



# A Message from the Principal

# being faithful to grace

Earlier this year, I was fortunate to attend a Loreto Principals' meeting at Loreto Manderville Hall Toorak. If you are not aware, once a term we meet as a group of Principals in order to support each other in our roles and share best practice across our Loreto schools. I have been a member of this group for eight years and I am currently the longest-serving Loreto

Principal (even though I have only just joined the Loreto Kirribilli community!). At this meeting we were very fortunate to have a presentation from Sr Sandra Perrett ibvm on the topic of being 'faithful to grace'. I was very struck by this presentation and wanted to share some elements of it with our community.

The focus on 'grace' and what this means is important in our preparation for the celebration of 150 years of Loreto education in Australia which will take place in 2025. To explain this, I will need to take you on a little historic journey regarding the foundation of Loreto schools in Australia.

For those who are unaware: in 1874 the newly appointed Bishop of Ballarat, Michael O'Connor, invited the Loreto sisters in Ireland to establish a school for Catholic girls in his new diocese. In light of this, Mother Gonzaga Barry was asked if she would go to Australia. Mother Gonzaga Barry and her nine companions arrived in Melbourne, Victoria on 19 July 1875 (we call this Landing Day) to begin a school for girls. Loreto Convent Mary's Mount (Loreto College) was founded in the first year as well as Loreto Dawson St, a day school for girls.

More than 25 years later, when writing about her experience of coming to Australia to undertake this task, Mother Gonzaga Barry said:

"I suppose no one will ever know what it cost me to leave Ireland and my Irish friends. It nearly broke my heart. Though I was told by Superiors I would not be sent against my will, I felt I had to do it, or be unfaithful to grace; and when Reverend Mother told me that if I had not consented to go, she would not have allowed any of the Sisters to go to Ballarat.

I felt grateful to God, Who gave me the strength; and surely He has made up a hundredfold since for any little sacrifice I may have made for Him."

The notion of what it means to be 'faithful to grace' is a concept for us to explore as we move towards the exciting celebrations to

take place across all Loreto schools in 2025. It was the presentation by Sr Sandra that helped me to understand what was meant by this statement and what we mean by the word 'grace'. Sr Sandra pointed out that ultimately, when we say the word 'grace', we are actually saying 'God' and being faithful to grace is to not only being faithful to God, but like Mother Gonzaga Barry explains, it also involves being trusting of God. This trust requires us to understand that even though we might travel a path of uncertainty, which can at times be very frightening, ultimately this journey will lead us to the place where God has planned and once at this place, we will grow within ourselves and consequently we will influence those who surround us. This fundamental concept of trust is important to remember (both for students and parents) every time we are disappointed with a result or outcome in our lives. We must put this disappointment or setback into perspective and trust in the whole journey.

By the time of her death in 1915, Mother Gonzaga
Barry had established Loreto convents and schools in
Portland, Hamilton, Melbourne, Sydney, Adelaide, and
Perth, as well as parish schools, kindergartens, and
teachers' training colleges. We are all here because
Mother Gonzaga Barry was faithful to grace. The impact
of one woman on the lives on many thousands and their
subsequent impact on many thousands more emphasises
to us the importance of having trust in God's plan for us.

Like Mary Ward, the foundress of the Loreto Order, Mother Gonzaga Barry was indeed a woman ahead of her time, and to her we are eternally grateful.

### **INAUGURAL ICGS EVENT**

We welcomed principals, leaders and teachers from girls' schools around Sydney for an informative afternoon discussion entitled *Single-sex Schools in a Co-Ed World*. Dr Archard and Dr Briony Scott, Principal of Wenona, hosted this inaugural International Coalition of Girls' Schools (ICGS) Sydney event. Dr Archard began the discussion with an overview of current statistics from around the world reflecting the continued inequity of women and girls in society. Dr Scott spoke of inspiring women who have broken new ground in our lifetimes, and the important role girls' schools can play in challenging social norms.

Last year the three global girls' education organisations representing Australasia, United Kingdom, and USA/Canada amalgamated into one global organisation representing 550 girls' schools across all educational sectors in 22 countries.

The vision statement of ICGS is one which certainly aligns with our vision and mission at Loreto Kirribilli. The ICGS vision statement indicates:

"We are united in elevating women's leadership worldwide by educating and empowering our students to be ethical, globally minded changemakers."

### **VERITY IMMERSION**

For over 10 years, Loreto Kirribilli students and staff have been privileged to be a part of annual Verity Immersion to East Arnhem Land. Immersion is a learning experience where Indigenous knowledge is understood, not through a glass window or on a school stage, but first-hand by being invited into the cultural processes of the Yolnu. Yolnu are the Traditional Custodians of north-eastern Arnhem Land, Northern Territory. Yolnu culture is among the oldest living cultures on earth, stretching back over 80,000 years.

### **YEAR 9 CHARISM DAY**

We have undertaken this excursion for several years now as a way of celebrating our links to our Cathedral and our whole Church community, and the obligation we have as Catholics to work for Reconciliation with our Indigenous sisters and brothers.

We also enjoyed an inspiring session with Kyle Wallace, a proud Aboriginal man with roots to Gomeroi Country and Anaiwan Country. Kyle lived most of his life in a small coastal town called Woolgoolga until he moved to Sydney to attend St Ignatius' College, Riverview. He is now undertaking a Bachelor of Secondary Education at the University of Sydney. He continues to work as the First Nations Cultural Mentor at Riverview, guiding young First Nations men in the right direction to break stigma and stereotypes surrounding Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Kyle made a significant impact on Year 9 as he told his family's story, and the students were inspired to ask meaningful questions.



# The Tradition of May Day

Loreto Kirribilli's long history of celebrating May Day was brought by Mother Gonzaga Barry from her home in Ireland. Mother Gonzaga would write a letter to Loreto students each year in the Eucalyptus Blossoms magazine, and the following is one in which she reflects on her childhood felicity when celebrating this special time of year.







# My Dearest Children,

It's May - yes, May Day - how the words seem to make my old heart young again, as the memories of the May Days long ago come to mind ... We children would scamper with merry laughter down to the river shining in the morning sun, for well we knew the wealth of golden primroses that clustered on its banks, and hid in sheltered nooks, nestling close by the shy blue violets. Baskets were quickly filled with these treasures, then on we would hasten to the hawthorn hedges where great garlands of almond-scented "May" were soon secured, and likewise clusters of the dear bluebells ... And for what were all those flowers destined which the children gathered so eagerly? For Our Blessed Lady, of course, and for her altar...where they (were) arranged at either side of her dear statue ... filling the air with delicious and delicate perfume in honour of the Immaculate Queen, Our Lord's dear Mother.

### Creating the building blocks for young conservationists.

We were delighted to welcome Jens Bergensten, one of the original creators of Minecraft, with educators from Microsoft AUS/NZ and Taronga Conservation Society, for the launch of *Eco Detectives*, a Minecraft computer game. The game empowers students to act as conservationists in their local ecosystems.

Eco Detectives is the result of an innovative collaboration between zoos across Australia and New Zealand, Microsoft AUS/NZ, and expert game developers Team Workbench in Amsterdam. By playing Minecraft Education Eco Detectives, students discover why their virtual ecosystems are out of balance and then take action to restore biodiversity. The project aims to bring positive behaviour change from the gaming world into the real world, and raise awareness of the plight of species and wild habitats.




### YEAR 8 POETRY RECITAL COMPETITION

### STUDENT ADVOCATES FOR CHANGE

Hello! I'm Lucy, a Year 9 student here at Loreto Kirribilli. In January, I started a campaign called the Freedom Movement, which aims to improve education, awareness and treatment of eating disorders. Currently, one million Australians have eating disorders, yet there are only 38 public hospital beds available for eating disorder treatment in the country. I have established a social media awareness page and a petition to the Minister for Health and Aged Care, the Hon. Mark Butler MP, to improve the funding and number of hospital beds for patients with eating disorders. In June, I attended Parliament House to speak about eating disorders at a roundtable event hosted by the Butterfly Foundation and various politicians. I also spoke at a press conference for the event. I am also a Youth Ambassador for the Butterfly Foundation. 


### **CONGRATULATIONS!**

# Sharing our Community

### FOUR GENERATIONS OF LORETO KIRRIBILLI | A GRANDMOTHER'S STORY

Thank you so much for inviting me to speak at this wonderful afternoon tea. It is especially meaningful for me as this year marks a momentous occasion for our family's connection to Loreto Kirribilli. It's our 100 year anniversary.

A hundred years ago my mother, Jill Creagh, stepped foot into Loreto Kirribilli as a bright-eyed eight-year-old in 1924. She came here with her sisters and brother and started a tradition that she could not imagine.

She loved her education and when it was time to send my sister and me to school, she desperately wanted a Loreto education for us.

At that time, we were growing up in Oberon and it was desperately hard living on the land; our family had very little. After managing to send my sister to Loreto, things got harder financially for my parents, and it appeared unlikely that I would be able to come here.

However, my mother's unwavering desire for me to experience the same enriching education led to a turning point. Through the generosity of Loreto, I was granted a bursary, enabling me to join the school. I packed my bags and moved to Sydney to live with my aunts. I started here in 1962 and attended school with my five cousins.

At the time I found it very difficult. I experienced a lot of homesickness and missed my family every day. I often felt like an outsider - the country kid in a big city. But, despite the difficulties, I tried to make the most of my Loreto education by getting as involved as I could.

Although quite hard, my time at Loreto left an indelible mark on me, shaping the rest of my life. This educational legacy was passed down to my daughter, Katharine. On the day of her birth in 1974, my husband David walked down to Loreto from the Mater Hospital to hand in our baby's enrolment forms, so that our family's connection to Kirribilli could continue.

Reflecting on the journey spanning four generations - from my mother's arrival in 1924, to my bursary-assisted enrolment in 1962, to Katharine's entrance in 1985, to my three granddaughters Evie in Year 8, Mali in Year 10, and Indie in Year 11 - I am filled with immense pride.

It's a legacy that might never have happened without the generous role of my bursary.



As a young naïve 14-year-old, I could not have imagined the impact of my education. I did not realise what positive effects it would have on me and my daughter and now my granddaughters.

In today's world, where financial burdens loom large for many families, I rarely speak about the invaluable gift of a Loreto bursary. Yet, the opportunity to pay it forward-to provide another young girl with the same opportunities I had - is a cause close to my heart.

I encourage anyone who is able to support the Loreto bursary program, ensuring that future generations can benefit from the amazing education this school provides. The world needs more Mary Ward women: women from the city, women from the country, from families with financial means and also from families who have financial struggles.

I am so proud of the women my granddaughters are becoming. The opportunities, the values, the holistic focus that Loreto Kirribilli provides. From academics, sports, arts, music, drama, the pastoral care and Catholic values. This environment nurtures women who "in time to come will do much".

Thank you, Loreto Kirribilli, for 100 years of education in my family.


