Photographing Monumental Buildings

The UNESCO WORLD HERITAGE SITE - Itsukushima shrine was built in 593AD on Miyajima island and is dedicated to the Gods of Seas and Storms. It is 16.8 metres high.

This photo was taken in South Japan 2010. Upon completion of my year of teaching in Shanghai, China I took a 5 day trip to Japan. I visited Fukuoka, Miyajima and Hiroshima.

The best way to photograph these types of buildings is to place a person in or around the structure. This then gives the viewer an idea of the size and placement of the structure and how it fits into the context of itself, the landscape and the other buildings in the shrine.

This photo was taken on the island of Miyajima. The Torii Gate was built using huge timbers without the use of modern cranes or concrete. It was built at low tide and can be easily seen over most of the island. The island is situated near Hiroshima a short tram ride to the coast.

I was there at about 2pm and waited until the tide went out around 4pm when I was able to walk around the structure and get right up close to it to understand the complexity of this monumental structure. It has withstood centuries of water and tides and weather conditions painted with a red-orange resin oil that describes its appearance. All Torii Gates and many other entrances are painted and preserved in this way.

The island has few cars, walking is the only form of transport. Torii Gates mark the entrance to a Shinto Shrine and displays the entry from the mundane to the Holy ground. Torii Gates are found at the entrance of Buddhist temples. There are some 90,000 Torii Gates in Japan. Most are a bright Vermillion Red and the colour represents the colour of fire and the sun.

On the island are a deer population. If you carry food they will attack you and steal your lunch! Which happened to me!

"I love volunteering here. I'm no great singer but I can carry a tune. It's lovely seeing the residents enjoying themselves."





The Climate Report

Something approaching a miracle has been taking place in California this spring. Beginning in early March, for some portion of almost every day, a combination of solar, wind, geothermal, and hydropower has been producing more than a hundred per cent of the state's demand for electricity. Some afternoons, solar panels alone have produced more power than the state uses. And, at night, large utility-scale batteries that have been installed during the past few years are often the single largest source of supply to the gridsending the excess power stored up during the afternoon back out to consumers across the state. It's taken years of construction-and solid political leadership in Sacramento-to slowly build this wave, but all of a sudden it's cresting into view.

California has the fifth-largest economy in the world and, in the course of a few months, the state has proved that it's possible to run a thriving modern economy on clean energy

Making the "green" choice then leaves us satisfied that we are "doing something" about climate change. But driving an electric car, putting your organic produce in a tote bag and



turning down your heating or airconditioner by one degree is not going to save the planet. Let's have the courage to face this fact.

What would make a difference is developing mass transport and substantially reducing car ownership; closing coal mines and ending oil and gas exploration; promoting decentralised and community-managed renewable energy systems; doing away with industrial-scale monoculture farming; and supporting smallholder and Indigenous-led agroecological systems that have been shown to enhance nutrition, biodiversity and quality of life.

That is why, as Swedish climate activist Greta Thunberg, has eloquently pointed out, "we can't save the world by playing by the rules because the rules have to be changed".

Solar's off-the-charts global growth

Installed solar capacity is doubling every three years, meaning it has grown tenfold in the past ten years. The Economist says the next tenfold increase will be the equivalent of multiplying the world's entire fleet of nuclear reactors by eight, in less time than it usually takes to build one of them.

To give an idea of the standing start the industry has grown from, The Economist reports that in 2004 it took the world an entire year to install one gigawatt of solar capacity (about enough to power a small city). This year, that's expected to happen every day.

Energy experts didn't see it coming. The Economist includes a chart showing that every single forecast the International Energy Agency has made for the growth of the growth of solar since 2009 has been wrong. What the agency said would take 20 years happened in only six.

Solar easy, batteries more difficult

Batteries are more difficult. They are needed to make solar useful after dark and they require so-called critical minerals such as lithium, nickel and cobalt (which Australia has in abundance).

But the efficiency of batteries is soaring and the price is plummeting, meaning that on one estimate the cost of a kilowatt-hour of battery storage has fallen by 99% over the past 30 years.

In the United States, plans are being drawn up to use batteries to transport solar energy as well as store it. Why build high-voltage transmission cables when you can use train carriages full of batteries to move power from the remote sunny places that collect it to the cities that need it?

The first free library was in a round bluestone building at the BARWON Hotel.

It was built in the 1860's and had 2500 books. Where did these books go? It was built over the underground tank which was then the only water supply of the hotel.

It contained a fireplace, windows and circular shelves. After thirty years of continuous use, this snug reading room was found to be too small and a movement was commenced to have a new library built.

After a public meeting in 1889 the three cornered block where the current library is - was bought and a building built and opened in 1894 and closed as a library in the 1970s.

The erection of this attractive and useful little building is largely due to the financial and moral support of Cr. Montague Smith who was President of the Free Library Committee.

Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey results are in

The Surf Coast Shire Council has again scored higher than other large rural councils in all categories in the Victorian Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey.

The Council's overall performance index score of 57 was one down from the previous year but still well ahead of the average rating of 50 for large-rural councils group, and 54 for all Victorian councils.

The annual survey co-ordinated by the Department of Government Services provides insight into community views on areas including overall council performance, value for money in services and infrastructure, decisions made in the interest of the community, customer service, and council direction.

Key findings for the Surf Coast Shire Council included:

- Waste management registered the highest satisfaction index score of 73 out of 100, up from 70.
- Sealed and unsealed roads maintenance categories were both

up on 2023. Sealed roads scored 57, up from 56 and unsealed score 48, up from 46. Both ratings were well above the large-rural scores of 38 and 34 in these categories and statewide 45 and 36.

- Consultation and engagement remained unchanged at 52, higher than large-rural 48.
- Value for money remained unchanged at 51, higher than large-rural 43 and state 48.
- Customer service remained unchanged at 71, compared with large-rural 65 and state 67.
- Overall Council direction slipped one point to 45, higher than largerural on 42 and equal with the state score.

Cr Gary Allen said the annual survey provided valuable insight.

"We thank community members for having shared their input," Cr Allen said.

"We are pleased our ratings continue to be higher than other councils across the board and survey responses have highlighted areas with room for improvement.

"Even though maintenance of unsealed roads ranked two points higher this year it clearly remains an area our community is looking for improvement. We look forward to community input from our recent extensive unsealed roads review helping to guide our work in this area into the future. As always, doing more in one area requires decisions on how to deliver it whether that be reducing something else we are doing or looking for new revenue.

"We are also really pleased to see our waste management score increase. Knowing how passionate and aware our community is about our environment, waste reduction and recycling, the endorsement from community means a great deal."

Guest Speaker: Silvana Lannello—Speleologist (cave ecologist)



Silvana will present her work as a Speleologist and discuss the hidden world of caves within the Corangamite Catchment and what lies beneath. By day, Silvana serves as an Environmental Land Manager in the Corangamite Catchment, but her true passion lies beneath the surface. Since 2009, she has dedicated herself to the study, exploration, and conservation of subterranean ecosystems, with a particular focus on cave crickets and other small cave-dwelling creatures.

Silvana's work has led her to the discovery of a previously unknown cave cricket species in Victoria and the mapping of numerous new caves across Australia. Her work not only expands our scientific knowledge but also demonstrates the importance of preserving these hidden worlds.

Beyond her research, Silvana advocates for cave conservation. Her short film, "Adapted to the Dark," won first prize in Australia's 2021 Year of Caves and Karst Creatives Competition, shedding light on cave crickets and the importance of cave ecosystems to a wider audience. More recently, in 2024, Silvana produced "On the Line: Nullarbor," a film highlighting the significance of the Nullarbor Plain and advocating for its protection against industrialisation giants.

In addition to her caving pursuits, Silvana holds leadership roles in key organisations dedicated to speleology. As Vice President of the Australian Speleological Federation and President of The Australian Cave Animal of the Year project.

This year, 2024, we celebrate the Nullarbor Blind Cave Spider, Traglodiplura genus as Australia's Cave Animal of the year.


C Grade - Winchelsea 48 def Bannockburn 41




