who is frail aged. That includes a suite of public transport concessions that make getting around Victoria more affordable and accessible. On top of free weekend travel, cardholders can access:

- Half-price weekday travel: Eligibility for a 50 per cent discount on fares across metropolitan trains, trams, and buses, as well as V/Line trains and coaches. This concession fare ensures that essential trips — whether for medical appointments, support services, or personal respite — are far less of a financial burden.
- Free travel vouchers: Depending on their location, eligible carers can register to receive two or four free off-peak travel vouchers annually, providing further opportunities for rest and recreation.

Carers Victoria CEO Judith Abbott welcomed the announcement of free weekend travel for carers.

"Carers are often unrecognised pillars of our healthcare and social systems, sacrificing their own financial stability to look after people who need significant help," she said.

"The Carer Card not only provides a range of discounts, it is also a very practical way of recognising carers and the critical work they provide. Carers Victoria is keen to continue working with government and other partners to make sure that connection and mobility isn't a luxury, but an accessible right."

Melbourne mother Melinda, who cares for her profoundly deaf daughter Amelia in the city's north, said the free weekend travel would be invaluable for building Amelia's confidence and independence getting to school.

"Something like this is a godsend for carers," she said. "Now I can travel for free alongside my daughter to teach her how to use public transport and help her feel more autonomous."

To access these free and discounted fares, carers must carry their Victorian Carer Card and use a specific Concession myki (Carer myki), which can be obtained at staffed stations.

Eligible Victorian carers who have not yet applied for the Carer Card are encouraged to do so immediately to start saving. The card also provides discounts at thousands of participating businesses, including supermarkets and pharmacies.

"We encourage community members to pick up their free copies of the calendar from our community outlets and enjoy the works for 2026."




