It has been another inspiring year in the USC Education Abroad Office! As our incredible team has recovered and rebuilt following the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, so too have our students. This year represented the "return to a new normal" we have so longed for as we had the honor to support and prepare nearly 2,000 students for their international experiences in 75 countries. This recovery would not have been possible without you, our education abroad champions, and all your work to encourage and inspire our Global Gamecocks to connect with the world!

In November, we were thrilled to learn that for the first time in school history, the University of South Carolina attained a #1 national ranking for our number of study abroad students. plus two other top ten rankings. USC ranked:

- 1st among doctoral universities for number of students engaged in mid-length study abroad
- 7th among doctoral universities for overall number of students who study abroad
- 8th among doctoral universities for number of students engaged in long-term study abroad.*





The Education Abroad Office supported the following education abroad experiences, broken down by term:




Undergraduate Education Abroad Participation Rates from Fall 2012 through Spring 2023 at USC-Columbia

Breakdown of education abroad enrollment by school or college:






UG Enrollment by Program Type


UG Demographics

Demographic breakdown of the 1,766 individual undergraduate participants:




Ethnic Background


The general USC undergraduate student population is 56.1% female and 43.9% male.








Graduate Demographics
