


MOONSHINE SALOON

Did you know that Bosnians celebrate Christmas twice? While Catholics have the usual, Western-style evergreen trees, feasting and presents on 25 December, Orthodox Christians celebrate on 7 January, with the festivities continuing into the new year. Head to Tuzla for a second Christmas filled with festive foods like sarma, pickled cabbage rolls filled with rice and mince; kuglof, a yeast cake with sultanas; and česnica, a Christmas bread with treats hidden inside. While you're there, look out for signs and symbols of the Orthodox Christmas - like the ceremonial badnjak oak branch, which is burnt on the fire on Christmas Eve (6 January) to bring luck for the coming year. 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



o how many of these mushrooms would you need to finish someone off?" I'm on stage, playing a TV host interviewing a supposed expert in poisonous mushrooms – with two heads. As they formulate an answer, the two heads face each other, and their mouths move slowly and in sync.

"At... least... a kilogram," says the expert at a glacial pace, nodding wisely. I'm not entirely sure that I trust their expertise. But they're hilarious, and that's entirely the point.

'The Two-Headed Expert' is a popular improv exercise, or game, in which two performers act as a single, multi-headed persona to answer audience questions. Reading each other's body language, they must collaborate closely to speak at the same time, which also prompts hilarity when they get it wrong. It's a great icebreaker for my two days of

improv comedy workshops in Prague – which, admittedly, I've been absolutely terrified by. As a complete beginner, I have no idea how to be funny on stage – so I'm here to learn from the best.

I'm not sure about mushrooms, but when it comes to comedy expertise, Prague is seemingly on top of the world. According to a 2025 study, the Czechs have the best sense of humour on the planet, trumping even famously wry Brits and Australians. British actor and comedian Michael Palin had already noticed. In 2019, he said that the

Czechs "have a feeling that everything is up for laughter... which some other countries just don't have".

Until now, I wouldn't necessarily have associated Prague with comedy. For me, it's always evoked a moody, Gothic splendour. But when I arrive at the BLR Theatre, just north of the Old Town's Letná Park, to observe an improv





rehearsal, there's a level of playfulness there that I never would have expected.

"Improv is joyful. It gives you licence to play," says BLR Theatre founder and "professional pretender" Jim High, who encourages me to drop my self-consciousness and forget my anxiety about not being funny enough. "People aren't scared away from playing football simply because Lionel Messi exists, are they?"

According to the research, what makes Czechs so amusing is their ability to rip themselves to shreds for laughs. They don't draw the line there, though. Apparently, they're also adept at aggressive humour, making others the butt of their (sometimes mean) jokes. Poland and Hungary were revealed to excel in this, too.

Maybe I'm just not the mean girl I once was, but jokes at someone else's expense leave me cold, as do off-colour topics. Perhaps that's why, later that evening at a stand-up routine event at Metro

Comedy Club – an English-speaking comedy club, and a legend on the local circuit – I'm bemused by the constant sex references and spiky comments directed at members of the audience.

Maybe that's my fault for attending a show called *Talk Dirty to Me*, because Metro hosts a range of shows, including friendly improv. Celebrating its third anniversary this year, the club has a cosy bar upstairs and a raw atmosphere in the basement, which features a cave-like, curved ceiling. The intimacy of the setting lends itself perfectly to the unfiltered nature of these improvised performances.

"Stand up tends to be quite combative," says Jeff Koch, founder of The Improv Academy in the Old Town, when I meet up with him for a second crash course the next day. I've spent a good hour beforehand wandering the neighbourhood's streets aimlessly, in a bid to calm my nerves by gazing at its decorative façades, flourishes



and archways – aided by the slow, grey drift of the Vltava river. But Jeff assures me that I have nothing to fear. "Improv has a very supportive atmosphere," he explains, "not only between the performers themselves, but also between audience and stage, with the former invited to provide cues for the latter."

He's right. Everyone in the group of 20-odd people, regardless of their level of experience, is incredibly friendly and welcoming. "I started improv because I wanted a non-solitary hobby," says Sam Ewen, who's from Coventry, UK, and now lives in Prague to teach English. "But it's been great for my confidence, too."

The games we play encourage us to lock into each other, riffing off physical and verbal cues. In one exercise, two people are given roles and a location, and the story unfolds from there (think, two rival scientists meet in a café). As Jeff teaches us, though, resolution is part of the process – so

part of our job is to learn how to bring the story to a natural conclusion. It's not a bad lesson for life in general.

It's a full house on the night of my debut performance and, nerves notwithstanding, I get up on stage and run with a daft story about pretending to hide salami on a lifelong vegetarian's pizza while actors from The Improv Academy play it out in a wonderfully goofy style. It helps that improv requires you to interact with those on stage, so it's easy to block out the audience – and my voice is far stronger than I expected it to be. Even so, I'm glad I had a drink beforehand.

The Czech people I've met have been hilarious, and by the end of the evening, I'm convinced that – with perhaps just a little more practice at the Two-Headed Expert routine – I could be, too. At the very least, I've conquered a fear, and that's certainly no joke.

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"It's a chance to see Abu Dhabi in a new light"

The second edition of the UAE capital's Manar Abu Dhabi light festival is expanding to Al Ain, with eight installations across the UNESCO World Heritage Site's oasis trails

s dusk falls over Al Qattara Oasis, the last daylight mingles with something electric. Between the palms, a canopy of light responds to a visitor's heartbeat with gentle pulses of white and amber that seem to breathe with the desert air. The installation, Pulse Canopy by Mexican-Canadian artist Rafael Lozano-Hemmer, reads the rhythm of a hand placed beneath a sensor and turns it into waves of light that shimmer through the night.

Here Rafael Lozano-Hemmer's light installation Translation Island

It is one of several works illuminating this UNESCO-listed landscape in Al Ain, as Manar Abu Dhabi returns to the UAE capital and, for the first time, shines on this ancient oasis city.

"This year's theme, 'The Light Compass', is rooted in the Gulf's deep traditions of navigation and wayfinding," explains Khai Hori, artistic director of Manar Abu Dhabi and deputy director of artistic programming at Paris's Palais de Tokyo. "The theme guided our approach to invite artists to engage with light as a medium for reimagining our connection to place."

Curated by Khai with co-curators Alia Zaal Lootah, Munira Al Sayegh and Mariam Alshehhi, this year's exhibition unfolds across both Abu Dhabi and Al Ain, forming what Khai calls "a kind of breathing constellation across the landscape". It brings together 15 Emirati and international artists, plus collectives from 10 countries.

For tourists, Manar Abu Dhabi offers a luminous new way to explore different parts of the emirate. At Al Qattara, Emirati designer Khalid Shafar exhibits Sadu Red Carpet, an installation of pixelated light and brick patterns reinterpreting the traditional local craft of sadu weaving, while at nearby Al Jimi Oasis, works by Maitha Hamdan and Ammar Al Attar respond to surrounding palms and desert silence through sound, photography and motion.

"Rather than mapping a fixed route, we invited artists to respond to each site," explains Alia. "The idea was for the works to emerge organically, shaped by dialogue with their surroundings."

Including AI Ain for the first time was a natural extension of that vision. The oases "reference ancient Aflaj Irrigation Systems and the emirate's water-land relationships, while our coastal sites





reflect the archipelagos, mangroves and maritime traditions," says Alia.

Back in the capital, the festival transforms the city skyline. At Souq Al Mina, visitors encounter *Holiday Abu Dhabi* by American artist KAWS, a monumental character reclining by the port, its glowing form reflected in the water. The artwork feels right at home beside the harbour, where ships that once navigated by the stars now share the skyline with an installation inspired by the moon.

Seeing Abu Dhabi anew

Across the water, Jubail Island serves as the festival's central venue, with 15 large-scale works and performances. Whispers by Dutch multidisciplinary studio DRIFT is a sea of tiny, responsive lights that flicker with the wind. Interactive installation As Water Falls by Montreal-based art studio Iregular blurs the lines between nature and digitisation, and as night deepens, DRIFT's drone performance Wind of Change rises in hundreds of synchronised lights dancing silently across the sky. Seen from the shoreline, the constellation feels at once futuristic and intimate.





a reminder that modern innovation can inspire the same awe we once reserved for the stars.

"Manar Abu Dhabi is a chance to experience Abu Dhabi in a new light, quite literally," says Khai. "Each site reveals a different rhythm of the place, inviting visitors to slow down, explore and connect with the environment in ways that go beyond the usual itinerary."

For Alia, the festival's legacy lies in what it inspires. "Over time, we hope Manar Abu Dhabi helps shape a generation that values connection between disciplines, people, art and environment. Its legacy lies in the artworks and the mindset it aims to nurture, one of curiosity, openness and creativity in the generations to come."

Whether walking through mangroves, wandering ancient oases or pausing along Abu Dhabi's waterfronts, visitors are invited to follow the glow – and in doing so, trace the same light that inspired the artists. As Khai reflects, curating in this landscape "begins with the land itself".

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"All the granny skills are coming back"

In Vienna, there's a handicraft revival underway. We speak to some crafty locals who are getting their needles out



op down to Vienna's Votiv Kino cinema on the second Sunday of any month and you'll hear a faint clicking noise as you walk into the dimly lit auditorium. Look around and you'll see that audience members are multi-tasking in their seats - knitting, sewing, crocheting or even needle felting as they watch the movie.

Cinema purists might recoil in horror, but for a growing group of young people in Vienna, these *Stricken im Kino* (Knitting in the Cinema) events are a hot ticket. Since the launch event in December 2024, they've "pretty much sold out" every single time, according to cinema worker Lisa Stolze.

"Many of my co-workers are avid knitters and love cinema, so the idea developed to combine both passions," she explains. "We anticipated that the concept would resonate with our audience. A lot of people started knitting and crocheting during the pandemic and, through necessity, only did it at home alone. That's why a lot of people now want to do it with others."



Knitting's back, baby

It's not just in Vienna that the trend for old-fashioned hobbies – dubbed 'grannycore' – is on the rise. From New York to Tokyo, young people have been resurrecting lost handicraft skills along with other formerly unfashionable pastimes, like gardening and birdwatching. As well as the creative outlet, these practical, mindful activities have been shown to offer mental health benefits for a generation of digital natives.

But in Vienna this cultural nostalgia has chimed with something particularly Austrian, according to local knitting blogger Norman Schwarze, AKA Nimble Needles. "The traditional clothes of Austria and Germany prominently feature hand-knit socks and, to a lesser degree, jackets. So knitting has always been a widespread hobby. For the longest time, boys and girls had to learn a whole range of crafts in school."

According to Norman, who makes his own patterns, there was a decline in interest in the last two decades. "This went hand-in-hand with the fact that few people would wear their traditional clothes anymore," he says. "Thirty years ago, a



man or someone in their twenties walking into a yarn shop would have been quite the novelty. But now, no one would care. Things have changed dramatically. Knitting has lost a lot of its 'old woman hobby' stigma."

Today, an estimated 1,000 young knitters attend an array of craft meet ups like Queer Craft or Stitch Sip Knit. There are regular craft fairs (e.g. Wollträum Wien), special shopping events where yarn shops are open at night and workshops

that offer opportunities to try everything from strudel-making at Vollpension
BakAdamy - a baking school run by actual grannies - to flower pressing, upcycling or making your own balaclavas.

Darn, that looks great

One grannycore skill that's making a comeback is darning, or 'invisible mending'.

Down at the RESI Slow Fashion pop-up shop, you can take your damaged clothes to be mended - and also learn to fix them yourself.

"The older generations had these kinds of skills. They would have done things like darning themselves," says Alina Saavedra Santis, cofounder of the shop. "Young people are definitely more interested in knowing how to do this for themselves now."

At workshops that run four times per month, she and co-founder Serafina Spatt help their clients – largely women in their 20s and 30s – to give their tattiest garments new life. They introduce people to a wide range of repair options, from darning to patching, as well as more intricate weaving and embroidery, so they can keep their garments in the "textile cycle" for longer. "It means that people can avoid replacing them with fast fashion," says

BEST FOR ECO ESCAPES...

BAVARIA, GERMANY

First up is Garmisch-Partenkirchen, a German mountain resort that's carving out a more sustainable future, and improving the visitor experience in the process





n the hand-moulded bowl, a plump, steamed dumpling sits on a delicately arranged array of burnished ingredients – a sphere of roasted pumpkin here, cubes of crystallised ginger there. A thick, golden soup is poured over so that just the tip of the crimped dough peeks out. As I begin to slurp, bursts of submerged flavour and texture catch me by surprise. Earthy pumpkin seeds crunch and tangy ginger pops, blended with the coconut-rich broth.

The warm dining room at Restaurant Wurzelwerk is spotlit by low-hanging lamps, with floor-to-ceiling windows looking over a babbling mountain brook outside. Zoom out further and the pastel-fronted houses and surrounding, snowcapped mountains reveal the Bavarian mountain town of Garmisch-Partenkirchen, with its hightech gondola zipping visitors 2,962m above sea level to Germany's highest peak, Zugspitze. But while this Alpine town is iconic among skiers and hikers in the know, it's lesser known on the European ski holiday circuit, despite its access to two ski areas whose downhill slopes have featured in Winter Olympics. German mountain resorts, however, are sneaking up on the bigger players in France, Austria and Switzerland - and savvy holidaymakers are starting to take note.

This refined take on a simple pumpkin soup, served at the excellent restaurant at boutique hotel Werdenfelserei, reflects the sea change happening here, an hour and a half's train ride south from Munich and practically on the border



with Austria. The chefs lean on their immediate surroundings to create a seasonal and sustainable menu: the cheese is from a dairy farm in nearby Ettal, river fish comes from the Isar Valley and some ingredients are grown in the employees' own gardens. "Everything is local unless the menu explicitly says otherwise," says my server.

Going for green

a post-pandemic interest in outdoor experiences – as well as the country's wider, green-minded policies – Germany's mountain resort industry is predicted to be worth €1.5 billion by 2035 – up from €832 million this year. The data shows that nowadays, tourists are looking for healthy, sustainable holidays, and German mountain towns like Garmisch-Partenkirchen are rising to the challenge with all-seasons tourism and future-

proofing tech, like green energy and carbon-neutral operations.

It's a small piece of a countrywide puzzle. Renewables already account for 59% of electricity production in Germany, and the government has committed to reaching climate neutrality by 2045. Just a few hours from Garmisch-Partenkirchen, across the Bavarian state border in Baden-Württemberg, the city of Heilbronn has been named 2027 European Green Capital thanks to its efforts to improve air quality and adopt a circular economy, among other eco credentials. And while Baden-Württemberg is generally considered more progressive than its traditional, conservative neighbour Bavaria, the march towards a carbon-

neutral future is showing itself to be paramount across both southern German states.

Walking on ice

In the clouds above Garmisch-Partenkirchen is a very visible reminder of the importance of these policies, and the new-

age tech that supports them. Two of Germany's last-remaining – and rapidly melting – glaciers are at the top of the Zugspitze mountain. In the summer season, guests can take a round-trip to the peak via cable cars and a cute, cogwheel train for a free, 'farewell' guided tour of the glaciers. Come winter, they make the same trip to gently ski on the glacial slopes of the Zugspitze, with a breathtaking, bird's-eye view of Austria's surrounding snow-capped peaks and the glowingly turquoise Lake Eibsee below.

Behind the scenes, great care is taken to safeguard the environment here, from snow groomers equipped with GPS data-based snow depth measurement technology, to the use of biofuel and a reduction of snowmaking systems. The railway company that has been operating the cable cars and lifts here for almost 100 years

has gone against the grain by committing to no further expansion, instead deciding to improve and safeguard what they already have.

For visitors, this means well-groomed, real snow and a 360 approach to their mountain break - which gives food, wellness and off-the-slopes activities equal prominence to skiing. The glacier-side, classic Alpine restaurant Gletscher 2600 now has a completely vegetarian menu; livestock graze on the ski areas before the snow falls; and activities like sledding, ice skating and snowshoeing are encouraged to take the pressure off the slopes.

Food for thought

Back in Garmisch-Partenkirchen's town centre, the restaurant 4Eck is a

great example of the town's increasingly holistic approach to a wellness-based ski trip. Homemade preserves in jars line the shelves behind the open kitchen, where head chef Yannick Fehren delicately places edible flower garnishes on amuse-bouche arancini with a pair of tweezers. The multi-course menu gives rich, mountain ingredients a light and modern treatment. Local sheep's cheese is stuffed into cannelloni, and lamb raised in the nearby hills is given a wasabihot twist.

"As I work in the evenings, I spend my days hunting down new, local suppliers and

ingredients," says co-owner Kerstin Schumann Ishizuka, who's a central figure in the town's foodie community. "For example, we served an experimental,

limited-edition bread made with used hops supplied by the town's microbrewery and made in our local bakery."

It's similar to the kitchen's approach at the Werdenfelserei hotel, which is a microcosm of the green-minded transition developing in Garmisch-Partenkirchen. Bavaria's first solid-wood hotel gives modern sensibilities to Alpine traditions in a beautiful way. The lobby's leather armchairs, sheepskin throws and cable-knit rugs create a Scandi-chic version of a mountain lodge that continues in its exquisite spa rooms, with their woodburning stoves, freestanding baths and private saunas overlooking the leafy Michael Ende Park next door. The fact that solar panels, biogas and hydropower are warming the underfloor heating might not be at the forefront of guests'


minds as they pad around the extensive rooftop spa, sweat it out in the sauna or participate in a free yoga class. They won't dwell on the fact that the Team Dr Joseph bath soaps are zero-waste and vegan, and come with a small organic cotton bag to take them home. But research shows they cared when they made the choice to book their room, and these touches increasingly matter.

From the hotel's heated rooftop pool, with distant clanging cowbells accompanying views of church steeples and the jagged, white-topped peaks beyond, there's no question that full immersion in all these mountains have to offer – from their rich produce, to the raw elements that contain so much power to be harnessed – is the only way to truly be here. gapa-tourismus.de

BEST FOR OFF-PISTE...

CRETE, GREECE

There are no ski lifts, lodges or trail maps on the 2,500m-high peak of Mount Ida which guarantees adventure. savs Greek specialist Heidi Fuller-Love. Here's why

1. YOU CAN GET SERIOUSLY OFF THE BEATEN TRACK

Better known for its dazzling beaches, Crete is a summer haven for tourists. But away from the coast, the island's rarely visited mountains – covered in pristine snow from December to March – offer a winter playground for off-piste adventurers, with no crowds.

2. YOU'LL BE PART OF AN EXCLUSIVE CLUB

Only a few thousand intrepid adventurers ski Crete's slopes each year, which is similar to the daily footfall in the most popular resorts in the French Alps. High in the mountains you'll be exploring a region that few people get to see – let alone ski.

3. YOU CAN SKI IN THE MORNING AND SWIM IN THE AFTERNOON

With an average of 15 to 20 sunshine days per month, Crete's glittering blue waters stay warm well into the winter months. After a day on the slopes, a quick dip in Balos Beach's turquoise waters is an unbeatable way to unwind.

4. IT CAN BE AS CHALLENGING AS YOU LIKE

Although you'll need to clamp on lightweight skis and be prepared to cross-country ski – or climb – for several hours to reach Crete's best trails, a scattering of baby slopes, along with lashings of soft powdery snow, mean that there's also plenty of fun to be had by beginners.

5. YOU CAN STAY IN A MOUNTAIN REFUGE

Deilina, a cosy mountain resort complete with a spa and restaurant serving local treats, is the perfect place to recuperate after a day's skiing – unless you fancy sleeping at 2,000m altitude, at rustic mountain refuge Kallergi.







6. THE SNOW IS PRISTINE

Apart from birds and the occasional wild goat, you won't see many tracks high on the peaks of Mount Psiloritis or Lefka Ori, south of Chania – where the snow gets as deep as five metres.

7. CRETE'S WINTER FESTIVALS ARE ICONIC

Cretans save their best festivals for the winter months. In December they come together to drink local raki brewed in copper stills, or to celebrate the feast of St Nicholas – the patron saint of sailors – with maritime-themed festivities and decorated boats called *karavakia*.

8. THE FOOD WARMS YOU UP

Away from the slopes, authentic tavernas like Gryli or Aradamos serve garlic-infused xochloi snails; vlita wild greens and other sumptuous après-ski meze snacks to the wild strains of Cretan music, while a *somba* (stove) heats the chilly night air.

9. YOU'LL BE AMONG ATHLETES

Ski mountaineering was unheard of in Crete until 2014 when a group of local mountain climbers launched the Pierra Creta, a biannual ski mountaineering race on Mount Ida. Since then, ski athletes have flocked from around the globe to take part. The next edition is in 2026 and not for the faint of heart.

10. THERE ARE HARDLY ANY TOURISTS

Major attractions like Samaria Gorge might be closed in winter, but there are still plenty of things to see and do in off-season Crete. Sitting in a cosy café by Chania's Venetian harbour, chatting with monks in Arkadi Monastery or strolling through Rethymno's cobbled streets are some alternative ways to explore a more authentic side of Crete.

GAUSTA, NORWAY

Our intrepid reporter Andrew Dickens lists the reasons why this resort near Oslo blends luxury, fun and comfort for a rare sense of calm when holidaying with kids

1. IT'S SAFE TO EXPLORE

In Norway, it's normal (and safe) for kids to roam freely on the slopes without adult supervision. The 45km snow-sure ski area is big enough to keep avid skiers happy, but is contained and full of watchful eyes, so young folk won't get lost.

2. THERE'S A VILLAGE FEEL

It takes a village to raise child, and Gausta feels like one, with a community centred around the Gaustablikk Fjellresort hotel. Guests and staff quickly become acquaintances, even friends – especially the kids, who have plenty of ways to meet and bond.

3. IT HAS TOP SKI TEACHERS

Are your children learning to ski for the first time? Expert instructors provide ski schools and private lessons for all ages and abilities, at pleasingly sub-Alpine prices.

4. THERE'S KID-FOCUSED FUN

Younger children might never want to leave Gausta. There's a children's area, a playroom, two energetic mascots (Huski and Flaks) and activities all day long – including a kids' après-ski featuring a 1.8m bird grilling marshmallows on a BBQ.

5. IT'S ALSO TEEN-FRIENDLY

Mascots and marshmallows might not cut it for grumpy teenagers. Luckily, there's swimming,

7. THERE'S FINE AND FUN DINING

It's an unproven fact that you can't gain weight on a ski holiday. Good job, because the food in Gausta is fabulous, varied and plentiful. You can even hire a piste-side BBQ if you want to cook your own sausages al fresco.

8. THERE ARE SLOPES FOR EVERYONE

The ski runs in Gausta cater to all tastes, from off-piste and black runs to nursery slopes. The joy, for a family group, is their proximity to each other, so skiers of different abilities can spend the day together without getting bored (or scared).

9. THERE'S PLENTY TO DO OFF YOUR SKIS

Travel horizontally for a change with cross-country skiing, snowshoeing or a dog sled ride – or invigorate yourself Scandi-style by jumping in a frozen lake from a floating sauna.

10. IT'S GREAT VALUE FOR MONEY

Kids under eight ski for free, the food is no more expensive than in the French Alps, the hotel packages are great value – and cocktails are surprisingly affordable.



- * In an age of visitor fees in Venice and overtourism protests in Barcelona, it's refreshing how delighted Chişinău's residents are to see you. A little puzzled too, perhaps, but that's only because Moldova is often cited as the least-visited nation in Europe. Go soon, before everyone else does.

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



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
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he sound of wheels on concrete and marble carries on a light wind, which sculpts rippled patterns on the surface of the sunsparkled Garonne River. Down by the water, where pedestrians stroll in the early winter light, curved concrete sculptures are swarmed by groups of skateboarders, hungry to test out the new features erupting from the ground. In a city better known for its centuryspanning architecture and vineyards, a grassroots movement has been growing here in Bordeaux - one that just a few years ago would have been difficult to imagine.

Bordeaux's quayside, named Port de la Lune, is the largest urban area in the world to be listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Covering about 40% of the city, its twists, turns and alleyways, right angles and corners, are irresistible to skateboarders. But until recently, anyone who gave into the temptation to skate here would have been met with aggressive security and police fines – symptoms of a wider view of skateboarding on these historic streets as a transgressive act.

Skateboarding in Bordeaux, as with most places near surf communities, lurched from the waves in the late 1960s and has clung to the city's fabric ever since. In 1995, a massive redevelopment of the city centre saw the docks turned into a smooth promenade, with streets pedestrianised, cobblestones replaced







with marble and the industrial docklands rebuilt as public space. This improved the streets for walkers, and tempted skateboarders there. The rise of street skating here that followed went hand-inhand with a growing hostility from those who saw it as a nuisance. The authorities, under pressure from disgruntled residents, reacted by banning it across most of the city.

Meanwhile, a generation of would-be skateboarders were growing up in a decidedly anti-skating environment. In 2016, a small group of them formed a collective, and began a dialogue with the council. Wednesdays and Saturdays became approved 'skate days' in iconic city centre spots, to great success. An exhibition, *Landskating Anywhere*, took place at the CAPC Musée d'art Contemporain in 2017 – exploring the relationship between skateboarding





and Bordeaux architecture, in a much more public way. After a lot of collective pressure, and as wider public perceptions softened, the skateboard ban was lifted completely in 2023.

Just one year later, the same collective invited skateboarders from across the globe to attend the Connect Skaturbanism festival, which had its second edition in October 2025. Its goal? To show that skateboarding can play a positive role within urban environments, as demonstrated by those new, riverside skate sculptures – which were installed as part of the

"The first Connect in 2024 came out of seven years of work with the city of Bordeaux, as well as with architects, skate organisations, brands and different crews around the world," says Léo Valls, a professional skateboarder, founding member of the collective and one of the driving forces behind the event. "It made sense to create an event around this as an open door to talk about skate culture, and to work on preserving what makes skateboarding special."

Connect has grown massively since its first year, encompassing talks, video premieres and guided walks of the locations where the new skatefriendly sculptures have been installed. The festival is a microcosm of the types of challenges and solutions that skateboarding initiatives address around the world, NGO Make Life Skate Life shows a video on their skatepark builds in Iraq, filmmaker April Jones discusses the challenge of working with government when it comes to protecting illegal but essential DIY skateparks, and there is discussion around how the skate-hostile infrastructure of Tokyo could be more accessible for skateboarders, perhaps by taking a leaf out of Bordeaux's book.

"Tokyo is one of the most difficult places to skate in the world," says Léo. "You have to skate at night, dodge security and police. Though things were never as heavy here, skateboarding was illegal for years. The fact that we got to transform a situation of conflict into something beneficial to not only skaters, but to the city itself, is motivating in terms of how we can help other places."

Of course, not every part of Bordeaux is a skate utopia. While the city is now a friendlier place for skateboarders, attempts to skate on privately owned land - like a tantalising swoop of concrete outside an office building - are immediately stamped out by security, even on the weekend. But the city is





unique in how quickly it went from being a skateboard no-go area to a four-wheeled hotspot. While Paris, Lyon and Marseille have long been part of the skater's world map, in Bordeaux there's something of a blueprint for other cities where skateboarding is frowned upon.

A sign of how far the city has come is its ongoing collaboration with the city of Malmö in Sweden – a forerunner in allowing skateboarding on its streets – by taking part in a skatable 'sculpture swap'. Other city scenes are taking note.

"In Nottingham, we have worked with several of the county's local authorities but have yet to have real engagement, despite us frequently celebrating our city and bringing in so much funding ourselves to host city-wide events for residents and visitors to enjoy," says Tom Quigley of the Skate Nottingham collective. "Bordeaux has clearly recognised skateboarding is an asset and, much like Malmö, are embracing pride of place and 'skate tourism' as something that should be celebrated."



OUR WRITER'S TOP THREE BORDEAUX SKATE SCENE SPOTS

FOR SKATING

The Skatepark des Chartrons was rebuilt in 2022 and mostly imitates the ledges, banks and rails found in the streets. A nod to Bordeaux's winemaking heritage appears in the form of replica barrels carefully placed throughout the park.

FOR SHOPPING

Opposite the Skatepark des Chartrons, the cavernous Riot
Skateshop has been a hub of Bordeaux's skate scene since 2004, offering a wide array of clothing, magazines, videos and other items of cultural ephemera.

FOR THE VIBES

Designed by landscape artist Michel Corajoud, Miroir d'Eau is a lovely public fountain flanked by smooth, flat ground and various obstacles perfect for either warming up your legs or winding down after a long day's skating.

Bordeaux's acceptance of skating reflects a wider global movement of organisations that use skateboarding as a vehicle for positive change. NGOs like Skateistan and Free Movement in Athens teach skateboarding to at-risk youth worldwide and children in refugee camps, while Black and queer-led skate collectives like Melanin Skate Gals & Pals take to the streets of London and beyond. "We have changed the world through skateboarding," says Dr. Indigo Willing, co-author of Skateboarding, Power and Change. "By seeing these [skate programmes] in busy city centres, next to shops, toilets, transport and public services, we can already anticipate how much safer that makes skating for everybody."

It's also a tool that can be applied to all people and places. "It is not yet that diverse, but it's interesting to see how many sectors and fields are connected to skateboarding," says Marie-Ermelinda Mayassi, who runs Melanin Skate Gals & Pals. She is currently organising a year-long trip across seven African countries to investigate Black womenled skateboarding collectives. "We can do things differently. We can expand the conversation about the spaces we have."

At the Miroir d'Eau, the iconic reflecting pool by Bordeaux's quay, a skate session is in full swing and a crowd of onlookers has formed. The sun is setting behind the streets of the Port de la Lune, and a live jazz band contributes a fluid, funky soundtrack to the activity taking place.

As attempted tricks meet with various levels of success, passers by are intrigued, delighted, bemused – but rarely annoyed. As the Bordeaux authorities have realised, skateboarding quickly becomes integral to the urban milieu when it is allowed to. It can offer a way to reclaim city streets around the world into spaces we can explore, enjoy and make our own.





Comfort food

In a new cookbook, Tuscany-based cook Amber Guinness celebrates Italian food in the off-season – when the crowds have thinned, the air has cooled and a deepe connection can be found. Here, in an extract from *Winter in Tuscany*, she explains her approach to the region's cuisine



Ithough people associate Tuscany with balmy summer days and the incessant

cacophony of cicadas, it is the colder months that are my favourite here. As the temperatures begin to drop in October, there is a sense of respite after the long languid months of searing heat, and a general feeling of reclamation in one of Italy's most visited regions.

Autumn is also a time of hard work for the region, as the bounty of these fertile lands is harvested and turned into celebrated produce famous the world over - full-bodied, ruby-red wines; the new season's thick acid-green olive oil; plump, tasty porcini mushrooms, and musky seductive white truffles. The

festive season soon comes and goes and we pass into the quiet cold months of the new year. There is a calm which makes this the most wonderful time to explore Tuscany's cities and little towns, all so full of treasures.

I have always loved winter. These are the months when Tuscanv's bestknown dishes come into their own: ribollita; deep black beef peposo; pici al ragu - all perfect antidotes to the icy winds outdoors. They lift the spirits on dark nights when it's most needed. This is when I most enjoy being holed up in the kitchen or in the hustle and bustle of a cosy trattoria, hiding from the biting chill in the air or rain. It is also my favourite time for eating, the colder months calling for steaming bowls of warming soups, meaty pastas, buttery polenta and deeply flavoured slowcooked meats.

Here in Tuscany, the concept of making something tasty from very little is a culinary art that was born from necessity in this historically very poor area – though nowadays, this making do with what is to hand has come to define Tuscany's cuisine.

For every traditional 'Tuscan' dish, there is no one definitive version or recipe, despite what some may claim. Within the same area you can often go from house to house and find slightly different cooking methods, textures, herbs or seasonings used to make ostensibly the same thing.

It's an attitude that can be summed up in the saying *A occhio e quanto basta*, meaning that you make something by eye, and with as much as you need.

This approach gives you the rugged,

decisive flavours of Tuscan cuisine, without worrying too much about following 'the rules' – as no Tuscan ever did."







'Discreet' is the best way to describe Mama Shelter's eastern Parisian - and original - outpost. You might find yourself walking past the front door a few times before realising where it is, while the colour scheme is distinctly black, black and more black - not just chic, but ideal for keeping out early morning light (and so conducive to a peaceful lie-in). Its fashionable status is ideal for the location just south of the village-like, youthful neighbourhood of Belleville and almost touching the outer walls of Père-Lachaise - the final

resting place of Oscar Wilde, Édith Piaf and Frédéric Chopin, and a must-visit in the area.

The rooms are sleek, well-looked-after and with touches of character, like the superhero and sci-fi masks draped over lampshades. Outside, boulangeries, bars and bistros line the Rue de la Bagnolet on Mama's doorstep, and are absolutely buzzing even on a week night. According to the cutesy bars of soap in the bathroom, Mama Shelter 'wants to look after you'. Does she live up to her promise? The answer has to be: 'oui'.

Why smoking is banned on flights

Airlines started banning smoking in the late 1980s and by 2000 it was made illegal across the world. Here are the reasons why

Secondhand smoke: It contains over 7,000 chemicals, including at least 70 known carcinogens. Breathing them in the confined space of an aircraft poses serious health risks.

It impacts air quality: Cigarette smoke jeopardises how the cabin pressure system functions, which can result in a lack of oxygen at high altitude.

It's a fire hazard: A lit cigarette can ignite flammable materials, potentially leading to a fire.

Electronic cigarettes/vapes/IQOS are also not allowed:

While e-cigarettes produce vapour rather than smoke, they use lithium-ion batteries that can overheat or explode while being used.

Dry air conditions: The dry air in the aircraft cabin can make fuel more flammable.

Smoke detectors: The smoke detector in the toilets is linked to a warning system, which triggers an audible alarm.

SMOKING ON A PLANE COULD LEAD TO:

- Fines of up to €3,000
- A ban from flying with that airline for life
- As per the applicable law, smokers on board may face prosecution

Remember, lighting up during a flight is not only illegal but also jeopardises the wellbeing and safety of everyone on board. The ashtrays in the passenger cabin and restrooms are not an optional design element and not an invitation to smoke. Cabin crew members are trained to extinguish smoke and fire and eliminate any potential danger.

Why you can't drink your own alcohol on an airplane

And why it's a bad idea anyway

Flying can be stressful, and a drink or two might seem like the perfect way to relax. But before you crack open that mini bottle of whisky you picked up at duty-free, remember that consuming your own alcohol on a commercial flight is prohibited by law. This rule applies regardless of where the alcohol was purchased. Cabin crew are trained to monitor alcohol consumption and are responsible for ensuring that no passenger becomes intoxicated or disruptive during the flight.

ALCOHOL AFFECTS YOU DIFFERENTLY IN THE AIR

The cabin pressure in commercial aircraft is equivalent to being at about 6,000 to 8,000 feet above sea level. This means:

- You may feel drunk faster
- Your judgment and coordination may be impaired more than usual
- You may experience dehydration and fatigue more quickly

Combined with the stress of travel, jet lag and limited mobility, alcohol can increase the risk of medical emergencies, conflict with other passengers or non-compliance with the crew.

PREVENTING DISRUPTIVE BEHAVIOUR

Airlines have seen a rise in air rage incidents,

many of which are linked to alcohol. By restricting alcohol service to flight attendants, airlines can:

- Limit overconsumption
- Refuse service to visibly intoxicated passengers
- De-escalate situations before they become dangerous

THE BOTTOM LINE

While it might be tempting, drinking your own alcohol on board is illegal, unsafe and inconsiderate. If you'd like a drink, let the cabin crew serve you – they're trained to do so responsibly. And if you're feeling anxious or stressed, consider deep breathing, listening to music or watching a movie to relax.

Your onboard safety

Please show consideration for your fellow passengers and pay attention to the following information. Remember that by purchasing your Wizz Air ticket, you have accepted the Wizz Air General Conditions of Carriage (available in full at wizzair.com)



Lithium batteries

Portable electronic devices (PED) such as phones, laptops and tablets can contain lithium batteries. When damaged, faulty or overheated, these batteries can catch fire and explode.

If you recognise any issues with your device, inform the cabin crew immediately. Charging electronic devices on board using a portable battery charger is forbidden. Please refrain from storing your electronics and power banks in the overhead compartments.



Safe handling of hand luggage

Ensure that your larger hand luggage remains safely stowed in the locker and the smaller ones are under the seat in front of you for take-off, landing and whenever instructed by the crew. Passengers seated in the emergency rows and first row must store their cabin bags in the overhead lockers. Take care when opening lockers, as falling items may injure fellow passengers.

In case of evacuation, all baggage must be left on board, and the instructions of the cabin crew must be strictly followed.



Safety equipment

It is an offence to tamper with or remove safety equipment, including adult and infant life vests, infant safety belts or extension belts. You are not allowed to remove or damage any onboard informative placards.



Sharp items

To dispose of sharp items (e.g. hypodermic needles), contact a cabin crew member. Do not leave it behind.




Turbulence management

Turbulence can occur unexpectedly. Whenever seatbelt signs are switched on, remain seated, keep seatbelts fastened and stow away large electronic devices. For your safety, we recommend that you keep your seatbelts visibly fastened at all times when seated.



Safety of infants on board

Wizz Air has a clear procedure for infant (a child under two) restraint systems. You can only use the single hook infant seatbelt – vests/slings cannot be used with the infant seatbelt. Wizz Air only accepts aft-facing car seats when an extra seat is purchased. However, during take-off, landing and



whenever the seatbelt sign is switched on, infants



Electronic devices

Some electronic devices can be used during the flight with WLAN/Wi-Fi/Bluetooth turned off.

Larger electronic devices that cannot be held in one hand, exceed ca. 1kg in weight and do not qualify as handheld devices (e.g. laptops, notebooks etc.) must be stowed in the overhead stowage compartments for takeoff, landing and whenever required by the cabin crew. If in doubt, please ask your cabin crew.

Inflight health tips

Read these tips on how to stay fit when travelling.



Before your air travel

Consult your doctor before travelling if you have any medical concerns. Pregnant women and those with heart or respiratory problems, blood diseases or ear, nose and sinus infections should seek medical advice before flying. Crew members are entitled to call for medical assistance pre-flight if they deem it necessary and are in doubt about your fitness for the flight.



Medical supplies on board

Keep any medication you may need in your hand luggage and in its original packaging. Inform cabin crew of allergies or illnesses. If you are seriously ill or travelling post-surgery, you will need a medical certificate confirming that you are fit to fly. If you have limited mobility, are hearing- or sight-impaired, pregnant, or unable to understand/react to safety instructions, you will be unable to sit in the emergency exit rows or the front row. If you start to feel unwell during the flight, do not hesitate to talk to the cabin crew.



Nut allergy

During our WIZZ Café service we offer peanuts and some snacks containing peanuts/nuts traces. If you have any allergies we strongly encourage you to take all necessary medical precautions before flying, and to inform the cabin crew during boarding about your allergy.













Your security

...is one of our top priorities. In order to ensure a smooth and pleasant flight, please read the following rules of conduct

We encourage you to...

- Follow crew instructions, which will keep you safe
- Be respectful towards everyone on board
- Use suitable language, and stay calm and cooperative

...so you can:

- Travel in a pleasant and peaceful atmosphere
- Relax on board
- Get to your destination as soon as possible

Not tolerated on board...

 Smoking on board (including classic cigarettes or e-cigarettes, pipes, vapes), might result in a fine of up to €3,000 or prosecution.
 Additionally all existing Wizz Air flight bookings will be cancelled



- Consuming alcohol that was not purchased on board. Alcohol is served at the crew's discretion to passengers of legal drinking age. The crew reserves the right to stop serving alcohol to any passenger who is, or appears to be, intoxicated
- Being under the influence of drugs or substances that may affect your behaviour or self-control



- Damaging the aircraft or onboard equipment
- Wasting, polluting or contaminating the cabin
- Endangering the safety of the flight by any means
- Breaching, or refusing to follow, crew instructions



- Harassing fellow passengers and/or crew members in any way (including sexual harassment)
- Threatening or being aggressive towards fellow passengers and/or crew members
- Being violent or behave in a hostile, erratic manner
- Filming or photographing the cabin crew without their permission

...or face the consequences:

You are fully responsible for your behaviour. Disruptive behaviour on board and before boarding will not be tolerated and will be reported to the authorities. You will be held legally and financially responsible in all cases.

The following consequences* will occur for such misconduct:

- Denied boarding
