

**Busy Person Retreat** – Integrating prayer, reflection, and personalized spiritual direction in daily living, co-sponsored by Dominican Center Marywood.

**Circle of Life** – a panel conversation on end of life planning, co-sponsored by the Catholic Foundation of West Michigan.

**Stations of the Crèche** – inspired by the tradition of the Stations of the Cross, encounter the mystery of Christ's Incarnation.

## At the Intersection of Faith and Life

- **The Gallagher Talk:** This event honors the life and visionary leadership of **Father Joseph V. Gallagher, CSP**, who served as CIC Director from 1978 to 1982. The theme of our 2025 event was ***The Role of Compassion in a Divided World***, presented by **Gloria Purvis**, a nationally recognized Catholic speaker, author, and public scholar known for her bold and compassionate voice on issues of faith, dignity, and justice. **160 people registered for this year's Gallagher Talk.**



- **Women of Vision Series:** This series of four presentations presented the opportunity to explore the proposals in the final document of the recent ***Synod on Synodality***. Monthly, we hosted different presenters to introduce 3-4 women of faith, highlighting the historical context and the gifts that they expressed through their leadership – gifts that are still needed today. Presenters for the Women of Vision Series, included: **Sister Barbara E. Reid, O.P., Ph.D., Bronwen McShea, Ph.D., Shannen Dee Williams, Ph.D., and Patricia Cooney-Hathaway Ph.D.** A total of **85 people, representing 24 parishes and faith communities participated** in the series, including attendees from Hoboken NJ, Chicago IL, Eden Prairie MN, and Boston MA.

### Wisdom Circles – A Space for Reflection and Growth:

Two weeks after each presentation of the **Women of Vision Series**, participants were invited to gather in Wisdom Circles. These small group sessions designed to deepen the experience of the presentation, offered the space to pray together and explore how the stories of these women illuminate our own God-given gifts today. Facilitators included: **Cami Beecroft-Mann, Barbara Conklin, and Mary Martin.**



- **Evening in December:** Each December, the Catholic Information Center partners with downtown Grand Rapids Christian churches to host Evening in December—an ecumenical gathering of prayer, dialogue, and reflection on Advent themes. This year's theme, ***A Weary World Rejoices***, invited participants to acknowledge the weariness many feel today and rediscover the hope and renewal that Advent offers. The event featured a panel discussion with **Lutheran Bishop Julie Thomas Schneider, Pastor Daryl Kistler of Hope Congregational, and AJ Fossel, Director at Community Food Club.** **82 people registered, representing 14 faith communities.**



# Equipping Leaders



In May, the CIC offered Deep Dive Sessions to provide focused, practical formation for strengthening parish life and supporting sustainable pastoral initiatives. Rooted in prayer, shared wisdom, and better practices, these sessions move from vision to action, equipping participants with better practices and renewed confidence for ministry.

## Jump Starting Small Groups

Small groups foster spiritual growth, faith sharing and community. This four-part series teaches participants how to effectively facilitate a small group, whether for faith formation, retreats or seasonal gatherings.

## Bereavement Care

The Bereavement Care, a four-week training course, equips participants with the knowledge and skills to provide compassionate care, cultivate active listening, and provide spiritual support to those who have experienced loss.

## Understanding & Serving Inactive Catholics

This training series helps to foster understanding and connection with inactive Catholics, with an emphasis on what is practical for different parish situations. through dialogue, invitation, and engagement.



# Sending Missionaries



## Leadership Formation Institute for Missionary Disciples

In 2025, the **Leadership Formation Institute** (LFI) continued to serve as a transformative formation experience for lay leaders, **equipping them with spiritual depth, pastoral vision, and practical skills** to live and lead as missionary disciples within their parishes. Rooted in the Church's call to evangelization and inspired by *Evangelii Gaudium*, **LFI invited participants to view every aspect of parish life through a missionary lens—grounded in prayer, attentive listening, and courageous outreach.**



Three parishes sent teams to participate in LFI, engaging a total of **21 lay leaders** in a 12-week formation process. Participants gathered weekly for two-hour sessions focused on spiritual formation, communal discernment, accompaniment, and intentional project planning. *This shared journey fostered collaboration across parishes while helping participants translate formation into concrete pastoral action.*

The formation process culminated in the launch of four parish-based initiatives, each responding to the unique needs of its local community. The **Seek & Find** event at **St. Jude Parish** (October 11, 2025) invited neighborhood families to experience the parish campus through hospitality, relationship-building, and the creation of prayer centerpieces for use in their homes.

At **St. Mary Magdalen Parish**, participants launched **The Rescue Project** in January 2026, a series of weekly small-group sessions designed to proclaim the Gospel in a compelling way—offering participants a framework for understanding reality and making sense of the world through the lens of faith.

At the **Cathedral of St. Andrew, Made For More** (January 2026) created a welcoming pathway home for those who have drifted away from the Catholic faith, emphasizing listening, community, and small group sharing. Also at the **Cathedral**, the **Lay Ministry Toolkit** has been designed to assist lay ministry teams (e.g. lectors, ushers, choir) as they begin to introduce elements of small group prayer and sharing in a more intentional way.

Together, these initiatives reflect the heart of the Leadership Formation Institute: **forming lay leaders who move from formation to mission, strengthening parish life, and embodying the Church's call to accompany others as missionary disciples in today's world.**

## Instituto de Formación de Liderazgo para el Ministerio Hispano



Equipping and forming Spanish-speaking lay leaders who strengthen parish life and mission.

Hispanic Catholics represent nearly **40% of the U.S. Catholic population**, and in West Michigan, approximately **119,000 residents are Hispanic**, with an estimated **56,000 Catholics**, that is about **20% of the Catholics in the Diocese of Grand Rapids**. This growing community calls for strong, culturally responsive leadership.

The **Leadership Formation Institute for Hispanic Ministry** equips lay Hispanic/Latino Catholics with a solid foundation in Church teaching and practical skills for ministry. Leaders are prepared to serve in ways that reflect the cultural and pastoral realities of our region. The current cohort of 22 lay leaders are midway through the program – studying Scripture, evangelization, prayer, and pastoral planning.



## Impact in 2025

In June, **16 leaders** completed the three-year program of **24 courses**. They are now actively leading initiatives in their parishes:

# Missionary Disciples

## Spotlight

### St. Jude's "Family Seek & Find"

***"This experience showed us that missionary discipleship begins with simple invitations that make people feel they belong." – LFI team member***

As participants in the Leadership Formation Institute (LFI), the parish team from St. Jude stepped forward with a shared longing: to strengthen family connection and renew a sense of welcome within their community. Throughout the summer, the team practiced the habits they learned in LFI – discernment, deep listening, collaborative planning, and trust in the Holy Spirit. Their conversations revealed a persistent reality: many families disengage from parish life after the sacrament of confirmation is received by their children. If St. Jude was to grow, families needed not only programs; they needed to feel they belonged.

Guided by this insight – and aligned with St. Jude's strategic priorities of growth, welcome, and family support – the team envisioned a simple, joyful encounter that would open the parish to both members and neighbors. Their project, **Seek & Find**, became that invitation. With support from parish leadership and seed funding from the CIC and Knights of Columbus, the team designed a campus wide scavenger hunt and creative activity that made it easy for families to participate without pressure or prior connection. On October 11, more than **150 participants**, about 40 families, joined the event, including many walk ins drawn by street signage. Toddlers, teens, parents, and grandparents engaged together, creating moments of connection, laughter, and shared faith.

After the event, team members noted renewed parish energy, increased confidence in their own leadership, and new ideas emerging for future outreach. This Spring, the team plans to host a community bicycle swap and blessing of the bikes for neighborhood families. What began as a formation project became a lived expression of missionary discipleship—leaders sent forth to ignite belonging and welcome in their community.



Create spaces where diverse voices are welcomed, relationships are healed, and unity is fostered through culturally responsive programs.

### **4. Advance Our Communication and Outreach**

In the coming year, we are planning to create new video content for self-directed online learning as well as continuing to improve the quality of outreach through our e-newsletters, social media, and in the diocesan magazine FAITH Grand Rapids.

Help amplify stories of transformation and extend the CIC's reach through refreshed media, digital platforms, and community engagement.

### **5. Ensure Long Term Sustainability**
