Work on Winchelsea Bowls Club's sports lighting project is scheduled to start in January and be complete by mid-March 2024.

The community-initiated project is progressing well, with a tender set to be awarded for installation of the 100 lux LED lighting on four new 13.5-metre towers.

The lighting will meet relevant sport lighting standards and Bowls Australia guidelines for night competition, greatly expanding the club's capacity to cater for a growing population and provide greater accessibility.

The lights will be able to be dimmed for non-competition activities such as night training and social bowls.

The LED system will minimise glare for bowlers and minimise light spill to surrounding areas.

Winchelsea Bowls Club is contributing \$37,539 to the project, with the Victorian Government contributing \$112,618 via the Local Sports Infrastructure Fund.

Surf Coast Shire Council is managing the project delivery.

Club officials approached Council with the project concept in November 2022 via Council's online community project proposal portal.

Council's Community Project Development Program led a project working group including club board members and a representative from Bowls Australia through a detailed investigation process including consultation with specialist lighting company Webb Australia.

"Importantly, Council will also need to focus on financial sustainability. We want to better understand community priorities so we can provide the best value and most needed services."

There will be a series of pop up sessions where people can learn more. You can find a full list on Council's website.

A panel of community members will also be established to give advice to Council on the Council Plan. This will involve 45 local people who will be randomly selected, based on the demographic profile of the shire, to be part of the community panel. Thousands of people across the shire will receive a letter in the post inviting them to apply to join the panel, so keep an eye out in your letterbox.

The Council Plan and Health Wellbeing Plan will guide how Council determines its priorities and makes decisions, including how its annual budget is shaped.

These plans will help ensure people have access to the services they need most; environmental values are enhanced and protected and people are empowered to lead meaningful lives.

The weekend of April 12th and 13th saw an enthusiastic group of Conquerors set off to walk and talk as they made their way to Inverleigh. This year's event saw 187 participants take part across the weekend.

To ensure there are no financial barriers we aim to continue to run conquer the Corrugations as a free event. The continued support of Winchelsea IGA and Bendigo Bank allows this to happen. Ashwani and his family very generously donate food and drinks for this event and financial funding from Bendigo Bank covers items such as insurance. Colleen Trewhella and Robyn Black prepare and cook up the fabulous food.

Once again, the Inverleigh and Winchelsea Lions Club members performed an amazing job of setting up the rest stops with seating and providing refreshments. Get fire ready for the fire danger period starting Monday 25 November

Surf Coast Shire

The Fire Danger Period in the Surf Coast Shire will start at 1am on Monday 25 November.

Council will start its annual roadside slashing program this week to reduce fire fuel loads around the shire.

Roadside slashing will start in the hinterland and move from the northern part of the shire to the south. Works are expected to take three to four weeks, depending on the weather, finishing in time for Christmas the busy summer season.

"Reducing the fire danger risk is so important and it's great to see these works getting underway" said Cr Tony Phelps. "We all need to do as much preparation as we can as we're facing an increased risk due to a very dry winter and above average temperatures. The fire danger is here now and we need to be prepared."

The roadside slashing program helps to prevent fire risk by: Reducing the potential for roadside ignition from cars/trailers/ machinery pulling over.

Reducing the radiant heat the grass produces when on fire, helping to reduce the potential size and risk of the fire. Reducing the risk of fires burning upwards and igniting trees.

During winter the Lorne community came together with Council's Fire Prevention Officers for the winter fuel reduction program. This program aims to manage fuel loads in a targeted town and complements fire break and fire reduction burns undertaken

Making Victorian rentals safer

Victorian State Government

The Victorian Government is making rental properties safer by requiring smoke alarm, gas and electrical safety checks for all residential rental properties.

Minister for Consumer Affairs Gabrielle Williams announced new reforms requiring rental providers to conduct smoke alarm checks every 12 months, and gas and electrical safety checks every two years, for all rentals – no matter when the lease started.

The reforms will also ensure that the residential rental provider or the provider's agent must immediately arrange for urgent repairs to be carried out on faulty smoke alarms.

Detox Your Home event recycles 3,000kg of toxic chemicals

Another successful Detox Your Home event held in October saw almost three tonnes of unwanted toxic chemicals collected. This included a highly toxic Schedule X chemical that required special handling for safe disposal due to the risk it posed to site workers.

The Detox Your Home chemist identified the Schedule X pesticide, which was used to fumigate rabbit warrens but is being phased out as an approved chemical in Australia. The chemical was safely wrapped and placed in an air-tight container ready for transport to the processing facility.

by Forest Fire Management Victora and Parks Victoria. Over 200 properties in Lorne worked with Council officers to reduce vegetation around their homes and buildings. At the same time Council officers cleared road reserves adjacent to 110 homes and created over 300 cubic meters of mulch.

"Thanks to the Lorne community for the great work they have done already with the winter fuel reduction program," Mr Phelps said. "It's great to see how committed locals are to being prepared and doing what they can, no matter the season."

"There is still time to be fire ready and if you need advice on preparing your property, Council's fire prevention officers are available to come and conduct a free inspection," he said. "It's so important that everyone cleans up around their property, has a fire plan in place and keeps informed via the Vic Emergency app or listening to ABC radio."

Property inspections have started for compliance with fire prevention measures, such as vegetation management and grass slashing. Properties that are considered a fire hazard are issued with a fire prevention notice and the owner is required to undertake the prescribed works. Failing to act on a fire prevention notice may result in fines.

More common household and garden chemicals were among the 2,908kg of chemicals collected, including:

- 1,361kg of flammable liquids (petrol, diesel, kerosene, methylated spirits, citronella, hand sanitiser etc).
- 545kg of weed killer, inspect sprays, rose dust, ant rid, mosquito coils, rat poison etc.
- 181kg of aerosol cans of paint, inspect spray, and solvents.
- 51kg of photographic chemicals.
- 68kg of mystery chemicals, such as liquids and powders stored in unmarked bottles and tins.
- The most unusual items dropped off were several jars of preserved laboratory specimens in formaldehyde from a former veterinary practice.

"Thank you to the community for supporting this event and bringing in your chemicals to be safely disposed of", said Cr Liz Pattison. "And thank you to Sustainability Victoria for running the event. I know these events take a lot of work to put on, so it's nice to see so many people playing their part to keep these chemicals out of the waste stream and our waterways."

All the chemicals were taken to a processing facility in Melbourne. A team of chemists sorted them into the appropriate recovery or disposal pathways. Acids are then neutralised, flammable liquids are reused as a blended fuel, and chemically inactive liquids are treated.

New financial scheme for Victims of crime

Victorian State Government

The Victorian Government is better supporting victims of crime, making it easier to get financial assistance and have their trauma recognised through the new online Financial Assistance Scheme.

The online scheme can be accessed in the privacy of someone's home and will replace the courts-based Victims of Crime Assistance Tribunal – helping to minimise further trauma for victims, as they no longer having to attend court or face perpetrators.

Victims of crime will be able to receive up to \$60,000, with some eligible for up to an additional \$25,000.

Victims of crime will also be able to receive a recognition statement from the state – acknowledging the effects of the crime and expressing condolences.

Application timeframes have been extended from two to three years, or for sexual offences or family violence cases to 10 years.

Shearers call for labour hire licensing system to stop exploitation

Shearers will continue to work for poverty wages in unsafe shearing sheds across the country until the Commonwealth

Government imposes a licensing regime on all labour hire companies operating in regional Australia the union which represents shearers, the Australian Workers' Union, said today.

A new resolution passed at the AWU's National Conference held in Perth calls on the federal government to step in with a new national licensing and enforcement body after widespread reports of labour exploitation in shearing sheds across the country.

The new regulation body would hold the powers to ensure licensing and registration but also have powers of enforcement.

The AWU was formed by unionised shearers in Ballarat in 1886, and it was shearers who formed the political arm of the labour movement, the Australian Labor Party, in Queensland in 1892.

Ross Kenna, lead organiser with the AWU Victorian Branch's Country Team says shearers of the 1800s would ashamed to see what's happening in shearing sheds in 2024.

"The AWU was born fighting for shearers, and we're not backing down now," said Mr Kenna. "It's disgraceful that some of the same exploitative attitudes that we saw prevailing in the 1890s have reemerged in 2024. Today we are once again seeing young shearers working for poverty wages in unsafe conditions. A national licensing system for shearing contractors is a must if we want to protect our workers' rights and safety.

"There's no reason that the regulation of this industry should lag every other industry in the country.

SEC projects give power and profit back to the people

Victorian State Government

The State Electricity Commission (SEC) is back for good – and its second investment is locked in.

Victorian Premier Jacinta Allan and Minister for the State Electricity Commission Lily D'Ambrosio have announced the SEC will invest \$370 million to build the SEC Renewable Energy Park – a massive solar farm and battery in Horsham. It will be the first 100 per cent government-owned energy generator in Victoria since the Liberal Party privatised the state's energy system.

The battery will soak up cheap solar while the sun is shining and deploy it later in the day to push down electricity prices. The battery storage will also allow more renewable generation to come online by storing power until it's ready to be fed into the grid during high demand.

The local community will directly benefit from the profits from the projects. The SEC will set up a community benefits fund and will work with the community to invest \$42,000 a year back into the local area during the project's construction, and a further \$70,000 every year once the project is operational.

The SEC Renewable Energy Park will come online in 2027 and will be used to provide cheap, 100 per cent renewable electricity to Victorian Government schools, hospitals and offices.

Once operational, all profits made by the SEC will be reinvested back into renewable energy projects – growing the state's battery storage, wind and solar farms – and putting power back in the hands of Victorians.

Bridging the gap: how social engagement can protect against dementia

Centre for Healthy Brain Ageing

Despite increases in digital connectivity, the world is getting lonelier and more socially isolated.

In Australia, approximately one in three people feel lonely some, if not all of the time, up from one in four since before COVID-19. Older adults and those in regional and remote areas are particularly at risk, which can lead to health complications.

One of the key health risks of poor social connections is dementia, the second leading cause of death in Australia. The World Health Organisation says that loneliness and social isolation increase the risk of developing dementia by a whopping 50%.

To combat this issue, researchers at UNSW Sydney's Centre for Healthy Brain Ageing have launched an online study addressing the role of social engagement in maintaining brain function and wellbeing: *Maintaining Social Engagement*.

This world-first research, led by social health expert and Clinical Psychologist Dr Suraj Samtani, aims to provide support and activities for people over 55 with memory concerns to stay socially engaged – all via videocalls – and with enormous potential benefits. "Evidence suggests that being socially active reduces risk of dementia by half," says Dr Samtani. "This is even after taking into account all other risk factors for dementia."

1 in 3 Australians over the age of 65 live in rural and remote areas. According to the 2023 Ending Loneliness Together Report, 35% of those people are lonely. These communities face challenges accessing services and experience geographic and resource barriers against social activities, all of which have negative health consequences.

Dr Samtani says it is important to note the difference between social isolation and loneliness. "Being socially isolated is the physical state of having less interactions with other people. Loneliness is the emotional state of feeling disconnected from the people around us and feeling the need for more rewarding social connections," he says.

According to Dr Samtani, the health risks of social isolation and loneliness are comparable to excessive drinking and daily smoking. "Loneliness is as bad for our health as smoking 15 cigarettes a day. Being lonely can increase your risk of getting dementia by 26%," says Dr Samtani.

Conversely, according to the longest happiness study ever conducted, social connectivity can delay the start of physical health conditions by 10-15 years. The Harvard-led study found that our relationships with people have a powerful influence on health, and that close relationships are the key to maintaining happiness throughout our lives.

"Originally of 20,000 acres, Wormbete embraced fertile lands, heavily timbered, from the foothills of the Otways extending north along the Wormbete Creek to the Barwon River, five miles from Winchelsea". (The Herald 9/9/1937)

Wormbete was established in 1837 by Henry Hopkins, a successful business director and merchant of Hobart. The homestead is set in delightful surroundings.

Rafters in the roof were hewn from timber on the estate and bluestone and sandstone quarried on the property were used to construct the homestead.

Family history was woven in the branches of the old oak tree, grown from an acorn plucked by Sir John Franklin, while Governor of Tasmania, and given to John Rout Hopkins.

Much of their furnishings were lost in transit. Two oils of Napoleon III and Eugenie Imperatrice were sent to Tasmania as a gift by the Armytage family, but were lost to the family.

The Hopkins and Armytage families were well known in the area. There is a legend that in the time of Queen Elizabeth, the Hopkins were buccaneers.

It was James I who granted the coat of arms to Samuel Hopkins, merchant of London. The crest is that of a burning castle.

In the 17th century, during the reign of William III, Hopkins and Bond were money lenders of London Bond Street. We have an interesting letter in our rooms from a descendant re these two families.

John Rout Hopkins, the eldest son of Henry, took over the place in 1850, it passed to his son Walter, and later to his sons Henry and John.

Portions of the property have been sold from time to time including to Alan Bond - but finally was divided among the Hopkins family of 2000 acres.

The property is of great significance to the Winchelsea district.



Victorian State Government First festival chosen for pill testing trial

The first of ten festival events to take part in the Government's pill testing trial has been announced by Premier Jacinta Allan and Minister for Mental Health Ingrid Stitt. It will be available to 35,000 festival goers at *Beyond The Valley, a* four-day event in the Golden Plains Shire from 28 December until 1 January 2025.

They also announced the pill testing service will be led by Youth Support and Advocacy Service, in partnership with The Loop Australia and Harm Reduction Victoria.

The service will be completely confidential, and world-leading technology will test the make-up of most pills, capsules, powders, crystals, or liquids and identify harmful chemicals that can lead to death.

It will be staffed by a multidisciplinary team of experts that will test substances, and provide confidential health information to help people at the festival make better, safer decisions.

The pill testing service will allow real-time surveillance and rapid alerts, and increase our ability to detect new drugs on our streets.

A fixed pill testing site will also be established and open by mid-2025 in inner Melbourne, close to nightlife and public transport.

The trial follows the recent passing of the Drugs, Poisons and Controlled Substances Amendment (Pill Testing) Bill 2024, which made Victoria the first jurisdiction in Australia to have dedicated legislation to support pill testing.

The Department of Health will also work with major events to develop a Safer Music Festivals Framework, helping organisers understand their responsibilities in keeping patrons safe.

More fee-free TAFE construction and housing courses for Victoria

The Federal and Victorian Governments are supporting thousands of Victorians to access free training for a rewarding career in construction – with the announcement of more than 5,000 Fee-Free TAFE places in construction and housing sector courses.

The Federal Government is contributing \$22.2 million in funding, partnering up with the State Government to address critical skills shortages.

From January 2025, 5,200 new Fee-Free TAFE places will be available to Victorians, including up to 1,300 pre-apprenticeship places.

Victorians have voted with their feet with 91,200 enrolments in Fee-Free TAFE courses, over 11,400 enrolments were in the Construction sector.

The announcement comes as more than 508,000 Australians have enrolled in Fee-Free TAFE since its launch with 35,000 enrolments in the construction places across the country.

Attorney-General Jaclyn Symes has congratulated 23 community organisations who will share in a record investment of \$12 million from the Victorian Legal Services Board (VLSB) grants program.

The grants will help fund projects that aim to support some of the most vulnerable people in our community. These include Aboriginal communities, young people and victims of family violence. Since 2007, the VLSB grant program has funded innovative projects supporting people with complex legal problems who struggle to access the legal help they need.

Victorian Electoral Commission

Reforms to Victoria's electoral laws needed to meet the growing challenges of elections

The Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) has today published its response to Parliament's Electoral Matters Committee (EMC) report on the conduct of the 2022 state election and calls on the Victorian government to enact significant reforms to the state's electoral laws.

In its response, the VEC supports many of the EMC's recommendations and agrees with their findings that change is needed to address the growing challenges facing election service delivery.

Electoral Commissioner Sven Bluemmel called for a holistic review of Victoria's electoral laws. 'As elections become more complex, it is crucial that our legislative framework also evolves. A modernised system will ensure our elections continue to be free, fair, secure, and representative of all voters,' Mr Bluemmel said.

'I urge the Government to adopt the recommendations from the Electoral Matters Committee and those put forward by the VEC to create a suite of reforms that will strengthen the state's electoral system,' Mr Bluemmel added.

Key recommendations the VEC supports include:

- changing the election timeline to alleviate pressure points and account for the growing complexity and scale of Victorian elections
- implementing additional measures to protect the safety of all participants at election venues
- adding safeguards to protect against mis- and disinformation
- taking legislative action in response to social media companies ignoring requests from the VEC to remove inaccurate material about the electoral process from their platforms
- developing a legally enforceable code of conduct for candidates and campaigners
- expanding the use of electronic roll mark-off across the state
- reporting on how the VEC is responding to lessons learned about ballot paper shortages during the last election
- extending access to telephone assisted voting.

The Electoral Commissioner also called for consideration of the financial impact when introducing new activities.

'Our response also looks at the resourcing impact of the EMC's recommendations, as elections are not immune from rising costs, and we have included a review of the budgetary impacts of each recommendation in our response,' Mr Bluemmel said.

100 million reasons to travel around regional Victoria

Victorians are continuing to reap the benefits from the Victorian Government's regional fare cap, saving passengers nearly \$100 million since public transport fares were capped at the same price as the daily metro fare.

Minister for Public and Active Transport Gabrielle Williams today announced more than 37 million trips had been taken on regional trains and coaches since the fare cap commenced.

Passengers across the state have embraced farer fares, with V/Line recording its busiest day on the network last month – with 92,000 trips taken in Victoria on just one day.

To help meet increased demand, 88 new and extended weekend services will be added to the Geelong Line from December – delivering 20 minute all day frequencies between Melbourne and Waurn Ponds seven days a week.

The updated timetable, which will come into effect on Sunday, 1 December, will make services between Melbourne and Geelong the fastest and most frequent rail connection between two cities in Australia.

Passengers on the Warrnambool Line are currently enjoying the benefits of a fourth weekend service which was introduced earlier this month and VLocity trains hitting the network for the first time – delivering more modern, reliable and accessible journeys.

Victorian State Government Victorians to have their say on women's public artwork

The Victorian Government is calling on Victorians to help decide which women's stories they would like to see celebrated through up to six new public artworks across the state.

Minister for Women Natalie Hutchins is calling on Victorians to vote for which six stories should be told through the next round of the Victorian Women's Public Art Program.

The chosen public artworks will be funded as part of the \$1.2 million Government Community Support Fund's investment into the second round of the Victorian Women's Public Art Program.

Fewer than two per cent of close to 600 statues in Melbourne's public spaces currently represent women.

The Victorian Women's Public Art Program is addressing the underrepresentation of women artists and women in public art, along with gender stereotypes about women's achievements.

Victorians can visit Engage Victoria to see all 13 of the women's stories shortlisted by an expert panel convened by McClelland Sculpture Park and Gallery.

Artworks chosen by the panel were narrowed down from a competitive pool of applications received earlier this year.

Feedback received through Engage Victoria, and advice from the expert panel, will be used to inform the Minister Hutchins' final decision. She said "As we can only choose six, I hope by opening the decision-making process to the public we can expose even more people to the stories of inspiring Victorian women who all deserve to be celebrated and remembered."

Centre for Excellence in Child and Family Welfare The Centre joins call for national foster care support

The Centre for Excellence in Child and Family Welfare (the Centre) is celebrating the launch of Parliamentary Friends of Foster Carers and Children in Foster Care in Canberra today, highlighting the challenges faced by 45,000 children and young people in out-of-home care across Australia.

As the peak for child and family services in Victoria and Tasmania, the Centre has campaigned for Commonwealth support for foster carers, joining the recently created National Foster Care Sustainability Group's campaign for national support services for children and carers.

"Nationally we see a steep decline in the number of people going through the accreditation process to become foster carers, yet the demand for homes remains constant.

"Improving access to healthcare, providing therapeutic supports to children and young people, reducing the financial pressure on foster carers, and creating equitable workplace entitlements, will encourage more Australian to become foster carers and sustain the carers who are already doing an incredible job," says The Centre's CEO Deb Tsorbaris

Alongside the National Foster Care Sustainability Group, the Centre is advocating for three critical reforms:

Prioritised access to Medical and Therapeutic Support, through the introduction of a card system that ensures all children in care have better access and financial supports to essential medical, therapeutic, and developmental services.

Reducing Financial Pressure on Foster Carers, by raising the ATO tax-free threshold for foster carers, easing financial pressures and enabling higher carer allowances without tax burdens.

More Equitable Leave for Foster Carers, by adjusting the National Employment Standards to help foster carers in paid employment to start or continue fostering. Foster carers fulfil a parenting-type role but are not currently afforded the same supports. Extending these benefits to foster carers ensures an equitable home experience for children.

"Giving children loving homes with foster carers who provide stability and kindness during a very vulnerable time is vital. We know the value of foster carers is more than just economic returns. Living in a foster care home greatly improves the lives of children and their families and is important in helping to repair families and get children home," she says.



The Climate Report

Over the past week, more than 450 researchers gathered in Hobart for the inaugural Australian Antarctic Research Conference — the first such event in more than a decade. Early career researchers have issued a joint statement titled, Making Antarctica Cool Again.

The statement warns of the potential dire consequences of global sea level rise caused by melting ice sheets.

"Nowhere on Earth is there a greater cause of uncertainty in sea level rise projections than from East Antarctica, in Australia's backyard," the statement says.

"The East Antarctic ice sheet alone holds enough water to raise global sea levels by approximately 50 metres if completely melted.

"Global warming induced shifts observed in the region are immense.

"Recent research has shown record low sea ice, extreme heatwaves exceeding 40 degrees Celsius above average temperatures, and increased instability around key ice shelves."

The statement says societies need to urgently "bend the carbon curve" by reducing greenhouse gas emissions as soon as possible.

"Runaway ice loss causing rapid and catastrophic sea level rise is possible within our lifetime," it says.

"Whether such irreversible tipping points have already passed is unknown."

It was announced at the United Nations climate summit in Azerbaijan.

Australia is one of the key parties in Baku, co-chairing negotiations on how much rich countries — who are the biggest polluters — should pay poor countries to cope with climate change.

"Creating a fund for this purpose has always been a politically very fraught issue and the fact that money is slowly trickling in and that Australia is among the top 10 providers of funding into that facility globally is certainly a positive step and one that will be received positively in the Pacific region in particular," said Professor Frank Jotzo, the head of energy at the Institute for Climate, Energy and Disaster Solutions at the Australian National University.

But Dave Sweeney from the Australian Conservation Foundation said that while Australia was taking a leading role on moving to renewable energy domestically, it was not reducing fossil fuel exports, a major contributor to global emissions.

"On a fossil front and emissions front, the impact and the emissions are far too much. Australia is massive exporter of fossil fuels. Australian exports are driving climate chaos around the world.

"(\$50 million) is a gold coin per Australian. It's 2 bucks per Aussie and \$50 million is nowhere near commensurate with the scale of the issue or what's needed abroad, particularly in the Pacific and First Nation Indigenous Australia."

My journey: From personal tragedy to business triumph

The story behind our taxi services

Stan Smith

In 2000, my life took an unexpected turn

when I experienced a workplace accident that left me unable to continue driving interstate trucks. This incident forced me to reevaluate my career and consider new avenues for supporting myself. Six years later, in 2006, fate presented an opportunity that would change not only my life but also the lives of many others in my community.

One cold, wet day as I was leaving the doctor's office, I encountered Lorran Bird, a 90-year-old lady struggling to make her way home in the rain. This sight sparked an idea: what if I could provide a small taxi service in Winchelsea, a town with no other transport options for those in need? The thought of helping people regain their independence and mobility motivated me to take the plunge.

For the first 18 months, I operated the taxi service with a single vehicle. During this time, I met a woman who used a wheelchair and lived out of town. Realizing the need for accessible transport, I purchased my first maxi van equipped with a wheelchair lift. This move marked the beginning of a more inclusive service aimed at accommodating all members of the community.

In 2011, I was approached by the owners of Bannockburn Taxis Service. After lengthy discussions and considering offers from Geelong Taxis, which only wanted to handle trips to Geelong and not local jobs, I decided to buy the entire Bannockburn Service. My decision was driven by a commitment to ensuring that the elderly and those dependent on taxis for community access were not neglected.

By December 2012, Great Ocean Taxis Service was on the brink of closing due to the ill health of its previous owners. I took over Great Ocean Road Taxis Service, determined to keep the essential transport service alive. At this stage, my phone was constantly ringing with bookings for weekly shopping trips, day programs, doctor's appointments, and trips to Tullamarine Airport. The demand was overwhelming, and I found myself questioning the wisdom of expanding so rapidly. The sleepless nights, driving, and managing phone calls for three businesses took a toll on me. In 2013, Colac Taxis Service went into receivership, leaving the town without a taxi service, particularly for those with disabilities. My drive to fill this gap and provide necessary transport services strengthened my resolve.

In 2014, 13 Cabs approached me with a proposal to start a branch in Geelong. They offered to handle all my bookings, which seemed like a great idea. This partnership allowed me to focus more on running the business and less on the dayto-day operations of driving and booking. Combining the Geelong service with my other operations seemed to be the perfect solution.

For eight years, 13 Cabs managed my fleet of cars and maxi vans. However, relying on independent drivers gradually eroded the personal touch that had been the hallmark of my services. The personal connections with customers and the satisfaction of providing dependable, individualized service were being lost.

In 2020, our company underwent a significant transformation with a name change to Surfcoast Taxis. Since then, we have been proud to expand our fleet to 14 vehicles, including five Maxis vans, all equipped with wheelchair accessibility. This expansion reflects our commitment to providing inclusive and reliable transportation services to our community.

Victorian State Government Great Outdoors Taskforce consultation opens

The Victorian Government want more people to get out and explore the great outdoors, with the opening of consultation by the Great Outdoors Taskforce.

The State Government established the Great Outdoors Taskforce earlier this year, to consult with the Victorian community and provide recommendations to government on the management of state forests in Gippsland, East Gippsland and the North East.

This is a landmark opportunity to open up 1.8 million hectares of Victoria's native forests that were formerly used for native timber harvesting, with new opportunities for recreation and tourism, while also ensuring we protect the things Victorians love about the bush.

The Great Outdoors Taskforce will ensure options for future uses and care of the forest are explored, including protecting the unique things that Victorians love most about the environment while also maximising recreational opportunities.

The Taskforce will not be making any recommendation for largescale changes to land tenure.

There is already so much to explore in Victoria, with Free Camping this summer, 31 new and 60 upgraded campgrounds, as well as 155 upgraded four-wheel drive tracks, and 16 walking tracks totalling 31 kilometres recently completed as part of a \$106.6 million investment in Victoria's Great Outdoors.
