FROM THE PRESIDENT 2024 SEASON

(164th Season)

2024 must go on record as one of our wettest starts to the season. Contrast this with our game and invitation to be back playing at Windsor Boys' School on 24th April only to find a hard track used effectively by the Boy's School to keep the Incogs batsmen on our toes.

We then had a couple of cancelled games in early May due to the weather and our season re-started at the end of May. We had a very good win against Oratory School which is the first time since I can remember we have beaten this school. This being down to a five-wicket haul by young Finn Wilshere for which there is sadly no match report only a photo to record how he achieved this feat. As a Club we need to ensure Peter Wiseman who is our Keeper of the Scores and Averages receives not only an accurate scorecard complete with all names and details but an accurate score card submitted in good time following completion of the fixture. The importance of this is being relayed by Tim Sims to all Match Managers for the 2025 season.

The Mid-West Tour was well run again by Jon Andrews who has since become both married and a father and I would like to wish both Jon and Maevis his wife a wonderful future together with their new baby.

The Western Tour I ran was well attended with good young cricketers. We had success on and off the field and thanks to Harry Gadsby we had our first Incogniti Grand Prix at the Go Karting circuit just outside Exeter on the morning before a game to settle our playing nerves! Alec Clarke was the inaugural winner. You can only guess who was last being the conservative driver! Specials thanks are also required to Tom Gadsby as we have secured a fixture versus Sidmouth CC at their beautiful ground by the sea as part of the 2025 Western Tour.

I would like to thank all members on the Incogniti Committee for their hard work in making the 2024 season so enjoyable, in particular, Tim Sims who continues to do an excellent job as Honorary Secretary keeping the Club's administration in line with current standards, Ben Wakeford for organising the fixtures, Peter Wiseman for once again putting together this wonderful booklet which will be on line on the Club's website and to Nav Saeed for his efforts in raising sides outside the two domestic tours and then running an overseas tour to Romania.

One note of caution is the need for the Club to continue to be vigilant to its financial position and for all match managers to ensure they provide an accurate record of receipts back to the Club's finance officer. We have tried to reduce costs by placing all previously printed documentation online and have looked hard at the cost of playing some of the marquee games at rented grounds. Sadly, the cost of ground hire and teas now makes some grounds unaffordable and we find ourselves being priced out of the market as a wandering cricket club.

Looking forward to a new season in 2025 catching up with old friends and making new ones.

Honorary Secretary's Report 2024

The world of cricket is undergoing significant changes. Bazball, limited over league cricket, 20/20 games are now being played instead of all-day games between schools, Development leagues now being played on Sundays which is leading partly to the demise of Sunday cricket at club level, and the welcome rise of more and more womens' participation in the game. All of this has provided some challenges for our Club, as there seem to be fewer opportunities to spread the game that Incogniti was founded on - namely the long form of declaration cricket which, if managed well, would lead to an enjoyable and exciting result - win, lose or draw.

Our Club has to evolve with all these changes, and it is pleasing to see how we are going about this. We do encourage our opposition to play declaration cricket - it is always amusing to be to see and hear the bemusement of the younger generation who have never played this form of the game - but where this is not possible, we are engaging in an increasing number of limited overs games. We are endeavouring, and have been successful in, recruiting a good number of younger players and this has been significantly helped by all the Oliver Battcock Fund donations that members have so generously provided. This is critical due to the diminishing number of more mature players from our playing membership, which has not recovered from the pause in cricket caused by COVID. We have also introduced a new range of modern playing and training kit which has gone down well with our younger members.

We are planning on keeping our fixture list to about 25 games a year. We are trying to structure these games to include our two successful and well-supported UK tours and an overseas tour, ensuring our regular fixtures are predominantly London-centric to meet the location of our playing demographic and to reduce travel time and costs, and avoiding fixtures that might fall during the Development League season in July and August. We are also ensuring that the mix of our fixtures fit our club's financial model. This means unfortunately that we are no longer able to maintain the range of fixtures that we used to have against other wandering clubs where we had to pay or share ground hire costs for example. Cricket is really becoming an expensive sport with the rise in cost of ground hire, catering and cricket balls.

As with many clubs, we have also now made the decision to publish all our publications on our Club website. This is to fit with our approach on sustainability as well as avoiding large increases in printing, material and postage costs. I am pleased to say that we will still send out hard copies of our fixture card and a quick review of the previous season's results. Please let me know if your address has changed as the Club can't afford to waste postage to incorrect addresses.

Overall the 2024 season went well. We played twenty-three games with four games being rained off, we had two really enjoyable and successful UK tours to Wiltshire and Devon, and Nav Saeed successfully led a tour party to Romania. It was great to see notable performances from our OBF-funded players - Bevan West scored 101 against John Lyon School and Finn Wilshire took 5 for 58 to help Incogs win their first game against a strong Oratory School side. Nav Malik and Imran Khan, representing the more mature end of our playing membership, scored 125 against Datchet and 109 n.o. against a Romanian XI respectively. We had many good days out, but probably the most notable were games at the wonderful Hurlingham Club, beating Oratory School, defeating Cross Arrows, managing to pluck defeat from the jaws of victory against Free Foresters at a most hospitable Datchet CC, and a wonderful day out at Burbage who fielded a team predominantly made up of youngsters from local public schools who we converted to declaration cricket!!

As ever, I would like to recognise our Committee Members for all the work they put into the running of the Club, all our Match and Tour Managers for organising teams and thank all our umpires and scorers for making themselves available to officiate at our games.

An abridged history of the Incogniti Cricket Club

On the 15th February 1912 some 300 cricketers gathered at the Hotel Russell, London for a celebratory dinner. This was the jubilee of the Incogniti Cricket Club and the date of the first Committee meeting 50 years previously. But there was another cause for celebration: the Ashes had been regained in Australia two days previously. On that day in 1912 the oh-so-famous Urn was the personal possession of a member of the club (they were bequeathed to the MCC after his death in 1927) and the Ashes, a concept born of a mock obituary of English cricket, had been won for England on two occasions by a major contribution from two members of the club. In its 150 year history there have been four Incogs who have captained England and eight or more Test players.

In Incogniti's first season, the year 1861, eight matches were played on a variety of grounds, starting at Lord's on 25th May v the X.Y.Z. It could have been the beginning and the end of the X.Y.Z. – they never reappeared in the amazingly complete and continuous record of the Incogniti – but Incogniti was to prosper and flourish. Tufnell Park was chosen as the home ground at that first Committee meeting, but after a week's tour to the Midlands in 1863 Incogniti became truly wandering, abandoning Tufnell Park the following year.



How truly great and wandering the club was to become is epitomised by the fact that both captains in the first Test series between England and New Zealand, played in New Zealand in 1930, were Incogs who had played together on the Incogniti Tour to America in 1924. And New Zealand had been put on the international cricket map by an Incog who had toured there, captaining a Fijian team prior to that Jubilee dinner. Two stalwart Incogs had played in opposing sides in an earlier Test series: 1905/6 England v South Africa.

An Incog forced the making of a new Law — the declaration. An Incog forced a change to the follow on Law. Two Incogs were heavily involved in the upgrading of the lbw Law. An Incog was largely responsible for acquisition of the southern end of the Nursery Ground at Lord's, when the whole of the ground was under threat from the building of a railway line. An Incog invented that deceitful ball, the googly. Incogniti has made its presence felt all round the world and over Europe with tours to Australia, South Africa, America, Canada, Goa, Singapore, Denmark, Holland, Malta, Cyprus and Gibraltar, and within the British Isles to Eire, Northern Ireland, Scotland, Wales, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Wight. There have been Incogniti matches in nearly every county of England and even in Kenya.

The magic facts about the club, the sources of pride, have been that it is the third oldest wandering club and that it played its first game at Lord's. The first fact is false, as carved in wood on a plaque commemorating the International Millennium Cricket Festival for Wandering Clubs, Oxford 2000, but definitely debatable: this placed Incogniti as the fifth. The second fact is of little consequence since Lord's was in an appalling state at the time: anyone could play there for one shilling, inclusive of stumps, bat and ball. Maybe it is harder to remember all of the above facts but they are surely far more worth boasting about! Back in the early years of the club, the initials LC.C. were used. Obviously they are not used today, in deference to a far more powerful organisation, but the initials had been taken from a club as meritorious in its own way. There has been un recognisable change in the social landscape since the inception of the Incogniti and yet its essential character, the desire to play a fair and honourable game to a sporting conclusion, has not. Incogs remain passionate about the "proper" way of playing, about the joy derived from playing for a finish, and from playing with the opposition rather than against them. It is the preservation of this ethos that is now drawing cricketers, tired of the lack of these very qualities in league cricket, into the ranks of the Great Unknown.

This is the story of the Incogniti Cricket Club, starting with eleven men, some if not all, recently having finished their schooling at Godolphin, Hammersmith, in a match on 25th May 1861 at Lord's cricket ground. With no boundaries, no declaration, a 4 ball over, under-arm or round-arm bowling and long-stops, cricket was then a significantly different game. Bowling was so much the lesser part that no analysis was kept – scoring 50 runs was considered as great a feat as a hat trick! The conditions acceptable for play were also considerably different - even Lord's had a rough wicket and ridge and furrow in the outfield. Play would continue through drenching downpours and on into darkness. Cricket had a long way to go to become the game that we know today.

Early in its history the Incogniti played counties and mostly won, fielding up to 9 first class cricketers in its side. Some 650 first class cricketers have been members, including 9 Test captains. A meritorious wandering club – one of those Test captains was of South Africa (having previously played for England) and another was of New Zealand.

Some 300 pages tell a personal story of a journey through the 76 kilos of leather bound records and 42 kilos of other memorabilia. It is eclectic, anecdotal, visual and colourful, including photographs taken from 1863 onwards. There is also a complete record of the opposition in the nearly 8,000 matches played; who, where, when and with what result.

THE OLIVER BATTCOCK FUND

Dear Member

I am most pleased to be able to report that, over the last couple of years, the club has been represented on the field by more and more younger or student candidates.

Whilst this is healthy, it does mean that, although the club does it's best to subsidise their cricket, many games are played at a financial loss. As a result of this the Committee has agreed to re-open the Oliver Battcock Fund, which some members will remember was set up on his death in 1970, with the objective of helping to subsidise younger or student candidates and members who would benefit from some financial support to help them with the costs of representing the club.

For those of you that don't know, Oliver Battcock was one of the Club's most influential members of recent times - playing two first class matches for the MCC and playing 115 minor counties games representing Buckinghamshire. He was a Life Member of Incogniti, taking 2,204 wickets at an average of 12.99 and scoring 7020 runs. The article that follows gives a wonderful insight to the man based on the reminiscences of club member Colin Schnadhorst.

Over the winter, a number of members have been kind enough to donate to the Fund and we are most grateful for their support. I am now hoping that other members might consider making a donation to the Fund, to a maximum of £50, thus making it possible for us to continue to support good young cricketers and encouraging them to adopt and enjoy the style of wandering cricket that the club is renowned for and the camaraderie that the club provides.

OLIVER GORDON BATTCOCK 1903-1970.

I first met Oliver during the summer of 1959 during the school holidays as my father was helping me to find a club in order to continue my cricketing education. A friend suggested Datchet where "there's a chap there called Oliver Battcock who might teach your son a thing or two". And he did!

He taught me how club cricket should be played, in the right spirit, seriously and fairly, always respecting the opposition and enjoying their company in the bar afterwards. In Oliver's case this would mean holding court with his pipe in one hand and a beer in the other! There was always a group around him enjoying his company and stories.

Before the days of League cricket when Sunday matches were all-day affairs when a good lunch would be enjoyed. If it was a home match and we were batting, Oliver, as captain, would take charge of the washing-up and would 'volunteer' others to help him!

He was a medium-paced swing bowler who played for Buckinghamshire between 1925 and 1939, and after the war from 1946-51 making 115 appearances in all. When the Australian touring party played a 2-day game at Eton College, they described him as one of the best swing bowlers they had met on tour.

He took 12 wickets in the match and was undoubtedly much sharper than in his later years. He was essentially an outswing bowler with the occasional off-cutter which was rather telegraphed by his clearly wrapping his fingers around the ball. A competent lower-order left-hand bat, he would normally field at mid-on, the boot being used as much as his hands when fielding in his later years! Playing into his sixties, Oliver took 100 wickets for both Datchet and the Incogs in his 60th year – some bowler!

Apart from Bucks and Datchet, he played a vast amount of cricket every summer, frequently more than one game a week. He subsequently became a stalwart and something of a legend to the Incogs. As a part-time groundsman at Datchet, he liked to use liquid cow manure in the preparation of the wickets. This was transported to the square in a wheelbarrow and, rumour has it, one sunny afternoon he was found enjoying forty winks in the very same barrow after his labours were done! This may explain why the ladies of Datchet repaired a pair of his favourite trousers with a red patch and, at the end of the season, hauled them up the flagpole and then ceremoniously burnt them much to Oliver's great indignation!

Datchet used to organise a series of tours to Wales and Oliver played in the first game of the inaugural tour. The accommodation was a B & B run by a very stern landlady. After a raucous night celebrating our first win and the ensuing noisy late night, breakfast was served in silence with the landlady announcing, "I want you all out by 11 o'clock!" Oliver's response from behind his newspaper was a rather unhelpful, "I've been thrown out of better places than this!" Subsequent negotiations revealed that the previous guests had been a rugby team who had left without paying and a cash advance resolved the impasse!

A less auspicious occasion occurred when Datchet played Ickenham away towards the end of his career and his health was suffering. He ran in to bowl and, in the final three delivery strides, he broke wind three times. The batsman looked at Oliver rather than the ball, slips and the keeper collapsed laughing and the ball went for four byes!



Whilst cricket consumed his summers, his other passion was the theatre and he loved acting, making his West End debut in 1931 under his stage name of Oliver Gordon. When the Second World War broke out, the then manager of the Theatre Royal Windsor, John Counsell, was called up and asked Oliver to take his place in running the theatre. In later years he was the Director-Producer of the Salisbury Repertory Company and he enjoyed playing the Dame in their pantomime. One year a group of Datchet players took a minibus to see the panto in which he was playing Widow Twankey, to find that he had reserved us front row seats. When the traditional sweet-throwing scene arrived, Oliver was unwise enough to aim some at the front row, only to receive a very accurate return volley! Being so close we clearly heard a stage whisper to the effect, "you bastards!"

Oliver led such a full and busy life and met so many people on the cricket field and in the theatre, that it was impossible for him to remember all their named. He duly adopted the simple tactic of employing the endearing greeting "Hello Cock, how are you?" What a character, and a lovely man.

INCOGNITI C. C. v WINDSOR BOYS' SCHOOL

In a sentimental nod to yesteryears, Incogniti CC squared off against Windsor Boys School, injecting the field with passion in a spirited early-season match on Wednesday, May 24th, 2024. With whispers of former showdowns echoing from the early 2000s, both teams readied themselves for a interesting contest.

The day unfolded with the arrival of the dependable umpire, Paul Furness, dressing his trademark Incogniti attire and armed with his trusty Ribena juic. A comforting sight that stirred memories and camaraderie, especially among Datchet CC comrades like Peter Brant and Dan Graham. Paul effortlessly slipped into his role as the sociable host, rekindling old friendships and laying the groundwork for a day loaded with banter and competitive cricket.

As the coin favoured Incogniti CC, anticipation soared for their batsmen to seize the spotlight.

Anthony Wood and Seb Eyre took to the crease, showcasing early promise until Wood surrendered to a fiery bouncer, courtesy of Windsor's emerging talent. However, Incogniti's resolve remained unshaken, with Anil Gill stepping up to steady the ship alongside Eyre, guiding the team to a respectable 73 before Eyre's departure.

Amidst discussions on tactics and the day's play, the players relished a feast fit for champions during the lunch break. With plates filled with delicious chicken and vegetable curry, fragrant rice, warm naan bread, and zesty mango chutney, they refuelled their bodies and forged bonds over shared meals, fortifying their resolve for the challenges ahead.

After lunch, Incogniti's batting lineup showcased depth and collectively setting an imposing target of 224 for 9 in 42 overs.

As Windsor Boys embarked on their innings, only to be swiftly dashed by Incogniti's bowlers. Despite B. Nibblett's valiant efforts, emerging as Windsor's standout performer with the bat, the rest of the team wobbled against Incogniti's fearsome spin bowling attack. With Naveed Malik spearheading the attack taking three wickets, Windsor Boys School found themselves bundled out for a modest 93 runs in 31 overs, conceding victory to Incogniti CC.

In a match teeming with sporting genius, Incogniti CC emerged winners, and setting the stage for a promising season ahead.

Nav Malik was watchful to begin but soon got into his stride with Harris as the score moved onto 145 before Harris was out for a fine 52 having completed his 50 in 37 balls with 8 fours and 1 six. He was bowled by the captain Alex Clements.

Oliver Wood joined Nav Malik in the 25th over and got away positively with a 4 off his first ball but the accurate bowling of Clements saw the back of Wood bowled for 14. Enter Jon Andrews for his first and only game on tour. He again was watchful as a few balls kept low but a four eased his early nerves and then a series of 1s and 2s and a well run 3 took him onto 14 meanwhile Nav Malik continued to occupy the crease at the other end.

After Jon Andrews was out for 14 it was left to Anthony Maplesden and Tom Gadsby to see Incogniti home to a respectable score of 222 declared off 40 overs leaving Ottery 44 overs to secure victory or draw the game.

Incogniti started with the bowling of Maplesden and Ben Willshere who endured some serious "pad rash". Maplesden and Willshere were both accurate but unrewarded. The Ottery opening batters were in for a reasonable time and had a good start before the first wicket fell with the score on 71. Ollie Wood bowled Carstairs for 25 and then a further 7 wickets fell with the score only on 118.

Tipton mauled by Incogniti Good fielding display by Tipton in vain

Tipton were honoured to host the nomadic touring side Incogniti for the third time. They were formed in 1861 so are a tad older than our 150 years. The teams assembled under leaden skies that thankfully did not deliver, unlike the car containing the freshly prepared teas that whizzed up the path just before the start, piloted by John Buckland.

It was decided that Incogniti would bat first which they did with Harry Gadsby and Ollie Wood who faced David Birch and Dave Alford. A maiden from Birch to Gadsby allowed the late running Buckland with to don his whites on the boundary and join the match. Wood got way first ball, but Gadsby had to wait for his 14th before he scored a 2. Birch struck the first blow for Tipton trapping Wood LBW for 3 in the 4th over.

Anthony Maplesden replaced him and was unsettled by the accuracy of Birch, which saw a few balls miss bat and stumps. He foretold his own fate to the fielders around the bat and contributed to it by advancing down the wicket to a ball from Birch and was stumped by a country mile by Dave Thayre for a 7 ball duck.

A sprinkling of fine drizzle saw the ball wiping cloths in action for a few overs but this soon abated. Harry Gadsby and Ben Wilshere survived another 10 overs although both had narrow escapes. Reece Whittington just got his fingers to a ball from Gadsby at short mid-off and John Buckland could not

grasp a ball at his feet at mid-wicket, but then he was only warming up. Alford bowled 6 overs from the river end (0-27) and was replaced by Arthur Coles, whilst Birch completed his full 8 with impressive figures of 2-10 with Phil Wright taking over. Wright did not start well with a Gadsby boundary followed by 3 singles. However, this probably gave Wilshere a false sense of security as he wound up to play an expansive shot to the final ball of the over, which arrived long after he expected and eventually hit leg stump. He had scored 17 off 31 balls.

This started a productive period for Tipton where 6 wickets were taken for 38 runs to put them in a good position. Tom Gadsby was next to go after facing just 5 balls, hitting out at Wright he failed to clear John Buckland at mid-wicket, but it took a good catch high over his head. Arthur Coles bowled a very good 4 over spell from the river end which cost just 9 runs. He was unlucky not to bowl Conal Clarke as the ball landed on a bail, which resulted in 2 byes.

At drinks with the sun now shining, Incogniti were 63-4. Buckland took over from Coles and took a wicket with his first ball in unusual circumstances. Harry Gadsby's long innings ended when he edged a ball low to the left of Phil Wright at slip. His two slip catches this season were self-preservation in catching the ball before it struck him in the head, but this one involved a dive to ground level, which surprised everyone including the participant. Gadsby Jnr had scored 30 off 66 balls. Buckland followed this up in his next over when Clarke was trapped LBW for 7 as the visitors slipped to 69-6. Tony Wood and Dan Kite added a further 20 before the Wright/Buckland combination worked again, this time Buckland taking a running catch at mid-wicket to remove Kite for 7.

Mike Bennett replaced Buckland and took his first Tipton wicket since 1988 when Finn Harris unwisely picked out Buckland at mid-wicket with the first ball he faced giving Buckland the 3rd catch of the innings. Wright's spell ended having taken 3-22 and was replaced by Arthur Coles.90-8 was the good as it was going to get for Tipton as a late rally added a further 57 with Tony Wood doing most of the damage. He reached his 50 with a six and a four off Buckland, the second shot endangering the ball searchers from the first. However, he was dismissed off the next ball when top edging high behind keeper Thayre who sprinted back towards the boundary and intercepted it as it fell. Wood had scored 55 off 52 balls to switch the momentum of the match.

The final pair of Ian Robertson and Alec Clarke did even more damage with 11 runs each as Incogniti closed on 160-9. Buckland ended with 3-36 and Coles 0-37, but bowled better than those figures suggest as he came under the late assault by the batsmen. A great tea awaited provided by Helen Buckland and laid out by Luke Phillips and Jem Gillham (and possibly others)

To say that Tipton's reply did not go well would be a bit of an understatement. Full credit must be given to the bowling and slip catching by the Incogniti players who shop Tipton out for a miserable 47 runs. Tom Jeacock was the first victim of Anthony Maplesden's great opening spell when he was bowled for a single in the 2nd over. Fellow opener Brendan Coles was caught at slip by Dan Kite off Finn Harris for 4 before two more wickets fell in the 5th over. Maplesden too the crucial wicket of John Buckland when bowling him for 2 and Mike Bennett went first ball, also bowled.

Reece Whittington and Arthur Coles made a partial recovery with a partnership of 25, but then all hell broke loose. Whittington had reached 11 when he edged a ball from Tom Gadsby to Finn Harris at slip, then Coles was caught by Maplesden off Ian Robinson for the same score.

Dave Thayre became Harris's 2nd victim at slip off Tom Gadsby having scored 3 and Amelia Tolley followed him 4 balls later, trapped LBW for a single. Gadsby made it three wickets in an over when Birch was caught via a bit of juggling in the slips first ball with Harris claiming his 3rd catch. At 43-9 Tipton were in danger of matching their poor score against Bakers earlier in the season. However, a leg bye and a single to Phil Wright avoided that. Dave Alford batted with intent with some adventurous air shots which suggested the last wicket partnership would not be long keeping the players from the Golden Lion. Wright avoided the Tom Gadsby hat-trick at the beginning of the following over with all fielders clustered around the bat.

After facing 5 balls from Ian Robinson without scoring in the 19th over, a big swipe by Alford was unsuccessful, but his pads prevented him from being bowled, but not dismissed for LBW by Jem

Gillham's upraised finger. Tipton were therefore all out for just 47. Tom Gadsby 4-6, Anthony Maplesden 3-12 and Ian Robinson 2-5 took the bowling honours.

The John Williamson Tipton player of the match went to Phil Wright for his 3 wickets and rather good

Safeguarding Policy Statement

Incogniti Cricket Club (The Club) is committed to ensuring all Children (i.e all persons under the age of 18) participating in cricket have a safe and positive experience. We will do this by:

Recognising all children participating in cricket (regardless of age, gender, race, religion, sexual orientation, ability or disability) have the right to have fun and be protected from harm in a safe environment.

Ensuring individuals working within cricket at, or for, our club provide a welcoming, safe, and fun experience for children.

Adopting and implementing the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) "Safe Hands – Cricket's Policy for Safeguarding Children" and any future versions of this.

Appointing a Club Welfare Officer and ensuring they attend all current and future training modules required by the ECB.

Ensuring all people who work in cricket at, or for, our club (such as staff, officials, volunteers, team managers, coaches and so on) have a responsibility for safeguarding children, and understand how the "Safe Hands Policy" applies to them.

Ensuring all individuals working within cricket at, or for, the club are recruited and appointed in accordance with ECB guidelines and relevant legislation.

Ensuring all individuals working within cricket at, or for, the club are provided with support, through education and training, so they are aware of, and can adhere to, good practice and Code of Conduct guidelines defined by the ECB, and the club.

Ensuring the name and contact details of the Club Welfare Officer is available:

As the first point of contact for parents, children and volunteers/staff within the club.

As a local source of procedural advice for the club, its committee and members.

As the main point of contact within the club for the ECB County Welfare Officer and the ECB Safeguarding Team.

As the main point of contact within the club for relevant external agencies in connection with child safeguarding.

Ensuring correct and comprehensive reporting procedures exist for raising and managing child safeguarding concerns.

Providing an environment where the views of children, parents and volunteers are sought and welcomed on a range of issues. This will help us create an environment where people have the opportunity to voice any concerns (about possible suspected child abuse/neglect, and/or about poor practice) to the Club Welfare Officer. Details of the County Welfare Officer will be made available, in case the Club Welfare officer is unavailable, or the concern relates to the Club Welfare officer.

Ensuring all suspicions concerns and allegations are taken seriously and dealt with swiftly and appropriately.

Ensuring access to confidential information relating to child safeguarding matters is restricted to those who need to know in order to safeguard children – including the Club Welfare Officer and the appropriate external authorities, such as the Local Authority Designated Officer (LADO), as specified within ECB child safeguarding procedures.

Code Of Conduct For Cricket Club Members, Candidates and Guests

All Members, Candidates and Guests of Incogniti Cricket club, including all members and officers, as well as individuals who watch/attend/participate/officiate in matches, will:

Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every person within the context of cricket.

Treat everyone equally and not discriminate on the grounds of age, gender, disability, race, ethnic origin, nationality, colour, parental or marital status, religious belief, class or social background, sexual preference or political belief.

Not condone, or allow to go unchallenged, any form of discrimination if witnessed.

Display high standards of behaviour.

Promote the positive aspects of cricket, for example fair play.

Encourage all participants to learn the Laws and rules and play within them, always respecting the decisions of match officials.

Actively discourage unfair play, rule violations and arguing with match officials.

Recognise good performance not just match results.

Place the well-being and safety of children above the development of performance.

Ensure activities are appropriate for the age, maturity, experience and ability of the individual.

Respect children's opinions when making decisions about their participation in cricket.

Not smoke, drink or use banned substances while working with children in the club.

Not provide children with alcohol when they are under the care of the club.

Follow ECB guidelines set out in the "Safe Hands – Cricket's Policy for Safeguarding Children" and any other relevant guidelines issued.

Report any concerns in relation to a child, following reporting procedures laid down by the ECB.

In addition, all club officials and appointed volunteers will:

Have been appropriately vetted, if required.

Hold relevant qualifications and be covered by appropriate insurance.

Always work in an open environment (i.e. avoid private, or unobserved, situations and encourage an open environment) NB This includes the online world – club officers and volunteers are actively discouraged from online or other electronic communication with children – any such communication should be via parents.

Know and understand the ECB's "Safe Hands – Cricket's Policy for Safeguarding Children".

Develop an appropriate working relationship with young players, based on mutual trust and respect.

Ensure physical contact is appropriate and necessary and is carried out within recommended guidelines with the young player's full consent and approval.

Not engage in any form of sexually related contact with a young player.

Attend appropriate training to keep up to date with their role, especially with respect to the safeguarding of children.

Privacy Policy Statement

Incogniti Cricket Club (the Club) is a nomadic cricket club and golfing society. We primarily operate within the UK and are bound by the principles of privacy contained in the Data Protection Act 1998, and the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) EU Laws.

The Club holds personal information on existing members, freely supplied by them when they applied to join the Club. The data which is stored is used to support the primary purpose of the Club which is to arrange, organize and deliver cricket or golf events, including the club's Annual General Meeting. This personal information may include the following:

- Full Name, Contact details such as email address, postal address and telephone numbers.
- Gender
- Date of Birth (only where necessary for our welfare obligations)
- Cricketing or Golfing ability (such as performance statistics)

This personal information is recorded and kept for all members on our Membership database, which is currently provided and hosted by Hitssports Ltd on secure servers within the European Union. The database is administered by authorised club members. Members' names and performance statistics are published on the website and visible to non-members, however all other personal information such as contact details are only accessible by other subscribed members of the club, via the club's annual Scores and Averages booklet, or via a login and password to the Club's website.

In order for the Club to operate effectively, the personal information of its Officers, Executive Committee members and key postholders including match managers, umpires and scorers is made available to the membership and third parties via the Club website and the Club's Annual Fixture List.

In certain cases Members' personal information may be supplied to third-parties where it is essential in order to fulfil the Club's primary function as a nomadic cricket club – for example where the names and details of players are required to be supplied to oppositions for security reasons.

The Club protects the personal information it holds from misuse, loss, unauthorised access, modification or disclosure by various means including password access and secure servers.

The Club endeavours to ensure that the personal information it holds is accurate, complete and up-to-date.

Members can access and update their own personal data via logging in to the Club's website, or by application to or contact with the Membership Secretary.

Incogniti CC will presume that any individual who is a fully subscribed member is willing for his or her personal information to be kept on the Club database, and shared internally or externally via the club's website, fixture list and annual scores and averages booklet, unless the Club hears from them to the contrary.

Members may 'opt out' from this presumed consent by contacting the Honorary Secretary and requesting that their personal information not be published in the aforementioned media, or indeed deleted entirely.
