## **WELCOME WEEK**

As the new academic year got underway, we were pleased to welcome more than 1500 new students, as well as over 1200 familiar faces who returned to continue their studies, and it was great to see both campuses busy and buzzing after the quietness of the summer break.

During the first week of term we hosted the annual Welcome Week with a range of activities and freebies to give students the opportunity to have fun between lessons and get to know their new classmates in a relaxed environment.

Activities included a penalty shootout, virtual reality headsets and a visit from some furry, scaly and prickly animals, as well as free popcorn, candyfloss and ice cream to tuck in to throughout the week.









## **NEW £8.1M TRAINING CENTRE STARTS WELCOMING STUDENTS**

The start of the new academic year saw the new Advanced Technology and Automotive Centre at the Wellington Road campus welcoming its first students.

The £8.1 million centre purpose-built centre was completed in July and provides state-of-the art teaching and learning facilities for students and apprentices studying for automotive and engineering qualifications.

The centre was officially opened in September by Councillor Stephen Simkins, leader of City of Wolverhampton Council and Richard Parker, mayor of the West Midlands and chair of West Midlands Combined Authority, who both unveiled commemorative plaques which will be displayed in the automotive and engineering departments.

The opening of the centre - which was phase one of City of Wolverhampton Council's transformational City Learning Quarter plan - has enabled the transfer of all automotive and engineering courses from the Paget Road campus in Compton to the Wellington Road site.







Students and apprentices doing automotive qualifications got experience of working in the industry by carrying out winter checks on tutors' and students' cars in return for donations to charity.














# PROMOTING EQUALITY **BLACK HISTORY MONTH**

A Level students got valuable insights into careers in the parole and criminal justice field from Jennie Sugden, a Parole Board member for England and Wales.


Jennie explained the processes behind sentencing and parole decisions, and students took part in a workshop where they reviewed case studies, assessed risk factors, and deliberated on offender release.

He also shared personal stories and captivating tales of his travels across Japan and his journey over the Pacific, and also met with Louise Fall, college principal and chief executive.






#### **FUTURES FOUNDATION LEARNING**

#### **MATHS**


Annette, a tutor on the Multiply maths course, recorded a video about the programme and how it can help to boost not only maths skills, but selfconfidence and employment opportunities too.




