Mountain ranges, Peru

Summit of Salvation

Growing up in a devout Italian Catholic household in Chicago, USA, I attended Mass weekly, yet found myself grappling with the depths of my Catholic faith. I never really understood what I believed as a Catholic. At 16, influenced by a close friend's conversion to Protestant evangelicalism after a trip to the Deep South, I, too, drifted away from the Church, swayed by the allure of a newfound spiritual path.

Immersing myself in evangelical teachings, I became proficient in scripture and evangelisation, feeling content in my newfound faith. However, profound tragedy struck in my mid-twenties with the loss of my mother to cancer. My life had been shattered and I felt so alone, unable to understand why God had not healed her. I was told that talking to my mum was a grave sin since there is no concept of a communion of saints in Protestant theology. I was so lonely without her, and for the first time I questioned my Protestant faith.

STORY OF GRACE

Relocating to Virginia years later, I found myself drawn back to Catholic rituals. I started sneaking into the vigil Mass and going to my evangelical church on Sunday morning.

Catholicism is considered a cult by many in evangelical circles but I loved being back at Mass, although I couldn't figure out why.

It was then that I started reading about Catholicism, the early church, and books by modern theologians like Scott Hahn and David Currie. They explain the contrast between Catholic doctrine and Protestantism on topics like the Eucharist, Mary, praying to the saints, reconciliation, the Pope and many other areas.

As a Protestant I was taught this was idol worship and to stay far from Catholicism. When I read how much evidence there was to support the Catholic faith, I felt so silly for being so easily persuaded away from it. And ashamedly, as well as being extremely anti-Catholic, I even tried to convert others away from it.





When I turned 30, I embarked on a month-long hiking expedition in the high mountain range of Peru. Accompanied by a group of 14 Italians from my father's hometown, including my cousin, we were led by former street boys from Lima.

These individuals had undergone profound transformations, having surrendered their lives to Christ through a Don Bosco mission. Witnessing their devout prayers and actions throughout the journey deeply moved me. I felt inspired by their unwavering faith.

On our final day in Peru, while in Lima, my Italian cousin and I, along with some friends, stumbled upon a Mass.

Though I hadn't fully reconciled with the Church, I felt a longing to receive the Eucharist.

Surprisingly, my cousin refrained, explaining that he hadn't confessed beforehand and couldn't receive the Eucharist.

His words lingered in my mind during my return journey to America. Despite my apprehensions stemming from a 15-year absence from reconciliation and the unpleasant memories associated with it, I felt an undeniable urge to seek confession.

Upon my arrival in Virginia, I promptly sought out Father Carl, a warm, compassionate and knowledgeable priest.

In our conversation, I bombarded Father Carl with numerous questions, to which he provided insightful answers.

I suddenly sensed a palpable presence enveloping me— a tangible, physical cloud descending from my head to my shoulders.

Convinced of the necessity to confess, I mustered the courage to ask for reconciliation. Father Carl agreed, suggesting we conduct the sacrament right then and there, face to face in his office—a departure from my usual experience behind the confessional curtain.



As I began recounting my sins spanning 15 years, it proved to be a lengthy process.

Following my confession, Father Carl pronounced the prayer of absolution over me. With my eyes closed and head bowed, I suddenly sensed a palpable presence enveloping me - a physical tangible, cloud descending from my head to my shoulders. At that moment, I instinctively recognised it as the Holy Spirit, overwhelming me with His divine presence. It was an indescribable sensation, so powerful that I feared opening my eyes, believing I might encounter God and perish from the intensity of His presence.

Following the sacrament of reconciliation, Father Carl proceeded to consecrate a host and offered me the Eucharist, symbolising my return to the Church. It felt like the warmest embrace from God Himself. This was a profound moment of grace for me and I felt like the prodigal daughter returning to her Father's loving arms, knowing I was completely forgiven.

I am eternally grateful for God's boundless grace and forgiveness.


Areté Centre welcomes New Team Member

A WHIRLWIND TOUR OF MISSION

Fr Chris has had a busy March and April, with a number of speaking engagements across Australia and New Zealand.

Fr Chris spoke to the priests, principals, and assistant principals for mission from the Diocese of Lismore on the topic of together". His "mission talk explored the necessity of parishes and schools aligning for the common mission, and offered some practical strategies for how this might take place. He also spoke to the Australian province the Oblates of of Mary Immaculate, as well as the priests of the Diocese of Bathurst on the topic of missional preaching.









The trip included a first-hand experience of what it is like for our six current Kiwi students to attend the online Areté lectures: Fr Chris gave one of the Theological Foundations of Mission lectures from Palmerston North from 9 pm to 11 pm Sydney time!

Thanks to Cheryl Surrey, Divine Renovation's Relationship Guide for New Zealand and a current student of the Foundations of Missionary Leadership program, who organised Fr Chris' trip.



Fr Chris also traveled to New Zealand in March for Divine Renovation Australasia.

He spoke with 7 bishops, around 70 priests, and approximately 400 lay leaders across four dioceses about the need for parishes to adopt a missional stance.

He shared his experience about what it takes to move parishes from maintenance to mission.

The whistle-stop tour included Auckland, Palmerston North, Dunedin and Christchurch.



Uniting for a Higher Purpose: The Power of Teamwork in Parish Ministries

In a parish setting, teams are defined as small groups of people who work together to achieve a common goal. However, their importance goes beyond mere functionality; it touches the very core of community ministry. We sat down with Fr Chris and asked him to share his insights on the importance of teamwork in any parish or ministry setting.

Why do we need teams in parishes?

The best teams consist of people who are each able to contribute their diverse skills and perspectives in complementary ways. When all these diverse gifts are woven together, it enriches the tapestry of the parish. Working together not only amplifies the Grace in ministry but there's an extra joy and satisfaction in sharing the parish journey with others.

How do you create the right kinds of teams in your parish?

The experts would say that real teams are forged when there is a focus on a "worthy challenge" or purpose. Parishes have the most worthy challenge of them all – to play their part in the fulfilment of Jesus's Great Commission: to make disciples of all nations (Matt 28: 18-20). Disciple-making is a 'team sport'! If we galvanise ministry teams around the great commission, wonderful things are possible. When ministry teams are also characterised by mutual love for each other, great things are possible. Jesus calls us to love one another as Jesus has loved us (Jn 13:34), and so when teams are grounded in these kinds of relationships it is possible for teams to accomplish great things for the Kingdom of God!

Finally, ministry is much more fun when we do it together. We were not supposed to do things on our own for Jesus. The Church is the Body of Christ, and so we do it best when we do it together, and with, in, and for Jesus.

A final word for priests

As priests, we are much more effective when we are leading out of a team. We make better decisions for the parish because we are benefiting from the wisdom of others. We are healthier too, because the responsibility and burden of leadership is shared amongst others. Many priests aren't used to a team approach to leadership. I can honestly say that having experienced what it is like to lead out of a team, I will never go back to trying to do it all on my own.



Kristy Komadina

Introducing Kristy, a graduate of Areté in 2023, and the Regional Coordinator (Sydney North Shore) Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, Broken Bay. Kristy was born into an immigrant Croatian family from Western Sydney and is the eldest of 4 siblings. Kristy has been happily married for almost 20 years to her husband Marko and they share 4 beautiful children.

What Parish do you belong to and what role do you serve in?

I belong to the Catholic Parish of Lower North Shore which encompasses 3 churches from Northbridge, Willoughby and Naremburn. I am currently serving in the music ministry there by being a cantor and choir member. Until recently, I was the Parish Sacramental Coordinator. Now my main focus is our mission. I'm working behind the scenes, collaborating with others in our parish to launch our first Alpha program, to engage families from our parish schools and to overhaul our digital presence through revamping our website and social media.

How has Areté deepened or impacted your faith journey?

I think when I first contemplated joining Areté, I knew that I wanted more formation and deeper spiritual experiences. I was in that sweet spot where I was a committed Catholic, I understood that I was responding to my baptismal call to go make disciples, I was involved in multiple church ministries already. However, there was still so much to learn and discover. I found this immediately at the first intensive when I was introduced to concepts I had never heard before, experienced forms of prayer that I had never tried and was pushed ever so gently past my own defences and inhibitions to share my story candidly with others.







The whole journey over the course of the year unfolded at just the right time. It felt like with every new learning and every new experience, I opened myself up more to receive God's love.

How has the leadership element impacted your professional life?

It has given me the confidence to see myself as a leader. Sometimes as adults, we feel like we're faking it until we make it. The Areté program delves deeply into leadership and explains that we can lead, even if we are not necessarily in charge. I have taken that on board in my parish and through my work as a part of our Mission Broken Bay team. I believe people have seen leadership qualities in me and have been given opportunities to speak from a place of expertise and knowledge on many occasions in the last 12 months. I was particularly honoured to be asked to contribute a reflection for our Diocesan Lenten Program titled "Participating in the Mission of Christ"

What is one highlight or moment of grace that you can share with us from that journey?

Over the course of the year, I was able to receive and give prayer as a ministry. In the beginning, I found it confronting to be prayed for by a stranger and the thought of doing that for somebody else scared me more than anything. As time went on, I received so much grace in being able to pray for others. Seeing how my prayers could impact somebody else and witnessing the Holy Spirit working, then and there, right in front of me was one of the most powerful experiences of my life.

This verse absolutely blew my mind last year. It had only taken me 42 years of living to understand that every time we love someone or someone loves us, that IS God.

Favourite method of prayer?

I'm so lucky to work with a team that prays together every day. We practice Lectio Divina through a prayer website called prayas-you-go. It's so powerful to reflect on the scriptures daily and let God's word speak directly to you.


Who is your favourite Saint?





Canonised in 1665, his profound theological insights led to his declaration as a Doctor of the Church by Pope Pius IX in 1878.



In 1610, with St Jane Frances de Chantal, he founded the Visitation of Holy Mary (the Visitation Nuns).
