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From the Chair: Playing for gold

Hi everyone,

The first NSW gold point event for 2026 was a resounding success, with 320 players descending on Orange for the Central West Festival of Bridge. Now in its third year, the sold-out festival showcased a powerful collaborative model between regional clubs, local businesses, and government – a successful framework that other clubs and regions might look to replicate. Plans are already underway to increase capacity for 2027.

There are two more NSW gold point events in 2026 – the popular Coffs Coast Gold Congress in August, which has sold out quickly again this year; and the [Sydney Spring Nationals](#) in October (SN26), which is now open for registrations. With 18 separate events over the nine days, this flagship tournament includes a diverse range of events for players of all experience levels. For those ready to enter, an early bird discount is available until 31 August.

This month, we are excited to launch the [Starter Congress](#), a first-of-its-kind event for Australia, specifically for new or developing players with limited congress experience. Featuring a pre-match briefing, a gentler pace of play with fewer boards, and dedicated volunteers to help players learn, it is an excellent introduction to congress play. The first event is a collaboration with Peninsula Bridge Club as host, and supported by North Shore Bridge Club, Sydney Bridge Club and Trumps Bridge Centre. We hope to make this an ongoing series, hosted in partnership with clubs across the state.

To wrap up event news, the NSW teams for this year's ANC are officially set! Check out the team lists on [page 8](#) to see who is representing us. It is a wonderful achievement to be selected, and I encourage you all to wish our players well before they head off to Canberra in July.

A special mention goes to this month's profile, which features the Curtis family – mum Brooke, dad Dion, and 10-year-old Jack. After starting lessons at Mollymook Bridge Club, this competitive trio has embraced bridge as their latest challenge. Their story is a fantastic reminder of the game's unique camaraderie and appeal across generations.

Finally, we extend a heartfelt thank you to André Korenhof, who is stepping down from the Events Committee in June after 10 years of valuable service. While André will continue as GNOT Coordinator in 2026, his decade of committee work is especially significant to acknowledge in May, with National Volunteer Week coming up. Profile: The Curtis Family

(Mum Brooke, Dad Dion and 10-year old Jack)

How did the three of you first come across bridge, and what made you decide to give it a go together as a family?

Brooke & Dion: We are a family who plays card and board games together, and I'm always keeping an ear to the ground for our next challenge. By pure chance, I interrupted a Bridge training session last year to ask what card game they were playing.... And the rest, as they say, is history!

Jack: Mum heard about it and because we enjoyed "500", thought it might be a fun game to play.

What's it been like learning the game as a family—does it make it easier, more fun, or occasionally more competitive?

Brooke & Dion: Ordinarily we are a very competitive family, however, as none of us has "mastered" bridge - (and may never do

so!) - the dynamic is completely different. We discuss boards after Bridge sessions to help each other problem-solve and improve. We really champion each other and celebrate solid performances.

How have you found the atmosphere at the club? Did you feel welcomed as a family of new starters?

Brooke: Jack is the youngest member that Mollymook Bridge Club has ever had, so we were very aware of trying to fit in and not annoy anyone with too much "youthful exuberance". We needn't have worried - the Club has been incredibly supportive. The NSW Bridge Youth contingent has also welcomed Jack into their fold and he had a wonderful time of building friendships and playing Bridge at the recent Bateman's Bay Congress.

What has been the most surprising (or funniest) part about learning the game as a family?

Dion: The complexity of bridge has blown my mind, and I love it. The element that I did not anticipate, was how much I was going to be learning off my 10 year old son.

How has this shared hobby changed your family time?

Brooke: I get to participate! As a mum I often find myself supporting everyone else's interests and hobbies without finding time to undertake enjoyable activities myself. Bridge is a win-win.

Jack: It doesn't change our family time, it's just a different activity we enjoy together. *(Note from Mum: For context - Jack is homeschooled).*

What have you found most challenging so far, and have there been any “lightbulb moments” where things started to click?

Brooke: My “lightbulb” moments usually occur immediately after I've made an incorrect bid or led the wrong card. C'est la vie!

Jack: The bidding (after basic conventions) has been a good challenge.

Who is the most competitive player in the family?

Brooke: Jack is definitely the most competitive since his young, elastic brain is picking things up at a faster rate. We're very proud of him.

What are your goals with your bridge game?

Jack: Improving and playing more regularly. I'd like to be good enough to represent Australia one day.

What would you say to other families or beginners who might be thinking about trying bridge for the first time?

Brooke: Apart from the fun and challenge presented by Bridge which, alone, is more than enough reason to embark on this adventure, there are enormous cognitive and social benefits. Give it a go and see if it's a nice FIT for your family... see what I did there?! 😊

Dion: Being involved in bridge, the thing that has impressed me the most is the calibre of the people. Everyone that I have encountered from day one has been a credit to the community. The youth community that Jack has become involved in is full of genuinely impressive people. Bridge is a complex and challenging game – it involves work and time. But the people are amazing, the game is brilliant and it is so worth it.

Introducing the Starter Congress



Bridge NSW is excited to announce an initiative to support new and developing players who have little or no experience playing in a congress.

Introducing the Starter Congress – a full-day event specifically for newer players who are interested in trying tournament bridge but might feel hesitant to take that first step.

The very first Starter Congress will be hosted in partnership with Peninsula Bridge Club at their brand-new club house on Sunday, 9 August.

Why try tournament bridge?

Playing in a Congress is the best way to:

- Make new friends and connect with other bridge players
- Compete against others at about the same level of ability (or if you feel up to the challenge, in a higher-level field)
- Have a wonderful time, sharing stories of triumphs and disasters, while you laugh and learn!

Take your first step at the Starter Congress

Moving from club bridge to tournament bridge can feel like a giant step for many players. The Starter Congress is a "supported pathway" to allow players to give congress bridge a go. It features:

- **Fair competition:** created for players with under two years' experience or less than 50 masterpoints to ensure players compete with those at a similar stage in their bridge journey.
- **A gentler pace:** a shorter day with fewer boards than a standard congress and a focus on learning – a great experience without the pressure of a standard tournament.
- **Helpful guidance:** the day begins with introduction to congress etiquette and scoring, with dedicated "Go-to" volunteers on hand to support players throughout the day.

The inaugural Starter Congress is expected to be the first in an ongoing series, hosted in partnership with clubs across the state. The goal is simple – to help newer players build their confidence and skills to become more active and engaged players within the NSW bridge community.

Entries now open for Sydney Spring Nationals 2026



A national gold masterpoint event – Sydney Spring Nationals 2026 (SN26) returns this October, bringing together players from across Australia and abroad, for what is expected to be the second largest event in the nation this year.

The scale means more than just a large field and more gold masterpoints; it means a diverse program with something for every player – whatever your level of experience.

A flagship Spring tradition, SN26 will take place from Saturday 17 to Sunday 25 October at Canterbury Park Racecourse.

Highlights this year include:

- **Teams and Pairs events** – Novice, Restricted, Intermediate and Open categories ensure you can customise your program and compete with players at your level.
- **Two mixed events offering Playoff Qualifying Points** – recognising the popularity of the mixed format, the Gerda Stern Mixed Pairs returns this year, alongside the Gumby Lazer Mixed Teams
- **The Open Teams Championship** – the double knockout format has been

simplified and will run over three days for those who don't make the semi-finals, incorporating a plate event but no shield this year.

- **The return of Mini Monday** – this popular initiative offers an introduction to congress play for newer players with a focus on learning and fun.

Spring Nationals is an opportunity to immerse yourself in the game by entering multiple events over the nine-day program. You can test your skills by entering higher level events than last year and sharpen your game comparing hands and recapping matches with fellow players.

But it's also about more than just what happens at the table. It's an opportunity to strengthen social bonds by reconnecting with friends, as well as meeting players from NSW and beyond. Sydney Spring Nationals is a backdrop to host club social events, drinks after play with fellow players, or spontaneous get-togethers with new people you meet.

Coming from outside of Sydney?

Why not organise a club 'road trip' with fellow players and make it a bridge holiday? The venue includes ample free parking and there is lots of local accommodation including the nearby Comfort Inn & Suites where a special rate is available for SN26 players.

Tournament recap: Central West Festival of Bridge

The Central West Festival of Bridge has concluded another successful year in Orange, continuing its growth from its 2024 debut. Originally established as a series of red-point events to support the ANC, the festival has quickly become a significant fixture for both local and interstate players.

The 320 available places sold out in record time this year, and the field included 130 players from Sydney, 36 from Canberra and 36 local players from the Orange Bridge Club. Demonstrating the growing appeal of the festival, players from Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, and the wider Central West region joined this year's event.

Tournament highlights

Competition was held across Open, Intermediate, Restricted, and Novice divisions, with identical prize scales applied to all categories.

- **Open Teams:** The team of Pauline Gumby, Warren Lazer, Sue Luck and Bruce Neil successfully defended their title, retaining the championship for the second consecutive year.
- **Open Pairs:** Jimmy Wallace and partner Kevin Steffensen secured the win after maintaining their position at the lead table for the duration of the event.
- **Novice Awards:** Two Gold Cups were awarded in the Teams event – one for the overall Novice winners, and another specifically for the best-performing Novice team from the Central West region.

Profile: Newcastle Bridge Club

Tell us about the history of your club – how long has it been running?

The seeds of the club were sown on 18 August 1968, when 34 players from the Postal Institute, BHP Research Labs, and Newcastle University came together to form a dedicated bridge community. We grew quickly, reaching 66 members in our first year thanks to the tireless efforts of our early teachers.

However, finding a permanent home was a decade-long challenge and with many venue changes along the way. We played at the YMCA, where we struggled in near-darkness because they insisted on turning the lights off after supper—talk about the Dark Ages! The Adamstown RSL was another highlight, where we'd have to pause play at 9:00 pm for the Ode of Remembrance, hopefully not in the middle of a difficult slam. We moved through the Bowling Club, the Masonic Club, and even the International Sports Centre before landing at the District Park Tennis Club, which was notoriously draughty in winter.

The discussion for a permanent home began in 1979 with the purchase of an investment property, funded by bank loans and generous member contributions. The eventual sale of that property, combined with years of fundraising and hard work of volunteers, allowed the club to move into its current Broadmeadow home, where it celebrated 25 years of occupancy in 2004.

How big is your community and what sessions do you run?

We currently have 316 members and run 10 sessions a week. A real highlight is our monthly "Potluck Partners" Sunday session, where you draw a card to find your partner for the day. We are fortunate to have a paid Director and Administrator, Ken Wilks, for three sessions, supported by a dedicated group of experienced volunteer directors and standby players to ensure everyone gets a game.

What makes your club special?

Some of our sessions are absolutely buzzing; Tuesday and Thursday mornings, in particular, see huge fields of players with a wide range of abilities. Many of our experienced players (include Grand Masters) are always willing to share their knowledge or give formal lessons to help improving players.

One of the original founding members Roy Hardy still plays regularly at the Club and won the mixed pairs championship last year with long term partner Pam Robinson – exactly 50 years after they won the same title together!

What other activities do you run?

The first Saturday of the month is "Social Saturday." It's a regular bridge session followed by drinks, nibbles, and a "plate of goodies" to share for a \$2 donation—a total bargain. It's a tradition started by Pam Robinson that we've joyfully reintroduced post-pandemic. It's the perfect time to socialise and, inevitably, deconstruct the most interesting hands of the day.

How do you appeal to new players?

We run beginner lessons twice a year and provide at least three supervised sessions per week. We've also introduced a dedicated Teaching Subcommittee and a Mentoring Program, which has been vital for helping newer players feel confident enough to stay. Beyond lessons, we host two Congresses a year including our Open Congress in June, and host many other special sessions.

What is a particularly memorable moment in the club's history?

Celebrating our 50th Anniversary in 2018 with 90 members was special, but looking further back, our 1970s Pairs Congress at the historic Great Northern Hotel was fabulous! It was held in a stunning Art Deco ballroom and attracted some of the top Sydney players of the era, thanks in no part to the exceptional meals from Chef Myer.

John's presentations were followed by play. We were encouraged to call the director at every opportunity, and many arose! These were attended by our new directors Jim Watts and Steve Dunnill who were able to practice dealing with infractions at the table under John's supportive gaze.

Other clubs in the area were invited and we were happy to host players from Muswellbrook, Quirindi, Gunnedah, and the Hunter Bridge Club in Singleton.

We're enormously grateful for John's time and expertise. Having such a high level of training in our **spiritual home** (see photo below) was a true **blessing** for the club, and the participants were thrilled to receive his notes and presentation afterwards.

Following the club's move to their new premises, Peninsula Bridge Club has some equipment they no longer need, and would like to donate the items to any club that may be interested

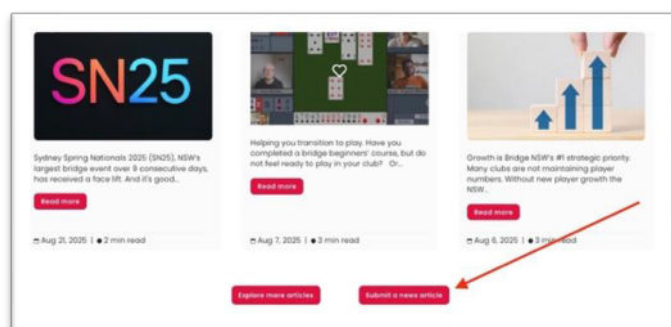
The materials include a wall mountable, simple digital round timer, a power amplifier and a good microphone with a wireless

Directing

Beyond green point events

The Masterpoint Scheme requires Directors to have certain qualifications for specific events. They recognise three levels: Club, Congress, and State (or D, C, and B). The States are individually responsible for accrediting Directors for these levels. The ABF administers the top-level of National Directors. NSW and Victoria have adopted a common accreditation framework for these levels which you can [learn more about here](#).

The Committee – primarily John – has been very busy presenting workshops across the State for Directors who want to get accredited as D or C Directors. Four workshops were held in April at Northern Rivers, Blue Mountains, Orange and Wagga Wagga and will be recapped in next month's newsletter.

Beyond NSW

In February, John McIlrath, together with four other National Directors, ran an Interactive Workshop in Melbourne for the Australian Bridge Directors Association (ABDA). Several NSW Directors attended (some receiving ABDA subsidies).

John gave his excellent session, "Considering becoming a Director," on issues relevant to the new Director. The notes from that presentation and a recording will be added to the Director Development page soon.

ABDA plans for 2027

Every ten years, the Laws of Duplicate Bridge are revised by the World Bridge Federation Laws Committee (of which Laurie Kelso from

Victoria is Secretary). In August 2017, the Laws became active in Australia. The planned schedule is to release a draft in January with an opportunity to comment, and a final release in March or April.

ABDA is planning workshops for senior Directors following both releases and will work with State Associations on workshops for all Directors before implementation locally.

What you can do

To support Director development, you can:

- As a Director, make sure you are listed on the website's Director List. If not, follow the link to complete the Director Survey.
- As a club administrator, identify potential Directors at Club and higher levels and encourage them to direct and become qualified.
- As a player, ALWAYS call the Director for irregularities at the table. That is how Directors hone their craft!

Player Development

Kate's Way #9

THE LAW OF TOTAL TRICKS GOVERNS ALL COMPETITIVE DECISIONS.

We don't defend at the 2-level when either side has (or appears to have) an 8-card fit. Similarly, we don't sell out below the three-level when we have 9 trumps, and we don't sell below the four-level with 10 trumps.

"When in doubt, put the opponents on lead. Why should you make the mistake?" - Edgar Kaplan

The reason for this very basic principle of competitive bidding is the Law of Total Tricks. For readers not familiar with the Law of Total Tricks (LOTT), it's a phenomenon, first observed by French mathematician Jean-Rene Vernes in his 1966 book on the subject. He found that the total number of tricks available to both sides is equal to the number of trumps held by both sides.

Greeted with skepticism at the time (some of which still lingers today), it's turned out to be remarkably accurate in the years since.

It's not quite as simple as stated above, but pretty close. In practical terms, if you have a 9-card spade fit, and the opponents have a 9-card heart fit, there are a total of 18 trumps between us, and, you will nearly always find that there are 18 tricks available. They may be divided 9-9, 10-8, or 11-7, or even 13-5. Your job, in the bidding, is to find out how many of those 18 tricks are yours.

But you don't need to do all that work if you don't want to. Bidding to the level of the number of trumps you hold is a fairly accurate and painless way to apply the Law, even if you don't understand it. In this case you would bid to the three-level since you hold 9 trumps (contracting for 9 tricks).

An obvious fact to be derived from that basic principle is that, when our opponents are at the 2-level in their 8-card fit, they've reached their correct LOTT level (8 trumps, 8 tricks). We will pretty much always score poorly if we let them play there.

Hence the agreement – we don't defend their 8-card fit at the two-level. Never. Not ever.

Various factors can affect the Law and cause total tricks to play high or low. For example, if both sides hold queens and jacks in the opponents' suit, total tricks is likely to be a trick low, i.e., 18 trumps but only 17 total tricks. If you're interested in learning more about how to apply it more accurately at the table, you might want to read Larry Cohen's "To Bid or Not to Bid" (much of it written by myself so, needless to say, I think highly of it).

Here's an old example of the Law at work (from the 1985 World Championships and borrowed from a recent write-up on youth.worldbridge.org) – see overpage.

In one room, the Italian pair sitting N/S arrived at a contract of four clubs. In the other room, the American E/W were allowed to play two spades.

North made ten tricks in clubs, losing only one spade and two red aces, while West made eight tricks in spades at the other table, losing one spade, one diamond, one club and two hearts.

N/S holds 10 trumps (clubs) and E/W has 8. 18 trumps should equal 18 tricks. And it does. 10 for N/S and 8 for E/W. And, as it happens, the 8 tricks go to the side with 8 trumps, while the side that has 10 trumps can take 10 tricks.

The Americans didn't follow the Law (no one had heard of it in those days) and they scored poorly, as we would expect nowadays.

A much more recent example from the ANOT a few years back, in which I will not mention names to protect the guilty.

North faced this bidding problem:

KQ65 973 K 85432

None Vul at IMP scoring, his RHO opened 1H and the bidding continued as follows:

1H P 4H Dbl

P ?

Would you bid 4S? Not if you're a Law-abiding bridge player:

The opponents can be assumed to have 9-10 trumps. Our side will usually have 8-9 (occasionally only 7!). Max of 19, minimum of 16. Let's forget the unlikely 16 and assume 18 trumps for the moment since that's pretty likely. If you can take 10 tricks, then the other side can only make 8. Seems right to bid? Perhaps... Not so much in it.

But, let's suppose there are only 17 trumps. Now, if you can take 10, they have only 7. Clearly right to pass.

Suppose there are 19, then one side will make ten and the other 9. This one is harder. What's right? It's a guess. 4S is insurance, and if you're sure about the 19 trumps, you should probably bid.

But the deal with 19 trumps is the least frequent, and pass may still be right. The deal with 17 trumps is the most frequent, when pass is the clear winner. And then there's that occasional 16 that we ignored. It's looking right to pass.

And don't forget that on those frequent deals with 17 or 18 trumps, it's possible that neither side has ten. If there are only 18 trumps, the 18 tricks may be divided 9-9.

And when there are only 17, it's even more likely that neither side has 10. Pass is becoming a standout.

In fact, neither side had ten tricks, and pass was a big winner, just as we were able to predict by counting the trumps and following the Law. But both world class north players in our match bid 4S!

As often happens, there are 17 trumps and only 17 tricks. (NS take 8 on best defense and EW take 9). Bidding 4S was a big loser.

You won't always be right with this sort of calculation. Maybe this would have been the deal with 19 trumps where it was right to save in 4S against a making 4H. But if you always follow the Law, and go with the percentages, you'll be right most of the time. We can't ask for more than that.

West has to decide about partner's bidding. Is it a cue raise for spades? How does partner show a strong single suiter hand? Most of the panel considered that the 2H bid was

a genuine suit, despite South's attempts to muddy the waters.

Many of the competitors (58%) thought it was a cue raise in Spades and made a game try / game bid.

The experts considered that if partner was making a cue raise, then 2C was the bid not 2H, hence 2H is a true bid with good values. Recognizing this, an almost majority of experts decided to show some values with 2NT which by implication denies heart support.

When the hand was played, 4H was a make, 3NT was off 2 and 4S was a disaster

As a side note, many experts considered that they would have bid 2S instead of 1S (8-10, 5Sp.)

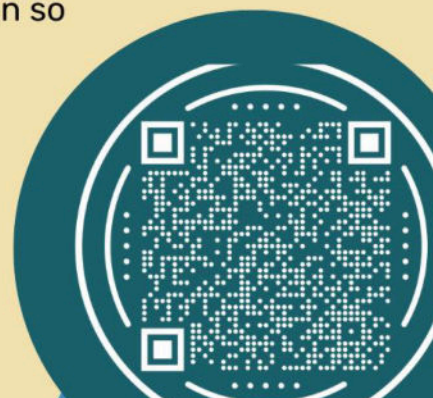

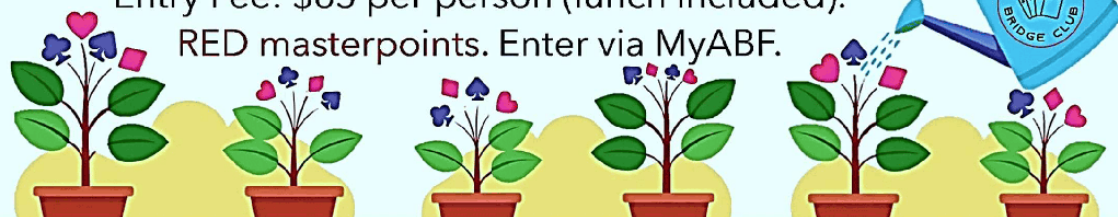
