This marks my third BAPF as Executive Artistic Director at Playwrights Foundation and my first festival welcoming audiences back into the theater. We celebrate our 45th Anniversary by producing our most ambitious festival to date combining digital and in person readings while gathering our community in the theater and online to celebrate

the dynamic work of these talented artists. The pandemic has forced us to innovate. We respond by continuing to discover new possibilities that we never would have dreamed of before, leading to wider exposure around the world for these exciting plays and playwrights.

You are the last character added to these plays, and we are so excited to have you. Inda Craig-Galván's (she/her) work often explores conflicts and politics within the African-American community, with plays that are grounded in reality with a touch of magical realism that plays with time and memories. Produced plays include Black Super Hero Magic Mama (Geffen Playhouse, Los Angeles) and I Go Somewhere Else (Playwrights' Arena, Los Angeles); The Great Jheri Curl Debate will have its world premiere at East West Players (Los Angeles) in the Fall of 2022. Casting Collective (BAPF45 Casting) We are a community of casting professionals with extensive experience and deep ties to the Bay Area theatre community. Casting locally should be the predominant practice, and one of our main objectives is to offer a full range of casting services which showcase our local community and encourage theatres to hire actors living and working within the SF Bay Area. In the wake of the pandemic and the massive national call for greater EDI representation and prioritization, regional theatre has fundamentally changed.
