

# Only in Victoria: kids go free for footy Round 21

### **Victorian State Government**

Minister for Tourism, Sport and Major Events Steve Dimopoulos has joined AFL CEO Andrew Dillon at Marvel Stadium to announce that tickets will be free for all kids aged 14 years and under for Round 21 in Victoria.

Round 21 begins on Thursday 31 July and kicks off the final month of the home-and-away season. The round includes five blockbuster matches across Melbourne and Geelong.

Kicking off on Thursday night, the Western Bulldogs host GWS Giants at Marvel Stadium, which will also welcome Melbourne and West Coast on Saturday afternoon. A rematch of the 2023 Grand Final takes centre stage at the MCG on Saturday night as Collingwood takes on the Brisbane Lions. On the Sunday, the Saints and Kangaroos meet at Marvel Stadium and Geelong Cats face Port Adelaide at GMHBA Stadium.

This year's Kids Go Free round builds on the success of the initiatives debut last year. More than 6,000 kids got to see their teams play in Melbourne, Geelong and Ballarat thanks to last year's Kids Go Free round – more than a quarter of the total general admission tickets for that round.

The initiative is part of the Labor Government's AFL Events Package which includes support for the 2025 Toyota AFL Grand Final Parade and Footy Festival. This will provide a huge boost for young Victorian footy fans and their families. looking to cheer on their team before finals in our world-class stadiums.

# WHERE THE COOL KIDS CROCHET Spotlight on the community Crochet Group at Winch House

On the second Saturday of the month from 1.30pm, members of the Crochet Group gather their hooks, wool and \$5 and make their way to the Winchelsea Community House. This has been the way for over six years and though attendance has fluctuated, a core group remains dedicated to the hour or so of likeminded company and quiet creativity.

They sit around a square of long tables with sounds of soft music coupled with light conversation filling the room, and skilfully bring

together their creations one notch at a time. They make shawls, scarves, blankets for dolls and little toy penguins. Never have I wanted to be a part of a group quite so much.

There is nothing exclusive about this club, not skill level nor age is required for joining. At the last meetup there were eight in attendance, four-long serving members and four newer members - the cool kids. Together this multi-generational collective is doing their bit to keep creativity, and the great skill of crocheting alive. And I wish I was as cool as them.







### Call out to design the new Youth Myki

Kids across the state have the chance to design the new youth myki cards that will hit the network next year. Young Victorians can submit their designs for a chance to showcase their work on over a million youth myki cards and to win a \$1,000 gift card.

Designs for the new youth myki can be hand drawn or a digital illustration – with the new card set to stand out from the current myki card range.

Entries will close on Sunday, 15 June 2025 with Premier Jacinta Allan and Minister Williams announcing the winner later this year.

A yearly student pass currently costs \$755, but from next year children aged under 18 can travel for free. For a family with three children under 18, that's a saving of \$2,265 each year.

# Push-Up Challenge for Mental Health

Pushing for a Purpose in Winchelsea

### Winch locals are dropping to the floor for a cause—the Annual Push-Up Challenge for Mental Health

For the third year in a row, a team of locals from Winchelsea are participating in The Push-Up Challenge, a national initiative raising awareness and funds for mental health.

Their chosen charity? Lifeline Geelong. Their goal? 3,214 push-ups in 23 days—one for every Australian life lost to suicide in 2023. Team Winch has started strong, already banking over **5,457 push-ups** just three days in, and raising **\$763** towards their target.

But they've got their eyes on a bigger prize—topping their incredible results from year one, when they:

 Finished Top 10 in Victoria for most push-ups banked

- Finished **Top 10** in Victoria for most funds raised
- Finished **Top 15** nationally overall
- Raised \$2,300 for Lifeline Geelong
- Completed 80,631 push-ups across a team of just 29 people!

This year's team has 25 members, and the spirit is just as strong—whether they're on the gym floor, in their lounge room,or awkwardly lowering themselves in office hallways between meetings.

# New GPs celebrate completion of training in Geelong

### Royal Australian College of GPs

Fifty-seven doctors celebrated the completion of their training as specialist GPs at the first regional Victorian Fellowship ceremony of the Royal Australian College of GPs (RACGP) at Novotel Geelong.

It marks a successful end to 11 years of education, training, rigorous assessment, and experience in primary care for the new Fellows of the RACGP.

New GP Dr Shruthi Vantakesh trained in Colac. She said working in general practice means she gets to help patients at every stage of life. "I've always wanted to treat all the parts of the body – it's very diverse. You get to be part of their journey, from birth 'till they pass." Dr Vantakesh said she found living and working in a small town challenging, but the experience gave her opportunities she wouldn't have otherwise had.

RACGP President Dr Michael Wright told graduates at the ceremony that earning their Fellowship was a huge achievement that reflects they have displayed the skills and experience to help patients in their communities thrive at all stages of their lives. "Admission to fellowship shows a GP has the confidence of their mentors and peers to serve their patients in the broad discipline of general practice independently.

"You will have faced different challenges – for some that journey started from another country, while for others you some have gone through big life events – births, loss, and transitions. And it's important to acknowledge that you could not have made this journey without the support of your families and friends.

"General practice is a fantastic specialty. No other specialty has the flexibility, variety, and independence that general practice offers us, or lets practitioners form such long-term relationships with our patients.

The RACGP trains 90% of GPs in Australia, across big cities, regional, rural, remote and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

The Fellowship graduation ceremony coincides with Crazy Socks for Docs Day, where GPs around the country are wearing their wildest socks to challenge the stigma around doctors' mental health.

because it required carrying a phone for emergencies. What followed was a curious blend of admiration, confusion, and cautious diplomacy (on my part, anyway). We laughed, we disagreed, we survived.

There were also conversations about Winch's community food bank and Richard's upcoming coffee cart project. There was talk of a new-age food exchange involving local kids,





community produce, and just a dash of utopian flair. Only in Winch.

# Viva Energy gas import terminal still risky and uncertain with safety and dredging concerns unresolved GEELONG

**Geelong Sustainability** 

The Geelong Renewables Not Gas Alliance is deeply disappointed by the approval of Viva Energy's gas import terminal while significant concerns around additional dredging in Corio Bay remain unresolved.

The Victorian Premier and Planning Minister have announced environmental approval for Viva Energy's controversial gas terminal, without releasing details to the Geelong community.

Reports released since reveal that concerns around safety and navigation raised by expert witnesses, Ports Victoria have not been addressed.

Instead, the inquiry report states any additional dredging of the shipping channel would be subject to a separate assessment, including potentially a whole new Environment Effects Statement – another major hurdle for the company.

Spokesperson Lauren Dillon for ACF Geelong said, "Maritime experts, Ports Victoria and Vopak have all flagged the current Corio Bay shipping channel is too shallow for most LNG tanker ships and significant dredging could be required to ensure safe navigation of the vessels.

"This additional dredging isn't part of Viva Energy's proposal and wasn't scrutinised in this environmental assessment. This means the community, the regulator, and even the Minister have yet to see any assessment of what will happen to the local ecosystem if the shipping channel is deepened for LNG ships.

"We would like to thank the local community who have campaigned tirelessly for four years to oppose this project, including gathering thousands of petition signatures, attending public hearings, presenting expert evidence, and hosting rallies."

Spokesperson Jane Spence from Geelong Sustainability said: "Investing in new gas infrastructure locks us into decades of emissions at a time when urgent climate

action is needed. "The proposed gas import terminal is not just a climate risk — it is an economic gamble that could leave Victorians worse off.

"We are incredibly disappointed by this outcome in the face of considerable community opposition. "We call on the Victorian Government to invest in ambitious electrification and renewable energy solutions that provide reliable power and long-term jobs for a safer, healthier, and more sustainable future for our community."

"As the electricity system shifts to renewable energy, fossil gas could become Victoria's biggest climate problem. The smartest solution remains helping households and businesses shift to efficient electric appliances."

# Australia just approved Woodside's gas project until 2070. How could it happen?

Some weeks more than others, climate change really bears down on Australians.

This week, the news carried images of eerie orange skies as dust storms whipped across landscapes dried from record-breaking droughts. Further north, homes were submerged in floods exacerbated by heavier rain from a warmer climate.

And also this week, the Australian government approved the extension of one of the world's largest gas facilities until 2070.

But this decision isn't about climate change.

At least not under Australia's current laws, where the climate harm from fossil fuel projects doesn't have to be considered.

How can Australia approve a fossil fuel mega-project that will run until 20 years after the world is meant to reach net zero emissions?

"I think the average punter out there is basically saying, 'Hang on, this is about climate change and 2070, what are we doing? What in the hell are we doing?" lamented Greg Bourne from the Climate Council.

The North West Shelf is already Australia's third-highest emitting facility in the country, producing about 6 million tonnes of greenhouse gas each year.

That's just the direct emissions from extracting and processing the gas and doesn't count emissions after the gas is sold, shipped, and burnt at its final destination.

Some estimates put the total lifetime emissions from this project at the equivalent of a decade of Australia's current emissions.

A decade. Think of it as pushing out Australia's climate goals by another 10 years.

But Mr Bourne said the decision would "haunt" the government.

Before working at the Climate Council, he worked for decades in the gas industry

in Western Australia and internationally, including at the North West Shelf.

"We've been talking about net zero by 2050, that number is in people's heads," he said.

"Then suddenly, a project which is now allowed to go ahead until 2070, it's going to ring alarm bells in a very, very, very big way."

It's not just climate experts warning that the world needs to stop expanding fossil fuels: the International Energy Agency says there is enough existing coal, oil, and gas projects to supply the world and stay the course to net zero.

"The world is awash in gas, primarily coming out from the Middle East, but lots coming out from America and so on like that. I think our Australian companies fool themselves into thinking that they're going to be the last company standing, pushing gas out there," Mr Bourne said.

Currently, the environment minister has veto power over major projects if they would impact "matters of national environmental significance", such as protected plants, animals, and ecosystems.

In the case of the North West Shelf, the minister considered the impact on cultural heritage relating to the ancient rock art of Murujuga.

But under these laws, in the Environment Protection Biodiversity Conservation (EPBC) Act, climate change is not a deciding factor.

"The fact that our environment laws do not address the harms caused by climate change from coal and gas extraction is a really dangerous loophole," said Julia Dehm, an associate professor in the law school at La Trobe University and climate law expert.

"There's long been calls for reform of the EPBC act to include a climate trigger."

This concept was actually proposed back in 2005 by Mr Albanese, who, as shadow environment minister, wanted to fix this "glaring gap" in the laws.

"The climate change trigger will enable major new projects to be assessed for their climate change impact," he told parliament in 2005.

"Climate change is one of the most significant challenges facing the global

community and one of the greatest threats to Australia's way of life.

"It is time to act. It is time for procrastination to end ... We cannot any longer afford to be complacent on this issue."

Twenty years later, Australia has not closed that gap and the Albanese government just approved the type of project that he was targeting back in 2005.

# Government urged to act swiftly as drought devastates rural Victoria

Member for Western Victoria, Bev McArthur has moved a motion demanding urgent targeted support for drought-stricken regions, including subsidised water, financial assistance for fodder and water delivery and meaningful government intervention to sustain rural communities.

Mrs McArthur said, "This government is sleepwalking through a rural emergency in Victoria. Rainfall is at historic lows, feed and water supplies are vanishing and farm families are facing the kind of hardship that would break most people.

"These aren't just numbers on a page, but livelihoods, communities and the very backbone of Victoria's food supply. It is utterly unacceptable that while South Australia is stepping up to support its farmers, Victoria is lagging.

"Farms are running out of water, feed and hope. Victoria's farming families don't want sympathy. They are calling for action from the Government now."

The motion passed unanimously.







### Why do dam repairs often fail?

As dry conditions continue across Victoria, many farmers may be considering repairing leaking or failed dams to increase on-farm water storage capacity once it rains.

Dam repairs are often high-risk, expensive, and should only be undertaken when the cause of failure and repair options are well understood.

Repairs should only be attempted on larger, well-constructed dams.

Understanding the dam's history—who built it, what equipment was used, and how it has performed—is essential before any work begins.

Poor construction, unsuitable materials, inadequate compaction, and soil contamination are among the most common causes of dam failure.

While poor maintenance can contribute, it is rarely the primary factor.

Diagnosing the cause of dam failure can be complex. It is important to determine whether the leak is through the wall or floor of the dam, and whether it is isolated or widespread.

Thorough inspections should ideally be carried out across multiple seasons, including winter, spring, and summer. Where possible, landholders should:

- Inspect the dam bank for seepage, subsidence, cracks, or tunnels
- Check the waterline for whirlpools or surface turbulence
- Examine downstream areas for soft ground or lush vegetation, indicating seepage
- Use a steel probe or crowbar to test soil firmness in suspect areas
- Watch for unusual signs such as bright yellow or very clear water, which may indicate tunnelling or unsuitable soil
- Monitor and photograph the site regularly to track changes in water levels or visible issues
- Inspect the dam after heavy rain to identify potential problems
- Carefully examine any breach in the dam wall, looking for signs of unsuitable materials like sand, gravel or topsoil.

Soil testing is a crucial part of any repair effort. Testing should include samples from the failure site and surrounding areas, as well as any potential borrow pits.

Basic soil assessments, including texture, aggregate stability, and shrinkage, can be undertaken by landholders using simple guidelines available on the Agriculture Victoria website: Soil materials for farm dam construction.

Repair options depend on the location, cause, and severity of the failure.

Solutions may include reworking existing materials, sourcing suitable material nearby, or using additives like lime, gypsum, bentonite, or specialised products such as sealants or membranes.

Expert advice should always be sought before using manufactured products, as locally sourced materials are often more effective.

Dam repair works usually involve:

- Excavating the site for safe machinery access
- Preparing the foundations to optimise bonding
- Ensuring repair materials are moist and placed in layers not exceeding 100mm
- Compacting each layer with multiple passes of a padfoot roller
- Ensuring the total depth/width of repair materials exceed 300mm
- Shaping final slopes to a maximum gradient of 3:1 (horizontal:vertical).

Repairing dams also present significant health and safety risks, including unstable soil, steep slopes, machinery hazards, and exposure to dust.

All works should be carried out by qualified and experienced personnel, and safety protocols must be in place, including reliable emergency communication.

Permits or licences may be required to undertake dam repairs. Landholders are encouraged to contact their local council planning officer and water authority for quidance.

### The Armytage family at Ingleby Station

The land on which the Ingleby homestead now stands is the traditional lands of the Gulidjan people and was first colonised by Thomas Armytage, one of the earliest pastoralists to follow Batman and Fawkner into the Port Phillip District.

He initially arrived at Port Phillip in 1836 with his partners Charles Franks (mentioned earlier re the murder of him and his shepherd) and Thomas Ricketts (after whom Ricket's Marsh was named on the Princes Highway near Birregurra, and Ricketts Point Marine Sanctuary in Port Philip Bay just off Beaumaris in Melbourne's south-eastern suburbs).

Armytage, Ricketts and Franks were shipping stock across Bass Strait to a site near Werribee in 1836. Their venture began disastrously when the stock dispersed after Franks' death.

Following the disappearance of the explorers Joseph Tice Gellibrand and George Hesse, several search parties were mounted in an attempt to find them. One was a group of five which included John Cowie, David Stead, Captain Joseph (or James, sources disagree) Stephen Pollock, of Pollock's station, Irrewarra (namesake of Pollocksford, Pollockdale, near Wickliffe, and Pollock's Plains, north of Lismore), William Roadknight (Point Roadknight) and Thomas Armytage.

During this search, Thomas Armytage settled on the land which became the Ingleby Run at the place where the party first found Gellibrands tracks, which led into country to the west which was too rocky to track any further.

The original house of bluestone built by Thomas Armytage still stands near the current Ingleby Homestead. It was extended in timber on the west facing side.

It was later replaced by Thomas' Father, George, who built the current Ingleby Homestead. The homestead, garden and farm can be booked for weddings, special occasions, events and location shoots.

Thomas was only sixteen years old when he came to the colony to start his pastoral run. He lost his life when he caught a cold by crossing the Barwon before there were any bridges. His father, George Armytage went on to become one of the key settlers in Winchelsea and one of the most prolific colonial Settlers in Victoria.





# RACV says Buckle Up, as seatbelt fines raise serious concerns

RACV is urging all Victorians to wear their seatbelts every time they are in a vehicle, following alarming new figures that show more than 8,500 drivers were caught not wearing a seatbelt in the first quarter of the 2024-25 financial year, totalling over \$3.3 million in fines.

Victorian Police data suggests that the state could be on track to record more seatbelt offenses than the 34,744 record in the last financial year.

Concerningly, 118 Victorians have lost their lives in 2025 (as at midnight 20 May 2025), up 8.3 per cent, and over the last five years, 130 lives have been lost in Victoria where the occupant was not wearing a seatbelt.

RACV Head of Policy James Williams said the figures were a stark reminder of the risks associated with ignoring seatbelt rules.

"Failing to wear a seatbelt is a simple, but deadly mistake," Mr Williams said.

"Seatbelts save lives. Choosing not to wear one puts you, your passengers, and other road users at risk."

In Victoria, the penalty for not wearing a seatbelt correctly is a \$395 fine and three demerit points.

"Crashes can happen anytime, anywhere – and the consequences of not being restrained can be fatal."

RACV is calling on all drivers and passengers to prioritise their safety every time they enter a vehicle by:

- Ensuring seatbelts are worn properly and by all occupants.
- Adjusting seatbelts to sit snugly across the chest and lap.
- Checking that children are using appropriate restraints for their age and size.

"Wearing a seatbelt is one of the simplest actions we can take to reduce road trauma. It takes just seconds to click in – and it could save your life," Mr Williams said.

# Emergency Volunteer Grants now open

Victorian State Government

Volunteers across Victoria will benefit from more money for trucks, equipment and modern facilities to help keep themselves and their communities safe with the Government's Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP) now open.

Minister for Emergency Services Vicki Ward announced that \$30 million is available –double last year's amount and the most ever available in one round.

Over the next four years, an additional \$62 million is being provided from the Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund to double the VESEP.

Every dollar raised by the Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund will support emergency and disaster recovery services.

VESEP is an annual grant program that helps emergency services volunteer groups purchase essential equipment or make facility improvements so they can strengthen and their emergency response.

Groups can apply for a grant of up to \$250,000 – a \$100,000 increase on the previous maximum – with the Government contributing \$2 for every \$1 raised by the local volunteer group.

Volunteer groups can purchase equipment including generators, pumps, utility vehicles, tankers and rescue trucks. They can also fund minor refurbishments or amenity upgrades to their station, club or unit.

Eligible services include the Country Fire Authority (CFA), Victoria State Emergency Service (VICSES), Life Saving Victoria, and Volunteer Marine Search and Rescue units.

Recent VESEP recipients include CFA Bullengarook, Forrest, Laharum and Toongabbie brigades, which all received more than \$140,000 each for new ultra-light tankers, and VICSES Warracknabeal, Goroke, Sunbury and Terang units, which received more than \$100,000 each to replace utility vehicles.

The 2025-26 VESEP applications are now open and close on 28 July 2025. For more information about VESEP and to find out how to apply for a grant visit emv.vic.gov.au/vesep.

### Feedback invited on draft policy aimed at reducing single-use items and packaging

### **Surf Coast Shire**

Council is inviting feedback on a draft policy seeking to further reduce single-use items and packaging in Surf Coast Shire.

The draft Single-Use Items and Packaging Policy aims to help protect the natural environment and reduce the amount of waste being sent to landfill. If adopted, it would replace Council's existing policy, the 2021 Plastic Wise Policy.

The draft policy has been broadened and would see the phasing out of many singleuse items across all Council facilities, Council events, and events on Council land, over the next five years. It has also been updated to align with current state government plastics bans.

If adopted it would apply to all formal use of Council facilities, such as:

- User groups, including sports clubs, who are tenants of Council facilities;
- Community members or businesses hiring Council facilities for parties, events, conferences or workshops:
- Facilities directly managed by Council; and
- Organisers hosting events and markets on Council land.

It would not apply to informal use of Council facilities such as visiting a library or local park.

The draft policy outlines three categories of items:

- Items already banned by the Victorian Government such as lightweight plastic bags:
- Single-use items to be phased out of Council facilities over five years - by

Exemptions would be available on several grounds, including health and safety, existing commercial agreements, and lack of suitable alternatives. Anglesea Landfill is nearing capacity, so it

is increasingly important to work together to reduce waste going to landfill.




